

January Wholesale Prices **Increase Eight-Tenths Of 1%**

WASHINGTON (AP) -Wholesale prices jumped another eight-tenths of one per cent in January. The rise exactly matched December's increase and indicated that the expected Phase 2 price bulge has not yet begun to flatten out.

When adjusted for the usual seasonal trends, the rise in the wholesale index was only half as great, or four-tenths of one per cent, the Labor Department's announcement said.

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The seasonal improvement resulted from a smaller climb in food and farm products. which rose 3.2 per cent in December-the biggest increase for those items in 10 monthsand 1.3 per cent in January.

But there was no comfort for administration economists in the segment of the index that covers industrial materials and commodities. It increased five-tenths of one per cent. compared with four-tenths of

one per cent in December. The industrial commodities are considered a better indicator of future price movements at retail than the food and farm prices, whose movements are more erratic. White House economists had

predicted substantial increases in both December and January, the first two full months following the end of the 90-day price-wage freeze. Early decisions by the Price Commission gave a green light to substantial adjustments of prices frozen

since Aug. 15. The wholesale price showing was disappointing nevertheless because consumer prices rose only one-tenth of one per cent in January, or three-tenths of one per cent after seasonal adjustment. This movement, an-

consumer price increases lie ahead, because the portion of the index devoted to consumer finished goods rose fourtenths of one per cent. This represents a sampling of commodities which closely resemble those in the commodity segment of the consumer price index.

Of the 15 major commodity groups measured by the wholesale index, 13 rose from December to January. 2 showed no change, and none

The index for all commodities stood at 116.3 per cent of the 1967 average, or 4 per cent above a year earlier. However, the inflation rate was still within bounds of President Nixon's goal of keeping price increases limited to 2 to 3 per cent a year. thanks to the stringent

Two Leaders Make Pledges At Banquet

PEKING (AP) - Premier Chou En-lai pledged tonight that China "will work unswervingly" for normal relations and friendly contacts with the United States.

At a dinner in his honor, the Chinese leader responded to a toast in which President Nixon declared: "We have begun the long process of removing that wall between us."

Seated at round tables in the Great Hall of the People, the Chou and Nixon encourages ate a nine-course meal of Chinese food except for grapefruit and orange segments flown from the United States. They sipped California champagne.

Nixon began the toasting by expressing appreciation for the Chinese hospitality shown the Americans the five days they have been in Peking.

Chou and Nixon came to the dinner from their fifth and final meeting, at which they presumably reached agreement on improving contacts through cultural and other exchanges, with diplomatic relations some time in the future.

Recalling his visit Thursday to the Great Wall of China, Nixon said the wall showed "the determination of the Chinese people to retain their independence throughout their long history.

"The Great Wall is no longer a wall dividing China from the rest of the world." he continued. "But it is a reminder of the fact that there are many walls still existing in the world, which divide nations and peoples.

Many Pampans watching the television report of President Nixon's visit to the historic Great Wall of China this week were unaware that an artifact of that same 2.200-year-old wonder of the ancient world is one of the rare items on display at the White Deer Land Museum here in Pampa. It is owned by Tracy D. Cary chairman of the Gray County Historical Survey Committee

The small fragment of mortar was obtained on a visit to China in 1915 by Cary's father, the late Judge C. I. Cary. during the time he was stationed in the Philip Islands with the United States Department of Education. It was obtained at a location some 20 miles north of Peking at a place where the Wall had been intentionally and destructively broken to make way for a road...news reports indicate this is the same approximate location which President and Mrs. Nixon visited this week. PORT ARTHUR, Tex. (AP) -Discovery of three bodies of apparent murder victims within three days had city authorities alarmed today as a \$1,000 reward offer was

expected to grow quickly. Mayor Bernis Sadler of Port Arthur announced Thursday that the city was offering a \$1,000 reward for arrest and conviction of what he called the "vicious persons or person" responsible for the deaths.

Sadler asked corporations groups and individuals to add to the reward fund.

The third body found was believed that of a missing officer from the tanker Texaco Rhode Island, A. H. Strickland, about 50, who vanished from the Driftwood Motor Hotel here about midnight of Feb. 15.

Police said they believed Strickland, from Middletown, Conn., carried about \$500 when he disappeared, but the decomposed body found in what apparently were Strickland's clothes had no wallet on it and only about \$6 in the pockets.

A receipt from the Driftwood also was found in the clothing

The body believed to be Strickland's was found in high weeds off Farm Road 365 Thursday. Nearby officers found a spent .25 caliber slug.

