

Judicial Decision

BETTER JOBS

In the last issue I was quoting from Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson's decision freeing a wheat farmer, J. Evetts Haley Jr., from fines imposed on him by the Department of Agriculture. The judge was showing what the Constitution permitted Congress to do.

Then he related that ten amendments were immediately added to the original Constitution, and the Tenth Amendment says:

"The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people."

"Therefore, we are relegated immediately back to the word Production is not 'commerce.' commerce. "If this law is finally upheld, I think it should be definitely stated by our courts that intrastate commerce has been abolished and that the states have no control over even their domestic commerce.'

peace plan, the President will point out that Congress must enact legislation to authorize it. He will declare his intention to recommend this to the new Congress being elected next month, which will convene January 7.

The Atomic Energy Commission already is empowered to use "peaceful explosions" for industripurposes in the U.S.

The general counsel of the AEC has ruled it can "sell such services for research developments or demonstrations" in this country But such activities are banned elsewhere under the existing law. It is the President's aim to eliminate this barrier, and to enable the AEC to conduct "peaceful explosions" in other countries.

ALREADY UNDERWAY - Studies already are being made by the Atomic Commission to put this new atoms-for-peace plan into op-

eration. Commissioner H. S. Vance disclosed this in a letter to Representative Carl Durham (D., N.C.), chairman of the Joint Atomic Committee. Highlights of this significant communication are:

"The Commission is actively en gaged in studying what kinds of projects will be ready for execution in the next year or so, the extent to which these projects may be performed under the present law, and the problems involved in amending the law to add additional authority where necessary.

"We will submit to you a propos al for legislation in ample time for Congress to give consideration to these problems without delaying this program. "Our plans include work on

many applications of peaceful explosions . . . It will be desirable and advantageous to work with industry.'

First among those whose cooper ation is being sought is the oil in-

dustry. This is revealed in another Vance letter. He informed Representative Durham that the AEC has called a conference of officials of the U.S. Bureau of Mines and the oil industry to discuss plans for using atomic explosions to develop shale oil.

"The petroleum industry has indicated considerable interest in the possible use of nuclear explosions in oil recovery," Vance wrote. There are several possibilities for using such explosions for this purpose. One of the more promising is in the recovery of oil from oil

Q-Is it possible that hardening of the coronary arteries can cause unbearable pain at times? Can hardening of the arteries not show on an electrocardiogram?-Mr. A.

A-If the cerenary arteries are hardened and thickened so that they do not carry enough blood to the heart muscle, pain (usually known as angina pecteris) is common. Pain is likely to be absent at rest and come on with exer-

It is possible to have hardened coronary arteries and have nothing evident in the test known as an electrocardiogram. Q-Can an overactive thyroid

cause a heart attack?-W. B. A-An everactive thyroid (texic golter) frequently causes a rapid heart rate but is not a primary enuse of a heart attack - if by this is meant a cerenary throm-


