

### **BETTER JOBS** By R. C. HOILES

The Decalogue 'Insufficient' As Ethical Guide

I have always believed that the man who believed and understood the Ten Commandments would bry to live by them and would be a good citizen and neighbor- a quaintance asked me if I had read "The Ten Commandments" by A. Powell Davies I was interested because the tone of his voice caused me to think that the Ten Commandments were not what I thought they were as a moral guide. For that reason, I was very much interested in reading the book. I am always interested in reading something that takes exception to what I believe.

One can usually learn more from those who have different ideas than can be learned from those who have the same ideas. With this idea in mind, I went to the book store and asked to buy this book. The clerk looked it up and said this was a 35 cent paperback book and it was sold only in 100 lots, usually to news stands. He said he would see if he could get me a copy of it without buying 100. I ordered one.

Then I went to the library to find out whether they had it. They didn't have it but they promised to see if they could get it out of the state library. In the mean time, my acquaintance was good enough to lend me the book.

Mr. Davies is the Minister of the All Souls Church in Washing-

It seemed to me Mr. Davies was more interested in quoting what he called "scholars," without defining them, than he was in discovering principles. He tried to show that t wasn't possible for the Commandments in Exodus and Deuteronomy to be harmonized.

He does recognize that "Thou shalt not murder" is murder rather than kill. He points out, however, that the Israelites at that time believed it was perfectly-right to murder their enemies.

He does not seem to realize that the ethical code of the Jews evolved with time; that they were written on the hearts of men and there were plenty of explanations as to the real meaning of these Commandments that certainly should cause rational persons to see that their neighbor meant all mankind.

### Coveting

It seems to me he very loosely and carelessly explains the Coveting Commandment, which is really a summary of the Commandments governing men's human relations to each other. He does recognize that coveting really starts in the hearts of men; that it is more or less a spiritual commandment as far as human relations are con-

His Conclusions Listen to this:

"The esteem in which the Ten Commandments have been held has long been due not to their contents but to their place in religious history. To the traditionalist they were given by God to Moses and hence are sacred. To those who reject their supernatural origin they form an ancient moral code which is presumed to have high value because it has attracted so much veneration.

'But whether traditionalist or otherwise, whoever really studies the Ten Commandments as a guide to ethical behavior is bound to find them insufficient. Their provisions are too few and too elementary. ... What we need for our ethical guidance is not so much the prohibition of murder, which most of us are not likely to commit, as some indications of the positive virtues. Kindness, generosity, sympathy, courage, love - these are the ethical values that we look for in a high moral code.'

Of course, he doesn't define kindness, generosity, sympathy, cour-

age or love. One wonders whether one can be materially kind and be generous with one person and not injure another. As, for example, if the man gives to an indigent, he either reduces his own standard of living or retards his accumulation of tools that make it possible for him to be useful and helpful to everyone in the world. It is so easy to emphasize a concentrated benefit and not see the harm done to the

THE JOLTERS - First of these underlying bases is the extraordinary fact that only about one-third of the "gross national income" is now being taxed.

According to the November "Ecnomic Indicators" report of President Eisenhower's Council of Economic Advisers, the gross national income this year has averaged around \$350 billion. Of this immense amount, Mills will state that only \$129 billion 's being tax-

Doubtless there are "many good reasons," Mills will say, why some \$220 billion of national income is not taxed.

There appear to be rumors that this operation exerts an unfavorable effect on marital relations, but there is no reason why this should be the case. Actually, in many instances marital relations appear to improve following an hysterectomy because of the removal of the fear of unwanted pregnancy.

Q-My married daughter is the mother of five children and does all her own housework. After her last child she obtained a prescription for benzedrine to lose weight. She quickly discovered the extra energy this gave her, but she continues to take about one tablet a day and says she feels absolutely listless without it. What is your opinion?-Mrs. A. L.