It was the same caliber weapon that killed two area businessmen some 24 hours earlies, George Martin, 55, of Groves and Bernard B. Bardslev. 56. of Port Arthur. Both men, their bodies about five miles apart, had been shot in the left ear.



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Insurance Company Men Attack Hanoi Blasts Nixon's Trip **Idea Creating 'Guaranty Fund'**

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - A Texas consumer advocate strongly backed legislation Thursday to guarantee policyholders something more than apologies when life insurance companies go broke.

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Executives of two leading Texas-based companies, however, attacked the idea of a "kitty" to pay off claims of defunct firms.

The testimony was before an interim legislator-citizen study committee chaired by State Insurance Commissioner Clay Cotten.

Why should the policyholder be the one to bear the burden of an insurance company failure? ... They are the ones who are least able to bear it," said Joe K. Longley, chairman of the Texas Consumer Association's legislative committee.

Longley endorsed Cotten's proposal requiring all insurance companies that sell life and medical insurance in Texas to hold a certain amount of their funds in trust. The money would be used as a "guaranty fund" to pay claims of policyholders against insolvent insurance companies

Ben H. Carpenter of Dallas. board chairman of Southland Life Insurance Co., denounced the plan as a "poor political expedient.

"This is locking a barn door after the horse has been stolen, and then assessing the neighbors for contributions to buy a new horse, and at the same time permitting other barn doors to remain unlocked," Carpenter said.

Texas Filing Fee Law Ruled Unconstutional

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court ruled Thursday that a Texas state law requiring candidates in local primary elections to pay filing fees sometimes as high as \$8,900 is unconstitutional.

Upholding a lower court ruling, the justices said the Texas filing fee scheme discriminates against candidates who would otherwise be qualified to run for county judges, county commissioner or other similar offices. They are barred, the court said, simply by their inability to pay.

The opinion written by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger said, "many potential officeseekers lacking both personal wealth and affluent backers are in every practical sense precluded from seeking the nomination of their chosen party. no matter how qualified they might be and no matter

taking part, the court emphasized that it was not slapping down election filing fees in general, but rather finding the Texas rates dramatically excessive

Many states use filing fees as a means of keeping frivolous candidates off the ballot and Texas officials said that was one reason for the charges it levied on political aspirants. But, said the court, the Texas fees by their very size give them "a patently exclusionary character. Texas also said it needed the

fees to finance its elections. but the court said it could easily find other sources or at least a less disproportionate levying of filing fees.

House Approves Foreign Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House today passed a \$3.2billion money appropriation for foreign aid and related agencies-the last step in Congress' four-month foreign aid battle-and sent it to the Senate for final action.

Sen. William Proxmire indicated the Senate might vote on sending the bill to President Nixon before the end of the day.

The measure appropriates \$2.62 billion for foreign aid itself and the rest for related programs including \$72 million for the Peace Corps. It restores \$86 million for the

United Nations' own foreign program, from which the House had voted to withhold the entire 1972 U.S. contribution, and international bank money the House had sharply curbed.

U.S. Astronomers Believe Titan Warmer Than Originally Thought

HOUSTON (AP) - Astronomers from the University of Texas and the University of Hawaii say they have discovered that Titan, the largest moon of Saturn, has a more massive atmosphere and is warmer than originally thought. Dr. Laurence M. Trafton, a

member of the UT astronomy department, said spectrographic analysis of light received from Titan by the 107-inch UT telescope at McDonald Obsevatory near Fort Davis indicates the atmosphere on the 2600-mile diameter body is at least 10 times more dense than previously suspected. He also said the atmosphere appears thicker than the atmosphere on Mars.

Dr. David Morrison of the system. Institute of Astronomy at the University of Hawaii said infrared measurements made through another telescope in Hawaii of the heat emitted by the large satellite show that miles larger in diameter

temperatures at the top of Titan's atmosphere is about 290 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. He said it warms up to a minus 160 degrees on the surface.

Morrison said the surfact temperature is about 90 degrees warmer than it would be if Titan's atmosphere were as thin as originally thought. "The situation is one that we

don't understand fully but this kind of temperature variation certainly gives evidence for there being quite a massive atmosphere" Morrison said. However, he doubts that Titan is warm enough to sustain any sort of life, although the new results solidify Titan's reputation as being one of the

the only satellite that has an atmosphere. However, it is not the largest moon as Jupiter's Ganymede is a few hundred

Dr. Gerald P. Kuiper discovered the existence of an atmosphere on Titan at McDonald Observatory in 1944.

Trafton estimates that the minimum surface pressure on Titan is about 10 to 11 millibars, about twice that of Mars, although Mars is larger than Titan.

