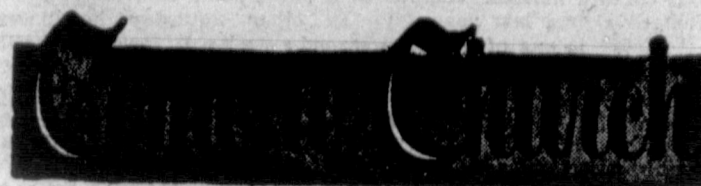
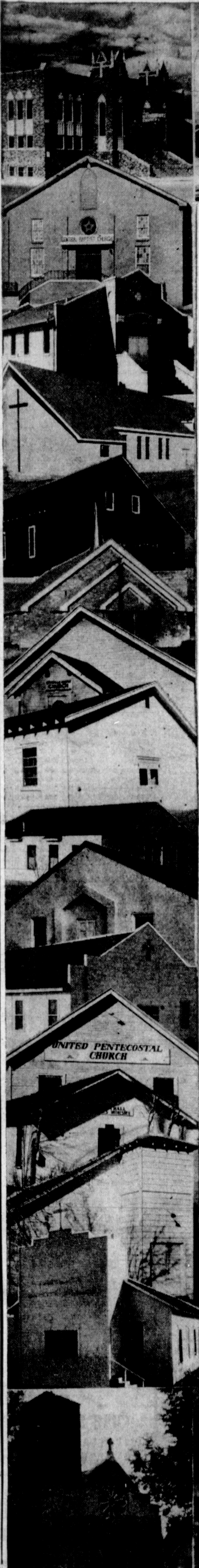
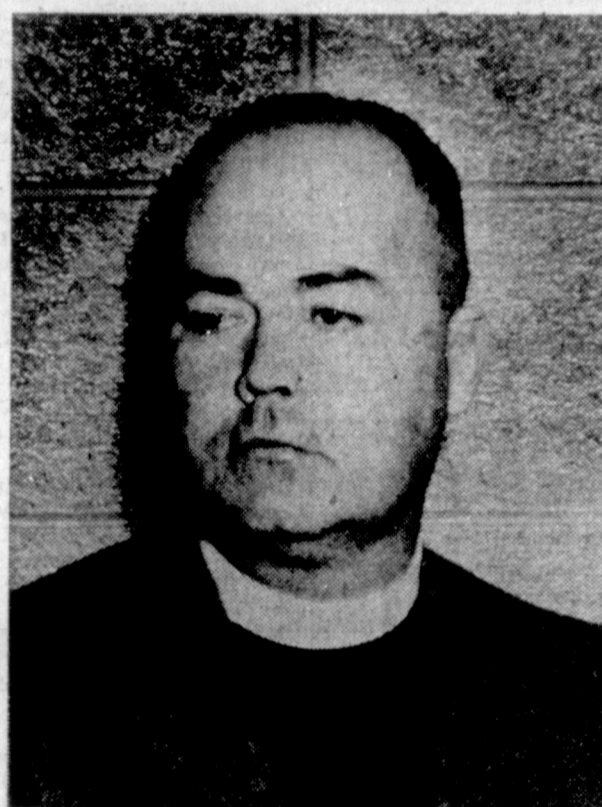

CHRISTIAN LOVE AND MARRIAGE

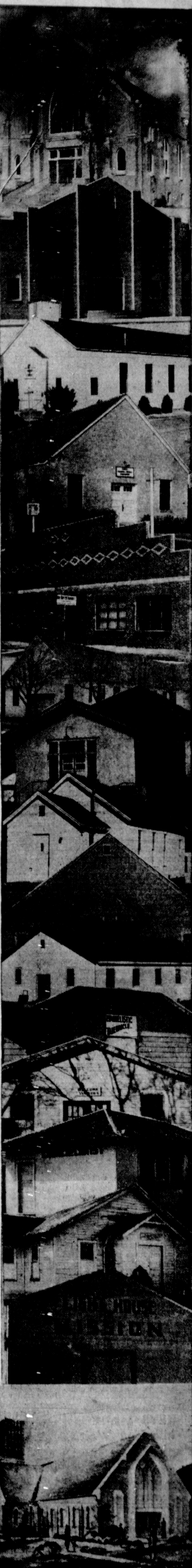
Often unhappiness in marriage is caused by the fact that one or both of the partners is not getting out of the marriage those satisfactions that he or she had been led to expect. As lovers, each may have idealized the other into a perfect being, with whom union would assure perfect happiness. After a few years, or sometimes months, the perfect being turns out to be an illusion. The needs of each partner have not been met. They feel cheated. The marriage goes on the rocks. There often begins a search for another perfect being, a divorce, a re-marriage, and the cycle begins again.

