On Mideast Resolution

Russia Offers Plan Changes

UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—Russia unexpectedly offered changes today in a Japanese compromise Middle East resolution. The United Nations Security Council postponed a decision until afternoon.

Soviet Ambassador Arkady A. Sobolev had indicated Monday night that he probably would veto the Japanese measure, which is designed to replace U.S. forces in Lebanon with a befeared up and armed U.N. observer group. Sobolev switched tactics this morning.

He sought to put into Japan's measure a call for the immediate withdrawal of American forces from Lebanon and, in what was regarded as a strange veering of Soviet policy, reinstated a demand that the U.N. observer group now there "continue to develop its activities." This had been deleted from Japan's original measure in deference to the Kremlin.

Sobolev's amendments would instruct Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld to meet the observers' request for reinforcements which was relayed from Beirut last week. But they also would put a July 30 time-limit on Hammarskjöld's efforts.

The Soviet amendments stood no chance of passage, although Swedish Ambassador Gunnar V. Jarring gained the council's adjournment until 2 p.m. c.d.t. to consider them.

If and when Russia's amendments are voted down, Japanese sources expected Sobolev to veto the original measure.

Sobolev announced Monday that Soviet opposition to the Japanese proposal was based on belief that it would sanction U.S. intervention in the Middle East.

Abdul Majid Abbas, pre-revolutionary royalist ambassador who had represented the late King Faisal of Iraq, returned to the Security Council today. He was absent Monday because of illness.

Abbas said he had heard about a reported threat against his life, but did not take it seriously. He had no bodyguard and said it was up to U.N. security officers to take any necessary steps. New York police have been guarding his hotel.

Last week Sobolev vetoed an American resolution which would

have substituted an armed UN force for the Americans to safeguard the independence of Lebanon. Diplomats said he was almost sure to veto the substitute proposal which waters down the UN forces' strength.

The effect of the Soviet Union's 85th veto would have on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's proposed summit conference on the Middle East was not clear. But the United Nations itself was prepared to welcome the heads of government to such a high-level conference.

Washington and London reports indicated the allied reply to Khrushchev's call for a summit meeting would include an invitation to such a summit meeting. UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld, in accepting Khrushchev's invitation Monday night, also plumped for a UN meeting.

"The primary responsibility of the UN in this situation should, in my view, be given the fullest possible application in the arrangements for the conduct of a high-level meeting, were it to come about," Hammarskjöld told Khrushchev.

Sobolev, leaning forward in his blue chair, his right hand waving like an orchestra leader, said flatly his delegation "cannot support the draft resolution proposed by the Japanese delegation." Instead he said a summit conference would be better.

Commission Pays Bill

Senate Smiles On Trade Legislation

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate appeared ready today to give President Eisenhower a major victory in his fight for effective reciprocal trade legislation.

The bill, now in its second week of debate, was given an excellent chance of passage by tonight in a form substantially agreeable to the administration. A critical amendment designed to save the program from congressional hamstringing appeared assured of passage.

The key amendment, one affecting tariff relief for U. S. industries, would continue the present law on tariff commission decisions rejected by the President. The bill as approved by the Senate Finance Committee would let a simple majority of Congress toss out the President's objections to a Tariff Commission ruling.

The House wrestled with tax legislation, hoping to reach a vote late today on a Senate-approved bill that would provide funds to help finance small business ventures. Under the legislation, investment of up to 250 million dollars in federal funds in small businesses would be possible through the intermediary of privately operated investment corporations.

The House Ways & Means Committee was expected to give final approval of a bill to allow self-employed persons substantially lower income taxes through deferral of tax payments on amounts placed in retirement funds or insurance annuities.

Other congressional news:

Small business — The House by voice passed a 260 million dollar tax relief bill for small business that had administration backing. The bill's chief provision would permit small business firms to reduce their taxable income by deducting an increased percentage of machinery and equipment costs for depreciation in the first year after purchase.

National Guard — The House approved a resolution by voice

vote urging the defense department not to cut the National Guard below 400,000 men. The resolution did not have the force of law but simply expressed the view of the house.

Farm — The House tentatively approved a bill to revive the government's authority to sell farm surpluses abroad for foreign currencies. The authority ran out three weeks ago.

