Elections Set For A New President

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI)-U. S. forces in Lebanon tightened security measures today on the eve of scheduled parliamentary elections for a new Lebanese president. There was some doubt that the election would be held.

The cabinet of Premier Sami Solh threatened Tuesday to boycott the elections until the Lebanese army cleans the rebels out of Beirut. Opposition forces demanded that President Camille Chamoun and U. S. forces pull out be-

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday." in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to the Con-stitution of Texas to require that va-cancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as here-after to read as follows: "Section 28. 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Profit Sharing

When it comes to profit sharing, Walter Reuther raised a bit of a hubbub this year by suggesting that his dues-paying minions be included along with the stockholders if the automotive companies came up with a dividend. The idea took hold in some quarters and there are lots of folks now wondering what is the matter with the big three auto manufacturers that they didn't jump at this chance.

There are a couple of things which ought to be reviewed right now on this particular point.

In a Mike Wallace interview, Reuther made his case for profit sharing. But in the cross questioning which followed a general presentation of the idea, Wallace took an intelligent line. He asked Reuther if a worker employed at the Chrysler plant and doing the same job as a similar worker employed at the Ford company, should be treated equally. Reuther was compelled to admit that both workers were entitled to the same rewards.

Although this is palpably false, for it makes no allowance for the individual merits of the separate workers, this is the central theme of collectivism and Reuther could not very well agree to anything else without exposing his phony line of reasoning.

But Wallace bore down. If the Chrysler company profits should happen to be less than the Ford motor company profits, what would happen on the profit sharing end of things? If a division of profits occurred among the workers, would it not follow that the wage earner for Chrysler might conceivably receive less in a profit split than the same worker doing the same job at Ford? And if this were true, where was the spirit of absolute equality in rewards?

Reuther, under this questioning, offered his only out, but it reveals his thinking and Americans should pay particular attention. He said that in the event one company made more profits than another, then all the profits of all the companies should be seized by the government and an equal distribution made to all workers regardless of the company's position in relation to the buying public.

Today the doctrine of force is infinitely more dangerous than ever, for it is not crude, easily discerned. It is often cunningly disguised under scores of seductive signboards and labels. These signboards and lables, in and of

themselves, are so numerous as to add to the confusion. Seldom' in all the saga of history has there been a more crucial necessity for man to know where he is and





The Doctor Says:

There does not seem to be .ie slightest doubt that carrying excessive fat on the body is dangerous to the health, as well as being unattractive. It is also true that all of those who are overweight want an easy way to reduce.

Obesity is thought to exist in about one-fifth of all people over 30 in North America. Here are a few things which the fat person faces:

Among insured men, those who are overweight have a higher death rate than the average at every age. And the greater the degree of overweight, the higher the risk.

It has been stated that for men 20 to 29 years old, the mortality of those who are overweight 34 per cent above the general average. Approximately this same picture holds for other age groups, and for women as well as men.

Ill health, as well as an in creased chance of early death, is also a risk for the obese person. One study of 74,000 industrial workers showed that at every age in both sexes there was a steady increase in average blood pressure accompanying increase in body weight.

Among patients 40 and over at the time when active signs of diabetes begin, 60 out of 100 were at least 20 per cent over the average weight and an additional 25 per cent were moderately werweight.

It is impossible to list all of the disorders which are more common in fat people than in those who are of normal weight,

Another Crucial Mideast Decision Is Facing Ike

If this idea were put into effect, it would, for all intents and purposes, end free enterprise in America. If the government is able to seize all profits and then effect a distribution, both to stockholders and to workers, private property would vanish overnight.

We should be warned in time of Reuther's intentions. His profit sharing idea is totally unsound and vicious.

On the other hand, profit sharing may be an acceptable idea for many companies. But is is only acceptable if the management of a given firm can find some way to invoke a profit sharing scheme which will result in an improved product and a better deal all along the line. The philosophy behind any profit sharing program should be the one enunciated by Mr. Sartell Prentice Jr., who put it this way:

"The case for profit sharing rests solely on its ability to provide greater efficiency in the use of tools of production, thereby reducing costs and increasing profits . . . far from representing 'generosity' or 'good-heartedness' on the part of stockholders, true profit sharing represents an investment that should prove to be fully as profitable as any comparable investment in tools of production."

We'll string along with that idea.

Then, there's another side to the question, too. The willingness to receive a share in the profits on the part of workers, ought to be paralleled by an equal willingness to share in any losses that might ensue. The free enterprise system is not so much a profit system, as it is a system involving risks. The stockholders take the risks. If the workers expect a reward, they should also take the risks. And how many workers are there who would be willing and able to go along with the idea of a share in the profits, if they were also obligated to share in the losses, should they occur?

Reuther's ideas on profit sharing could be more accurately described as a scheme aimed at looting the stockholders with the assistance of government. Workers ought to look squarely at this one and not fancy that free enterprise is some kind of a cornucopia with themselves ensconced on the big end of the horn.

and would consist of a government, taking this power, once given, and using it without any further reference to those who had given it. So the State would be as ruthless as the amoral law of the hive. In short, the State would play the role of the Divine, so inevitably the individual, as such, would disappear.

"Hegel; a German philosopher, lived in the years 1770-1831. Taking up Hobbes' theme of the omnipo-

tent State, he played the idea to its political limits, not alone vesting it with the attributes of the Divine, but declaring that the State was the Divine idea on earth. The U.S. is no also sending the Army's HONEST JOHN and NIKE-AJAX guided missiles to Turkey. Both are primarily anti-aircraft weapons. The HONEST JOHN can be armed with a nuclear warhead, and has a range of 200 miles. The NIKE-AJAX also can fire a small nuclear warhead up to 90 miles. Turkey is now the key member of the Baghdad Pact since the overthrow of the Faisal govern-

ment. Total U.S. military aid to Turkey to date is around \$1.4 billion. Of this huge amount, Turkey has received \$1.2 billion, and another \$200,000,000 is scheduled for ship-

ment this year. The U.S. also has a large military mission in Turkey; 394 military personnel and 67 civilians. It is commanded by Major General Armistead Mead.



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

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
