Repairmen were able to restore current to approximately half of the blacked-out area in about 40 minutes by by-passing the section of the loop where the break had occurred.

Repairs on the broken line were completed at 7:30 Friday night and the remainder of the system was supplied with electric power.

The officials of the company reported that the failure in the line came less than two hours after a line supplying electricity to the west side of Pampa was cut to allow construction on the Hobart street underpass to progress. Current to that side of town was being supplied by the loop on which the failure occurred, they stated.

The arc resulting from the falling line also melted the sheathing on a telephone cable, but workmen repairing the phone cable yesterday morning reported that none of the lines in the cables were damaged and that service was not hindered.

Would 'Outlaw War

MOSCOW, Dec. 1 (UP)-Russia today rejected the NATO call for a foreign ministers' conference on disarmament and demanded instead a summit meeting to outlaw war and "solve the problems bothering humanity."

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko formally refused the proposal of the NATO powers at their Paris meeting in an address before the final session of the Supreme Soviet (Parliament).

Communist Party Chief Nikita Krushchev endorsed the rejection and called for an agreement on world peace between the United States

Pampa Traffic

The recent action of the Pampa City Commission to change existing traffic regulations in an effort to speed traffic with a maximum of safety certainly deserves the hearty commendation of the community. The elimination of diagonal parking on certain streets, in particular, is a momentous step which is in keeping with Pampa's rapid growth.

As is to be expected, the Commission is in for many protests from those business people who look upon such actions as detrimental to their personal interest and, in some cases, there is no doubt but that this is true. Streets, however, exist primarily for the movement of traffic and parking must always be relegated to a position of secondary consideration.

Since learning of the request of the Commission last week to the city attorney to draw up an ordinance to make right turns on a red signal legal, we have given this proposition some serious consideration for we have been unable to recall an instance to mind where a city has done away with the right turns on red and then reverted to the previous practice.

On making a few inquiries, it was discovered that this action was being taken by the Commission because of vocal elements who found the prohibited turn personally vexing and certain business people who felt the prohibited turn was undesirable because it seemed to them it slowed traffic too much.

Frankly, we know of no individual who particularly enjoys sitting at a red signal light when he sees the cross street in front of him free of traffic but this is not the issue at stack. There is only one issue, safety; and to look at it in any other light can have serious con-

The National Safety Council which exists for the sole purpose of appraising procedures and situations which create safety hazards is most definitely against the right turn on red as a matter of flat policy and we conclude that this position was taken on the basis of cold, hard analysis of facts. Too, the Pampa Citizen's Traffic Safety Commission has voiced its opposition to the proposed change.

Experience has pretty well indicated that the greatest hazard arising from right turns on red comes from the fact that a relatively small percentage actually make a complete stop and proceed with caution. To enforce a complete stop would almost require a policeman at every signaled intersection. Also the motorist who has the through right-of-way must always be alert to traffic violating the right-of-way. This automatically means that the through traffic, if it is judicious, must move at a slower pace because of possible turns into its traffic flow.

Those favoring the proposed ordinance try to make light of the safety factor by contending Pampa didn't have any accidents of consequence when the right turns were permitted but we think this is just another form of Russian roulette in that the laws of probability work out on averages which, though not applicable to a specific example, will eventually take their toll. We should be thankful for good fortune in the past and not wait to be shown by unnecessary injury to persons and property that which the National Safety Council has discovered by a close examination of the problem on a nat-

Pampa has left the small town status and graduated into the city class and our traffic ordinances should reflect this fact. As Pampa grows larger and traffic becomes an increasing concern, the problems caused by a right turn on the red light will become more and more

We understand the City Commission has had virtually no expression of desire to retain the present no right turn on red light rule. If you agree with the foregoing, we urge you to contact the mayor and commissioners before this Tuesday and let them know your thinking in the matter.

CIO-AFL On Right-To-Work Laws

In the last issue I was pointing out the errors of the pamphlet issued by the CIO on their contention that right - to - work a a w s would reduce the workers' standaro of living.

Now I want to discuss the folder issued by the California State Federation of Labor. They have issued an eight - page, two - color folder with the title page "What about the 'Right To Work' Fraud? Know The Facts: California's prosperity is threatened. Your livelihood is

About the only thing that is accurate in the whole folder is that 'right - to - work" ,s a misieading slogan. Certainly it is not a clear title. Slogans seidoni are able to express the ideas clearly as can be expressed with a longer

explanation. Of course the slogan does not mean that workers have a right to a job. What the right-to-work title means is that each and every individual has a right to be employed without interference from any person or group, if he can find somebody who wants to employ him. But to criticize the title is a way of diverting attention from the subject. No believer in rightto-work laws contends that it is a bill to guarantee a man a job if he wants to work.

Then the folder says: to work' is a tyranny of words. If adopted, it would cover a tyranny of deeds. It would wipe out workers' and employers' rights."

The statement that it is a tyranny of words. It is a method of trying to confuse the worker.

Then the statement that this law "would wipe out workers' and employers' rights" is a falsehood, unless we get our rights from the labor unions or from the government instead of from the Creator. And, of course, the persons who believe that men have a right to strike, with the idea of injuring another, believe in no eternal, moral law. They certainly do not believe in the Golden Rule or the Coveting Commandment or the "Love thy neighbor as thyself' Commandment.

Would any believer in the closed shop and the right to strike contend that he, for one minute, would want other workers to combire to keep him from seiling his services to the world's nighest bidder? If he so contends, he is talking nonsense. It thus violates the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment and the Command ment, "Love thy neighbor as thy-

THANK YOU, SPUTNIK! By Dr. Alfred P. Haake

Sputnik is not sufficient reason for the wave of fear and capitalization of that fear now sweeping into the minds and paralyzing the hearts of many Americans. But, we should be grateful to the Russians for their unintended kindness in awakening us out of our complacency and smug quest of still higher standards of living without the appropriate work and sacrifice that must accompany such a quest. 