Atomic — A House-Senate conference committee agreed on a compromise version of the 388 million dollar authorization bill for atomic energy construction projects — twice that suggested by the administration.

Space — The House established a permanent committee on science and astronautics to handle space legislation. The 24-member committee was called "one of the most important" in Congress by House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack.

Buddy Kills Marine

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI)—A U.S. Marine was shot and killed today by one of his own buddies—the second American to die in Lebanon since U.S. troops landed last Tuesday to try to save the country's independence.

The name of the Marine was withheld. He had left his own lines to lay trip flare wires around his company perimeter near the Beirut International Airport seven miles from the city and was killed by a sentry when he failed to answer three challenges.

The first American killed in Lebanon was Navy Lt. (jg) Richard Dieterich, 24, Evanston, Ill., a Navy pilot whose plane crashed into a mountain near Beirut last Saturday. Authorities said his plane flamed out and that he was not hit by rebel bullets.

The Marine killed today was shot in the stomach. He was rushed by helicopter to the command ship Pocoyo in Beirut harbor but died on the operating table in the ship's hospital.

16 U.S. Planes Hit

The accident happened after a night filled with the sharp exchange of rifle fire in the city, punctuated by heavy explosions. There were fears of major outbreaks of violence before Thursday's scheduled presidential elections.

Vice Adm. Charles R. (Cat) Brown said today that rebel snipers have scored hits on 16 U.S. naval planes flying over Lebanon in the past three days. He said there have been no casualties and most of the hits were scored by .30 or .50-caliber bullets.

"The majority of planes hit by ground fire have been accounted for by one rebel marksmen, Brown said. "He's a real Annie Oakley. Wish he was on our side."

A U.S. Marine was killed early today by one of his own buddies as he returned to his lines from laying a trip flare wire around his company perimeter. The Marine failed to answer a sentry's challenge and he was shot fatally in the stomach.

The Marine was the second American casualty of the Lebanon incident. Last Saturday a Navy pilot was killed when his plane crashed into a mountain.

Senatorial Race Takes Spotlight

Texas' senatorial race held the political spotlight today as candidates started the final four days of campaigning before Saturday's Democratic primary elections.

Incumbent Sen. Ralph Yarborough, who returned to Washington Sunday for a round of conferences on the Middle East crisis, said "I feel it is imperative that I remain on the job."

Yarborough's opponent, William A. Blakley of Dallas, slammed the senator's return to the capital Monday, calling it a "transparent effort to make last-minute publicity out of a serious international situation."

Defends States' Rights

In the gubernatorial contest, Price Daniel continued his stand for states' rights. Speaking in Dallas, the incumbent governor said he was opposed to general federal

and their political stooges."

O'Daniel, who scheduled a helicopter tour of Pasadena, Baytown, La Porte, Texas City, Galveston, Alvin, Sugar Land, and Fairbanks today, said "greedy oil operators control 85 per cent of the distribution of petroleum products and are flooding our American markets with cheap crude oil imported from fields all over the world where low-paid foreign workers are used in the production of the oil."

Borger Man Is Held After Being Involved In Car Accident

A 51-year-old Borger man, Leroy Raymond Brown, was being held in Hutchinson County jail this morning facing charges of driving while license suspended after being involved in a one-car accident a mile and a half east of Skellytown late Sunday night.

Pampa Highway Patrolman W. A. Richardson, who investigated the accident, said that Brown was traveling east on a county road between Skellytown and the Skelly-Schafer camp when his car hit a slick spot on a bridge and plunged into the creek. Brown's car was completely demolished. He escaped with only minor injuries.

Richardson said that Brown spent the night at the bridge and was picked up by a motorist late yesterday morning walking along the road looking for help.

Brown at first told officers some-

one else was in the car with him but later changed his story and said he was by himself.

Wrecking crews hauled the car out of the creek bed late yesterday afternoon and could find no evidence that anyone else was in the car. Clothing was found strewn about the creek bed but was later identified as belonging to Brown.

It took wrecking crews about three hours to pull the car out of the creek. It was buried so deep in sand.

