Would 'Go Along' With United Nations

By STEWART HENSLEY United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI)-The White House said today the United States will go along if others concerned want a summit meeting at the United Nations.

The White House announcement followed British acceptance of Nikita Khrushchev's proposal for a headr of state meeting on the Middle East provided the Soviel premier is willing to hold it within the U. N. Security Council.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said: "If such a meeting were generally desired, the United States would join in following this orderly procedure."

Western powers had been unable to agree on a reply to Khrushchev's summit proposal.

The Bitter Decade

Dr. Melchior Palyi has been described as an economist who can put \$5.00 thoughts into 25 cent words. This description is born out in a recent compilation of a series of articles which first appeared in the Chicago Tribune. Mr. Palyi has revised the articles and now publishes them under the broad title, "Nationalizations—Ten Years Later."

The burden of his effort is to examine the wave of nationalizations which swept over Europe about ten years ago and aind out just how these seizures of private means of production and distribution have fared since those days in which they were hailed as a means of deliverance from all mission of financial illness.

The Palyi summation is devastating.

On this panoramic theme, the Hungarian-born professor has this to say: ". . . Europe is in no mood to celebrate. Even the 10th anniversary of the launching of the Marshall Plan failed to evoke more than faint applause. France, Britain, and many of the other countries are tumbling from one dollar crisis into another, each more severe than any

"This time, the threat to Europe's finances cannot be blamed on the ravages of the war. Nor should relief be expected from large-scale American handouts."

Then the professor goes on to show that some of the nationalizations date clear back to the 19th century. This is an observable result stemming from the rise of communist and socialist propaganda which abounded from the period beginning about 1848 and continuing unabated to the present

For example, telephone and telegraph has been included everywhere in Europe as a 'subdivision of the government's monopoly of the postal system. The exceptions appear to be two telephone companies covering central and southern Italy which are now being nationalized. There are also two free enterprise telephone companies in Denmark.

Tobacco was governmentalized long ago in France and Austria. (Could this fact account for the present preoccupation of Frenchmen who retrieve cigarette stubs and cigar butts from gutters in order to conserve the tobacco?)

Salt has been nationalized in Switzerland, Austria and Finland.

Railways have been nationalized throughout central Europe. In France they have always been a socialized industry. Sweden has perhaps gone farther into state socialism than most, a fact, says Palyi, which "is leading it into national bankruptcy."

The extent of these nationalizations is generally not appreciated in the United States. But Palyi's effort is not just to catalogue them, but to examine how this practice has fared during the past decade.

The chapter heads in his pamphlet give us a brief run-down on what he finds. "Labor Relations under Nationalization"; "Management by Technocrats"; "Profitless Monopolies"; "Wasting Resources"; "Deficits and Inflationary Consequences"; "Socialized Medicine"; "De-Nationalization?"; and "The Nationalization of Savings."

We found one of the most stimulating chapters to be that which takes up the attitudes of union members respecting nationalizations. The British coal miners, as an example, were among the most eager for the government to take over their

"Now," says Palyi, "full employment reigns in the coal fields." But has that satisfied the union worker? Neither full employment nor an increasing number of government benefits have managed to provide what the worker thought he would get by nationalization. In fact here is what the workers themselves have had to say:

"We believe that never before in the entire industry of the British coal industry was there a time at which the workers have felt so betrayed in their hopes as today . . . We have hoped that nationalization would bring about a development totally different from the one that occurred. On that Jan. 1, 1947, when the coal pits were taken over by the authorities, the great majority of labor was carried by an enthusiasm and strong will to cooperate . . . But today, this source of good will has largely dried up."

And Palyi sums it up by adding: "The history of a socialized coal industry in the United Kingdom is an almost uninterrupted record of labor strife . . ."

We haven't the space to tell you all of the Palyi findings. We can only recommend that you get a copy of this light, but penetrating reading from the Heritage Foundation, 112 West Wacker Drive, Chicago 1, Illinois. Quotes From National Council Of Churches On Employer-**Employe Relations**

I want to continue to quote from the pamphlet issued by the Church Federation of Los Angcles, quoting from the Nationa Council of Churches' position on

" 'People should recognize the tendency for compulsion in any form to become evil in its consequences, and remain aware of the fact that only with great difficulty and fine judgment can compulsion be made to serve ideal ends. The question of compulsion is one of the more deliicate of moral questions and it has a special bearing on the question of whether membership in a labor union should be made a condition of employment.

" 'In the light of the above considerations and with specific reference to the issues currently raised by state "right to work" laws, it is recognized that either requiring by law or forbidding by law union membership as a basis of continuing employment involves grave moral problems. Under the varied circumstances prevailing at different times and places throughout this large country the National Council of Churches discerns no simple judgment on these moral problems upon which highly diverse opinions are held by dedicated Christians.

