Texans weigh in on campaign finance reform

In large margins, Texans strongly support reforming fed-
eral campaign finance laws by imposing limits on a broad
Inal campaign finance laws by imposing limits on a broad
range of contributions. My annual questionnaire, which your newspaper published last August, asked Texans to tell
me how they feel about the ongoing campaign finance reform debate.
Of those who responded, 87 percent faver stricter limits
on contributions from non-citizen permanent U.S. residents;
86 percent favor stricter limits on labor unions' contribu86 percent favor stricter limits on labor unions' contribu-
tions and 71 percent said they support imposing stricter limits on contributions by individuals.
Asked if you think there should be limits on the amount of
money individuals or organizations can spend to support or money individuals or organizations can spend to support or
oppose candidates or specific issues, 74 percent of Texans
answered yes. But only 22 percent of you favor government oppose candidates or sp
answered yes. But only
funding of campaigns.
Here are some of your comments on this perplexing issue:
From Arcadia: "Individual contributions should be unlimited because restricting them would be a limit on free paigns."
From Lake Jackson: "No contributions should be allowed by any entity except a (singular) qualified voter.
Contributions should only be acceptable from an individContributions should only be acceptable from an individ-
ual's current personal earnings or savings. Corporations,
foreign countries foreign countries, labor unions, trade associations, etc. are
not voters and should be prohibited from giving financial not voters and should be prohbited from giving financial apply to contributors to political campaigns."
From Aledo: "We are not even enforcing our current laws,
Deregulate individual contributions, but require full, immeDeregulate individual contributions, but require full, imme-
diate disclosure. Forbid business and political action comdiate disclosure. Forbid business and political action compaign contributions to level the playing field. Special interests should not be allowed to influence government this
way. Capping contributions would allow them to represent way, not whoever has the most money. Right now, when money talks, government listens."
From Vernon: "I think non-citizen permanent residents
should not be allowed to contribute toward campaigns. If they are not willing to become legal citizens, they should not
have a say in any area of government... The buying of can-
didates needs to be stopped. Candidates need to focus on interest groups." From San Antonio: "The cost of campaigns should be
borne by the candidate entirely, but with free TV and radio corporate interests."
From Hurst: "There shouldn't be any limits on spending or donations, but we should require contributions and
expenditures to be reported within three days on a web site,
so everyone will know where support comes from." so everyone will know where support comes from."
From Blanco: "Public campaign finance is a misuse of tax dollars. If you're not a U.S. citizen, you have no right to parFrom Garland: "It's simple. Increase the limit on what an individual can donate (either individually or through a PAC or corporation) to $\$ 5,000$ for any legitimate candidate or
party. All congressional candidates should be required to raise 75 percent of their funds within their home state. On the income tax returns, people could select $\$ 10, \$ 25$ or write
in up to $\$ 100$ for support of presidential and senatorial races." El Paso: "I believe in total freedom for all people.

Anyone from any Congress will take up campaign finance reform next spring. I have introduced a bill design finance to remedy the noxt significant shortcomings in federal campaign finance laws.
These new rules would help return control of federal campaigns and elections to individual voters. My bill:

These are clear, workable reforms designed to encourage
greater political participation while curbing the abuses that greater political participation while

deaths. A search of his former home turned up a variety of drugs, syringes and needles. Authorities declined to elabo-
rate on the charges. But a state rate on the charges. But a state
police commander, Lt. Charles Ellis, said a computer analysis of the case finished in
November was a turning point. November was a turning point.
During the period Majors worked at Vermillion, now
known as West Central Community Hospital, a death
occurred every 23.1 hours he When he was off duty, a death occurred every 551.6 hours. The investigation included
the exhumations of 15 patients, ine exhumating the six people named
in the affidavit - all of whom died from injections. Ranging in age from 56 to 89 , all were said
to be in stable condition before they died suddenly.
An autopsy revealed some of the deaths were consistent with the injection of potassium chlo-
ride, which can cause the heart to stop. It is the same drug used
to kill some condemned prisoners.
In two cases, police said, a witness saw ctajors give a
patient an injection just before the patients died. A nurse once saw Majors standing over a vic-
tim with syringe in hand, investigators syaid, and in another case Majors was the last person seen with the patient. The hospital suspended began an investigation into the death rate. The State Nursing Board revoked his license for
five years in 1995 for practicing five years in 1995 for practicing
beyond his authority by giving emergency drugs and working in an ICU without a nurse pre-
sent.

## Mexico massacre:

More Mexican Indian refugees flee villages in Chiapas highlands
They trickled in from surrounding mountain ham lets, carrying whatever belongings they could on men. Clothed in threadbare ponchos and crude san dals, the latest group of ponchons and crude sanMexican state of Chiapas trudged for hours in the Mexican state of Chiapas trudged for hours in the
bone-chilling dampness. At the government's
nstitute grounds, the mostly Tzotzil Indians sat, shivering and waiting for food. Many said they had
nothing to eat in the last two days but a few tortillas with salt.
A few dozen armed federal police and soldiers had escorted the 300 Indians to safety on Monday, but the protection came too late for some.
After months of ignoring warnings from the After months of ignoring warnings from the
Roman Catholic Church, human rights groups and Roman Catholic Church, human rights groups and only after dozens of gunmen killed 45 people in the
town of Actal last week. own of Acteal last week.
All in all, about 5,000 people have fled their vil lages since Saturday, following months of terror by rmed gangs affiliated with Mexico's ruling Mireille Roccatti, president of the National Human Rights Commission, said 3,500 refugees had come to the town of Polho alone, 37 miles north Hundreds more sought refuge in nearby villages. Survivors of the Dec. 22 a
blamed PRI-affiliated gunmen.

The gunmen, dressed in black uniforms, gunned
down people in a five-hour killing spree- mostly women and children - in the village that sympahized with the Zapatista National Liberation Army It was the state's biggest number of deaths since he Zapatistas took up arms Jan. 1, 1994, to demand better treatment and living conditions for the dirtpoor Chiapas Indians, who are a majority in the More than 145 people were killed in fighting between the Zapatistas and the army until a truce was called 12 days later. An uneasy truce has since uneventful peace talks.
Last week's massacre sparked widespread outage in Mexico. Church, civic and opposition politiover the Chiapas state government and call new elections. Leaders of National Action and Democratic Revolution - the two biggest opposition parties are also demanding the resignation of Interior domestic security.
