

Frankly, there were times (you may recall) when newspapermen used to wonder whether the sixwaves were going to make the printed page obsolete. First there with their "on the spot" reports. Then television commentators went one better by transporting our readers to the very scene of the news, so that they might see It

Yet through it all, the nation's newspapers kept growing in both circulation and prestige.

If anything more were needed to dispel our erstwhile fears, of the "new" news media, it is the effect of the New York newspaper carriers' strike. New Yorkers' news paperless now for two weeks, are reported to be like smokers deprived of their cigarets, so strong is the addiction to the printed word. In the subways and on commuter trains, they stare blankly, ahead of them, or greedily scan the words on fleeting advertisement hoardings.

Radio and television, far from being triumphant at their "rivals" discomfiture, have actually rallied to the support of the newspapers and their readers. Well-known columnists read their unprinted masterpieces over the radio, and television commentators read the Dick Tracy blurbs as the latest cartoon to flashed on the screen.

Others have rallied to the cause of the printed word. The New York. Central Railroad began publishing in New York" for its passengers, and a restaurant chain puts out its own news bulletin for customers. NBC has even found it necessary to supplement the broadcast word with a printed bulletin on the latest news.

Through it all the newspapers and advertisers groan at the blow to their Christmas revenues -- but they say there's not a newspaperman in town who hasn't secretly derived some comfort from the fact that his printed word is so obviously, and so sorely, missed.

The quail season should be rated as excellent, considering the over-ail picture. The deer and turkey hunts should have had at least a fair rating while the duck and goose seasons will rate at least good.

Other species hunted in the Panhandle will rate at least good. The mourning dove season ran from poor to excellent, depending on the area hunted, together with the weather. If there was any hunting success that might have fallen below par, it was the antelope hunting on a few particular ranches. Generally, pronghorn hunting was good.

Soon all of the hunting seasons on game birds and animals will be over but there is still time left for hunters to fill their deep freezers with their limits. The limits are: ducks and geese, five of each specie; and quail, thirty-six.