'However, it is the opinion of the Executive Board of the Division of Christian Life and Work that union membership as a basis of continued employment should be neither required nor forbidden by law; the decision should be left to agreement by management and labor through the COMPULSION

"Compulsion" is a rather loose word. Compelling a man to pay for the damage he has done might be described as defensive force, which in some cases seems to be Compelling a man, however, to do something that he thinks is wicked and violates the Golden Rule and the Coveting Commandment in order for him to create wealth to benefit himself and mankind, is another kind f compulsion that, it seems to me, cannot be harmonized with any eternal, moral principle

Whether or not a man has a right to join an organization de pends entirely upon what is the means used by that organization to bring about their objectives. Would anyone contend that a man had a right to join a group of robbers in order to secure material things that are desirable

A Collective Bargain Does anyone know of any labor union that practices collective bargaining without using the threats of strikes as a means of coercing an employer to sign a contract that he believes will greatly reduce his ability to serve his fel lowman? If there be no labor union that does not use the threats of strikes, then if one advocates the right to join such a group one is, in reality, endorsing strikes that injure the employer, his supoliers, his customers and his stockholder, and, in fact, every human being in the world. This is true because anything that reduces production and wastes human energy certainly, violates the Coveting Commandment and the Golden

Would the officers of the National Council of Churches contend that it would not violate the Golden Rule and the Coveting, Commandment for all the employers in a certain line of production to enter into an agreement that they would pay a fine and could be expelled and hindered from producing their product if they sold for less than what the majority specified or paid more wages than the majority specified should be

Certainly if the workers have a right to have a monopoly and have a conspiracy, then the employers have, but it is doubtful closed shop as being in harmony with right would contend the employers had the right to do the same thing. In fact, the Sherman Anti-Trust civil law has made it a crime for employers to do what la bor leaders and the authors of the National Council of Churches of Christ advocate workers having a moral right to do.

Remember, the Clayton Amendment to the Sherman Anti-Trust law exempts farmers and workers from being guilty of violating the Sherman Anti - Trust Law that would be a crime when done by other citizens.

The statement, "that union membership as a basis of continued employment should be neither required nor forbidden by law," is, in effect, taking a stand that the Sherman Anti-Trust law should be repealed, or that we should have a double standard - one for the employer and another for the employes and farmers. They contend that whether or not a man should be forced to join or not join a union should be left to an agreement by management and labor through the process of collective

bargaining What is a Bargain? But is it a real collective bargain when either party threatens to injure another, as does every labor union when they threaten to strike if the employer does not concede to a closed shop? If that is a bargain, then we have a bargain when a highwayman holds up a man and gets his money on the condition, your money or your life. Both of them are getting something under duress. That is, by collusion, intrigue and a conspiracy. And there can be no real bargain under collusion, intrigue or a conspiracy against any in-

dividual or any group. (To be continued)

Committee Learned Of Intervention In Papers

WASHINGTON - The powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee is angrily up-in-arms over the State Department's refusal to divulge what is going on, particularly in the war-threatened Mid-

The potent senators are especially outraged because early this month they formally-voted a resolution directing Secretary Dulles to send them daily reports. So far, they haven't received a single one. Senator John Kennedy (D.,-

Mass.) caustically raised this ques--tion at a private Committee hearing. He was vigorously joined by Senators Wayne Morse (D., Oreg.) and Hubert Humphrey (D., Minn.). The trio hotly assailed Secretary Dulles' "defiance" of the Commit

"I offered the motion that the State Department keep us informed on a day-to-day basis of the critical problems we now face, esin the Middle East,' declared Kennedy. "The State Department has seen fit to ignore that official action by this Committee. What are we going to do about

"That's an excellent question," declared Morse, "and I'm glad Senator Kennedy asked it. It's long overdue that we find out what the State Department is up

"It is, indeed," added Senator Humphrey. "I'm the chairman of the Subcommittee on the Middle East, but not a single member of the State Department, or any other agency of this Administration, has consulted me about this extremely perilous situation. This Committee, and particularly my Subcommittee, is supposed to be kept fully informed of what is going on in the Middle East, but all I know is what I read in the newspapers."

'Morse questioned Senator Theodore Green (D., R.I.) c, hairman, on whether the bipartisan leaders of Congress were informed at their White House Conference that a decision has been made to send Marines to Lebanon.

"No, we were not told that directly," replied Green. "I wasn't sure there would be such intervention until a newspaperman told me about it when I returned to the Capitol.'

"Then why didn't they tell you?" demanded Morse.

"That's what we ought to find out," remarked Senator Mike Mansfield, Mont., Democratic Whip, "We should summon Secretary Dulles and put that, and other, questions up to him. What distresses me greatly is the fact that at the very time they were briefing us in the White House, orders had actually gone out to land Marines in Lebanon. But we weren't told one word directly about that.

