Destruction Path Is 40 Miles Wide

MENOMONIE, Wis, (UPI)-Tornadoes cut a 40-mile wide swath through the peaceful dairy country of northwestern Wisconsin Wednesday night, killing at least 25 persons and injuring more than 100.

Hospitals in four cities were filled to overflowing with casualties and emergency first-aid stations were set up in armories and school gymnasiums. Sixteen persons hovered between life and death.

"It was like a battlefield," said Dr. G. J. Neumann, a dentist at Colfax, hardest-hit community in the area. "I was in World War II and

I've seen a lot of people die, but when you see your own towns-people killed its something different.

Neumann said he was waiting for a patient in his office when the killer tornado struck.

The index rose to 277 per cent of the 1910-1914 base. This compared with 276 per cent for the previous month and 268 for the same period last year.





about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smashup. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. STOP! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequances.

2. RENDER AID. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury


3. PROTECT SCENE from further damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. CALL AN OFFICER, Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.




U.S. STAKE IN ERENCH CRISIS-The political crisis in France has focused attention on that nation's vital geographical position in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. As news-map above shows, France is the major port of entry to the continent. Across her run the main supply routes, with their attendant warehouses, depots and repair shops, for U.S. troops in West Germany, free Europe's f line of defense. The United States has invested 1.5 billio. ...ollars and eight years in building up a huge military and supply complex within France, containing materiel worth another billion. The 371-

mile pipeline was built at a cost of 60 million dollars. On French soil are 55,000 American troops and 50 air base sites used by NATO nations, besides numerous U.S. military military installations. There are 200,000-plus troops in West Germany. Should France pull out of NATO, not only would French troops, ports and bases be lost, but Kaiserlautern, main U.S. base in Germany, would be cut off. The German ports of Bremerhaven and Hamburg are too close to Red territory to be relied on. A route across the Low Countries could be constructed, but at an immense expenditure of money and time.





Total Socialism

If we were socialists, we would not be namby-pamby socialists. We'd go all the way. The present breed of socialist, so far as we can see, is a piker.

He wants the government to step in and provide him with weekly spending money, for example, in the event justice catches up with him and he is unemployed. But such paltry sums of spending money! The unemployment (socialist) insurance program grants him something between \$14.00 and \$36.00 per week. And present day socialists are complaining about this. Right now, in fact, the Congress is considering upping this weekly stipend for doing nothing to a figure closer to \$40.00. Labor bosses, also socialists, are for increasing it up to \$50.00.

Well, if the whole business relates simply to passing a law, why should we be cheap about it? It wouldn't do the country any more harm to pass a law which would grant the unemployed socialist \$100 a week; \$200 a week; or \$1,000 a week, would it? Laws are cheap. They must be, we have so many of them.

So if we're going to have to accept a law which pays us for doing nothing, why not make the pay worthwhile? Think of all the spending money \$1,000 a week for each of the unemployed would put into circulation! Wouldn't that be magnificent? If \$36.00 a week is good for doing nothing; \$1,000 a week would be that much better, wouldn't it?

And then there's this business of getting the government to take over various businesses to run them. Socialists seem to think that there are some businesses such as utilities, airports, parks, graveyards and street lighting which ought to be handled by the government. Their argument is that these things affect us all and therefore, the taxpayers (all of us) ought to be compelled to pay for them.

By R. C. HOILES Compelling Employers To Increase Wages In soliciting signers to right-to-

work petitons, I heard several people say that employers will not increase wages voluntarily, they have to be forced to raise wages.

To some extent it is true that employers have to be forced to raise wages. The real question then is, is

there a way to do this? A way that actually results in increasing all real wages instead of increasing some by decreasing others? The labor leaders claim this can be done best by the closed shop using strikes. They say just look how wages have increased by collective bargaining. They fail to point out that wages increased above a competitive wage reduce the real wages

of all those excluded from competing, who are obliged to buy their product and thus pay these non-competitive wage increases. Thus, this union method of forcing wage increases does not increase the total wages or increase

them for all wage earners. But this idea of forcing an employer to pay more by threats of strikes and picketing and boycotts in the long run greatly reduces real wages and interferes with freedom. Wages undoubtedly can be so high that there is unemployment, and when wages are artificially set by threats of strikes, wages and prices cease to be a guide as to what people want produced. This method of trying to force the employer to increase total wages can never be successful

Real Way of Forcing Wages Up

There is a way, however, of increasing total wages and compelling the employer to raise real wages of his employes or lose his employes. This way constantly increases all wages, everything else being equal. It benefits everybody - the wage earner, the employer, the retired person and all mankind. In fact, it is the only known way of compelling an employer to increase real wages. Just what way is this that will be of such great benefit to mankind? The way to coerce employers to pay more wages is to permit capital to accumulate by respecting creative energy, and when this

capital accumulates it has to be distributed in order to benefit its owner. If it is put into tools, then the owner of the tools has to bid against other employers to get. employes to operate these tools, and this bidding against other employers compels the employer to raise wages in order to keep his employes. This kind of an increase in wages doesn't prices, because the better and more efficient tools enable the worker to produce more and thus earn more after a reward has been paid to the owner of the tools. The more tools there are owned, the more reasonable the owner will have to be in his share of the total production as pay for the use of these tools and his management This way of forcing an employer to pay better wages does not injure anybody. It does not even injure the employer who is required to pay more wages. This is true because the employer does not own his workers, nor does he own his customers. Unless he can benefit his employes and his customers as much as anyone else can he should have no employes or customers. It is because we have more nearly followed this way of coercing employers to increase wages that real wages throughout the United States are higher than they are in any other country in the world. There are more tools per worker and also a more minute division of labor and a bigger market for distribution than anyplace else. With this method of raising wages, we can have sound money, and if followed internationally, we need not have wars. And the standard of living will increase gradually because of increased production per workernot because of threats of strikes and getting more for what the employe produces than other people are. willing to do the same

The Doctor Says:

One of the great disease killers is known as typhus. Horrible epidemics of typhus have occured many times in different parts of the world.

