Senators and congressmen reing use of highway funds for mass transit projects and turn from summer vacation Wednesday, having spent a month finding out how their constituents feel about Watergate.

The lawmakers have also had a chance to learn where grassroots sentiments lie in the battle between Congress and the President which has produced four vetos so far this year, and could generate five more in the weeks ahead.

Nixon is planning a series of his own initiatives to gain passage of bills he wants enacted. The chief executive will meet with congressional leaders Thursday or Friday. Much of Congress' annual

work, including passing 10 of 13 appropriations bills needed to run the.government, remains unfinished. Before the recess last month, both houses had

Other bills the President may veto if passed are ones limiting his power to dispatch troops into combat, prohibiting him from impounding appropriated funds and requiring Senate confirmation of the director and deputy director of the budget office.

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (UPI) - Rebellious inmates at Indiana State Prison freed three guards unharmed Monday night and prison officials reported shortly afterward the twoday takeover had ended.

The inmates, who held the guards captive in three of five cellblocks at the 24-acre prison site, released the hostages after they were promised complete amnesty from any charges growing out of the two-day takeover.

Astronauts Continuing Photography

HOUSTON (UPI) - The Skylab 2 space explorers calmly continued photographing earth's natural resources today. but flight controllers on the ground had to brace themselves in case Tropical Storm Delia blew through the Space Center.

The space fliers beamed back a live television show of Delia Monday as she moved toward the Texas-Louisiana coast, reporting the storm's eye was apparently obscured from their view by high clouds.

DALLAS (UPI) - A college student who has spent the past three years working in a methadone clinic says a lot of veterans of the Vietnam War who became heroin addicts kicked cation.

the habit when they came home. "They did not develop an addict lifestyle," said John Friedli of Dallas. "They dropped whatever addiction they had with their uniforms. They were using a much purer form of the drug than you can get in this country.

He said veterans who got hooked in the war showed up in few numbers than expected at methadone treatment centers. Hard To Get

When they got back they found heroin hard to get. Another reason they were able to drop the habit is that it is not a physical problem. The worst they went through was something like flu. Their stomachs hurt and they vomited."

Methadone Preferable But, he said, if there is a choice between habits, a methadone habit is preferable. For one thing, a dose of methadone will last over a 24-hour period. "Heroin lasts for four hours," Friedli said. "A heroin addict is

either up or down. A person can function better on methadone." Friedli found that the more often heroin addicts have to come to the clinic to get methadone the faster they improve but the greater the program dropout rate is.

He also found that when heroin addicts are given methadone to take home so they won't have to return to the clinic so often, they do not make as many social improvements.

Other Problems There are other problems.

For one thing, if you give an addict a three-day supply, he may take it all at once." Friedli Friedli said he had no answer

for that problem but about 75 per cent of the people who come to the Drug Treatment Center are working and less than 3 per cert a month get arrested. The center is treating about 170 people



methadone at the center but \$30 a day on the street to buy heroin

"Sure, we get people who want to get on the methadone treatment simply because it is cheaper," Friedli said. "But we always demand improvement if they are going to stay on the program

"We tell addicts to clean up your act or split. This includes holding a job. getting an education or job training, not getting arrested and trying to cut down on drugs or break the habit."

Friedli said all kinds of people come in for methadone treatment. The minimum age allowed to take treatment is 18. But there is no upper age limit and people in their 70s and 80s who have been on drugs for 20 or 30 years come in.

One man in his early 60s came in. He was a nightwatchman and while center physicians were giving him a required examination they discovered he had cancer. He later died.

Many old people with a heroin habit have so many complicated physical problems, like heart disease, that withdrawal would would kill





was made by the Meriden Britannia Co., Meriden, Conn. Sometimes the firm was known as Meriden B. Company which later produced silver and silver-plated items.







Business in Low Esteem

While public attention seems how the American business much concerned with Watergate, the public confidence in "big business" remains at a low point. representing the smallest confidence percentage. according to a recent Gallup Poll.

This was pointed out in a column by Anthony Harrigan, executive vice president of the U.S. Industrial Council.

Mr. Harrigan said he finds this deeply disturbing because big business provides millions of jobs and is central to the nation's industrial strength.

This newspaper has pointed out for years that the things peple want and need come not from political government but from the business and industrial communities. Political government provides taxes. war and restrictions while the private enterprise sector takes care of your wants and needs. Welfare programs may provide temporary relief, but they do so simply by taking away from

others. Mr. Harrigan, we think, lays the blame for this loss of confidence in "big business" properly in part at the nation's school system.