Morse contended that amounted to "deception."

"Their strategy is obvious," asserted the militant Oregonian. "They first got your approval of a plan, and then they told you it was an accomplished fact. I contend we cannot permit that to go on. It's time we established the prerogatives of this Committee." "I'm beginning to feel very strongly they just don't care about

Senator H. Alexander Smith (R. N.J.), who is quitting Congress this year, vigorously objected to that criticism. He held "it's not

this Committee," said Chairman

a fair statement. "What evidence do you have that they do care about this Committee?" retorted Green. "You are a Republican and a loyal supporter of this Administration. Do they ever consult you? It's my information they don't consult you any more than they consult us.'

Morse moved that the Committee direct Dulles to appear for a full discussion. That was voted. Later, Dulles sent word he could not find time to meet with the Committee until next week. In the meanwhile, he would send Undersecretary Christian Herter to substitute for him.

France Fresh Out Of Graditude For US By WESTBROOK PEGLER

Reports from France indicate that once more the French people - possibly a taxidriver - have run out of gratitude toward the United States for our slobbering affection for a France that never did exist. We have no right to believe that this is true, but it is devoutly to be wished, nevertheless. Anything short of a rousing war, which would be fatal to the United States, would be a fair price to pay for the dissipation of two historic infatuations, theirs for us and ours for them. It is not excessive to say that at times during these crushes we have loved them more than we have loved ourselves, for surely one has never seen Americans fawning and drooling over other Americans just because they were Americans. And Frenchmen know themselves too well to gurgle and blow kisses off their fingertips to fellow countrymen on chance encounters in pub-

It would be fine for both countries if we would come to our senses more or less permanenthy without first going to the gutter and coming up winded and dazed with blood on our gums. The first lesson in our education toward a beautiful understanding would be the fact that France has been beset and bedeveiled by millions of stangers ever since 1914. She has never had a moment's privacy since. Everyone here except a few assumed that France must be in the right then and an American Ambassador endeared himself to believue by asserting gravely that every American had two countries, his own and France. The belligerent martial history that had drenched a thousand battlefields was filed on a top shelf.

After the Boche had been mauled close to exhaustion in campaigns from Turkey to the Alps, the Baltic and Belgium, we dash ed to the rescue shooting French guns and flying English planes. Our admirable Mr. Wilson then undertook to dictate the Constitution of the brave new world in which Frenchmen but not Americans had to live. Some of them took this

Meanwhile we have done much better in material things than France. Our industrial age was just dawning as the war ended and our machines produced so that by the time the inevitable Second War began we had so many people out of jobs that we seized upon gallantry to excuse total mobilization. This absorbed most of the best male population from 18 to 35 and ran the divorce rate up from about one in six to one in three. Employment in the industry of making war was so totally total that Harry Hopkins and Eleanor Roosevelt promulgated Twin Bulls to the effect that freedom to elect one's own calling was an unreasonable luxury. Hopkins rolled on his tongue the sweetindecent idea that husbands must consent to deportation to jobs a thousand miles away while wives kept the home fires burning for patriotic strangers engaged in the "War Effort" billeted on them

And later they saw traitors who welcomed the German hordes or ran away from battle suddenly surge into the forefront of the "resistance" in time to lynch some 40,000 superior Frenchemen for "collaboration." They saw their great Petain, Weygand and Gamelin degraded and, so to speak, set to sweeping gutters while the communist Thorez and others like him. swaggering back from Moscow, received courtesies close to homage. Pierre Laval, patriotic and a good deal like Churchill but without the hammy arts that Winston shared with Hitler and the Duce, was shot out of hand for trying to accommodate his country to her conquered condition with the least possible hurt to his people. However, he was swarthy with a squinty eye and therefore treacherous. Churchill's grand coup in holing out the honor of "citizenship" for Frenchmen in the Land of the Cockney and the Sprout was construed here as a beautiful thought and Laval's refusal as proof that the beast had been a Nazi all the time.

Under De Gaulle, France has moved closer than we have, yet, to the stage of blood-on-the-moon that purified the amosphere of Italy and Germany momentarily. But the General suprisingly seems more capable than his gaseous harangues in seances with the press had let us suspect. Of all the authoritarians, he may be the only major leaguer with the skill to bring decent men together for honor, patriotism and faith in the pure culture of their country. At any rate, he has touched the hearts of the better Frenchmen with an impulse of hope whereas Ike no sooner was elected than he disavowed the spirit of patrious who wanted a severely pro-American president for a change after 20 years of turmoil and treachery.

If the French knew us as we know ourselves we would never have to fear another of these periodic appraisals of our imperfections. No American loves American as absurdly as the French at times have loved us. And Frenchmen have always thought us pleasantly mad in our delusion that Frenchmen are all patriots, counts


