First Try Is Failure

Air Force Plans 2nd Shot At Moon

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—The Air Force's first moonshot effort a failure—made tentative plans today to try again in four weeks to fire a rocket around the moon.

There was speculation Russia might make a similar attempt several days in advance of the second U. S. effort.

Meanwhile, the Army was reported ready to shoot for the moon.

Reds Shell Nationalist Islands

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI)—Communist shore batteries hurled 88 shells at Nationalist China's Quemoy outpost islands today, and Soviet-built MIG 17 jets rained over the Formosa Strait, the Nationalist Defense Ministry announced.

The ministry said the artillery bombardment caused no casualties among the Quemoy garrison.

Air raid sirens sounded eight times between dawn and mid-afternoon on the heavily fortified Matsu Islands at the northern end of the straits.

Three waves of four MIGs each were sighted near the Matus, the defense spokesman said.

The ministry spokesman said no combat resulted from the MIG flights, which have become daily occurrences over the 100-mile strait separating Formosa from the Red-held coast.

Union Men Cited For Contempt

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate today voted contempt-of-congress citations against Maurice A. Huchison, president of the Carpenters' Union, and 12 others who refused to answer questions before its Rackets Committee.

The action was by a roll call vote of 87-0.

The cases now will be sent to the U. S. attorney for the District of Columbia. Conviction carries a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine on each count.

The action came after Chairman John L. McClellan denounced the tactics used by an "underworld element" to obstruct the committee's work. He said the contempt citations were necessary to "support the power and integrity of the Senate and the Congress."

US Launcher Program To Be Probed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressmen promised today to seek an official accounting of Air Force and Navy spending for rocket launchers, including an alleged Air Force decision to pay \$406 apiece for parts available at \$4.69 each.

A House military operations subcommittee said it would ask the U. S. comptroller general to investigate some phases of the services' separate airborne rocket launcher programs. It contended they had been snarled for six years with costly errors, inefficiency, rivalry and second-guessing.

As a result of the snafus, the subcommittee said in a report published Sunday, the Air Force and Navy now have only a handful of modern launchers for firing rockets from beneath the wings of planes.

The subcommittee report was based on hearings carried out during the past two years.

It said that in one case the Air Force paid North American Aviation an average of \$406 for adapters to fit launchers to its F-100 fighters after rejecting an offer by Century Industries, San Pedro, Calif., to supply the adapters for \$4.69 apiece.

"Thus the Air Force procured adapters for mounting M-3 launchers on F-100 aircraft at a unit cost 80 or 90 times that proposed by Century Industries," it said.

Furthermore, the North American adapter was usable only on the F-100 aircraft, whereas the Century Industries adapter would have permitted suspension on other aircraft as well.

69 Vote Absentee

With absentee balloting closing tomorrow in the runoff election of the Democratic Primary, 69 votes are recorded in the Gray County clerk's office.

The second primary will take place Saturday in the 10 precincts of Gray County, with the general election scheduled for Nov. 4.

The absentee polls will officially close at midnight tomorrow, according to Gray County Clerk Charlie Thut.

Run offs are indicated on the ballot for County commissioners, justice of the peace, Precinct 1, and associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1.

The run-off will put G. H. Kyle or G. L. "Nat" Lunsford on the November ballot as County commissioner, Precinct 2; and John W. Dwyer or O. L. Tibbets, Precinct 4.

It will decide between W. R. Combs and Mrs. Gladys Pafford for the justice of the peace place for Lefors.

The one state office in the run off is that of associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1, for which J. Edwin Smith and Robert W. Hamilton are running.

Cool Front In Panhandle Visit

Heavy rain showers splattered a wide expanse of North, northeast and Central Texas today in the wake of violent thunderstorms that lashed at Dallas and Johnson counties Sunday.

The rainfall was so spotty that few of the heavier showers fell where official U. S. weather bureau gauges could measure them. But, the unofficial measurements ranged up to two inches in parts of Dallas and four inches in and around Cleburne and Midlothian Sunday.

A mid-summer cool front that was responsible for the rainfall and the break in a heat wave had dissipated along the Texas Gulf Coast, but its after-effects left virtually the entire state under a cloud cover this morning.

Relief To Be Short

A few scattered points along the coast reported clear, but the remainder of the state had considerable cloudiness with the heaviest and thickest concentration stretching from Central Texas to the Panhandle.