Would 'Go Along' With United Nations

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House said today the United States will go along if others concerned want a summit meeting at the United Nations.

The White House announcement followed British acceptance of Nikita Khrushchev's proposal for a head of state meeting on the Middle East provided the Soviet premier is willing to hold it within the U. N. Security Council.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said: "If such a meeting were generally desired, the United States would join in following this orderly procedure."

Won't Undermine U.N.

Before Hagerty made his statement, it had appeared that the Western powers had been unable to agree on a reply to Khrushchev's summit proposal.

This country, it was known, did not want an emergency big power meeting that might undermine U. N. authority and prestige.

Shortly before the British proposal, Hagerty said there had been "no agreement" among the Western powers and no reply to Khrushchev.

Then British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd told the House of Commons that Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will be willing to attend a summit conference if it were held in the Security Council.

Reply Given to NATO

That apparently provided this country with something it could accept, Hagerty said.

"A United Nations Security Council meeting of the character suggested by Foreign Minister Lloyd is clearly within the contemplation of the (U.N.) charter," Hagerty also said that a draft of the U.S. reply to Khrushchev "has now been given to the NATO organization in Paris."

This, plus Hagerty's remark that the United States would go along with the British proposal "if such a meeting were generally desired," suggested that this country is checking the procedure with the Atlantic Pact powers before making its reply final.

Reporters asked Hagerty if his statement meant that President Eisenhower would attend such a meeting.

"It means just exactly what I said and nothing further," he replied.

Dulles Flies to London

Meanwhile, other official sources insisted that the United States is not proposing that Khrushchev come to the United Nations for a summit meeting. But because, under U.N. procedures, a member government may be represented by anyone of its choice in the Security Council, the U.S. draft reply to Moscow does not take issue with this possibility.

Dulles Flies to London

Radio Moscow meanwhile needed the West to get a move on. It said time may be running out for a reply to Khrushchev.

"Today a disaster can still be averted but perhaps tomorrow it cannot," a Moscow broadcast said.

Nicaraguans Confer With Ike's Brother

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI)—Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, member here by anti-American pickets, confers today with Nicaraguan officials to find out what the United States can do to strengthen friendly relations with the Central American republic.

There were several manifestations of anti-American sentiment on his arrival. A large group of demonstrators picketed the U.S. cultural center while Eisenhower was visiting there, and a delegation of university students called on him at the embassy to criticize U.S. Latin-American policies.

There was no violence. The pickets, carrying signs saying "less friendship with dictators," "more aid instead of plans," "no tanks, no arms," marched in orderly procession back and forth before the center.

Eisenhower, on a fact-finding tour for the President, had offered to meet critical university student leaders at his previous stops on the tour, but all had refused.

Juan Zelaya acted as spokesman for the students in the meeting with Eisenhower here. He said the demonstration against Vice President Richard M. Nixon during his Latin American tour last spring showed "the people resent U.S. friendship with the dictators."

Zelaya said the U.S. government "spat at us" when it decorated Pedro Estrada, chief of the Venezuelan secret police during the regime of deposed dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez, and Gen. Francisco Taberna, chief of the Cuban army of President Fulgencio Batista.

