of the federal government. The Senate was drawing its breath after giving President Eisenhower a victory for his trade bill. The Senate passed the bill Tuesday night, 72 to 16, after beating down attempts to restrict

the President's power to cut tariffs on foreign imports. It now is for House and Senate conferees to reach a compromise on the two versions of the reciprocal trade bill.

Other congressional news: Defense: A Senate appropriations subcommittee removed a major roadblock from the path of the new defense money bill by agreeing the Marines and Army should be 10 per cent bigger than President Eisenhower proposed. The subcommittee followed the lead of the House by recommending \$226,118,000 to keep Army

rines 'at 200,000, the National Guard at 400,000 and the Army Reserves at 300,000.

Railroads: House - Senate conferees agreed on a compromise railroad aid bill which would give the Interstate Commerce Commission authority for the first time to order discontinuance of interstate rail service. The bill as approved also would authorize the ICC to guarantee 500 million dollars in loans to railroads to finance capital improvement, equipment and maintenance.

Minerals: A House interior subcommittee approved a new program of government subsidies for producers of lead and zinc and other minerals which could cost as much as 460 million dollars over the next five years. The program is similar to, but more liberal than, one recommended by

the administration. The subcom mittee approved the more liberal provisions of a Senate-passed bill and added a few of its own. Committee aides said the maximum over-all cost could run about 35 million dollars higher than the administration's proposed program.

Communists: The House Judici-

ary Committee approved a bill to nullify a part of a 1957 Supreme Court decision limiting the effect of the Smith Anti-subversive Act on prosecutions of Communist leaders. The bill would stipulate that the word "organize" in the act would cover the formation of new units and the recruitment of new members into a subversive organization. The court held the word meant merely activities in connection with the creation of a new organization, not subsequent acts to carry out the organization's objectives.







Back Stairs At The White House

By DAYTON MOORE United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) - Back-

stairs at the White House: Calm and determined. This was the consensus at the White House of how President Eisenhower came through the first five days of the Mideast crisis. It was the general opinion of his aides, visitors and newsmen who covered his reading of a statement Tuesday for radio and television recorded for broadcast.

The President's demeanor at times was on the grim side understandably-but he appeared in good spirits nevertheless.

Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder. the President's physician, was understood to be well satisfied with the way the chief executive was bearing up. As has been his practice since the President's heart attack in 1955 Snyder saw Eisenhower three times daily at the start, midway and at the end of his work day.

The physician at no time during the five days noted any trouble signs, White House sources said. If there had been any Snyder would have subjected the President to a medical check.

The President has been undergoing about once a month at the White House a fairly detailed examination by Snyder and consulting physicians from the Army's Walter Reed Medical Center. They are not as thorough as head-to-toe checkups and findings of the physicians are not made public. The fact that the President hasn't been put through a complete physical examination at the Army hospital since last November supports statements of White House sources that nothing wrong has been noted in the monthly check-

The last public report on Eisenhower's health was made last December. It was based on "a thorough neurological examination" in December following the mild stroke he suffered. His general condition then was judged "excellent" and he was allowed to go to Paris for a North Atlantic Treaty Organization meeting.



Yarborough's Disease

The recent visit to Pampa of the Walter Reuther candidate for the U.S. Senate, incumbent Ralph Yarborough, highlighted THE national sickness of our day for Yarborough is a man who thrives on this illness for personal advantage.

And to what sickness are we alluding? The "something for nothing mentality!"

We find considerable discomfort in the fact that many, many of our fellow citizens have become victims of this attitude which Sir Ernest Benn, years ago, explained was not a political philosophy but, like cancer, a disease for it enervates the individual's moral fibre and gnaws at the very vitals of a nation whose strength is in its tradition of liberty. The pernicious ruse by which the "something for nothing" mentality justifies its legalized class plunder is the "democratic process." In brief, if 51% of the voters sanction plunder by government, then plunder is proper.

Since labor is pain and man by instinct recoils from pain, the idea of getting something without a voluntary exchange of equivalent value appeals to the man lacking in a sense of responsibility. Plunder, whether committed by an individual or a government, usually makes life a little more pleasant in a materialistic way for the short run but, since nature understands no trifling with her order, she eventually rights the imbalance with an impersonal justice which is usually harsh. The robber, living-up the fruits of a few minutes' effort in a grand manner or the citizenry, consuming the fruits of others' labors through the tax collector, have their day of reckoning, both spiritually and materially.

Yarborough in his campaign over the state has primarily solicited support by telling the voters how he has helped them by backing government hand-outs, promising more to come and explaining that his opponent, Bill Blakley, is a questionable character because of his personal wealth. His proposition of playing the "poor boys" against the "rich oil men," of course, has the very strong aroma of an old fashioned

Yarborough's opportunistic streak came forth in full color recently when he attacked Blakley because of Blakley's large interest in the ownership of Braniff Airways and because of the fact that Braniff received government subsidies of some size. That airlines should not receive subsidies, which would be a sound point, was not Yarborough's position but rather that Blakley's "share" of the subsidies ran into six figures. Of course if it were wrong in principle that subsidies should be paid Braniff, then it would be wrong in principle that the farmer receive his subsidy, that the pensioner be subsidized, etc. Such was not Yarborough's stand, however, which shows up well his demagogic ignorance.

