Cost Of Living Is Reportedly Steady

By WILLIAM J. EATON United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI)—Living costs remained unchanged between August and September, the government reports. It also reported that earnings of the average factory worker hit new record highs last month. The Labor Department's consumer price index remained at 123.7 per cent of average 1947-59 prices in September. It was the second month in a row in which the index failed to rise after a steady two-year climb. Ewan Clague, labor statistics commissioner, predicted the index would stabilize over the next six months and would not resume its rapid upward movement. The department reported that

the average factory worker, with three dependents, received a record \$77.25 a week in pay after reductions for federal taxes. Some Wages Increase Buying power of these wages, Clague said, rose 1 per cent because of the stability in prices across the nation. About 900,000 railroad workers will receive a 1-cent hourly pay increase because of the rise in the index over the past six months. Another 450,000 electrical and aircraft workers whose wages are tied to the index on a quarterly basis will not receive any wage boost because there was no index change from August to September. The department said the factory worker's buying power has increased 5 per cent since the low point of the recession last April. This reflected a longer work week, higher hourly earnings, and relatively stable price levels, the department said. The earnings after taxes were about 65 cents a week higher than in August and about \$1.80 higher than in September a year ago. Sharp reductions in food prices and lower costs for personal care and recreation offset higher prices for fall clothing, medical care and transportation. Drug Costs Up Food prices dropped .3 of 1 per cent as the result of declining price tags for fresh fruits and vegetables, pork, poultry and coffee. Coffee prices dropped 3.2 per cent to the lowest point since July, 1950. Higher rates for group hospitalization insurance in several cities, higher doctor and dentist fees, and some higher costs for drugs, advanced medical care prices by .8 of 1 per cent. Clague said a slight upturn in living costs is likely for October, partly on the strength of higher new car prices. But he added that "you are getting pretty good stability now."

Dulles had pledged before his meeting with the Nationalist leader that the United States would neither attack nor "tolerate attacks" against the Chinese Communists. That statement, disclosed Thursday, came in an interview filmed for British independent television last Thursday before Dulles flew to Formosa. However, the secretary emphasized that "when they (the Communists) attack then I think we have to stand firm. If we don't, I think there will be a breach in the line . . . and then the whole position of the free world in the western Pacific will be lost."

Man Asks Back Pay From Guard

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Back in 1950, James Logan put in eight days of National Guard training at Red Oak, Iowa. Logan, a farmer, and 90 years old now, said Thursday he never got paid for the training stint. The prevailing rate, he said, was 50 cents per day. So, Logan demanded \$4 plus interest from Iowa. "When the training period was over, our unit commander told us to stack arms and go home where we could collect our pay," Logan said. "We never heard from him since," Logan complained.

Gas Tank Explodes, Mechanic Safe

Fumes inside an empty automobile gas tank exploded Thursday morning at the McCoy and Storm wrecking yard, 1505 Ripley. A mechanic welding on the tank was not injured. Pampa firemen answered the call at 9:47 a.m. and extinguished the flaming tank with high-pressure fog.

Sheriff Rufe Jordan made his appearance in a film Thursday at the Pampa Noon Lions Club meeting. Jordan was shown conversing with Cal Farley, president of Boys Ranch, outside Amarillo. "The Boys Ranch film, produced by the United Peace Officers of America, shows some of the 25 boys who never had a decent home until they came to Boys Ranch. Many of them were in trouble with the law. Lion Jordan, who is program chairman for the month, introduced the film. After the showing, Fire Chief Ernest Winborne said that the Panhandle Firemen and Fire Marshal's Association of which he is a member is raising money to build a fire station at Boys Ranch. The association has already donated a fire truck. There are 52 towns in the group. This week the Pampa Fire Department sent Boys Ranch a check for \$394.

Soviet Writer Is Nobel Prize Winner

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI)—Boris Pasternak, a Soviet writer whose best-known novel is banned in Russia, won the \$41,250 Nobel Prize for literature Thursday. The Swedish Academy of Literature cited Pasternak for his "important achievements in contemporary lyrical poetry and in the field of the Great Russian epic tradition."

The citation made no mention of the Soviet ban on his best selling novel, "Dr. Zhivago." It is uncertain whether he will be able to come here to receive his prize Dec. 10.

The literature award is the first of this year's prizes to be announced. Prize winners in chemistry, physics and medicine will be announced next week, while the peace prize winner—if any—will be named later. Pasternak is the first resident of Russia who has ever won the literature prize. Ivan Bunin, the only other Russian to receive the award, was living in Paris when he won it in 1933. "Dr. Zhivago," a novel describing nearly four decades of Russian life, was an immediate success when it was published in Italy. It has since appeared in 18 countries outside the Iron Curtain, but it appears unlikely that readers in the Communist world will have a chance to read it. A few installments of the Pasternak masterpiece appeared serially in the Soviet monthly Znamya, but publication was halted abruptly when the Kremlin decided to ban the book. Although Pasternak has lived in Russia all his life, he has usually kept aloof from the changing tides of politics which have affected the work of his contemporaries. Most of his writing is characterized by a combination of gentle lyricism and strong mysticism.