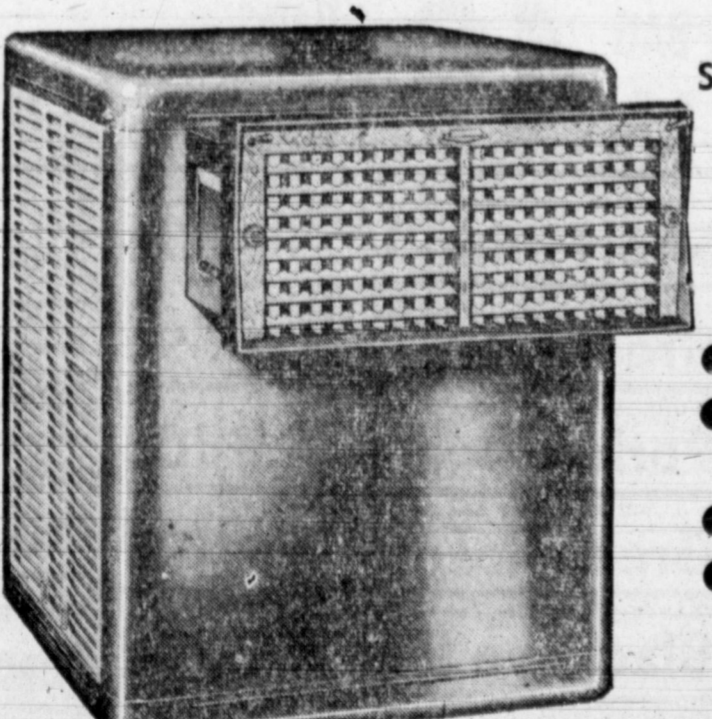

'What'll I Do Now, Mama?' Universal Plaint Of Youngsters During Summer

There will be fewer complaints of "What'll I do now mama?" from the youngsters during the summer vacation if you plan outings aimed to acquaint them more closely with nature. Guiding a child's native curiosity to observe, identify and understand something of the natural world around him is rewarding immediately and may provide the foundation for a lifetime enthusiasm.

For homemakers like myself who are wondering how to start, helpful advice comes from Miss Miriam Wood, chief of the Raymond Foundation of the Chicago Natural History Museum and director of the museum's children's program.

One of the projects for this summer is a museum "journey" to exhibits dealing particularly with nature around us. This is proving one of the most popular jaunts since the program started three years ago.

Miss Wood points out that an "outing" can be as close as one's back yard. It can, too, extend to the vacation by the shore or in the woods.

We want to be careful about encouraging a child to start a collection. Wildflowers, for example, are protected by laws in some areas and are not to be picked.

We can encourage children to look closely at wildflowers on a country walk; to learn the names and the habitats of various blossoms.

Butterflies, on the other hand, are a favorite collectors' item. And, says Miss Wood, they are so short-lived that there is little likelihood of anyone objecting to a child capturing butterflies.

To help your offspring and yourself get back to nature little equipment is needed. Helpful however, are pocket magnifying

insect or feather formation.

One entertaining exercise, Miss Wood suggests is to study one square foot of back yard, beach or woodland with a magnifying glass to see the numbers and varieties of insect life present.

Good field guides—identify of various flora, fauna, rocks and minerals are essential. Miss Wood suggests for a beginning naturalist a clearly written, pocket-size guide. There are several good ones available. If you're in doubt, ask your public librarian or write to a museum



For a book list.

A notebook in which to record what you see day-by-day is another aid to making you and the children more observant.

Records can be brief, but they should include the date, what you saw, where you saw it, and if it's a wildflower or tree, the type of place where it grows.

If you have both the notebook and the field guide you'll be more likely to record the sights.

Before you go too far afield, however, be sure you and the children know what harmful plants like poison ivy or poison sumac look like.

Although state and national laws protect many living things for conservation purposes, Miss Wood's points out that it's often permissible to pick up leaves, nuts, feathers and other objects that have fallen to the ground.

Feathers are good studies for the magnifying glass, can be identified as to the bird from which they came and mounted on paper for keeping.

Beside learning something about the tree from which a leaf fell use leaves to make leaf prints. Craft books at the library will tell you how.

Young rock-hounds, called by the museum's sympathetic directress, "pebble pups," should be encouraged first to collect the specimens near home.

So popular are the rock and mineral exhibits at the museum that a small book and sample collection were put together by the Raymond Foundation to guide "pebble pups." This is an excellent guide. I have found.

If you are stumped for nature projects, there are books to help you.

One of those recommended by many naturalists is by John Saunders, of New York's American Natural History Museum.

Miss Wood rates this one as excellent and the many color photographs are absorbing and informative.

In this third article of a series to help you serve your club effectively as its publicity chairman, it is a good idea to write your article while it is hot. Timeliness is the one important factor upon which a newspaper is built. An editor wants the news no later than the day it happens, when it is physically possible.

A happening or event that is days old is generally no longer news, it is history . . . and most newspapers leave the writing of history to the historians.

Much of the time, you can give your story to the editor before it happens. For example, you know well in advance that your group is going to conduct a banquet or hold an election of officers or sponsor some other similar activity. Once you've given an advance story, the editor will expect a "cover" or account of what happened.

