New Commie Crackdown Likely; Two Denounced

List Of 'Anti-Party Group' Grows In Number To Seven

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet press today linked two more top Communist Party members with the disgraced "anti-party group" of former government leaders, and a new crackdown appeared in the making.

Speakers at today's session of the 21st congress of the Soviet Communist Party heaped further denunciation on the group, apparently setting the stage for their confessions of plotting against Premier Nikita Khrushchev's policies.

The Soviet Press linked one-time Presidium members Mikhail Pervukhin and Maxim Saburov with the group which was expelled from the Communist hierarchy in 1957 on charges of trying to sabotage the party's domestic and foreign policy.

The previously denounced members of the anti-party group were former Premier Vyacheslav M. Molotov, Nikolai Bulganin and Georgi Malenkov, and former Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov and former Presidium member Lazar Kaganovich.

Answer for Mistakes

The first speaker at today's congress session, Alexei Geyevoy, secretary of the Dnepropetrovsk party committee, began by praising Khrushchev's seven-year plan and ended by up denouncing the anti-party group.

He said: "The tasks confronting the country throw into particular relief the tremendous significance of the exposure of the factional group which tried to frustrate the implementation of the Leninist line and the Soviet Union on all the questions of domestic and foreign policy."

The accusations against Pervukhin and Saburov were made Thursday by Ivan V. Spiridonov, head of the Leningrad regional party committee, and made public today. He noted that neither had spoken out against the anti-party group and asked:

"How can we understand this silence? Comrades Pervukhin and Saburov! Shouldn't we demand an answer from you before the congress for your mistakes?"

Pravda, the official Communist Party newspaper, said Spiridonov's suggestion was greeted with cheers by the 1,200 or more delegates.

Pervukhin and Saburov were dropped from the Presidium in June, 1957, when the others were expelled. But Pervukhin and Saburov remained in the Central Committee where Pervukhin was demoted from full membership to the rank of candidate member.

In addition, the congress was expected to take up the so-called "Leningrad case" which involved party intrigue and executions of several party leaders in 1949. Malenkov has been linked with this group.

Predict Party Expulsion
The "anti-party group" denounced originally by Khrushchev has been under heavy fire in the Soviet press for days. Thursday the head of the Leningrad Com-

2,146 PAY POLL TAXES

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London Suffocates With Worst Smog Since 1952

LONDON (UPI)—The worst smog in six years choked London today with a suffocating pall that threatened death to persons with heart or lung conditions.

The government warned that the mixture of smoke and fog was as bad as the December, 1952, smog that caused the deaths of 3,500 to 4,000 persons in four days. Continuing smog was predicted. Ninety per cent of the 1952 dead were persons over 45 who had previous records of heart or lung disease. The government since has established precautions against a recurrence.

Advise Wearing Masks
Doctors advised ailing patients or those who fall in the smog victim categories to stay home until the air clears. They warned any going out of doors to wear masks.

The fog, now in its third day, also was bringing a mounting toll of automobile wrecks. An 11-year-old (See LONDON, Page 3)

Speedup In Cuban Trials Is Scheduled

HAVANA (UPI)—L. Col. Riccardo Grao, Cuba's "war criminal No. 3," comes before a revolutionary tribunal today—the first day of a scheduled speedup in "war crimes" trials here.

While there was no immediate indication how long Grao's trial will take, tribunals sitting simultaneously at Camp Columbia and Cabana Prison are expected to deal with lesser offenders at a rate of seven a day.

The trials of Maj. Jesus Sosa Blanes and Pedro Morejon Valdes, the only other war criminals tried in Havana so far, lasted for upwards of 10 hours while witnesses by the dozen came forward to testify against the defendants.

Farmhands Return Home
In all 33 persons took the stand against Sosa and 56 against Morejon.

It is not certain what witnesses will be called against Grao. The 600-odd farmhands who swarmed in from Oriente Province to tell their stories at the earlier trials have almost all returned home, leaving no more than a score of their number in Havana.

The supreme military tribunal meets tonight to hear the appeals of Sosa and Morejon. Informed sources expect that both appeals will be rejected and that the two men will be shot at dawn.

These sources discounted rumors that Sosa might be granted a new trial, even though attorneys on both sides of his case have submitted new evidence.

To Launch Land Reform
They said a new trial would amount to an admission that the earlier proceedings, in what the prisoner described as the "Roman Colosseum" atmosphere of the Sports Palace Stadium, had been mishandled.

Meanwhile, Fidel Castro was preparing to return to his stronghold in the mountains of Oriente where he will launch his promised land reform program Monday by parceling out farms to landless hill-dwellers.