The disease is caused by a tiny, living organism of the Rickettsia family. Fortunately, on the North American continent, the epidemic form has not appeared for a good many years, but one type of the disease is still a problem.

Jail fever, or murine typhus, is spread by rats. Cases of this nonepidemic variety of the disease have been discovered in at least 37 states and the District of Columbia. Not many years ago more than 5,300 cases were reported to state health departments.

Typhus is primarily a disease of rats and is carried from these animals to human beings, principally by fleas. Since many cities and rural areas are now badly overrun with rats, we must be constantly on the alert to see that this, as well as other rat-spread diseases, do not get out

of control. The best line of attack against typhus is rat control. Three methods are being used: community poisoning programs, ratproofing and eradication in business establishments, and good general sanitation.

Since murine typhus has become a major public health problem, the United States Public Health Service has become actively engaged in assisting the war against rate in those communities where the disease is threatening.

New rat poisons have proved so successful that the average time required to rid buildings of rats has been cut down enormously. Rat-proofing of buildings also has been greatly improved through the use of more permanent materials and better construction.

Getting rid of garbage and other rat foods is an important part of the campaign against these disease carriers.

Attack on the rat flea is also important. The use of a DDT dusting powder applied to rat runs has been reported favorably. DDT powder used in this way kills most of the fleas on the rats and thus reduces typhus among the rats for periods as long as three months. Treatment has also improved. A chemical, the name of which is usually abbreviated to PABA,

seems to give good results. Prevention is more important than treatment. The campaign can be considered successful only when there are no more cases to treat.

Of course, if we reject this idea, then we ought to do it totally, not piecemeal. And in that case, what is good would be our own personal desires and our own personal abilities, not the will of the swarm.

Right now we are in a period of transition in this country in which we are moving from the American ideal of individuality, to the beehive idea of barbarism. Whichever we think is best, we ought to go after it all the way.

Socialists, as we meet and talk to them . . . and there are thousands of them . . . are a mediocre lot. They want government ownership . . . within limits; pay for not working . . . within limits; compulsory equality, limited to others.

As far as we're concerned we'll take individualism. We can't abide the cowardice and the fear of the huddlers who look to the government to look after them. And the grim joke of it all is, that once a person experiences the full socialist treatment, he'll run from it as he would the plague.

And there's one other thing, too. Whenever the socialist starts talking about getting the taxpayer to pay for everything, look around and try to find that taxpayer. You don't have to look far. Try the mirror. YOU are the sucker in the socialist handbook. The deal is that you have to pay for what everyone else is to have.

Also that he plans to insist on "full discussion" of every provision of the bill which is being drafted by the Subcommittee's staff.

"We have a pledge to report a labor bill to the Senate by June 10." asserted Senator Kennedy. "If such a promise was made," retorted McNamara, "I didn't make it. Nor did this Subcommittee make it. As I see it, the major concern of this Subcommittee should be to produce a good labor bill that is fair to everyone, regardless of any time limit, I shall insist on full discussion of every item in this bill, as well as all amendments which may be offered. I shall insist on that even if it takes us until July 10 to complete

our deliberations. There is no reason we should rush." "I have no intention of steamrolling any legislation through this Subcommittee," retorted Kennedy. "I noted the June 10 date because that assurance was given on the Senate floor, and also because I still think we can complete a

bill by then." "Time will tell," said McNamara. "But I'm serving notice that I do not feel committed to report a labor bill by June 10 or any other deadline.'

That ended the discussion and the meeting.

Family Watched Its **House Torn Apart**

Editor's Note: Melvin Hendrikson, 58, his wife, Helgs,

and their three children, Karen, 12; Roland, 15, and Richard, 17, had just finished supper and were sitting in the kitche of their Colfax, Wis. home when a tornado struck. His account of the disaster follows:



"It took only five minutes to wipe me out last night," said Duel who estimated his tornado damage at \$75,00. Seven trailers, five cars and a truck were smashed in the court and in pieces lay strewn there and in a nearby ravine.

"You cuoldn't see those farms over there Yesterday," he said, pointing to a clump of pine trees that had been stripped bare. Deuel said there were about 30 persons in the seven trailers and only five of them were hurt. "It's amazing to me how some

of them got out alive." He pointed to a trailer which

was flattened to the wheels and lay over the brink of a ravine. "Seven persons rode out the tornado in the trailer," Deuel said. He said one man in another trailer put his wife under a davenport and she was unhurt.

While Deuel talked with a reporter his wife was sweeping up some of the litter in their house of which only four walls were standing.

Damage in the Chippewa Falls area was confined to the northwest side near the Irvine Park area. For a length of two miles along U.S. 53 more than 30 homes along both sides of the highway were smashed. Trees and wires littered the area.