If, for some reason, the event fails to take place it is your responsibility to notify the editor immediately. If a story is printed announcing a meeting at a certain place at a certain time, and on that same day, a reader calls stating that the meeting did not take place, an "unfunny" situation develops.

You may be a Blue Ribbon penman, but writing a story in long

hand invites errors. If there were but one thing the editors the country over had in common, it would be an insistence on accuracy. If it's impossible for you to type your story, PRINT all names, and make certain your penmanship leaves no room for doubt in the editor's mind about the spelling of ANY word in the story.

We have available at the news office, a club report form that will aid greatly in writing up your club copy. It is yours for the asking.

By following these basic rules, when preparing a news story, you will go far in building prestige for yourself: 1) If using a typewriter, use tripled space on one side of the paper only. This will allow room above and below the lines for correction; 2) Leave ample margins, both right and left; 3) At the upper left hand corner type your name, address, and phone number. This will identify you as a news source, and the editor will have no trouble reaching you if there is a question; 4) Keep your story short but in full detail.

Rising costs of turning out any newspaper make it imperative that all stories be told in as few words as possible.

You will soon find that it's a lot more fun to see a brief item, giving all the essential information, in print . . . than to contemplate that beautiful, long story that found its resting place in the wastebasket.

Avoid adjectives and the glowing tribute. If it takes more than a page to tell a story, read it over carefully and do a little editing of your own. (TOMORROW: NEWS OR ADVERTISING.)

"So much is being written against working wives I just had to say that our is one family that has gained a great deal and lost nothing through this wife's taking on a full-time job."

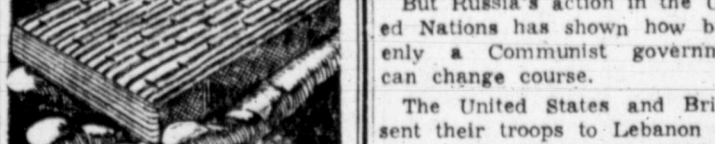

'Summit' Meeting's Chances Vanishing

Foreign News Commentary By CHARLES M. McCANN UPI Foreign News Analyst Soviet Russia appears to have destroyed any hope that its relations with the United States can be put on a friendly basis for months to come. Its tactics in the Middle Eastern crisis have shown the complete cynicism with which the Kremlin conducts its foreign affairs. Any chance for a 'summit conference' which has been discussed in recent months seems to have vanished. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles has expressed confidence that, despite its dire threats, the Soviet government will not resort to any military action against the United States and British dispatch of troops to Lebanon and Jordan. There seems to be pretty good reason for Dulles' confidence. One factor is the general belief that the Soviet government does not want a global war, which could easily be caused by any rash action in the Middle East. Cites Statements Another factor is the Soviet statements, threatening as they are, appear to be aimed chiefly at mobilizing world opinion against the United States and Britain - a propaganda offensive. Russia is represented as the friend of peace, the defender of small countries against aggressive imperialism and "colonialism." It might as well be admitted that this propaganda is likely to be effective not only in the Arab countries but in most of the newly freed nations in the world and among some sections of popular opinion in Allied countries themselves. But Russia's action in the United Nations has shown how brazenly a Communist government can change course. The United States and Britain sent their troops to Lebanon and Jordan in response to appeals by legally constituted governments. Their very life was threatened by rebellions fomented and actively aided by a foreign government - the United Arab Republic of President Gamal Abdel Nasser. The Allied action was taken under Article 51 of the U.N. charter. In the 11-nation Security Council, Russia called on the U.N. to order the United States and Britain to withdraw their troops. The resolution was defeated by a vote of eight to one, Russia alone voted against.



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Group Is Against Labor Reform Bill

By LYLE C. WILSON United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) - The American Retail Federation (ARF) is banging the alarm bell against House approval of the Kennedy-Ives labor reform bill which already has been passed by the Senate.

ARF, with headquarters here, represents 38 state associations of retailers and 32 national associations of retail merchants, an estimated 800,000 retail units.