News Reporter Says He Was Told Of Murder Intent

EL PASO (UPI)—A newspaper reporter says that Dr. Harold D. Eidinoff told him seven weeks ago of the threat he fulfilled to kill the El Paso school board president for showing nude pictures of each other on their honeymoon.

Dr. Eidinoff, wearing a bullet-proof vest, shot school board president Ted Andress five times with his wife in front of crowded International Airport Wednesday night.

The physician has been charged with murder with malice.

Andress was so well thought of that all schools and the county courthouse were to remain closed today for his funeral. The El Paso Bar announced its annual banquet, scheduled for tonight, would be postponed until the end of February.

Mail Investigation
Meanwhile, Asst. U.S. Atty. Joseph B. Ryan revealed Thursday night that postal inspectors in New Mexico were conducting an investigation of obscene photographs sent through the mail.

Eidinoff, who was pronounced insane about two years ago, was released from a sanitarium and since June 1958 had been in Grants, N. M.

The U.S. attorney said postal authorities in El Paso reported numerous complaints from prominent El Paso residents, who received nude pictures and accompanying letters.

The letters made reference to "the nude picture lawyer" and generally criticize the entire legal profession, Ryan said. He said the enclosed picture was of a nude man, with the face masked off.

He said most of the letters were postmarked Grants, N. M. They were unsigned.

Tells Story
Blair Justice of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram said Dr. Eidinoff told him seven weeks ago in Angleton, Tex., that he was going to kill Andress.

The reporter said that 10 minutes after he met the physician, Dr. Eidinoff showed him a nude picture of himself. Justice said Dr. Eidinoff told him that Andress had relinquished the photographs to exaggerate certain features, and had shown it around El Paso to humiliate him.

Justice said also that Dr. Eidinoff told him he sent a copy of the picture to Gov. Price Daniel of Texas, when he heard that Daniel was going to appoint Andress to a judgeship. He credited the picture with Andress' not getting the appointment.

Andress represented two attorneys who had represented Mrs. Sylvia Eidinoff in a divorce suit in a suit for legal fees. In that trial, Andress introduced the nude photographs.

Fire Chief Uses Blow Torch On Hospital, But No Flames!

Fire Chief Ernest Winborne reported Thursday he recently made a futile "attempt to turn firebug" in the interests of fire safety.

Winborne said he "tried his best" to start a fire in the closets and attic of Worley hospital in a demonstration of the flame-proof qualities of a substance called Flamemart.

Flamemart, Winborne reported, was recently applied to the unpainted woodwork at Worley hospital. He said he used a blow torch on the wood but was unable to get more than a "burning red glow" on any flame-treated surface.

Winborne is in hopes the demonstration will prompt other businesses into flame-proofing their buildings. He said he has also encouraged the school board to flame-proof Pampa junior high school.

Flamemart is an odorless, colorless chemical applied with spray gun. "The longer it stays on the surface the better it gets," Chief Winborne said.

HARROWING 5 1/2-HOUR ORDEAL

Diver Rescued After Being Trapped Beneath Icy Water

CHICAGO (UPI)—Veteran diver Frank (Lucky) Hefling, 35, managed a weak smile following his dramatic rescue from a painful trap. He fell under icy water Thursday night and said "I prayed."

Hefling was freed by two fellow divers and hauled to the surface after a movie-thriller five and one-half-hour ordeal in a tunnel shaft 140 feet below ground on Chicago's South Side.

The husky Hefling, who learned his skills as a Navy diver during World War II, was reported in "pretty good" condition at South Shore Hospital.

Thousands of persons hurried about their business along the streets of the busy South Side area, unaware of the life-and-death struggle going on in the water tunnel beneath their feet.

Hefling went down the shaft Thursday morning for the "routine" job of repairing cracks in a large water gate separating two tunnels. First his right arm became pinned in the gate by the water suction. He freed the arm after about three hours only to have his leg jam under the gate, trapping him in a painfully cramped position.

In addition, a sleeve of his diving suit ripped, and a 40-degree water filed the suit to his chin. "I realized this was one time in my life when I didn't know how I was going to come up," Hefling said later. "I could have drowned in my own suit. But I was able to keep the water next to me below my chin."

