Loyalty Report on Dr. Condon Is Called for by Committee

WASHINGTON-(AP)-Whether a loyalty report on Dr. Edward U. Condon is to be made public depends today on Secretary of Commerce Harriman.

There is some doubt that Harriman will give it out. Condon is the Federal Bureau of Standards chief accused by a House unAmerican Activities Subcommittee of associating "knowingly or unknowingly" with suspected Russian spies. The subcommittee also described him as "one of the weakest links in our atomic security."

Some of the government's most secret scientific developments are tested by the bureau.

Condon insists that if it is

true he is one of the weakest atomic security links the country can relax because he is "absolutely reliable."