A millibar is a thousandth of the standard atmospheric pressure at sea level on Earth, about 14.7 pounds per square inch.

The mystery is how could Titan have so much atmos-phere." Trafton said. Perhaps this is outgassing from the interior of Titan.

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
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


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Mothers react to letter on birth of 'special' child

DEAR ABBY: This is my first letter to a column:

How should one react to the news that their friends have had an "abnormal" child? I think I can answer that because we had one. We were lucky enough to be told immediately of our baby's condition and did not have the agony of the slow realization that "something was wrong."

Feeling it best to face the problem, we freely told our friends and relatives about our "special" child. Altho we knew very little about what to expect, he was our baby, and we knew we wanted to keep him with us. He is now a lovable, mischievious 11-year-old Mongoloid, going to a special school, and we have never regretted our decision.

Perhaps "congratulations" are not in order, but to ignore the presence of a new baby in a home, when you would normally express interest is, I think, cruel. To this day I remember the pleasure I felt when someone came to see our baby, to hold him, and to let me talk about him.

One of the burdens a mother of a retarded child has is not having anyone with whom to compare notes about her child's progress. Every tiny gain has a tremendous important meaning for the mother of a handicapped child.

So, do acknowledge the birth of a special child. Or send a little gift. Or send flowers to the mother. Continue to show an interest [not curiosity], and encourage the parents to get in touch with their local society for retarded children for help with mutual problems. It will be rewarded with much love, affection, and gratitude. EDITH

DEAR ABBY: Someone wrote asking you if they should send a gift or a card of "congratulations" to a mother who has given birth to a Mongoloid child. Thank you for saying: "By all means, yes. To a mother, a child is a child."

I know your advice was sound because I had a Mongoloid son. Friends called. They stopped by. They even gave me a surprise baby shower when he was a month old. Here is the message on one card which meant so much to me:----



Not all Mongoloid children are severely retarded. No one knows at the time of his birth what his potential will be ce. He deserves better than to be written of as a "tragedy." An investment of love and care and a little work can be returned tenfold.







Despite a general increase in the number of craft personnel over the past two decades-10 million workers 1968, compared with 8.1 million in 1948- the needs are now growing faster than the employment rate. One government report projects that some five million more such workers will be needed by 1980, which is about 3.5 million more than we'll probably have if present growth rates continue. The shortage already is evi-



DEAR POLLY-We bought a second-hand green vinyl upholstered sofa and chair that are in perfect condition except for a few small cigarette burns on the sofa seat and two tears a couple of inches long on the chair arm. Is there a decorative or inconspicuous method of repair? The chair arm worries me most as the burn holes do not really show. Any doubts that the consumer is still king can be erased simply by looking around

People buy the products they want to buy in the quantities they want to buy and in the styles and quality hey desire.

To be sure, some consumers make what turn out to be unwise purchases in the long run and at other times their choices are wise and profitable.

Well, that's all obvious and ementary, one might say. But the point is that the consumer of America today is under great siege by consumer groups, political bureaucrats and pseudo moralists all working in what might appear to be a conspiracy to discredit the free enterprise system.

So subtle is the multi-pronged attack that the corspiracytheory will be disbelieved. An in truth, it may not be a conscious ednspiracy as such. However there can be no doubt that the philosophical roots of these anti-consumer movements strike at the very heart of the dea upon which the economy f America was built-a free marketplace.

What makes possible the increasing strength of these attackers is that each has an ement of truth upon which hey base their campaigns. There are some shoddy tems offered for sale, there dishonest ndividuals engaged in unwise usiness practices, there are some unsafe products. And thereby the political interventionists justify their strangle-hold on all who engage in marketplace ctivity. They seek the force at law to restrict production

and distribution in the name of ecology, public health and consumer protection.

Certainly, no one can quarrel with the stated goals-dependable, safe products, a clean environment and equitable exchanges between buyer and seller.

The fact that the methods they employ create greater opportunity for the abuses they seek to eliminate is lost in the emotionalism of the moment.

Yet, despite all the stumbling blocks thrown in the way of the enterprisers and the customers they seek to satisfy, business goes on.

Certain makes of automobiles are attacked as unsafe, but the customers keep buying more and more of them. Cigarets are blasted from many directions, are heavily taxed and even forced to bear labels designed to curtail their sale, yet the customers still make purchases in increasing numbers. Pornographic literature and movies catch the wrath of organized campaigns from coast to coast, still the individual customer continues to make his choice.

There is a lesson in all this. if we will but learn it.