Five-day forecasts, however, indicated the relief would be short-lived. Temperatures two to five degrees above normal with only spotty, light precipitation was predicted for the week.

High winds, gusting to around 60 miles per hour, accompanied the thunderstorm at Cleburne. Blowing out the front of an electrical co-op building on the west outskirts of the town and felling trees both there and at Midlothian, 25 miles to the northeast.

The same storm moved on into southern Dallas county, where lightning struck at least four homes, numerous trees and power lines but caused no major damage or injuries.

Weather Station Skipped

Up to 1.90 inches were recorded unofficially in sections of Dallas but at the same time the official weather bureau at Love Field remained dry.

The brief, heavy rainfall flooded some streets and stalled one ambulance twice as it raced to and from the scene of a major traffic accident during the height of the storm.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Auls were asleep when lightning struck their Dallas home, knocking loose a wall, setting fire to a curtain and knocking their bed to pieces. They escaped with only a ringing in their ears.

Rose Nell Hashaway, 15, also escaped injury but was stunned when lightning hit her house as she sat on the front porch.

Store Damaged

The heavy rain may have been responsible for some heavy damage to the suburban A. Harris department store in a southwest Dallas shopping center.

Firemen spent the night in the store sweeping water from the lower floor. The water had seeped in through the floor and officials said it may have been caused by an overloaded drain pipe.

Although the rainfall was heavy in many spots, the heaviest recorded by official measurements were 30 inches at Amon Carter Field between Dallas and Fort Worth and .26 at Austin. Laredo reported .11, Waco .11, Lufkin .10 and Dallas .04.

Behind the front, temperatures were 10 or more degrees cooler Sunday than the previous day with Amarillo and Lubbock recording maximums of only 86 degrees. The mercury climbed to 101 at Waco and San Angelo and 107 at Presidio prior to the frontal passage.

Overnight lows Monday ranged from 85 at Dalhart and Amarillo to 81 at Palacios and Corpus Christi.

Baruch Wants No Fuss On Birthday

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (UPI)—Bernard M. Baruch intends to have no fuss about his 88th birthday Tuesday. He plans to observe it quietly with the immediate members of his family.

The famous elder statesman wants to avoid interviews, if possible, because, as he says, "these are times which try men's souls" and it is not up to a private citizen to speak out on world affairs.

I dropped in to see Baruch at his suite in the Gideon Putnam Hotel here. He has long been interested in the spa and its health-giving facilities. He is taking the baths and going to the races occasionally for recreation.

In response to a question, he said: "I feel fine. But I have to pace myself. I can't do as much as I once could."

He seemed to be in good shape, physically and mentally.

Baruch reads a lot and spends some of his time working on the second book of his memoirs. He keeps in touch with his New York office by telephone.

Inevitably, our conversation got around to longevity.

"Longevity is primarily a matter of heredity," he declared.

After a moment's pause, he went on: "We in America have developed lots of ways to increase the span of life. But, as far as most elderly people are concerned, it is more important to stop the inflationary processes and keep steady the purchasing power of our dollar for our old age."

He emphasized that he realizes the importance of social benefits to elderly people, such as pensions and social security. But he said it is nevertheless more important to find some way "to prevent the constant eroding of the dollar through inflation."

"You've got to beware of those who promise you more dollars with less purchasing power," he warned.

Asked at what age he thought a man should retire, Baruch replied that was up to the individual himself.

Baruch said he stopped smoking when he was 64. As for drinking, he added: "I am a very light drinker. In fact, I seldom drink. You see the hardest drinkers who live on for many years, and others who drink little pass on at a comparatively early age. As I said, I think longevity is a matter of heredity."

Youth Is Drowned In Swift Current

EAST LIVERPOOL, Ohio (UPI)—Cline Cogar, 21, drowned Sunday when he slipped from the grasp of a minister who was baptizing him and was swept away by the swift current of rain-swollen Beaver Creek.

Cogar, of Grantsville, W. Va., was one of 40 persons being baptized into the Lord Jesus Christ Church by the Rev. Garland McCartney, of Akron, Ohio. The victim was a nephew of the minister.

McCartney later told Columbiana County Chief Deputy Sheriff James Miller he had just immersed young Cogar when he lost his grip. Cogar, who could not swim, was swept downstream several yards before he disappeared beneath the surface.

