



SO LITTLE FROM SO MUCH (The Wall Street Journal)

In a year and a half, according the best estimates of the State Department, the Russians have promised to pay some \$1.5 billion

in foreign aid. The dangling of this financial assistance by the Kremlin is credited by the State Department as contributing mightily to Communist success in seducing foreign governments into the Soviet orbit. Therefore - or so argues the Administration - this country must increase its foreign aid spending and grant it on more liberal terms to counteract the Russian

Well, it's not yet proved that the Russian foreign aid has accomplished as much as alleged. For one thing, a lot they have promised hasn't been paid and there's disillusionment around the corner for some of the beneficiaries. For another, there is no instance yet in which Russian foreign aid has enticed any foreign government into the Russian orbit that wasn't already skipping along

the edge anyway. But even if the Russian success has been as touted, this hardly suggests that buying friendly governments represents a good bargain. If we can buy them away from the Russians by upping the ante from our foreign aid funds, what's to prevent the Russians from buying them back again by tossing a few more rubles in the

There's something else curious about using the Russian foreign aid statistics to argue that our foreign aid officials should have more money to do more of what they have been doing.

During this year and a half whenthe Russians were supposedly having such a success with promises of \$1.5 billion, the U. S. actually disbursed something like \$6 billion in foreign aid. Hardly anyone claims a comparable success in winning friends ,with our \$6 billion. As a matter of fact, since World War II our total spending among foreign governments has exceeded \$60 billion. Yet, if anything, the Western nations that have received all this money are less happy with us than before.

Surely some questions are in order about the whole concept of our foreign aid program if it is true that the Russians can ac complish so much with so little while our foreign aiders are accomplishing so little with so much

BETTER JOBS

Dan Smoot, in "The Dan Smoot Report," has a very rational answer to the unions' "Free Rider" charge in his January 6 report. Of course if one would analyze who are free riders, one would have to determine what a free rider means. If it means someone who gets more than he actually produces, then any man who does, is a free rider. That is, provided one believes it is ethical and just

and right for each and every man

to get all he produces. Since the labor unions never know how to tell how much each man should get, those people who will answer questions on the subject contend that the only way to tell how much each man produces is to have a free and unhampered market for the product of what each man produces. But here is the way Smoot handles this ques-

"The unions' 'Free Rider' argument against right-to-work laws, is that, because a union gets benefits for all employes in a unionized plant, all employes should be forced to support the union: employes who get the benefits of unionism without paying dues are getting a free ride at the expense of union members.

"Unions claim it is a heavy burden on them to bargain for employes who do not pay union dues. 'Actually, contract negotiating is about the least expensive of all union activities. Unions spend most of their money on political lobbying and propaganda - and on slush funds for union officials. "Moreover, it was unions who demanded this monopoly of bar-

"Unions are not content to go into a company and sell their services, on a voluntary basis, to employes who want to buy, permitting employes who don't want union membership to do their own individual bargaining.

"Unions know they would get nowhere in a system like this. Not very many employes would willingly buy union services, because an able and ambitious employe, if permitted to apply himself and work as hard as he wants to, could get ahead much faster on his own than by being tied down to the general average of mediocrity which unions require.

"So, unions demanded a law which would give them exclusive bargaining rights for all employes in a plant where they can get & bare majority of employes to vote for the union. They got it (in both the Wagner Act and the Taft-Hartlev Act); and now they claim they are imposed on if the employes who don't want their services are not forced to pay for them.

"One union argument is that, inasmuch as unions do so much good for so many people, all people who benefit should be forced to support the unions!

validity in this argument, then all churches, clubs, fraternal organizations, political parties, and other whose activities are thought to be beneficial to society could compel all members of society to join and pay dues!

"Unions answer this point by saying unions are different. Unions, in fact, claim that they should have the power of government itself. When AFL challenged the constitutionality of a state right-to-work law in the Lincoln Union vs. Northwestern Company case (in 1949) AFL lawyers filed

a brief which said: 'The common rule of collective bargaining carries with it the legal doctrine that the union is the common authority for government of a society of workers. It has in a sense the powers and responsibili-

ties of a government.' 'This is identical with the corporate-state idea which Mussolini tried out in Italy and called fascism. It is also identical with the communist idea that all workers in a workers' soviet, or union, must be governed by that soviet, or union.