The federation is circulating monthly a "labor law commentary" in which it is argued that the Kennedy-Ives bill is booby-trapped against employers. The ARF employ relations committee composed of legal and labor experts in the retail field contend the bill is so drawn that, in practice, an employer could not raise wages during or just prior to a union organizing effort without becoming liable to prosecution for the crime of spending money to influence his staff. Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) of the Senate Labor Committee which drafted the bill described the ARF reasoning as "utter nonsense."

The sections of the pending legislation to which ARF objects were drawn to put out of business the labor fixers whose operations in behalf of employers seeking sweetheart labor contracts were illuminated in recent hearings before the Senate Rackets Committee of which Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) is chairman. Says Bill "Booby-Trapped"

These sections are so loosely drawn, according to ARF, that they would go far beyond their assumed corrective purpose and would deprive employers of reasonable and above-board initiative in opposing organization efforts. "In short," the ARF bulletin concludes, "this bill has in it enough booby traps thrown in with the parts designed to eliminate racketeering that the House of Representatives must take a good look and find out why union leaders are so anxious to have it become law."

The Taft-Hartley Act prohibits interfering, restraining or coercing of employes by employers in the matter of joining or not joining a union. The ARF bulletin says the giving of a wage increase would not ordinarily be interpreted as violating that provision. The Kennedy-Ives bill, however, would make it a crime for an employ-

er to pay money to an employee or to a group of employees to influence any of them directly or indirectly in their right to organize. The penalty could be a \$10,000 fine and one year in jail.

Subject To Fine

An employer who spends more than \$5,000 to influence or to affect employees in their rights to join or to abstain from union membership must, under terms of the Kennedy-Ives bill, report his expenditures to the secretary of labor. Failure to report would be a crime subject to a \$10,000 fine and one year in jail.

"In summary," the ARF reported, "if the employer gives the employees fringe benefits, wage increases, etc., knowing it might influence' his employes, he must report it to the secretary of labor."

"At the same time, if he did this, he automatically becomes guilty of a crime under another section of the bill. His only alternative would be to recognize a union and let it tell him what will be the employes' working conditions. Only in this way will his personnel program not influence or affect the employes' decision to join or not to join a union."

The Kennedy-Ives prohibition against spending with "intent to influence" an employe seems to cover a lot more ground than the Taft-Hartley ban against interference, restraint and coercion.

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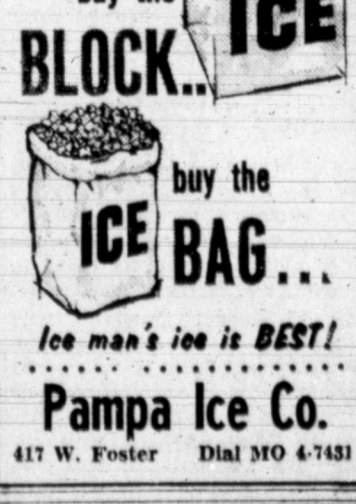
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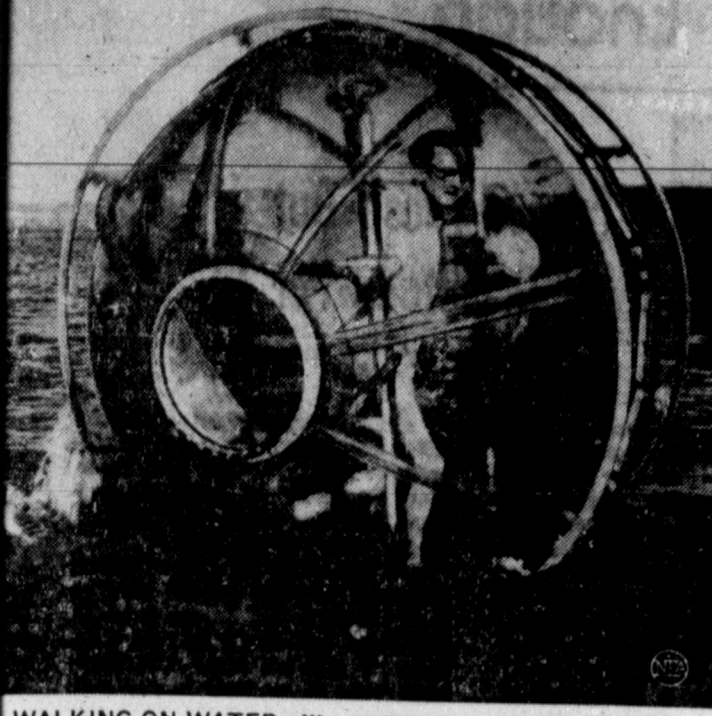

