BISHOP, Va. (UPI) - An explosion ripped through a section two miles deep in the Pocahontas Fuel Co. mine here today, trapping approximately 22 men.

A company spokesman said 166 other miners fled by foot and flatcar from the miles of tunnels that run beneath the West Virginia line in this mountainous area of southwest Virginia. The blast occurred where 37 men died in an explosion Feb. 4, 1957

Roland C. Luther, company vice president at the scene, said 22 of the men who had entered the mine at 8 a.m. were unaccounted for after the accident. He said it was not known whether they were dead or alive.

Another spokesman said the men still in the mine had "barricaded themselves" in the affected section, but Luther said this was not established.



Thus the fungus is already widely distributed and may cause trouble anywhere. So far, however, the highest frequency of infection has been in the vicinity of the Mississippi, Missouri and

Ohio, rivers. The study of this fungus in the laboratory is dangerous. In 1951, for example, there was a report summarizing 1,342 Mistoplasmosis infections presumably acquired as the result of laboratory work. I certainly do not mean to alarm people concerning Mistoplasmosis. Outlook for recovery is good, even

Still No **New Pope** Is Named VATICAN CITY (UPI) - The

Sacred College of Cardinals failed for the second straight day today to elect a new pope as successor to the late Pope Pius XII.

Black smoke emerging from the special chimney atop the Sistine Chapel signalled that the cardinals had failed to agree on a new pontiff after eight ballots in two days. But after four ballots Sunday and four more today, they were unable to agree on a new spiritual head for the world's half billion Roman Catholics. The fact that the vote had gone

to eight ballots appeared to indicate that the cardinals were deeply divided on the church's immediate needs.

This division seemed to be over whether to choose a political or a pastoral pope, although no one could be certain since all the proceedings inside the Sistine Chapel are held secret under pain of excommunication

A political pope would be a man who would have a great impact on world affairs. A pastoral pope would be one who would tend to concentrate on internal church affairs.


