McIlhany Vs. Campbell

In the Sunday issue of the News, the supporters of Grainger McIlhany for State Representative from the 87th District ran an ad which raised the point that the only way to "play it safe" and make sure our state representative does not represent "some corporation or special group of people" is to vote for Mr. McIlhany. Since McIlhany has but one opponent, Johnny Campbell, it is reasonable to deduce from this the contention that it would not be safe to vote for him inasmuch as he might be the tool of "some corporation or special group of people."

The implications of such a stand deserve to be brought out into the open and nailed down as nothing but a vulgar campaign tactic designed to question the integrity of Campbell without an iota of evidence to back up such an inuendo. It is the worst kind of hit-and-run tactic and is no credit to either McIlhany or his supporters.

Johnny Campbell was born and raised in Gray County and is probably as widely known in this area as any individual. To imply that he might be the instrument of "some corporation or special group of people" is probably the poorest way imaginable to influence votes favorable to McIlhany for Campbell's honor and rectitude would be about the last conceivable points upon which he would be vulnerable.

So, we would like to give the McIlhany supporters a bit of unsolicited advice. Just keep up this tactic and your candidate will know the feeling of being completely smothered by the votes of those thousands who know Campbell as a man above reproach.

Where McIlhany's supporters have to create myths in order to cast doubts about his opponent, one does not need to manufacture an Achilles' heel to show McIlhany's weakness as our state representative. His voting record takes care of this point adequately.

Several years ago, the Texas Manufacturers' Association compiled a voting record showing how each representative voted on key issues concerning free enterprise and limited government. At that time, McIlhany was rated among the bottom score out of 150 which put him in the group left of

In a recent "favorable-unfavorable" rating made by the Texas AFL-CIO, he showed some improvement on the basis of being not quite such an ardent supporter of left-wing causes. The labor barons said that McIlhany voted "favorably" on 21 vital issues and "unfavorably" on 17. Out of the total "favorable" votes, the incumbent representative was among the top one-third of those representatives found pleasing to the bosses of organized labor. On the "unfavorable" votes, he was about average for the house membership.

Frankly, though we are glad to see the personable Mc-Ilhany apparently venturing away from his extreme left-wing voting pattern, we think his record still leaves a great deal to be desired.

Those who know Johnny Campbell's philosophy of government, on the other hand, can feel confident that if he is elected, organized labor will never be able to give him credit for such a high number of "favorable" votes. As a matter of fact, it would not be surprising to see him receive the high honor of having the labor barons classify him as one with an extremely "unfavorable" voting record when the next session of the legislature adjourns.

Johnny Campbell is without question one of the most articulate defenders of free enterprise in the Texas Panhandle. He is a man of deep and unostentacious religious conviction, a man whose life gives an active meaning to the word "principle," and one who has the energy and organizational ability to make a splendid representative from this district.

Church Federation of Los Angeles On Employer-Employe Relations

I want to continue to quote from and comment on a booklet is med by the Church Federation of Los Angeles under the heading of "Concerning Employer-Employee Relations.

This is especially important since it uses as a standard right, statements made by the National , Council of Churches of Christ in America on the wage employer question. And since the right of workers to choose whether they want to join a union is now a law in 18 states and to be voted on this year by five states, the subject is very germane.

The National Council representative writes:

. . . In some industries management itself shows its view that the closed or the union shop may be an asset in good employer-employee relations.

That is a mighty thin argument. Some employers want protective tariffs and subsidies and the government to loan them money at less than true value. Evidently the employer who wants a closed shop has no consideration whatsoever for the individual worker's right to choose whether or not he wants to make an individual contract or be a part of a collectivist group. What Is Compulsion?

. .Some element of compulsion is present in almost every association of individuals. All men are confronted from time to time with the necessity of yielding to the

interests and welfare of others. Now, what in the world do the advocates of the closed shop mean by "compulsion?" Do they mean that men are compelled to live by the sweat of their brow? Certainly nature or God has laws that men must obey if they are to survive, but that is not the kind of compulsion that one needs to

Is a worker compelled to accept a certain job if there is no conspiracy between employers to refuse to hire him and he is free to go into business himself by renting the land, investing the capital and hiring the labor? Certainly all men should be confronted not from time to time, but all the time with the necessity of yielding to the interests, that is, the right, and welfare of others. One is yielding to the welfare and interest of another when he trades with him and benefits him as much or more as anyone else will under a competitive free market system.