Russian Bear on the Prowl While Nixon Visits Peking

By ROBERT'S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - Russia has not been idly sitting by while President Nixon was meeting with the Peking rulers.

The record is starkly clear that the Kremlin masters, with venomous aggressiveness, have been waging a worldwide offensive to undermine and sabotage the historic discussions.

The evidence on that is massive and conclusive. It shows that virtually every critical area has been under intense Soviet pressure and manipulation.

In this global counteroffensive. Russia is forcefully resorting to every conceivable political economic, military and propaganda stratagem. Where menacing threats and bald provocation don't fit, other, less truculent measures are employed.

It is very apparent from the nature and scope of these crafty and artful machinations that the Kremlin is leaving nothing undone to literally subvert President Nixon's foreign policies. This somber situation strikingly underscores a threnchant remark made here recently by Harvard Prof. Ross Terrill, author of two widely discussed magazine articles based on an extended stay in China, including talks with top officials:

'Peking authorities consider the Democrats more susceptible to Russia than the Republicans. From what 1 heard and observed. I gathered that the Chinese would rather deal with the Republicans than the Democrats.

The extent and nature of this Soviet drive are graphically detailed in a private Congressional study. Its primary sources were intelligence and military reports and assessments carefully studied by President Nixon before embarking for Red. China.

The overall conclusion of this backstage analysis sums up the matter concisely and explicitly, as follows:

"From the very beginning. when the President disclosed his intention to improve relations between the U.S. and

Soviet's successes is as

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unpalatable as they may be. are strongly supported by the evidence spelled out in the Congressional study. In substance, the highlights

These aggressive Vietnam operations were highlighted by an ostentatious visit to Hanoi by President Nikolai Podgorny and a lavish Kremlin reception by Prime Minister Kosygin for a new North Vietnam ambassador

INCONSISTENCY IN VIET

The recent bombing raids over North Vietnam might have been regarded as an encouraging sign. It could have signaled a renewed resolve to help the South Vietnamese defend their freedom against communist aggression. Yet the Administration has

displayed anything but a consistent policy in Vietnam. Shortly before the bombing raids were resumed. the President implied in a television interview that he would consider withdrawing all U.S. forces from Southeast Asia if the North Vietnamese would release U.S. prisoners of war. If such a policy were actually carried out it would make a mockery of the lives that have already been lost in Vietnam.

The basic problem is that the Administration appears to have no real sense of purpose in Vietnam, and therefore its tactical moves often contradict each other. Originally the U.S. had a

noble purpose in Vietnam: turning back communist tyranny and assisting an attacked people. But this purpose has become confused and thrust into the background as our government has switched to trying to conciliate the evil of communism.

It is still not too late to change this suicidal course. The leaders of our country could go to our citizens with the evidence of the horror of communism and what it has done to conquered people. Surely the people of our country would then realize that we have a moral obligation to defend a nation attacked by the communists. This renewed sense of

purpose would then guide our strategy and tactics in Vietnam. All of our efforts would be aimed at defeating the aggressors, instead of conciliating them at the expense of the people they seek to conquer.

Dear Reader-ACTH stands for Adreno Cortico Tropic Hormone. Adreno Cortico refers to the adrenal cortex. the small gland over the kidney which produces cortisone naturally. Prednisone is 'a purified medicine which has many of the effects of cortisone but not quite as many adverse side effects. Tropic refers to stimulating and H to Hormone, so basically ACTH is a hormone from the pituitary gland beneath the brain (the master gland) that stimulates production of the adrenal hormone. Thus, prednisone and ACTH have similar effects.

It is usually not good to stay on high doses of cortisone. prednisone, or ACTH for arthritis. I would suspect that your doctor has changed your husband's medication to keep him from having undesirable complications and still try to help control his arthritis. These hormones must be used carefully if one is to avoid having serious complications. They do not cure the arthritis. They may relieve a person's symptoms.



Just west of the triangle is the community of Batson, where around the year 1900 all unmarried young women were thrown in jail periodically. and bachelors bid to bail them. out. Each winner got to take the girl home with him for 24 hours.

"Look at that log over there." Geraldine said in the Jack Gore Baygall. "I always have a weakness for moss-covered logs.'

One wonders how many people share this weakness. The only historical thing that Geraldine wants to preserve is the music of the dog people- woodsmen who hunt with dogs. She had promised her passengers a concert by "the best oldtime fiddler I ever heard." Unfortunatly the fiddler was

on a two-weeks' drunk. Then she was going to show off "a young boy with a sweet voice who knows all the oldtime songs-learned them from his mother-but he's in jail. Seems like he can't stay out of jail."