Other church members looked on horrified. Rev. McCartney went into shock and had to be treated at a hospital.

Shamrock Short On Water Today

SHAMROCK — A break in a six inch water line to a water tower caused Shamrock to be short on water this morning.

Mayor Selbert Worley issued an appeal for a cut-down on water use until the line is repaired. He said he had hopes that the crew working today would have the line repaired by late afternoon or tonight.

Three Highway Accidents Boost Weekend Casualties

Texas highway casualties came in large clusters over the week end with three wrecks taking a toll of 15 lives.

One multiple death crash claimed six ten-agers. A man, woman and three children died in another major tragedy and a mother and her three children were killed in a third. There were other accidents with death tolls as well.

Joe E. Cherry, 24, of San Marcos, died Sunday when his car went out of control on U.S. 77 inside the Harlingen city limits.

Police said the car was going about 100 miles an hour when it plowed through a row of mailboxes, crossed the highway, bounced through a drainage ditch and across two railroad tracks, and stopped in a clump of bushes.

Six young cousins died earlier Sunday when their car crashed through a guard rail and fell 40 feet into a creek bed near San Antonio.

The victims had been to a dance at Poteet. They were identified as Dixie Harr, 15, Teresa Harr, 13, Raymond Lee King, 16, and James King, 13, all of Poteet; Faydelle Harr, 23, Millett, and Dwight Coffee, 20, San Antonio.

The father of the King brothers discovered the wreckage when he went to look for his boys after they failed to get home by 3 a.m. Workers used blow torches for nearly two hours to get the bodies out of the wreck.

Two automobiles and a truck collided near Memphis, Tex., early Sunday killing five persons, including four in one family.

The victims were Adolf Krumholz, 47, Derby, Colo., his daughter, Mrs. Wesley Harvey, 21, Panama City, Fla., her two children, Gertrude, 21 months, and Robert, 3, and Billie Lou Landers, 15, Fort Worth.

Four other persons died Saturday near San Marcos when a car ran into a truck. They were Mrs. Mary Tymanski, 31, and her three small children.

Major Issues Are Hanging In Balance

WASHINGTON (UPI) House Republicans aimed their artillery at a spending bill today in what was expected to be the final week of the 88th Congress.

Major issues hanging in the balance as the lawmakers began their final adjournment plunge were labor reform, housing, farm, education, Social Security and court reform legislation.

An angry clash was expected today in the House, where Democratic leaders scheduled 35 bills for action under a no-amendment procedure requiring a two-thirds vote for passage.

Republicans called this "legislative tyranny" and urged Southern Democrats to help them stop the "gavelling through" of spending bills lest it be "a blue Monday for the taxpayers." They said all the measures taken together would add about three billion dollars to the cost of government.

Gov. Lanham spoke at the noon meal in Poole's Steak House, after which the forum continued in the Boys Club with Lt. Gov. Phipps discussing Optimist International and New Secret of Pampa, life membership and the new club building. The meeting adjourned at 3:15, sending the Optimists back to their homes in Borger, Amarillo, Hereford, Plainview, Lubbock and Pampa.

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Union Official Denies 'Torch' Knowledge

PONTIAC, Mich. (UPI)—Former Teamsters official Herman Kierdorf denied today any knowledge of the "torch" death of his nephew, Frank Kierdorf, who died of burns in what authorities called a bungled arson job.

The 68-year-old ex-convict, object of a nationwide search for the past 13 days gave himself up Sunday night. He was jailed on a warrant charging illegal possession of a gun and silencer.

He said he did not believe Michigan Attorney General Paul Adams' theory that Frank Kierdorf, a Flint teamsters' Local 352 business agent, was the victim of his own backfired fire-bombing. Adams said evidence showed Frank suffered severe burns at the George A. Latreille cleaners just outside Flint Sunday night, Aug. 3. Frank died Aug. 7.

Herman was quoted as saying he knew nothing until notified that Frank, 36, was dying in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac, 41 miles from the scene of the fire.

At the hospital, where Herman identified his nephew, he dramatically swore he would "get the rats who did this to Frank." "Beat him up, yes... but this, God no," he cried.

Assistant Oakland County Prosecutor George Taylor permitted Herman to leave the hospital to pickup Frank's wife at Willow Run Airport near Detroit. Herman walked out and, according to Adams, never went to the airport but sold a Teamsters Cadillac from his old Local 299 — Teamsters boss James R. Hoffa's home office — for \$1,700 and vanished.