Lightbulb Theft Leaves Authorities In The Dark

LAKELAND, Fla. (UPI)—Authorities are still in the dark as to who stole lightbulbs from a downtown park and blacked out a Republican rally. Florida's top ranking GOP candidates and their supporters were all set for a round of outdoor speechmaking Thursday night. They finished a 33-a-plate fund-raising dinner at a cafeteria and headed for the park. But when the switch was thrown, the lights failed to go on. All the bulbs had been snatched. The crowd of about 250 trooped back to the cafeteria, where the candidates drew up and issued a statement describing the bulb-snatching as a "supreme and outstanding example of the one party system actively at work."

Robert E. Lee Defeats Pampa Reapers, 28-14

Robert E. Lee won the first intra-city junior high game in Pampa's history Thursday night, downing the Pampa Junior High Reapers, 28-14.

The Rebels capitalized on a fumble and a blocked kick to take a 14-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, then fought off the determined and inspired Reapers for the rest of the game.

The two things that stood out in the game were the passing of Lee quarterback Butch Crossland and the tremendous line play of the Reapers.

Crossland fired two long passes to give Lee its third touchdown just as the first half ended. He hit Dennis Mills with the first one at the Reaper 35, for a 22-yard gain. Then on the next play, he dropped far behind his own line of scrimmage and fired to Charles Fant, standing near the goal line. Fant stepped across for the TD.

The Crossland-to-Fant pass went about 80 yards in the air—a good toss for a college back, an excellent one for a high school player, and fantastic for junior high.

However, the steady, hard-hitting play of the entire middle of the Reaper line was just as impressive, in its own way, as the passing of Crossland.

The Reaper forward wall, out-weighted an average of 23 pounds to the man, formed a human wedge and literally shoved the heavier Rebels backward on almost every offensive play during the first half. Taking part in "operation wedge" were center Billy Hughes, guards Eugene Brock and John Hinsley, and tackles Danny Mathus and Corky Godfrey.

The Rebels stopped the wedge during the second half, but the Reapers still made good yardage on orthodox power plays. The Pampa team outgained Lee on the ground, 231 yards to 219, and made 16 first downs to 15 for the Rebels.

Lee, thanks to Crossland's passing, was ahead on total offense, 300 yards to 239.

Two Pampa backs, halfback Gerald Been and fullback John Arthur, carried almost the entire offensive load for the Reapers. Been was the game's leading ground gainer with 117 yards on 20 carries, and Arthur was second with 99 yards on 24 tries.

Two Rebels, halfbacks Robby Robison and Dennis Mills, shared offensive honors with Crossland. Robison gained 63 yards on just four runs, Mills got 62 yards on nine carries, and Crossland made 60 yards on eight attempts.

Tackles James Webb and Larry Braly opened some good holes for the three Rebel backs, and halfback Mills, safety Mike Stewart, and linebacks Jimmy Hoyer and Randy Haralson did a good defensive job for Lee in the second half.

Lee scored just two and a half minutes after the opening kick-

Top-ranked Army and second-ranked Ohio State both are "hurting" for their important battles with sectional rivals Saturday.

The unbeaten Cadets were most concerned over the condition of halfback Pete Dawkins when they took off today for their date with

the University of Pittsburgh, which will be televised throughout the East. Dawkins sustained a pulled thigh muscle in last Saturday's game against Virginia and hasn't even been near the practice field all week.

With fullback Harry Walters layed up with a sprained ankle and Dawkins regarded as a doubtful starter, Coach Earl Blaik in-

dicated the Cadets will depend on their new-found air power against Pitt.

"This is a more crucial game for us than the one with Notre Dame," Blaik declared. "And the only possible way we can win it, considering our injuries, is by throwing the ball."

Four Walking Wounded

Ohio State, meanwhile, will have four "walking wounded" in its lineup against Wisconsin. Halfback Don Clark has a sore shoulder, while fullback Bob White, center Dan Fronk and tackle Jim Tyrer have lingering leg injuries.

However, the Buckeyes, like Army, are one touchdown favorite to maintain their perfect record.

South Carolina knocked off previously unbeaten Clemson, 26-6, in their "Big Thursday" brawl Thursday, leaving only eight major colleges on the perfect record list. In addition to Army and Ohio State, they are Texas, Northwestern, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Colorado and Rutgers.

Texas, ranked fourth nationally, meets Rice in a "pick 'em" game that should have a major bearing on the Southwest Conference race. The Owls suffered their only conference defeat at the hands of Texas last year and would like to return the compliment Saturday.

Iowa Over Wildcats

Sixth-ranked Iowa is a 10-point pick to hand Northwestern its first defeat, but all the other perfect record teams are heavy favorites. LSU is 12 over Florida, Ole Miss is 14 over Arkansas, while the odds makers declined to quote prices on Colorado's meeting with Nebraska and Rutgers' clash with Lehigh.

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Rebels Release Pair Of Americans

HAVANA, Cuba (UPI) — The U.S. embassy has announced that Cuban rebels have released two Americans and seven Cubans employed by the Texas Oil Co. who were kidnaped near Santiago de Cuba on Monday.

The two Americans are C.R. Bennett and K.H. Drewes. The brief embassy announcement gave no details.

No other information was immediately available other than the fact the nine men were returned to freedom at 9:30 a.m. c.d.t. unharmed.

Although the kidnaping took place Monday, the embassy did not announce it until Tuesday.

Condemned by U.S.

At the time, the Texas company identified Drewes as a 40-year-old machine shop foreman from Joliet, Ill., and Bennett as a 35-year-old engineer and superintendent.
