# Aide 'Didn't Know' **Actions Improper**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams said he might not have done what he did for his friend Bernard Goldfine if he had known-as he was told today-that his action was improper.

Adams, staunchly defending his controversial relationship with the New England industrialist, conceded under questioning his decision to help Goldfine "might very well have been different" had he known the government information he sought for Goldfine was supposed to be kept confidential.

WASHINGTON (UPI)-Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams said today he and his White House associates have now concluded they ought not to make personal calls like those made to the FTC for his friend Bernard Goldfine,

"I had no knowledge of the rules," Adams said. "I certainly had no knowledge that the information I received was not perfectly proper, Had I known of that, my decision might very well have been different." Adam has acknowledge7



Jesus Marquez Monreal was shot down by unidentified gunmen Sunday while he was decorating the streets in preparation for a visit by Alvarez. It was the first fatality of the 1958 campaign. Angry Alvarez supporters prowled the streets of Chichuahua through the day, tearing down posters of the government party.

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# SchoolTotalitarianism

During the past several weeks, a House Education and Labor subcommittee has been holding open hearing on various and sundry measures aimed at providing federal taxes for local government schools. The Congressional hopper has been virtually jammed with a whole series of would-be laws, which aim at providing federal funds for construction, federal funds for scholarships, federal exemptions for educational moneys to be spent, federal funds for increasing teachers' salaries, and so forth.

During these hearings, the National Education Assn. and all those favorable to federal aid and control of the nation's school systems, have had ample opportunity to present their side of the story. It has been announced that those opposed to more of this federal control and dominance of the nation's schools would have an opprtunity to express their views late in May.

However, in a surprise move, and one that is highly unethical, the leftwing members of the subcommittee suddenly approved one of the bills (that dealing with school construction) without waiting to hear the negative side of the story.

The negative side, incidentally, has been very well prepared and documented and proves conclusively that federal aid for construction programs in the various states is not only not needed but is, in the main, unwanted. This testimony was not heard. Instead, the proponents of ever more socialism and government control of our already sadly saturated school, pulled a quickie and sent this measure to the full committee, which is now very likely to bring it up on the floor of Congress for passage.

This is not the only event which places the nation's educational system in even greater peril than existed hereeducational system in eveen greater peril than existed heretofore. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has drafted a new measure calling for the expenditure of more than a billion dollars. The major feature of this bill, which undoubtedly will get favorable treatment from the collectivists in the congressional committee, is that at least three guarters of the money to be taken from the American people by force and violence is arbitrarily to be used to increase the salaries of teachers.

According to Congressman Ralph Gwinn, who analyzed the measure, "more than three-quarters of the money authorized by this measure is to be doled out to the states to pay salaries of high school mathematics and science teachers. Up to \$150 million per year is to be spent directly by the government—to be matched by the states in the usual grant-in-aid fashion—to employ additional science or mathematics teachers, or to increase the salaries of those already employed."

Then, Mr. Gwinn points out, the bill also provides that those states which already have increased the salaries of teachers or are about to do so, independent of federal action, will not be cut in on this lush melon of the educationists.

The purpose is clearly to foster federal control of the nation's school arm.

Now this whole putsch toward a federal totalitarianism respecting schools has been carefully timed. As the news comes through respecting each of the enormously costly bills, Robert M. Hutchins, president of the fund for the Republic and a former chancellor of the University of Chicago, has caused an article to appear in Esquire Magazine which carries out the thinking of collectivists without notable ex-

Mr. Hutchins is not content with the bureau of Health, Education and Welfare and the tremendous spending program it advocates.

He wants to see the total power in the hands of the federal government. Says Hutchins: "Our government has illustrated its apparent contempt for the importance of education by the position of the Office of Education, a subordinate bureau engaged in the preparation of rather unreliable statistics in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare." This won't do at all, as Mr. Hutchins sees it.

He wants a "National Education Act, voted into law by Congress," which would cut out all pretense and place all schools under immediate federal control. He sees this as having "sensational consequences."