Herman said he "ducked out" because he needed a rest.

US Balks At Weakening Ike's Mideast Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The United States balked today at any further weakening of President Eisenhower's plan for maintaining peace and prosperity in the Middle East.

The plan placed forward at the opening meeting of the General Assembly's emergency session on the Middle East is being put into a resolution by Norwegian Deputy Foreign Minister Hans Engen.

But objections by the Arab states to many of its provisions

and demands for changes by the Soviet Union — aided by Moscow and Peiping radio propaganda blasts — have made the plan almost unrecognizable.

Dr. Charles Malik, foreign minister of Lebanon, was the opening speaker at today's session and delegates waited to see whether his first official statement here would change the situation.

Talks Stall

Engen planned to make his resolution public Sunday night after an all-day session of negotiating. But his negotiations stalled abruptly and he indicated he would introduce the resolution formally later today or Tuesday.

So many varying points of view have been written into the resolution that U. S. delegates indicated they were doubtful they could accept it themselves. At this point the United States stiffened its position — there must be no more weakening of Eisenhower's original plan.

The Norwegian resolution started as a strong one, embodying most of the six points set forth by Eisenhower. It provided U. N.

Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold go personally to the Middle East, but this has been so diluted that Hammarskjold's instructions are extremely vague.

One Eisenhower proposal was for measures to end propaganda warfare by radio and for setting up a clearing house for complaints of such activities. This was stricken entirely from the measure.

India refused to accept any reference to Eisenhower's proposal for a stand-by peace force, and Moscow Radio asserted today it would oppose such a force. The Indians also had other objections to the Norwegian draft and were reported pushing their own ideas for a separate resolution.

United Arab Republic Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi was insisting upon a definite date for the withdrawal of American troops from Lebanon and British forces from Jordan. Neither the United States nor Britain was ready to set such a date until the U. N. had taken adequate steps to insure the territorial integrity and political independence of both countries.

Aspirin Shipment Confiscated

DALLAS (UPI) — The U. S. Marshall's office has confiscated 50,000 aspirin tablets shipped by Norwich Pharmaceutical Co., of Norwich, N. Y., for violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

The government filed a district court brief against the aspirin shippers on Aug. 1. Trial on the motion has been set for Sept. 8 in District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson's court.

Authorities charged that the aspirin shipment was adulterated and that its quality and purity did not meet federal standards. The government also charged the tablets contained more than the permitted amount of salicylic acid.

The shipment was consigned to Superior Products Co., in Dallas.

Their hits were sandwiched around a wild pitch by winning hurler, Pete McCoy.

The burly McCoy kept a half dozen Phillips singles well scattered to post the win. He walked only one and whiffed four, Fagan, working his seventh game in four days, gave up eight hits, three to Dudley, and fanned five while also allowing but one free pass. Gene (Hoot) Gibson, the giant

Kempa third sacker, followed Dudley's first inning homer with a round-trip blast of his own. Both circuit clouts sailed to deep left-center.

After Phillips zoomed ahead, 3-2 in the fourth, and Kempa tied it at 3-all in the fifth, both clubs got a runner on in the sixth, but to no avail. Phillips leftfielder, Cody Gilliland doubled with two out in the sixth before McCoy forced the next batter to sky out to left.

Kempa's Bill Garrett took a curve ball that forget to break on the shoulder in the last of the sixth with two gone but Fagan struck out Gradon Lantz for the second time to kill the threat.

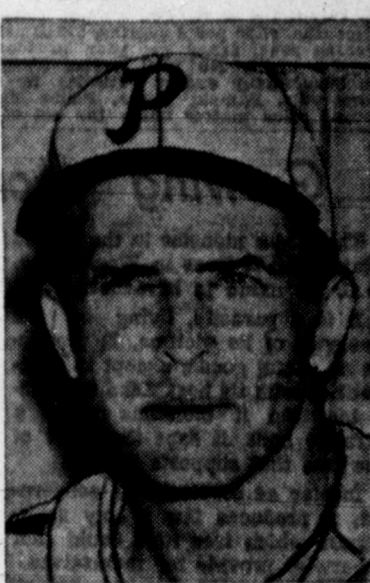
In the top of the seventh McCoy retired the side in order, posting a strikeout in between two flyouts to the outfield.

