



"The present drive to raise the income-tax exemptions and relieve millions of voters from the obligation to pay any income tax whatever is merely the latest illustration of how easily the progressive income tax can be turned into a demagogic weapon and a political football,

"In the light of the ideological history of the tax, this development should not be too surprising. In the "Communist Manifesto" of 1848, 'a heavy progressive or graduated income tax' is listed as the second point of a ten-point program that Marx and Engels demanded in order to make 'despotic inroads on the rights of property' and as 'unavoidable as a means of entirely revolutionizing the mode of production.' In the course of time, 'bourgeois' economists came to recommend such a tax in increasing numbers. But the excesses to which it has been carried (and which would have delighted Marx) have recently begun to produce a revulsion of feeling and thinking on the part of some economists who have had the courage to speak out.

"A few years ago, for example, Harley L. Lutz of Princeton, arguing for a proportional income tax, contended that there was no logical stopping place to the progressive principle, based on the current specious form of the 'ability to pay' theory, short of complete equalization of incomes by confiscation of all incomes in excess of the lowest amounts received by anyone.' And more recently two University of Chicago lawyers, Walter J. Blum and

Harry Kalven, Jr. (in "The Uneasy Case for Progressive Taxation,' University of Chicago Press), and the economist F. A. Hayek, have subjected the progressive-income-tax principal to searching criticism.



ing that it is illness and not intention which is responsible. In mild cases, the general health is good, the muscles twitch only slightly and the speech and mental functions are not disturbed. Children with mild chorea frequently complain of fatigue.

Emotional disturbances, such as easy crying and nightmares, are often present. When the hands are held straight out in front with the fingers spread, the jerky irregular movements of the muscles are characteristic and can be easily recognized by the experienced physician.

In the severe form of the disease, the movements involve a lot of muscles and the youngster may not even be able to eat or The Louisville and Nashville and undress without help. Sometimes the speech is affected and a child may not be able to talk at all for several days.

The worst type of chorea is the maniacal form, which is fortunately, very rare. Here, in addition to the muscular movements, there are severe mental symptoms which last for weeks.


Diagnosis is not too difficult if the possibility of chorea is considered. It is important to try to tell whether the chorea is of the kind associated with rheumatic fever or not, because this may have a bearing on treatment. Diet and long bed rest, similar to that which is given for rheumatic fever, are the main treatments for chorea. Because chorea involves the nervous system, sedatives are usually advisable. The exact cause is still unknown, though a virus is a likely possibility. I hope this discussion will be

helpful to Mrs. R., who inquired about chorea in connection with

her 10-year-old son. Mr. T., who also asks about it, says that his wife shakes her head from side to side when she is doing something and he has noticed her shoulders shaking sometimes when she watches TV. In this instance the trouble is probably not St. Vitus dance.

The State Department, aided by Eric Johnston, has jammed through an international deal whereby 7 American movies will be shown in the Soviet Union and 10 Communist films will be shown in the U.S.A. The agreement specifies that "the content of no movie will be distorted" but sets up no means of enforcing this. There are several flowers appropriate during the Yuletide season which are connected with the birth of Christ by th legends of history.

Sainforin, or "Holy Hay," is said to have cradled the infant Christ in the manger. The snowdrop is the flower of the Virgin Mary, and is said to be the emblem of the candles she lighted on Christmas.

According to legend, the Christmas rose was divinely created. A shepherd maid wept at having no gift to lay before the Babe in the manger. Suddenly an angel appeared to her. On hearing why the maiden wept, the angel touched the ground where her tears had fallen and immediately the place was white with Christmas roses. which the maid gathered and laid in the manger.

The chrysanthemum is said to have appeared first on Christmas Eve near the manger as a sign to the Wise Men that they had reached the spot where the star had bidden them.



On Coconut Day in India, great numbers of devout Hindus go in a parade to the nearest river or the sea, where they throw garlands of flowers and many coconuts into the water while the priests ask Varuna, the god of the waters, for a plentiful yield of coconuts during the season. To these people it is an important day because coconuts are an extremely important crop.