Judy Huff Named Future Homemaker

Judy Fropa Huff has been named 1959 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Pampa high school. She received the highest score in a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge. The test is designed and judged by Science Research Associates. Each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, an educational trip April 4-10 with her school advisor to Washington, D.C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., New York City and Minneapolis, and she will be a candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The school of each state winner will receive a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica. General Mills will award a \$500 scholarship to each state runner-up. There are 12,260 participating schools throughout the nation, which have enrolled 349,150 senior girls, the largest number of participants in the five-year history of this \$100,000 scholarship program. Growth has been steady since 1955 when 187,463 girls in 4,640 schools participated. The 1959 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced in Minneapolis April 10 at the American Table Dinner in the Leamington Hotel's "Hall of States."

The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. WASHINGTON (UPI)—Pope John's call for an ecumenical council is aimed primarily at achieving a reunion of the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches which parted ways in the "great schism" of 1054.

Emphasizing evangelism, one of the paramount phases of its doctrine, the International Church of the Foursquare Gospel will theme its 30th annual convention "Harvest Time in 'Atom' Time," announced the Rev. Dwayne Starling, pastor, Pampa, Foursquare Church. He added that "Sunday School in Orbit" would be the theme for the two-day Sunday School convention, Feb. 19, 20, in conjunction with the International convention.

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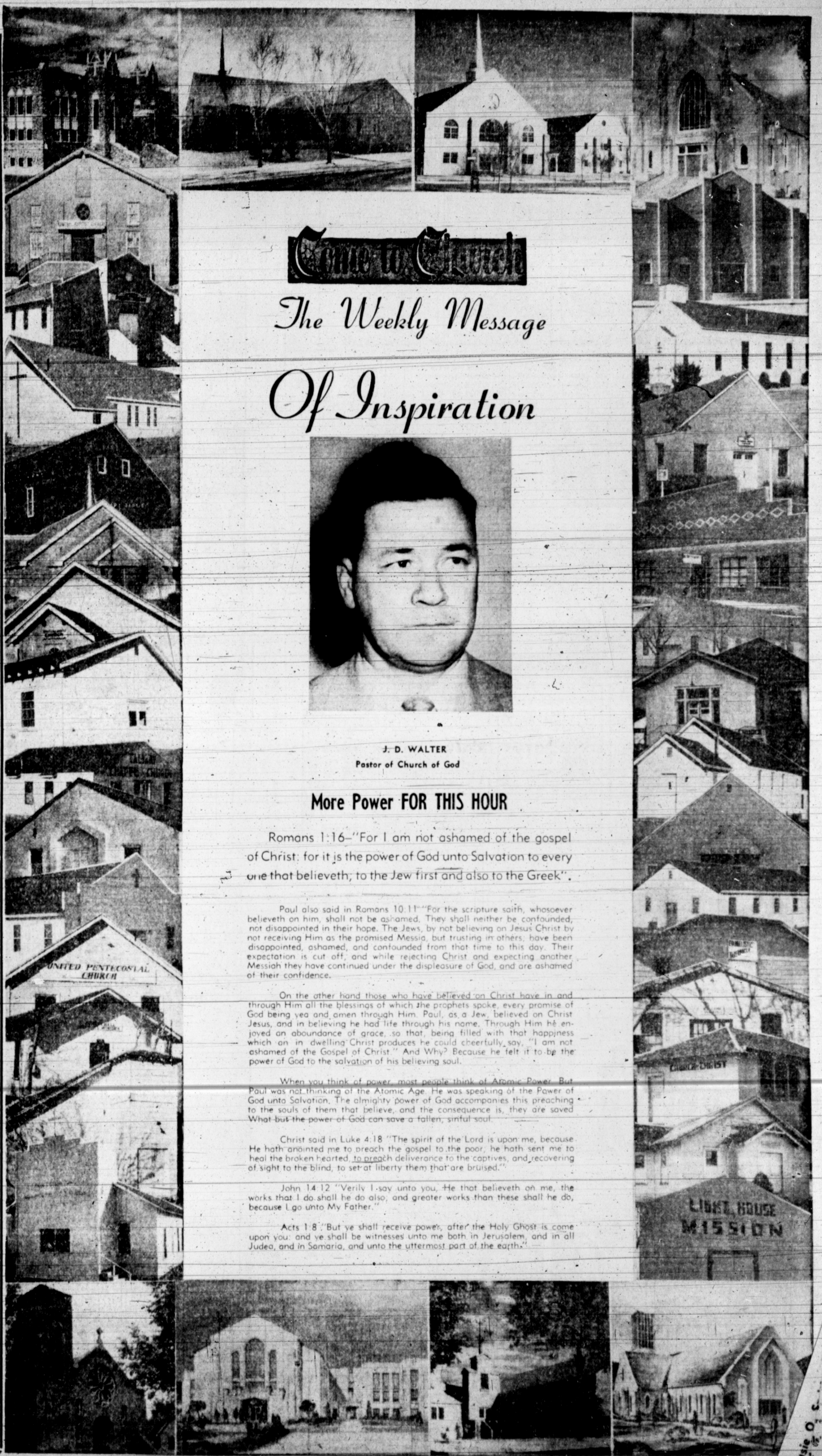

