To Seek New Talks With Soviet Union

PARIS-(UP)-Western delegates to the final session of the NATO summit conference announced today they had agreed on a two-way approach to the Soviet Union to resume the deadlocked disarmanent talks.

The summit conference ended at 1:55 P.M. with issuance of a Charter of Paris setting forth their decisions. In their communique, the summit leaders called on the Soviets to resume the arms talks either through the United Nations disarmanent subcommittee or through a new East-West Foreign ministers' conference.

An official spokesman disclosed the heads of government of the 15 NATO nations fully endorsed the Western disarmament proposals rejected by the Russians last September.

The communique said the NATO Contract On council "will neglect no possibility of restricting armaments within the limits of their own security.' Action Through U N.

The law also excludes from taxable gifts, gifts to the church, community chest, and similar charitable organizations, and allows each giver an exemption of \$30,000-before the tax applies.

The tax applies whether the gift is of money or of property. If it is of property, the tax is computed on the fair market value of the property at the date of the gift.

The purpose of many gifts is to remove the property from the taxble estate of the giver at the time f his death. This may or may not accomplished. The federal law rovides that transfers made withn three years before date of death shall be deemed to have been made in contemplation of death and shall be taxable in the estate of the one who dies.



WHY IS MEAT SO DEAR?-This is a question often asked by Mrs. Homemaker. But as Newschart above shows, the history of a steak from range to frying pan is a long and expensive process. Cattle, sheep and swine convert large quantities of grain and grass into meat which is nutritious and flavorful and a concentrated source of protein and energy. Actually, the American homemaker is spending a smaller and smaller percentage of her disposable income for meat (see center box). While many minor improvements can yet be made in the slaughtering, processing, distribution and retail business, meat experts say, the industry today is doing a competent and efficient job of serving the consumer inexpensively.







CDA recommends 10 square feet of floor space and 65 cubic feet of volume for each inhabitant. Man in center is operating hand-driven blower for ventilating system providing three cubic feet of air per minute for each person. At right end of chamber (not visible) is air outlet ventilator. Blast protection is afforded by a covering of six feet, eight inches of packed earth or four feet, six inches of concrete.





Mass Media Control

The "National Press Photographer" is a monthly publication devoted to items of interest to professional lensmen employed in various news media. The November issue of this magazine gave considerable space to the annual Photo Conference held at Rochester, Minne-

Among the items which should be of interest to all persons, professional pressmen and otherwise, was the report of a speech made by Leslie G. Moeller, director of the State University of Iowa's School of Journa-

Mr. Moeller touched on a particularly tender spot. Said he: "For the first time in its history, the federal government has begun to espouse formally the theme that the public does not have a right to know.

He showed that in at least, one third of all congressional committee hearings, the press is barred, and that insofar as the Atomic Energy Commission is concerned, virtually everything that occurs within this taxsupported and therefore public agency, is a matter of top secrecy. He charged that the "right of suppression" was being employed by the government in these and

The handout, and a tight rein on subordinates, is a method of controlling the flow of information" which is now widely in vogue, said Moeller.

"Mr. and Mrs. Every-Day Citizen give the strong impression of not bothering much with this sort of thing. In general, Mr. Average Citizen seems to feel that, so long as things go moderately well, freedom in the abstract is somebody else's business.

Moeller urged that educators and professionals in the media of mass communications bend every effort to bring the public a sense of personal identification with freedom. And he pointed out that a national climate favorable to freedom must be based upon information about freedom. "The citizen cannot act in darkness," is the way he put it.

He summed up his position by declaring that "the mass media need more research about the impact of their content." They "are the greatest educational force." And this force reaches on a daily basis about a hundred and twenty million people in this country who are beyond school age.

It is encouraging to have this well-informed opinion so ably presented at a conference where press protocharges made by the head of the Journalism School in lowa are altogether well founded.

For many years, there has been a tendency among the ranks of reporters to accept government handouts, whether federal or local, as gospel, and to prepare news stories around them. The old-style reporter who questioned everything, and particularly the political motives of government employees, has almost vanished from the American scene.