What is wrong? The secret lies in the words "what he or she has been led to expect". The only hope of a way out of the serious condition into which the marriage has fallen lies in loving our neighbor (spouse) as ourselves.

A marriage which is tottering often can be redeemed by putting it on a basis of Christian love rather than romantic love. Romantic love seeks self-gratification: Christian love seeks the good of the other. A marriage which is based on "my happiness" will always fail. One which is founded in a common purpose, the happiness of each other and of the children it produces, WILL SUCCEED.

In a Christian marriage based on Christian love, the man and wife become the neighbor whom each is to love as himself. In seeking the good of the other, it is God's will that is done, not the will of one partner which may be at cross purposes with the will of the other. It is the common good of the marriage that is foremost for consideration, how each daily decision made by the man and wife can best contribute to the working out of GOD PURPOSE for them and for the world about them.

In such a marriage there will be of course ups and downs because both partners are fallen human beings with all the sins that beset humans. But each difficulty looked at together in Christian love and prayer, will be overcome. The difficulties will not be a cause for more separateness, but more TOGETHERNESS. Zhukov Not Contender For Top Red Post

Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov's treatment on his visit to Yugoslavia may indicate that he is not really a contender for top Soviet leadership.
Certainly, it seems to indicate that President Tito — who ought to know — does not regard him as a rival of Nikita S. Khrushchev for the Nov. 1 spot in the Kremlin. Zhukov went to Yugoslavia in his capacity of Russian defense minister. He was returning a visit made to Russia by Gen. Ivan Gornjak, Yugoslav state secretary for defense.
Officially, at least, Zhukov was treated as the defense minister of any other country would have been.
During his 10-day stay, Zhukov saw Tito just once. That was when he went to Tito's summer home in the Slovenian Mountains for a day of hunting and for a reception.
Toured Country
The rest of the time, Zhukov was entertained in Belgrade as the guest of Gornjak and other high officers and was taken for a tour around the country to inspect military installations.
It seems entirely unlikely also that he would have paid so little attention to a man who, he thought, was breathing down Khrushchev's neck in a bid for leadership.
Zhukov, of course, is as much a Communist as Khrushchev is. He also is a member of the Communist Party Presidium which rules Russia.
Zhukov's support probably saved Khrushchev in the Kremlin dispute which resulted in the ousting of Georgi M. Malenkov, Vyacheslav M. Molotov and Lazar M. Kaganovich from the government at the Presidium. At that time, Zhukov was promoted from alternate to full membership in the Presidium.
There have been reports ever since that Zhukov, in command of the armed forces, was the real power in the Kremlin and that he might supplant Khrushchev as No. 1 man in the Soviet collective leadership.
Perhaps Non-Political
These reports may prove to be correct. But Zhukov's visit to Yugoslavia did nothing to substantiate them. The routine manner of his reception brings to mind the instance of Russian experts before the Kremlin dispute that the Russian armed forces were not involved in politics and that Zhukov had no political ambitions.
Belgrade dispatches reported before Zhukov's arrival that he would try to sell Tito the idea of making Russia his sole source of arms, instead of getting weapons from the United States, and that Tito would refuse. After Zhukov's visit, the dispatches said that he seemed to have accomplished little if anything in negotiations.
It is true that during the visit Tito recognized the Communist puppet government of East Germany. But that hardly was a matter with which Zhukov was concerned.
One interesting thing about Zhukov's visit is that he went from Yugoslavia to Albania, the little Communist satellite country on the Adriatic Sea.
Russia has built up a formidable naval base there, at Saseho,