The public ought, by these separate, yet pyramiding events, to realize just what it is up against in the education business. First, the proponents of more federal control don't want to hear opposing arguments. Second, they are making a mammoth bid for total control of all schools. Third, they wish, in Hutchins opinion, to "declare the national responsibility for education for those willing and able to learn."

Whatever interest or control parents may have had in the past respecting their children's education is to go by the board. As an American, each child is supposedly to become the property of the federal government with the government itself assuming full responsibility for that child's education in channels pleasing to the government.

If these various moves or any appreciable part of them are successful, where will we go in this country to find a free and nongovernment owned, yet thoroughly trained mind?

### **BETTER JOBS**

By R. C. HOILES Reader Questions My Way Of Compelling Employer To Increase Wages

In the last issue I reproduced part of a letter from F. E. Buck, asking several questions on what "respecting creative energy" meant. I had contended that this was the best way to force an employer to raise wages. I attempted to answer him. I continue to quote from his letter

"In order to benefit its owner", Mr. Hoiles writes, "capital has to be distributed." Assuming that by accumulated capital he means money in the bank, and by distributing it he means spending it, begin to see what he means. He certainly means for the employer to spend the surplus capital, not the worker. But then Mr. Hoiles writes, "If it is put into tools then the owner of the tools has to bid against other employers to get employes to operate these tools, and this bidding against other employers compels the employer to raise wages in order to keep his employees.'

"(1) Granting for the sake of argument that this hypothesis is sound and would work providing the employer had the good sense and foresight to invest in tools of production and distribution, what evidence have we to assume us that he would always do so? "(2) What is there to hinder him

from squandering his profits on gambling tables at Reno? "(3) Or what is to hinder him from buying a million dollars worth of productive pasture land and turning it into a private non-

productive dude ranch? "(4) And what is to hinder our hypothetical employer from spending a few million buying up antique curios and "priceless" art collections?

"(5) What of the man who takes his capital out of the country and invests it in Arabian desert oil wells, and the profits from which may or may not even enter our domestic economy?

"(6) What evidence is there that he will not just foolishly hoard it as many men of wealth have done down through the years, leaving vast sums to their children and even great grandchildren?

"(7) While it is true that any money he spends would tend to stimulate the over-all economy, by the same token wouldn't this be true if any portion of this money were spent by his employees without whom this wealth would never have been produced." Answers

I have numbered his questions so that I can answer them by num-

(1) There is no evidence that the employer would always invest his profits in tools. However, if he realizes that there is no greater pleasure than the pleasure of accomplishment and that it is more blessed to give than receive, he is not likely to squander his profits. He also would know it is a bad example for his children. Of course, all persons are fallible. However, if there were no persons of means to buy new luxuries like autos, airplanes, televisions, etc., when they were in their experimental stage and high priced the man with small means would never be able to have these things that have now become necessities for most people in U. S. The luxuries of the rich are the roadways to progress. If there were no rich uying new things that seem to be foolish at that time, there would be mighty little progress. Besides, does not every man have the right to spend what he has acquired on a voluntary basis by benefiting others, as he sees fit. If he does not who has the right to coerce him as to how he should use what was his own? Should it be left up to the labor unions or the govern-

(2) If he squanders his profits by gambling, he would simply be transferring his wealth to another. There would be no real wealth

(3) If he did not use his pasture land in a way to benefit mankind, taxes would eat it up. The man sold the pasture land would have the money that could be invested

(4) There is nothing to hinder him from buying antiques and curios, but if the government or the labor union takes away a man's right to use his property as he believes will make him happy, he will not produce and everyone will suffer.

(5) If he takes his wealth out of the country where it will increase more rapidly than any other place, that will benefit all mankind. He will not be inclined to do that unless he believes by so doing he will increase his wealth faster and thus benefit himself and at the same time the world. And just who should have the power to restrict a man from using his wealth the way he believes best?

