Clyde Vanderberg. In her talk the speaker stated that 53,000 people die in the United States each year from the disease and that 3,000 of these die in Texas.

This means that in our country someone dies every ten minutes from TB and that in the wartorn countries the destruction is much worse.

Mrs. Vanderberg pointed out that the age of the group affected most by TB is rising. The disease most prevalent women from the ages of 15 to 44 This rise in age is due to a large extent to the careful check made on school children and the early treatment given where symptoms are present. The speaker cleared up one commonly mis-aken idea about TB, emphasizing he fact that it is a germ and is not hereditary, that the germ may lie dormant for years until reactivated by fatigue or exhaus-tion from cold.

Mrs. Vanderberg stressed the fact that tuberculosis need not be the dread disease it was once considered because it is preventoble, curable, and controllable, but she added that it is the most nemicated epidemic

The speaker told about the tax-supported sanatorium near San Angelo with a thousand beds for adults and the "preventatorium" with a 187 beds for children. She said that since 1912 forty thoupeople have been treated there and have gone out trained to take care of themselves or members of their families. She stressed the importance of fresh air, ample rest and proper diet in the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis.

The other part of the program consisted of a debate on the question, "Resolved, that Russia will equal the United States in Ten Years." Both sides of the Ten Years. 