Evidently the authors seem to think that business is like gambling, that when one man produces wealth he takes it from another. When one man produces more than another for a given price he is interfering with the interests and welfare of another. But to take that position is to contend that one man is his brother's keeper rether than his brother's helper. That one man has a right to manage another life without his con-

Then the authors go on to say: .They are also, at times, under the moral necessity of resisting those compulsions which threaten to destroy them as free and responsible agents of their own minds and consciences."

Barring the closed shop would be in perfect harmony with the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment. One would have to have some man made laws that violate these higher laws in order to believe in the closed shop. Yet these authors are advocating civil law that takes away from an individual his right to choose and compels him to substitute the will of the majority or the dictator at the head of the union for his own plan of developing his moral faculties and helping his fellowman.

Advocates Compulsion Then the National Council rep-

resentatives write: "Thus, while people do not usually like compulsion in any form, they may accept some degree of it in order to achieve values which cannot be secured without it. They recognize that in any social order the exercise of individual freedom may be selfdefeating, and that freedom must of necessity in some circumstances be exercised in terms of group decisions."

That certainly is a strange ideology to be advocated by people holding high positions in Christian churches. It is, in effect, advocating the use of aggressive force, not defensive force. Coercive to stop a man from injuring another or making him pay for damages, is different kind of coercion than forcing a man to pay a third party for the right to work and serve

I can think of no individual that has the right to use aggressive force against another individual to manage his creative energy. And defensive force is not interfering with another man's freedom since freedom does not give any individual the right to initiate force against another man. Neither does individual freedom give any man or any group the right to start a fight against another. Remem ber. the Great Teacher said, "He who takes up ale sword will perish by the sword." That is, he who initiates force will get in trouble. And he also said, in the way of the individual's right to defend himself, "He who does not have a sword, let him sell his garment

and buy a sword." As stated above, it is very difficult to tell the difference tween the idologies at the head of National Council of Churches of Christ in America and

CIA Chief Suspected No Trouble In Iraq

WASHINGTON - A frank admission by Central Intelligence Director Allen Dulles was the most startling disclosure at President Eisenhower's emergency conference on the Iraq crisis with the bipartisan leaders of Congress.

The CIA chief candidly stated the first he knew about the Iraq coup d'etat was a cable from Baghdad at 2:00 a.m. Monday morn-

"Our representative in the Baghdad embassy sent me that wire, and that was our first word of trouble in Iraq," said the Intelligence Director in response to a question. "We had been on the alert for a possible uprising in Jordan several weeks previous, but it never came off.

"At that time, some 35 Iraq officers were placed under house arrest on charges of being pro-Nasser. But they had made no attempt to overthrow King Feisal and his government. Later these pro-Nasser officers were released, and we now understand they took an active part in the revolt. But it was a complete surprise to us." "That is the most shocking blund. er since Korea," exclaimed a Sen-

ate leader. "It's fantastic." Dulles said nothing Secretary of State John Foster

Dulles told the congressional leaders that 8,000 Iraq troops are in Jordan and "apparently" loyal to King Hussein.

"What are those troops doing in Jordan?" Dulles was asked. "Jordan requested Iraq troops

last year when the attempt was made to overthrow him and join Nasser's Arab Republic," replied the State Department chief. "Since then, Iraq troops have been stationed in Jordan in varying numbers. At present there are two contingents there; one of 5,000 and another of 3,000. They have been put under Jordan command, and are being prepared for a counteroffensive in Iraq, if conditions warrant.

When the President disclosed that 11,000 U.S. troops were enroute to Lebanon, the first question asked him was whether that was approved by the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Turning to General Nathan Twining, head of the Joint Chiefs,

the President asked him to answer. "We favored that unanimously," replied Twining. "Every one of us considered it essential and so informed the President.

Only congressional leader to voice dissent at the use of troops was Senator Mike Mansfield, Mont. Democratic Whip. He contended United Nations authorization should have first been obtained.

"There just wasn't time to do that," declared the President. "We had to act fast, or this conflagration would have gotten out of

"I agree with you," spoke up a house leader. "You're absolutely right. And in view of that, don't you think it would have been infinitely better to have allowed

Britain, France and Israel to have finished off Nasser a couple of years ago? Wouldn't that have saved a lot of trouble and expense?" "On second guess, yes," admit-

ted the President. Secretary Dulles, who was chiefly responsible for blocking the British, French and Israeli, main-

tained a glum silence. Senator William Knowland, Calif., inquired about the likelihood of Russian intervention in the Middle East.