Candidate Yarborough's attempt to sluff off CIO-AFL-Walter Reuther financial support during his last election as the small contributions of "workin' folks" would be laughable if it were not so patently a distortion of facts. The contributions of "workin' folks" made through unions are on a giveor-else basis with the union bosses holding the club of economic reprisal over their heads. That Mr. Reuther intends to utilize those elected officials indebted to him as a means of establishing a completely socialistic society is apparent from his own words. The public record still shows no disavowal by Reuther of his exhultation to "build a greater Soviet America" made in the nineteen-thirties when he was visiting Russia and accepting the financial help of a Reuther makes Sherman Adams' accepting a vicuna coat and oriental rug look like a children's tea party by comparison.

We do not mean to imply that Yarborough is a vicious or even a calculatingly evil man. He is just a candidate for public office who wants to be elected so badly that he uses every means at his disposal to press for advantage. That his demagoguery is a powerful tactic to influence some people is beyond question. That the "something for nothing" disease on which he thrives is even a more important swayer of the baser human instincts is begrudgingly admitted and the power of the two combined is truly a force to reckon with.

Our advice at this juncture of affairs is to urge those voters not infected with Mr. Yarborough's "something for nothing" mentality to cast their vote for Bill Blakley as an effort to help restore in Washington the philosophy that government exists to protect our lives and property and not to plunder one group at the expense of another.

I have been quoting for several days fom a pamphlet issued by the Church Federation of Los Angeles on employer-employe relations. 6. If that is not a violation of these laws, what would a group have to do to violate them?

Upheaval In Iraq Is Double Blow To Dulles

WASHINGTON - The sinister upheaval in Iraq is a double blow to Secretary of State Dulles.

In addition to gravely imperiling his entire Middle East policy, the ominous Iraq coup d'eat exploded in the midst of what appeared to be promising overtures for a rapprochement with President Gamal Nasser.

Optimistic reports on that were received by Dulles, only a 'few days before the jarring Iraq overthrow, from Ambassador Raymond Hare, in Cairo, and UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold, who had earlier conferred with Nasser regarding the internecine fighting in Lebanon. Both Hare and Hammarskjold ex-

pressed belief that Nasser wanted to restore cordial relations with the U.S., and that such an understanding could be reached with

Basis of these backstage negotiations was the following quid pro

The U.S. to more than double economic aid to Egypt, from \$9,-000,000 to \$22,000,000, and to relax restrictions on trade with that

In exchange, Nasser to cease his tirading against and machinations to overthrow the pro-Western governments of Lebanon, Iraq and Assistant Secretary of State

William Rountree, in charge of Middle East affairs, has told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that Nasser denied he was endeavoring to destroy these three Arab regimes, and voiced "definite interest" in re-establishing friendly ties with the U.S.

This rosy account was given the Committee by Rountree as an argument against a move by Senator Theodore Green (D., R.I.), chairman, for a searching review of U.S. foreign policy, particularly in the turbulent Middle East.

The State Department is strongly against such a survey, on the ground it might disrupt "difficult and delicate private deliberations." WHAT IT WAS ABOUT - Two points were stressed by Assistant

Secretary Rountree in his Foreign Relations Committee discussion. (1) Nasser had made a "favorable impression" on U.S. authorities by his visit to Yugoslavia and other recent moves; (2) the rapproachement plan would be immediately dropped in the United Arba Republic head incited new

troubles in the Middle East. "Many difficulties are present in dealing with Nasser," said Rountree. "But we hope there is at least a possibility of a change in his attitude so that conditions can be developed which will make it possible to establish a better relationship with the UAR than exists at present. We would like nothing better than to improve our ties with the UAR.

"Is it contemplated to use foreign ald funds for that purpose?" Rountree was asked. "We do not exclude the possibil-

ity of using such funds for an Egyptian program," he replied, The violent anti-American prop-

aganda of Nasser's radio and press was brought up. Rountree explained the State Department "has tolerance" for these hostile blasts; also that they have been "toned down quite a bit recently.' The question was raised of Nas-

ser's acceptance of "massive economic and military aid from Rus-

"Despite that," asserted Rountree, "Nasser is making an effort to pursue a neutral position in the East-West struggle. We feel that is clearly shown by the timing of his visit to Marshal Tito, soon after spending several weeks in the Soviet.

"It has been made clear to Nasser that there is no hostility on our-part toward him because of his neutralism. We regret that, but we do not hold it against him. A Through Ambassador Hare and

Secretary General Hammarskjold, Nasser has been informed the U.S. wants better relations with the UAR, provided it does not undermind governments that are friendly to us in the Middle East." "What happens" if he does per-

sist in doing that?" 'We would meet such a contingency with whatever measures are required," replied Rountree.

Throughout this significant discussion, there was no hint from Rountree of any awareness of an imposing upheaval in Iraq. He talked about strife-torn Lebanon and trouble-beset Jordan, but did not once mention Iraq.

NOTE: A new batch of Russian "experts" arrived in Cairo last week. This "shipment" numbered more than 70, and included electronics and mining technicians. Intelligence sources estimate the Soviet now has upwards of 2,500 specialists of varioud kinds in Egypt.