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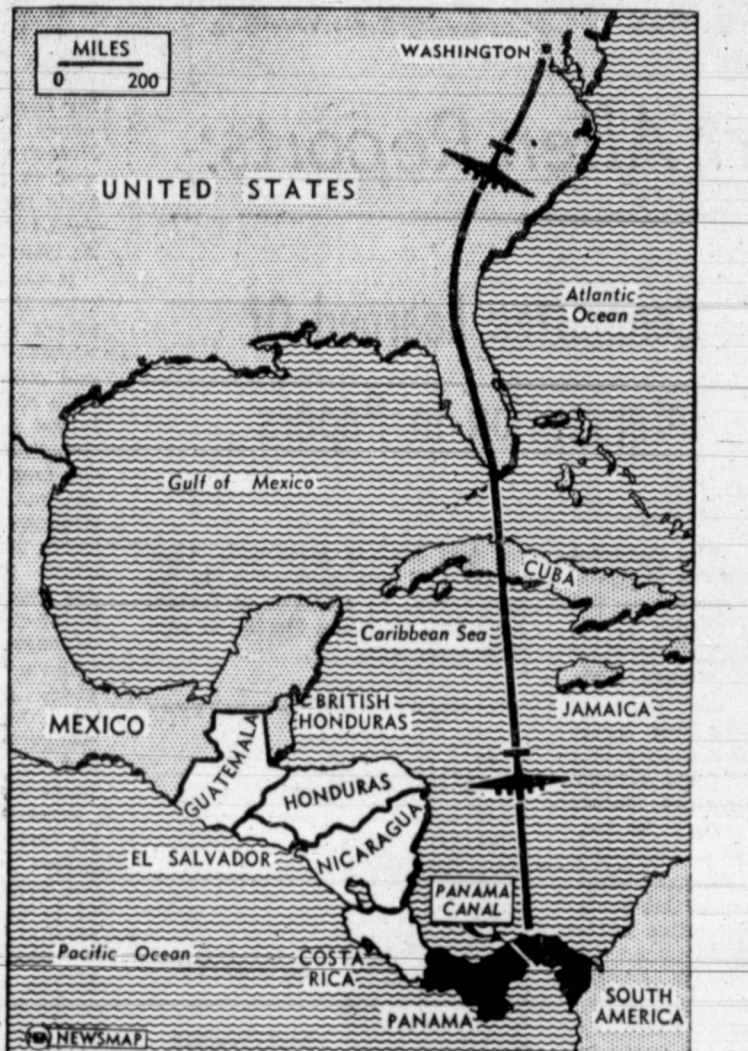

Steel magazine said the Mideast crisis would boost defense spending, particularly for steel. It said defense orders are likely to rise even if the Middle East situation does not explode. Meanwhile, it said steel demand for July has topped expectations, with construction products a feature.
The government will spend close to 80 billion dollars in the current fiscal year, or approximately \$10,000 worth of taxpayers' money per second, according to the Tax Foundation. This compares with \$9,749 per second in fiscal 1958 and \$9,268 in fiscal 1957.
The Air Force named Avco Corp., North American Aviation, Thiokol Chemical, Aerojet-General and Hercules Powder to do development and research work on the solid-fuel, intercontinental Minuteman missile. The project is expected to take four or five years.
The number of workers drawing jobless pay, after declining steadily since early April, increased slightly in the week ended July 5 because of plant shutdowns for vacations. The Labor Department said 426,400 claims have been filed in the past three weeks under a program using federal funds to prolong state benefits. Half of these claims came from Michigan, New York and Pennsylvania.

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Nobody Certain How Much Rockefeller Gave Away

EDITORS Note: In the last century, the name of Rockefeller has become synonymous with philanthropy. Advisers to the descendants of the late John D. Rockefeller say that never in history has there been a family so rich or so generous. United Press International reporter Claire Cox tells of the extent of the Rockefeller giving, in a dispatch based on interviews with Rockefeller aides and studies available financial information.