Floyd Favored By 6-1 For Win; 3-1 For Knockout

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Champion Floyd Patterson and challenger Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot, Tex., two brawny young athletes with remarkable records, fight tonight for the world heavyweight championship — the ring's golden crown.

Shortly after sundown, they will square off in Wrigley Field for their scheduled 15-rounder in which Patterson — who knocked out 14 of the last 15 men to face him — will try to blast backwoodsman Harris' perfect record of 22 straight professional victories.

They are not only the youngest pair to fight for the coveted title, but they apparently boast the most enviable records of any duo in the division's title history.

The 23-year-old champion lost but one of his 34 starts, and that on a very questionable decision. Harris, 25, is unbeaten.

Because of their records, each should be extremely victory-conscious when he starts tossing the eight-ounce gloves before a crowd that will include Texas oil, cattle and rice millionaires and Hollywood stars of the entertainment world.

Floyd Is Big Favorite
The main event is slated for 8 p.m., p.d.t. — 11 p.m., e.d.t.

Because of his punch, the champion from Mt. Vernon, N.Y., is favored at 6-1 to tag Harris with his first defeat, and at 3-1 to win on a knockout. Betting has been very light.

Likewise, the ticket sale for Wrigley Field — from \$5 to \$30 a pew — has been disappointingly light. Promoter Bill Rosenzohn, staging his first fight, originally dreamed of a \$500,000 gate, but now he will be lucky to beat the California state record of \$228,500 set by Sugar Ray Robinson and Bobo Olson at the same field May 18, 1956. The paid attendance is expected to approximate 13,000.

Patterson hasn't fought in practically a year. His last title defense was on Aug. 22, last year against amateurish Pete Rademacher, who had Patterson on the floor before being knocked out by the champion.

three small cards in a suit bid but not rebid by partner indicates a very probable losing trick and you should never bid a grand slam with such a holding. Of course, I did rebid my hearts over your five club bid, but I also did hold both ace and king and wanted to show that. Then when you bid six diamonds I contented myself with only going to six spades. Couldn't you have left well enough alone and taken your sure profit?"

Like all of Hard Luck Joe's partners, North was right. Joe had taken the trouble to cue in both clubs and diamonds. Surely if North held a solid heart suit he would have been able to bid the grand slam himself and therefore Joe should have feared a heart slam and stopped at the small slam.

Mother To Be Charged In Death Of Three Children

SAN ANTONIO (UPI) — Police planned to file murder charges today against a 24-year-old San Antonio woman who said she drowned her three small sons Sunday.

The woman, Rosa Pena, was in "good" condition at a hospital after swallowing two capsules of rat poison. She waited at her nose more than two hours to die.

Pale-faced, she walked from her small home to the police station to give herself up after she found she was not dying.

Mrs. Pena said she drowned Richard, 2, Alvin, 4, and David, 6, because her husband had threatened to take the children from her if she left him.

She told officers she decided if she couldn't have the children "no one could." Police said she appeared upset and repentant as she told her chilling story.

Officers found the three boys "stashed like cordwood" in the bathtub. They tried to revive them, but the bodies already were cold and stiff.

Mrs. Pena told police she wanted to divorce her husband but she didn't know how and didn't have any money.

She drowned the boys one at a time, Alvin first, then Richard,

and finally 6-year-old Dave. The oldest boy came to the door of the bathroom while she was drowning Richard, she said, and begged her to stop.

"But I couldn't kill one without killing all of them," she said.

After the boys were dead, she took two large rat poison capsules with water, and became violently ill. After waiting for some time, she decided to try to walk to the police station.

There she waited patiently for two other persons to finish their business with Desk Sgt. P. C. Bernal.

Bernal said he asked her if there was anything he could do for her, and "she just stared." Then she sat down and said she had "killed her kids."

"Are you making this up?" asked the horrified Bernal.

"I wish I was," she answered.

She told police her husband, Alonzo, was in Laredo, and had been there for some time.

It Was Almost Romeo, Juliet Over Again

REGGIO CALABRIA, Italy (UPI) — It was almost Romeo and Juliet all over again.

There were the feuding families, the young lovers, the death that came to both.

The families were the Spoletis and the Calabros, who have been feuding for many years—a bitter hatred whose cause was lost in the passage of time since the first Spoletis and Calabros fought.