'For a generation, "big business" hasn't received a fair shake from writers of textbooks and from the "educational establishment'' generally. In school, youngsters learn about the "robber barons" of the 19th century and early 20th century. They don't get an accurate picture of the pioneering work of American industrialists.

'Texts that spell out the accomplishments of the business system are few. Recently, however, I read John Chamberlain's superb book The Enterprising Americans: A Business History Of The United States (Harper & Row. Publishers, 95 cents). system made possible the affluence our people enjoy today. It is an illuminating book that explains, for example, how even the darkest days of the 1930s new industrial enterprises were being spawned and new technologies developed.

'Americans are so accustomed to the myriad products produced by business that they take them for granted. They forget that the jet planes, the synthetics, computers, wonder drugs and a thousand other things are the product of the inventiveness and managerial skills of the American business world."

While we subscribe to the basic thrust of Mr. Harrigan's commentary, we think on balance he should have reported that part of the problem lies in the tendency of some segments of "big business" to align themselves with the political governments of the nation.

Perhaps in fairness here we should consider the possibility that business leaders took the position that "if you can't lick em, join 'em." The joining has helped produce this lack of confidence, and Mr. Harrigan and his industrial council would do well to conduct an educational program among

themselves. When we read about the millions of dollars poured into political campaigns we can't help but conclude that the leaders of private enterprise are placing greater emphasis on the worth of political leadership than they are upon

Americans a collision course is shaping up in the battle for and against individual liberty in the vital matter of freedom to work. On one side is the attack heing mounted against

compulsory unionism. 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WASHINGTON (NEA) - In the awful morass of Middle East war and power politics there is one step left to try. It is time to resurrect an old

dream of Presidents Eisenhower and Truman - the use of American technical aid to assist Arab countries and such lands as Iran in developing their scarce water resources. promoting large - scale agriculture in arid wastelands and encouraging their industry. All this in a major way.

minimal. The combined Arab lands and Iran have more than sufficient funds and there is, in these countries, a tradition of coming to the aid of their less fortunate cousins.

Such programs, if judiciously carried out, could absorb the million plus Arab refugees whose misery has been a festering sore - and a stimulus to war, hijackings and hatred. Their absorption could be accomplished without compromising their rights as residents (or former residents) of Palestine

These projects would erase some of the great economic misery in such countries as Egypt. Iraq, Lebanon, Jordan and neighboring lands.

Even modest success might turn the thoughts of Arab and Israeli alike from thoughts of war and hatred. For such development could, if properly carried out, make clear that national honor could be achieved more certainly through economic development than through war. It might conceivably lead to cooperation between Palestine and the Arab states.

Developments of ths sort could ease the pressure on the dollar - which is reportedly due in considerable part to heavy speculation by Arab lands with the huge supply of dollars they receive in oil revenues.

This aid, if carried out, however, would not likely slow the drive of the Arab lands in moving toward complete control of their own oil resources, moves spurred by economic aims and nationalism, not by animosity, despite the anti - American rhetoric used in some

expropriations. What Eisenhower Truman dreamed of was not creation of an limitation United States, Britain, Japan or West Germany, but the use of American technical planning and know - how, in cooperation with the best brains of the Arab world, to develop those natural resources and industries natural to the region. 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

It is this nerve connection that enables psychic stress, or any other form of stimulation that reaches the brain, to affect the stomach's production of acid pepsin juice.

Not all stimuli that reach the brain, then stimulate the stomach to pour out acid pepsin juice, are stressful. The sight of appealing food stimu-lates the brain. The impulse is relayed to the vagus nerve and then to the stomach. The smell of favorite food cooking is another input.

Ulcer patients usually have an overproduction of acid digestive juice from cells in the wall of the stomach. Whenever surgery is used in such an individual, it's common to remove part of the stomach, thereby eliminating part of the cells and to cut the vagus nerve, thereby eliminating the nerve stimulus to cause these cells to produce acid digestive juice.

This does not mean that acid digestive juice ceases to be formed. It's just decreased to a much smaller amount. The cells in the stomach can produce acid digestive juice on their own. but will usually not produce excessive amounts if there is no vagus stimulation

Much the same effects of surgery are achieved through various medicines. Probanthine and atropine-like drugs all have the chemical effect of blocking nerve impulses along the vagus. Such medicines literally induce "chemical surgery of the vagus nerve.'

How effective the surgery is depends a lot on the individual case, whether or not a portion of the stomach was removed, how much and even how the vagus is cut, and if the fibers of the vagus nerve are regenerated or resume their old stimulatory effect.

Finally, I would have to say in either medical or surgical treatment of ulcers, part of the success depends on chang ing living habits that may have been the major factor in causing the problem to start with.