"Even if unions did create benefits for workers or society at large, they could not, in a free society, have the power to force people to join and pay dues. They can have such power only in a society where people are slaves."

proposes to attack with a billion dollars of Federal funds. It would be an "emergency" program, like Jupiter or Atlas, to crash us through the educational barrier in four years.

Yet to anyone who will look about the countryside at the new high schools, rising like architectural gems, it should be self-evident that these are not deficiencies of money. Algebra requires little more than a blackboard, an interested teacher and intelligent pupils. A magnificent physics or chemistry laboratory can be built for the fraction of the cost of a

Mr. Folsom does not understate the gravity of the deficiencies; he does not err in thinking that good education, like anything of high quality, costs money and that it is tragic waste for good minds to be left in ignorance. The error here is in the remedy he

proposes. If there are four students in a high school and only one is taking physics, there can be many reasons why the other three do not. They may not have the intellectual capacity. Their interests and ptitudes may lie elsewhere. They may, as young people sometimes do, prefer a "crip" course to hard work. The school authorities, as very often happens, may steer them away from a subject in which they will not do well because a poor pupil may lower the school average. The teacher may be incompetent to arouse enthu-

Present Need Is For Better Teachers

SOME OBSERVATIONS ON EDUCATION AND SPUTNIKS

There is much hue and cry throughout the nation right now about more pay for teachers. We can agree with this if the aim is to get better teachers; we cannot egree if the aim is simply to give the teachers we have more pay. Generally speaking, the teachers now employed are getting all they are worth. Our need is better teachers! And under our exonomic system, wherein we usually get what we pay for, the best way to get better teachers is to pay better teacher salaries. As a matter of fact, if we had

better teachers we very likely would not be having so much hullabaloo about the need for federas aid scholarships for exceptional students. It has been our second-rate teaching and second-rate educational leadership over the past generation that has brought all this trouble upon us So-called "progressive education", which emphasized the froth rather than the substance, ignored the exceptional student to a large extent and tried to bring all students down to a common level. Our whole educational program has suffered accordingly. It is a most hopeful sign that we are seeing a decided reaction in our schools and among our educators to "progressive" education. Of course, the current popular

move for the federal government to provide scholarships of various sorts, particularly in the field of science to meet the "scare", of the Russian Sputnik, is all a snare and a delusion. Maybe scholarships in certain fields to exceptional students would help right now - but why from the federal government? Must we keep on asking the question - where is the money coming from? We all know that the federal government has no money of its own, that whatever money it furnishes the various states must first come from the people in those states! I. it is "matching money", as has been stated, don't the states know that they are matching with their own money, that the money they put up direct is being matched with some more of their money which they have put up indirectly? Why not keep all the money at home in the first place and thereby save the administration cost of federa, bureaucracy and at the same time the federal control that always goes along with federal aid of any

There is another aspect of this Sputnik scare that deserves some consideration. Since when has the United States been "afraid" of competition? Haven't we always thrived on it? Doesn't it account in large part for the accomplishments we have achieved in this country in the way of a high standard of living? Is competition only good when it is internal? We know it is not, if we would only think about it a moment. We know that if some other nation achieves something which we ourselves desire, then we are more likely to work that much harder. In many ways, the Sputnik could be a blessing in disguise to a people who had come to believe that they must always be first in every-

thing. We need to do some more thinking, too, about how to remedy our laxness in scientific education before going off half-cocked in our efforts. Actually, our whole educational system needs overhauling. It needed it long before Sputnik was ever heard of; Sputnik just brought it to a head.

Neither can our present educational deficiencies be solved by simply offering some courses in science at the high school and college levels. It is much deeper than that: it must run the whole course of educational training. We must pay more attention to fundamentals and less attention to frill, from the first grade to the doctors degree. Science courses a one will not solve our problem. Not every problem can be solved by a slide rule and a chemical formula. The real aim of education should be the acquisition of wisdom, not the accumulation of knowledge - and there's a vast difference between the two.

Another final observation - the amount of money spent on education per pupil - which we use er.tirely too much as a gauge of value - does not necessarily determine the quality of education the pupil receives. Money can be wasted or it can be used wisely. The value received varies as cordingly.



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