NEW YORK (UPI)—How much money have the Rockefellers given away?

That may be a two billion dollar question.

No one is certain of the answer, possibly not even the Rockefellers themselves.

John D. Rockefeller Sr., founder of the family fortune, never quite achieved the distinction of being a billionaire, but the amount of money given away in the Rockefeller name has soared well past the billion dollar mark.

It still is soaring—and yet, the more money the Rockefellers give, the more they seem to have. John D. Rockefeller Jr. is said to be worth nearly a billion dollars after giving away possibly that much or more. His five sons and one daughter all are multimillionaires.

Fortune Increases
But the fortune left by J.D.R. Sr. when he died in 1937 was less than a billion.

After more than a century of Rockefeller giving, the fortune still is snowballing. Investments have swelled in value and family enterprises have expanded.

Two generations of Rockefellers and hundreds of their employees have worked overtime at the job of distributing money where it will do the most good in global philanthropies ranging from restoring the palace at Versailles to teaching Fiji Islanders how to can tuna fish.

And no one professes to know exactly how much money three generations of Rockefellers have given away since JDR Sr. made his first modest one-dollar bequest to a church more than 100 years ago.

Some persons estimate the Rockefeller benefactions, from dimes handed out on street corners to a multi-million-dollar foundation, have totaled more than 2.1 billion dollars. Some say less.

But even the most conservative estimate is close to two billion dollars.

Between them, JDR Sr. and his son are known to have put nearly a billion dollars in capital to found the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, the Rockefeller Foundation and the general education board and to establish countless philanthropies.

The foundation has given away more than 561 million dollars yet still has 600 million dollars left because of appreciation of securities. All this has been done with initial gifts of about 210 million dollars made by the senior Rockefeller more than 50 years ago.

Third Generation At Work

Lebanon Intervention Astonishing Operation

BEIRUT (UPI)—Intervention in Lebanon must rank with the more astonishing operations of military history — an American civilian can inspect "fronts" by taxi and meet equally warm welcomes on all sides.

It is a situation wherein the U.S. Marines and the rebels are leaning over backward to avoid starting fighting. So far, that is. But everyone here is holding his breath lest some clash—accidental or otherwise — set off bloodshed.

The main impression a newcomer gets here is one of the ludicrousness of the situation and a grim sort of amusement.

Come along with Abdullah, an English-speaking Beirut taxi driver, and let's tour the city that has put the whole world on edge.

Takes One By Surprise
Abdullah maintains a running commentary and it is with sudden concern you realize what he is saying is that this is the rebel-held section of the city, that snipers stay in top windows and it is a "very bad place."

But then you begin to get the hang of it and can tell yourself whether you are in the rebel section or those patrolled by the Lebanese army. It is simple because

you go past sandbagged guard-posts and through barbed wire barricades thoughtfully left open wide enough for cars to pass.

One minute you are looking uneasily at a Lebanese soldier leaning indolently on a rifle and the next you are looking even more uneasily at a civilian in a white shirt with a rifle slung over his shoulder. He is a rebel.

Sees Chamoun's Home
Abdullah casually drives past the home of Saeb Saïem, the rebel chieftain, then down the hill toward the heavily-guarded residence of Lebanese President Camille Chamoun.

Then out on the airport road south of the city to reaches and sand ridges where Marines are sprawling beneath tents for miles in the hot sun. They have little to do.

The Marines are glad to see you and the first question from most is "What is going on at home?"

What do people think of this? The view of Lt. Gary Gilson, Waterbury, Conn., is typical. "Every night as we lie here we wonder what is going to come of it all. We wonder if we can work this thing out without shooting. All of us hope we can and can get out of here."

Wallach assures the police that by the time Stevens realizes that it's Miss Rule he wants to kill her, no longer will want to kill her.

After some more coincidences involving pills, in perfume bottles and vases, Wallach stops Stevens from pulling the trigger. He convinces Stevens that it's not Miss Rule he's out to murder. It's you guessed it—poor old mother.

As I said, credulity took a beating in this one. The actors, handicapped by the plot and some florid prose, did their best.