(6) If a man cannot leave his wealth to his children or to those he wants to leave it to, he will not be so likely to create wealth. And even if he leaves it to his children, they will distribute it. And if he tries to hoard it he will lose it by depreciation and absolesence. If he hides his dollars they will buy less and less. Even if he

burns up paper dollars he will injure no one. Other dollars will

buy more. (7) The man who gets his wealth on a voluntary basis is much more likely to use it wisely than workers or politicians who get their wages on an involuntary basis by threats of strikes or by taxation. Of course, there would be no wealth without employes, nor would there be wealth, even to support employes, if there were no tools - no capital. Most of us

would starve to death if it were

not for accumulation of tools.

To Free Government

Regimentation Destructive Nothing is so destructive to free government as regimentation. Enforced conformity of any kind, and particularly in the public schools, is a powerful factor working toward the destruction of American

If our children are forced to conform to a single educational system, with no differing orientations in accordance with differing practices and ideologes, we shall develop a mass common-denominator type of citizen, lacking the variations that are necessary to bring forth or to maintain a rich If we develop a standardized

mind through uniform education;

a common type of thinking through standardized government propaganda, mass circulation magazines and blanket radio and television coverage; a common dependence upon government assistance of all kinds, including conformity to standradized provisions for retirement, and maintenance in case of accident or disaster, we shall become a standardized herd of humanity - easy prey for manipulators and would-be dictators. One of the safeguards against this powerful tendency is variety in education. The greater the number of private schools with differing emphases and ideologies and under a variety of sponsorships, religious and otherwise, the more likely we are to maintain our pronounced individuality and to preserve our initiative and selfreliance. Schools conducted by Lutherans, Episcopalians, Methodists, Quakers and Catholics will all be different, as will those conducted by Jews or Atheists. Let parents have the right of choosing the kind of schools they want their children to attend. We will then be sure of continued differentiation in taste, cultural emphasis, methods of teaching self control and achieving individual char-

If we are to have public schools, let them be under local management insofar as possible. Until recent times, a local School Board controlled each school. There was no mass conformity to some overall pattern laid down in the State

### The Doctor Says

By EDGAR P. JORDAN, M. D. "I was told," writes A. P., "that parakeets are undesirable for pets in the home, as they carry germs. I should like your opinion as to whether the diseases they carry are communicable to human beings.'

I would not go so far as to say parakeets are undesirable as home pets for those who like them. However, SICK parakeets are undesirable.

These birds belong to a group, including parrots and love birds, which may harbor a virus which can attack human beings and cause a disease called ornithosis, or psittacosis. Naturally, those birds free of the virus cannot spread the disease. Psittacosis is not a new disease.

In 1932, 76 cases were reported in the United States alone, with seven deaths during that year. Fewer cases of the disease appeared for several years thereafter, principally because of the activities of the U.S. Public Health Service which quarantined sick birds and banned their shipment from foreign countries to the United States and from state to state.

In 1951 the regulations for parakeets, parrots and love birds were relaxed and there has been a considerable increase in the number of such birds sold for household pets.

Unfortunately, this has been followed by an increase in the number of cases of psittacosis. There is reason for believing that many cases of psittacosis are not reported because the disease may be confused with other human disorders caused by viruses.

Since psittacosis carries risks for life as well as to the general health, more rigid enforcement of quarantine and other health regulations seems desirable. Every prospective buyer of birds should be assured that the birds are free of disease.

In an editorial in the New England Journal of Medicine two or three years ago, it was said that, since it appears unlikely that the disease will be entirely eliminated, several suggestions are in or-

All persons, the editorial pointed out, who acquire birds as pets or work with them should be made aware of the risk of psittacosis, even with birds appearing healthy. Danger of the disease is not eliminated by the addition of a certain chemical to the drinking water, which is a practice apparently used by some bird deal-

It was suggested that doctors should be more suspicious of the possibility of psittacosis in illnesses involving chills, cough, fever and the like.

In that manner many of the advantages of private schools can be retained in a public school system, and the evils of standardization avoided.

Civilization cannot be developed or maintained on a basis of uniform human beings. That type of society lends itself readily to manipulation and in times of crisis will almost certainly fall a prey to the dictator. Individuality and diversification are essential if we are to reman free

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
