MAN SHOOTS SELF IN HEAD

A retired oil field worker, Earl E. Gage, 63, shot himself through the head Tuesday morning about 10 a.m. His body, slumped in a chair, was discovered late in the afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Stalnaker, at 329 Jean St.

Deputy Sheriff Buck Haggard this morning reported Mr. Gage ended his life with a single bullet from a .32 caliber revolver. He had apparently been dependent over recent surgery and failing health. Gage had been living at the Stalnaker home in recent months following his retirement from the Magnolia Oil Co. He had lived in Pampa since 1941.

Justice of Peace Bill Graham, called at 3:20 p.m., returning a verdict of death by self-inflicted gunshot wounds. He said Gage had evidently killed himself "around 10 a.m." Mrs. Stalnaker, last to see her father alive, said she left home for work at 9:30.

The bullet entered the right side of Mr. Gage's head above the ear. The pistol, still in his right hand, was found in his lap. The body was taken to the Du-

TURK PREMIER HURT

Informal Cyprus Talks Resuming

of Turkish Premier Adnan Menemeres from injuries received in a plane crash that took at least 12 and possibly 15 lives Tuesday. Cyprus Gov. Sir Hugh Foot meets with Cypriot religious leader Archbishop Makarios, who was reported balking this morning. British Foreign Office spokesmen said the foreign ministers of Britain, Greece and Turkey might hold an informal meeting later today.

The Turkish Cypriot delegation announced that it had rejected Makarios' demand for a revision of the Turkish-Greek agreement. It said there could be no renegotiation of the proposal because it already was a compromise on the Greek and Turkish Cypriot views.

Formal talks were postponed Tuesday night after Menemeres was "injured on the plane trip to Britain from Turkey."

Makarios' Makes Demands A Turkish embassy official said today that police still were trying to confirm the exact number of dead in the crash. Police had reported 12 victims. The official said there were 25 persons aboard the plane and "there were only 10 survivors."

Dr. Fazil Kutuchuk, leader of the Turkish Cypriot delegation, said only objections by Makarios were holding up agreement on Cyprus.

He said the Archbishop wanted to limit Britain to a 99-year lease on her bases on the island and to give Turkish Cypriots a smaller representation on the Greek-Turkish parliament proposed for the island state.

Kutuchuk said that if Makarios would withdraw his demands, there would be nothing to prevent final agreement before British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan leaves for Moscow Saturday.

Suffering From Shock The resumption of informal talks gave weight to British hopes that a second formula in agreement on an independent Cyprus would be reached by the end of the week.

Red Premier Makes Threat

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, in a speech released today, warned that any Western attempt to use force to break through to Berlin by land, sea or air would be met with force.

He said in a speech at Tula Tuesday night that Soviet troops were not stationed in East Germany just to play games. The Western powers, in notes delivered Monday, rejected Soviet proposals to end the occupation of Berlin. The United States, Britain and France also reiterated their determination to "uphold by all appropriate means" their rights of access to West Berlin.

West Awaits Reply The Soviet government has not yet replied to the Big Three Western notes which suggested a Big Four foreign ministers' conference to discuss the problem of Germany.

Khrushchev's speech, at Tula, 105 miles south of Moscow, was reported by the official Soviet news agency Tass. Khrushchev warned that if any one opened fire over Berlin "this will mean the beginning of war."

He called for agreement on a peace treaty with Germany and again reiterated that all nations were open to "great destruction" from modern weapons.

Asks Peace Treaty "We understand this well and therefore we say: Let us sign a peace treaty," Khrushchev said. Khrushchev said that "some leaders of the Western powers say that even if the U.S.S.R. should hand-over to East Germany her rights arising from treaties signed by Britain, the United States, France and the U.S.S.R. concerning these rights, the Western powers would not accept the transfer of these rights."

Cuba Executes No. 1 Criminal

HAVANA (UPI)—Maj. Jesus Sosa Blanco, Cuba's twice-convicted "war criminal No. 1," was executed early today by a firing squad to which he gave the order for his own death.

Sosa was shot at 2:16 a.m. east in the dry moat surrounding Havana's Cabana Fortress-prison.

Reports from the scene said he faced the firing squad bravely. "I forgive you, and I hope you forgive me," he said in a clear, steady voice, and a moment later spoke his last word: "Fire!"