"It would be difficult for them to do that," said the President. But CIA Director Allen Dulles thought it might occur. He told the congressional leaders, 'It's entirely possible the Kremlin may resort - to 'volunteers'; Bulgarians and elements of that kind. They've got a lot of bodies and may very well attempt to use them."

A letter from Mrs. F. inquires about a peculiar disease known as Friedreich's ataxia. She would like to know something about the onser and progress of the disease and whether it strikes men only, or whether women can be affect-

This is definitely one of those diseases of a true hereditary nature which is transmitted from generation to generation. It can, and does, affect either sex. It is said that 10 per cent of those with the disease have first cousin par-

The cause seems to be a true defect in the germ plasm in the family involved. The disease involves the spinal cord in particular, and the defect which causes it may be carried by either par-

To make matters worse, the cefect is sometimes hidden so that the parents may not show identifiable signs of the disease even though it is present in the family. Friedreich's ataxia usually starts

in childhood (between 6 and 15,) but sometimes the appearance symptoms is delayed until after the age of 30. In such cases the victim may know nothing about it until after he or she has married and has had children, one or more of whom may suffer from the

The signs of this condition start gradually. An awkwardness in walking and a tendency to stumble and fall easily are characteristic. As the disease progresses the gait becomes more irregular and clumsy. Staggering or reeling from side to side is common. In advanced cases, irregular

movements not subject to the control of the will are frequently seen. The head and neck are likely to make nodding movements or spasms. Spinal curvature is common, and jerky movements of the eyes are also frequent. The inherited nature of the dis-

ease gives the clue to its conquest. If those who are afflicted, or have it in the family, do not have children, the disease will die out. It is never acquired except through defective germ plasm. A treatment has not been developed. There are some other nervous

conditions which are known to be hereditary. Most of them (including Friedreich's ataxia) are fortunately rather rare, and for this reason do not carry names which are familiar except to nerve spe-But it is important to recognize

them early so that the heredi tary tendency can be pointed out to the victim or his or her family and the danger of passing the condition to other generations can be

Whereas Bertrandias Shows The Waterfront

LOS ANGELES - Major General Victor Bertrandias, U.S.A.F., retired, a grease-monkey at heart, was exercising his little six cylinders German Mercedes, which is driven with a stick and costs more button productions. He pulled up with the showy pride of a courting hoosier in a spider phaeton coming alongside a carriage-block, and invited, "Crawl in." One does this by bending double and planting the head between the knees, which, being done, one may then settle back to contemplation of the ordeal of getting out.

We set a course for the naval base at San Pedro to gaze upon the plywood boat that Howard Hughes put together during the war and finally, in November, 1947, flew a mile in a defiant demonstration hop not unlike the Wrights' miracle at Kitty Hawk. There was no disputing the fact that this weird, aloof and hostile genius did lift this enormous barge off the water, fly her appreciably, and put here down with not more than a graceful swish of water under her

General Bertrandias showed his vaccination to a young Marine corporal, typical of the corps except that he was a Negro boy, and we went through under a notice on a board reading: "Salutes are made and returned on this post."

A mile away we hove to under the hulk of a crumbling Martin Mars with the wings bobbed and the hull sheathed in corroded copper. This had been pointed out as Howard Hughes' boat. It was his, to be sure, but a sparrow to a condor by comparasion to the big one which was nowhere in sight and unknown to most of the post outside headquarters. At last, we rounded her up by deduction and divination, for she is not really on the base but just outside and, to the naked eye; is more like a grain elevator in Kansas than the hanger of man's enormousest thunderbird thus far.

General Berthandias, a comrade the first war and a devoted Mac-Arthur man in the second affray, is now giving counsel on a movie on the Lindbergh saga, the first concession from Hollywood that Lindbergh wasn't a Nazi beast, and perhaps the forerunner of an apology some distant day to the memory of Joe McCarthy. We shuffled down a rough path

to a security shack by a big gate where a sign read: "Government Property, Keep Off:" But the guard, with a pistol in his holster, was a civilian employed by Hughes Tool and his only answer to questions about that sign on private property was that he had his orders. The corrugated metal housing of the big one stood the equivalent of eight stories high according to statistics that exuded rather freely a few hours later from William Utley, of the Carl Byoir office, public relations for Hughes, but the wings seem to have been docked, for in their natural span they measured more than the length of a football field.

We were looking at a structure housing some or all of the hull and the colossal tail. The flippers of the big one were about the size of the wings of a DC-7. There was a puzzling green light glowing behind one of the windows high up in the housing, and just inside the gate was a strange television scope by which the man on post could watch a constant