Several years ago, even the ubiquitous New York Times decided that there was altogether too much of government flavor in its news columns. So on a given day the paper ran a check to ascertain the sources of the material it had published. On the occasion of this spot check it found that approximately 84 per cent of Times news content was simply a rehash of prepared (and potentially slanted) government comment. Only 16 per cent of its news content on that day had actually been prepared by Times reporters without reference to

And the Times quite wisely observed that here was something to concern itself with. It pointed out that in Rússia, for example, 100 per cent of all news given to the controlled Russian press is government prepared, endorsed and slanted. The difference, then, suggested the Times was that in America 16 per cent of the news in a leading newspaper was non-government prepared and slanted. And it slyly hinted that it was scarcely creditable that all of the government prepared material distributed via the hand-out route, was objective and lacking in political bias.

This is something that every reporter, photographer and editor should have firmly in his mind at all times. It is the job of any mass media of information to strip the propaganda and the slanting out of any story and present the facts naked and without embellishment. Yet, when so many reporters, perhaps through, sheer inertia or lack of knowledge, lean so heavily on government prepared handouts, there is bound to be a dearth of truth in what is published.

We are indebted to Professor Moeller and to the NPPA Photo Conference in Rochester for presenting the point of view to which they held.

BETTER JOBS

How Unions Fool Many Good People

It is amazing how many good people have been fooled into believing labor unions that strike can benefit mankind. The reason they so believe, it seems to me, is that the wages of labor unions are concentrated in a lump sum and are thus easy to see. The part that believers in labor unions do not see is that the costs that pay these increased wages are so diffused and spread out that they are more difficult

Every strike that results in a non-competitive wage means that everybody who buys that product has to pay a little bit more for that product than he would have paid if wages were on a voluntary. earned, competitive basis. But on each particular item in the various classifications the amount is so small and grouped with the other costs of the item that the consumer fails to realize he is paying part of the cost of this fictitious wage

Fail To See What most union men that are temporarily benefited fail to see is that if they are granted the right to get an arbitrary wage, that sooner or later other people will demand a subsidy or an artificial wage When more and more lines of work become unionized, those who are not unionized are so handicapped that public opinion demands that something be done for them. Undoubtedly because laoor unions limit apprentices and practice seniority, the unskilled and the small producer was so nandicapped that the public began to believe in a minimum wage to help this class of people who were being barred from jobs by the la-

por union practices. The same thing applies to the farmers. When the farmers' sons were discriminated against and were not allowed to compete with organized labor, too many people remained on the farms. The rethe investor-owned businesses and industries whose taxes help to reduce every individual's tax bill. Not very fair, is it?

The investor-owned gas companies, the privately-owned electric utilities and all the many other types of non - socialized industries and businesses pay their own way under our American Capitalistic System of Free Enterprise the system responsible for creating for this nation the highest standard of living in all world history. Quite an achievement, don't you agree?

Gas utilities do not depend on public tax funds and they do not -hand begging for government subsidies. On the contrary, they stand on their own feet, are built solidly on the investment of thousands of people recruited from all walks of life, who have put their savings to work to provide the nation with a superior and less expensive fuel.

The "free enterprise" gas companies have already invested 16 billion dollars for facilities, and are increasing this at the rate of a billion and a quarter dollars each year. To provide a single customer with a dollar's worth of gas for one month requires an investment of \$60 invested in facilities. Looks as though the gas companies look with confidence to America's future!

Boiling statistics down to find just how much it has been necessary to invest to put one employee to work, we come up with an average of \$82,000 as the amount the gas companies have auteed into the kitty for each employee on their payrolls. This figure takes on special significance when compared with the \$12,000 to \$15,000 needed for the average factory

worker. Reflecting the growth of the gas co:npanies and their ever-increasing importance to the welfare and prosperity of the nation are their growth and increasing payrolls. Ten years ago they employed 120,000-today, 194,000. Ten years ago their payrolls totalled \$295 million-by 1955, they had reached Sers million.

The gas industry, tax-paying and unsubsidized, is making a vital contribution to our community and national economies. Their employees spend their wages in community shops and stores and to build and maintain homes. They generously support national and local charity programs to help protect their fellow citizens; and they pay their fair share of the tax load. In other words, gas company employees are good citizens