The lovers were Antonio Calabro 22, and Carmela Spoletis, 15, who had met and loved each other despite their family backgrounds.

They had met secretly for several months but on Saturday they forgot the family feud and walked openly, arm in arm. The girl's brother, Francesco, 25, saw them and tragedy followed.

Francesco shot his sister and Antonio in the head, killing them both.

Bruno Calabro, 58, father of the slain man, and Abouzziate Spoletis, 50, mother of the girl, rushed to the sides of their children where they lay in the street.

The bitter pain of the moment merged with his hatred of the Spoletis and he shot and killed the girl's mother. Francesco and Bruno exchanged shots too and both fell wounded.

Catholics Suffer Under Communism

BERLIN (UPI) — Pope Pius XII said Sunday that Catholics living under Communism often face greater difficulties than the early Christians who lived in a "stifling heathen world."

He bade them defend their faith "to the last." The Pope's recorded message was played to 170,000 Catholics from East and West Germany assembled in West Berlin's Olympic Stadium for a final meeting of a five-day Catholic rally. He spoke in German.

A-Sub Leaves For Brooklyn

PORTLAND, Eng. (UPI) — The U. S. atomic submarine Nautilus leaves here today on the week-long voyage to the Brooklyn Navy Yard, running underwater all the way.

Three newspapermen, including UPI Correspondent William F. Sunderland, will make the crossing in the Nautilus.

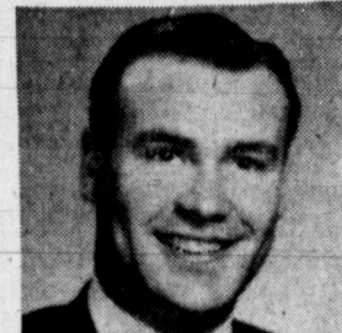

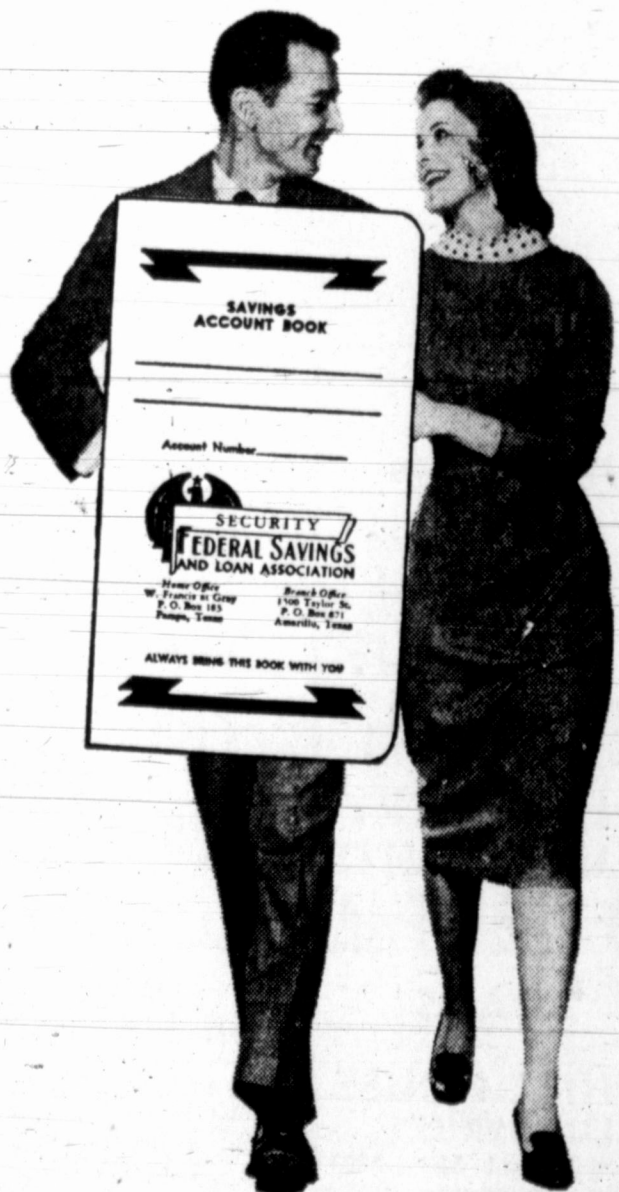