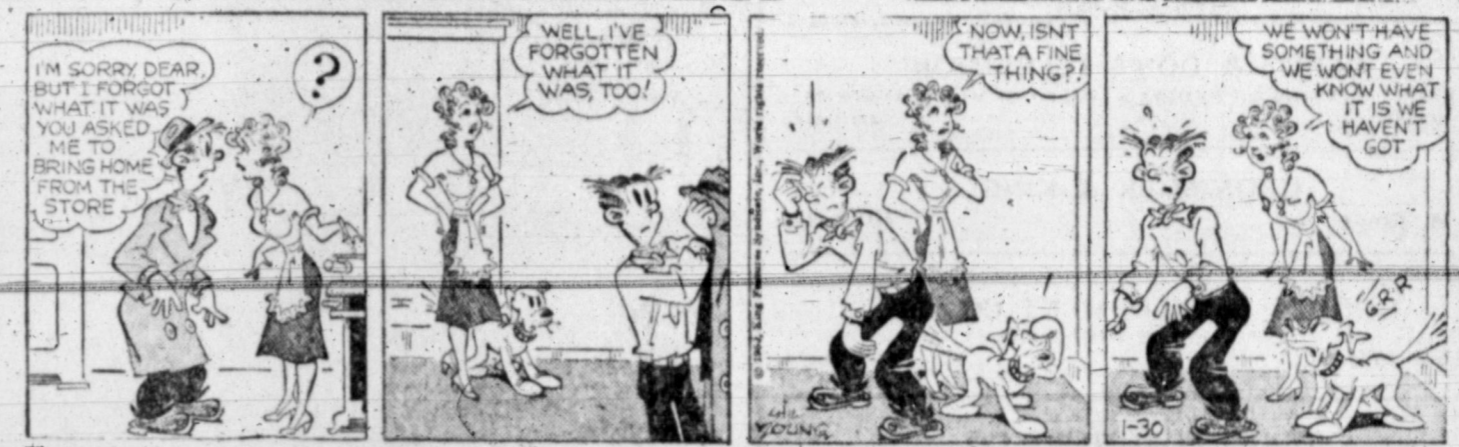

Rupp's Cagers Win No. 600 Thursday Night

Old Adolph Rupp was a cinch to do it. The coaches of other sports at the University of Kentucky were so sure of it they engraved in advance so they could present it to him as soon as the game was over.

The inscription read: "To Coach Adolph Rupp, on the occasion of his 600th victory, Jan. 29, 1959."

Rupp, who was given the pitcher and other gifts in ceremonies immediately following the 108-55 triumph of his nationally 10th-ranked Wildcats, over Georgia Thursday night, realized at once that the engraving must have been done some time ago.

"You fellows," said the man in the brown suit with a familiar gleam in his eye, "sure were optimistic."

Thursday night's win, an easy romp in which Kentucky held a 61-25 halftime lead, gave Kentucky a 16-1 record for the season. And it also gave Rupp a measure of long-delayed revenge, for way back when he started as coach at Kentucky in 1930 it was a Georgia team that dealt him his first defeat.

Rupp, who now has an overall record of 600 wins and 104 losses, thus joins only three active coaches in the 600-plus category: Ed Diddle of Western Kentucky; Hank Iba of Oklahoma State and Ed Adams of Texas Southern. Forrest (Phog) Allen, retired Kansas coach who once tutored Rupp, holds the record with 729 wins and 209 losses.

The Wildcats out-rebounded Georgia, 81-41, and outshot the Bulldogs, 57.6 per cent.

Leading the way was Bobby Slusher with 17 points.

In the only other game Thursday night featuring high-ranked teams, 11th-ranked St. Louis defeated eighth-ranked St. John's (N.Y.), 72-63, at St. Louis. It was the 10th straight win for the Billikens' first loss after nine straight for the Redmen.

St. John's cut a 13-point deficit down to two points, 61-59, but St. Louis pulled away to win comfortably.

Patterson Signs For Title Defense

NEW YORK (UPI)—Yes, Virginia, there is a heavyweight champion of the world.

All they wanted to know was which city offered the biggest stadium, how much the fights were guaranteed, would it be televised and for how much and whether it would draw more than one million dollars.