Senate Group Continues Investigation

AUSTIN (UP) — Largent Parks Sr., an insurance company president who tries to keep everybody happy "as much as I can" resumes testimony today before the Senate investigating committee.
Parks, president of Preferred Life Insurance Co. of Dallas, told the committee Wednesday if any of his stockholders aren't happy, he will buy back their stock at the price it cost them.
"You may have that opportunity," observed committee Chairman Sen. Charles Herring.
Committee Counsel Gene Fondren charged Parks sold \$170,000 of stock he bought for \$10 a share to the public for \$50 a share, telling purchasers it was a new issue offered to increase the capital of Preferred Life.
The subscription blanks said the stock was for convenience.
Parks said the blanks were used only for convenience, and insisted every purchaser was told he was buying stock held in Parks' name.
"Why did you take such a chance of raising a question on the sale of those stocks?" Fondren asked.
"I didn't realize I was taking a chance," Parks replied.
Fondren mentioned when an unhappy stockholder complained the stock was "grossly misrepresented," Parks was quick to give the man back his money.
Asked why he did that, Parks replied "I try to keep everybody happy, as much as I can."
Examiner's Report
An examiner's report alleged Parks company was owed \$194,707 on stock sales.
"Do you deny it is true?" Fondren asked.
"Absolutely," Parks replied.
"Why?"
"Because it's not true."
Parks said of the \$194,707, some \$24,000 was represented in stock owned by a company official. That left \$170,000 allegedly owed by Parks.
"I can't even account for \$100,000. I'm out of the stock. I have not got the stock," Parks said.

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Representative Proposes Plan On Integration

WASHINGTON (UP) — Rep. Brook Hays (D-Ark.) has proposed a three-point program based on "friendly persuasion" to help avoid sending federal troops to enforce school integration.
Hays represents Little Rock, Ark., in Congress. He served as mediator in arranging a meeting between President Eisenhower and Arkansas Gov. Orval E. Faubus in the Little Rock integration dispute.
To avoid sending federal troops to other states to enforce integration Hays recommended:
—Local communities should study all suggested alternative approaches.
—The Supreme Court should give great weight to variations in local school conditions and should re-examine the 1954 school decisions with the intent to provide an approach more suitable to conditions as they actually exist.
—"There should be a suspension of pressures for compliance in localities where the basis for change is not fully laid in public sentiment."
Hays' program called on all groups involved — southern communities, the Supreme Court and Negroes — to adopt a conciliatory approach.
—"Since neither 'massive resistance' nor military enforcement is satisfactory, let both sides begin using 'friendly persuasion,'" Hays said in a newsletter to his constituents.

Christian Dior Dies Of Heart Attack

MONTECATINI TERME, Italy (UP) — Christian Dior, the mild-mannered fashion czar whose merest whim could change hemlines for ten million women died of a heart attack shortly before midnight Wednesday night.

The 52-year-old bachelor rose to his greatest fame shortly after the war when he unveiled the long-skirted "new look" that substituted what he called the "peace-time grace and charm of a woman in a long skirt" for the knee-length dresses of World War II.
He remained at the top of the rarefied world of "haute couture" — the high style that made Paris synonymous with fashion. He did it with succeeding "A" looks, "H" looks and this year's new "Sack look" which puts women in a formless, bell-shaped garment that also is known as the "Gunnysack look."
Dior was visiting this famed spa near Pisa with four men friends and was stricken shortly after dinner. He returned to his room at the luxurious Hotel De La Paix and died a few minutes before midnight.
The success of his dictates to women reportedly brought him a seven million dollar annual business and a \$75,000 annual income.

Housing Tight In Southern States

ATLANTA (UP) — A Census Bureau survey turned up a "tight" housing situation in the South with nearly 90 per cent of the dwelling units occupied.
The survey covered Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Maryland, Delaware, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Texas.
The Commerce Department's Atlanta field office said that of the more than 13 million dwelling units in the area, 89.6 per cent were occupied, "only slightly less than the 90.9 per cent occupancy for the nation as a whole."
Including facilities for submarines which could operate in the Mediterranean, it is possible that the visit to Albania ranked with or surpassed in importance the visit to Yugoslavia.