It wasn't until it was all over, and the two principals were standing limply side by side near the wreckage of a smorgasbord table, that somebody asked how the two gladiators expected to do inside the ring.

"I expect to win," said Johanson.

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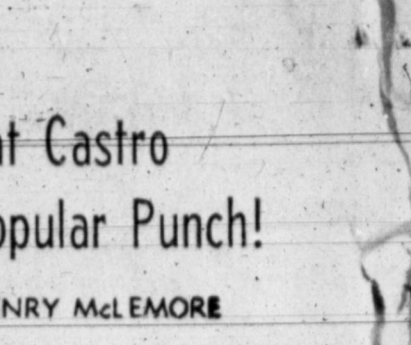

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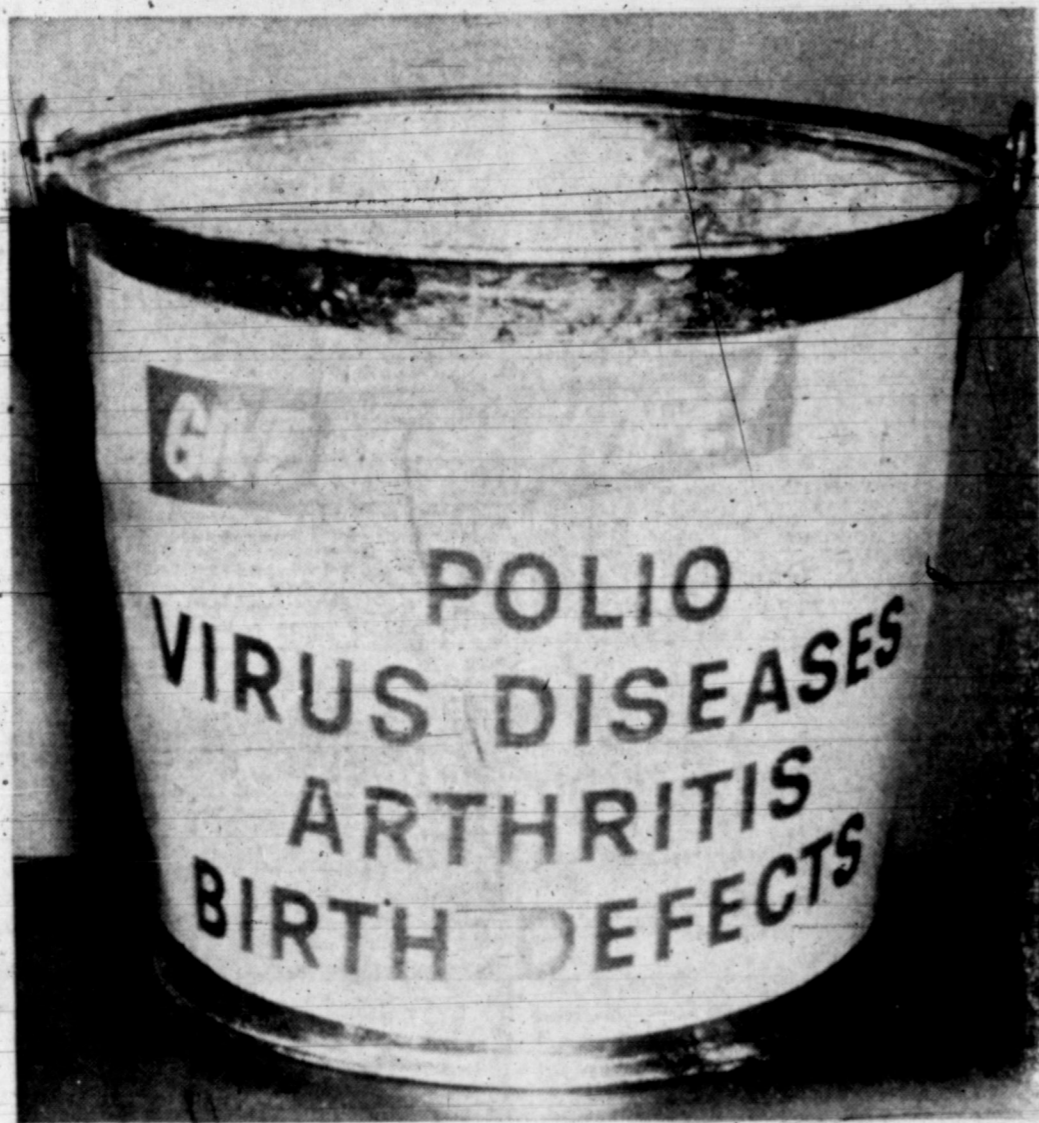