The regular commander of the firing squad administered the coup de grace, firing a tearful salute into Sosa's head to make certain he was dead.

Ariel Lima, a former policeman sentenced to death several days ago, was shot a few minutes later.

A five-major "revolutionary tribunal" headed by Maj. Cayetano Cienfuegos, the army's chief of staff, Tuesday night rejected Sosa's appeal from his second conviction of crimes against Cubans during the regime of ousted dictator Fulgencio Batista.

The other majors sitting with Cienfuegos on the case were Juan Almeida, Victor Bordon, Rene de los Santos and Eduardo Sardinias.

Capt. Aristides Dacosta, defense attorney at Sosa's trials, did not appear at the appeal hearing for reported reasons of health. His name was taken by Julio Morale Castellon, a civilian attorney.

It took the five majors just 20 minutes to agree on a verdict. Morales wound up his final argument at 10:06 p.m. and at 10:25 p.m. the decision was announced.

Sosa, who was convicted for the first time in the "Roman circus atmosphere" of the Sports Palace Stadium, was found guilty Tuesday for a second time of "murder, incendiarism, looting, robbery and property damage" in a military courtroom here.

Pampa Firemen Battled Four Blazes Tuesday

Pampa firemen Tuesday battled four fires, the most serious a car fire at 315 N. Baer. The car, a 1951 Buick owned by Emmett Teskell, was heavily damaged when gas on the engine block flared up. Firemen were called at 8:15 p.m.

At 10:10 a.m. a pile of sulphur caught fire at the Phillips tank farm, eight miles west of Pampa. Firemen said the fire was started from a nearby cutting torch. Damages were at a minimum.

At 10:25 a.m. timbers and grass began to burn at the Texas Pipe and Metal yard, 845 S. Russell. The fire was blamed on a torch used in cutting pipe. In the afternoon, at 4:42 p.m., grass near the home of Bill Robertson, 845 E. Frederic, caught fire, but damages were minor.

Pair Held For Cracking Safes Here

Four persons—two men and two women—are in Gray County jail today, charged with burglary and being accomplices to burglary.

Apprehension of three of the four, came late Monday evening, but was kept under cover by Sheriff Rufe Jordan and members of his department, pending the capture of the fourth party involved in two recent burglaries here.

Arrested late Monday were Warren Ellis, 36, of Vernon, and two women companions, Uleta Cockerell and Jean Rasco. Both gave ages of 32 and both are of Pampa.

The fourth member of the "crime quartet," Keith Duree, 28, walked into Gray County Sheriff's office about 11 a.m. Tuesday and gave himself up, after "hiding out" for some 18 hours.

Duree is a brother to the Rasco girl who was apprehended by Sheriff Jordan, Texas Ranger Bill Henslee, and deputies Buck Haggard, Shirley Nichols and Jimmy Bowers.

The track-down of the three ended a 48-hour manhunt by the five law enforcement officers who hardly had a moments sleep since Monday morning when it was discovered an attempted burglary and cracking of two safes at Pampa Lumber Company had occurred sometime between midnight Sunday and 3 a.m. Monday.

Duree, out on \$12,000 bond from Hutchinson County charges of forgery and burglary, has been charged with two counts of burglary: the early Monday morning Pampa Lumber Company attempted safe-cracking and the successful safe-cracking a week earlier of the Pampa Coca Cola safe after it had been battered open ten days ago. Two bonds, totalling \$6,000—\$3,000 on each charge) have been set for Duree.

Ellis has been charged only with one count of burglary, the Coca Cola safe-cracking. His bond has been set at \$3,000.

The two women's bonds were set at \$2,000 apiece.

The "crime quartet" is expected to be held in Gray County jail until early March when the Grand Jury is due to meet here.

Duree has only been out of prison about 18 months, after serving a five-year sentence in the Chino, Calif., Penitentiary for forgery.

Ellis has previous assault and swindling with worthless check counts against him. "We haven't got anything on the two girls, yet," Sheriff Jordan said this morning. They are both charged as accessories in the Monday Pampa Lumber Co. job.

The three Monday night arrests were made at a small house on Ripley Street, Jordan reported.

"There was a lot of griping and growling, but no violence when we made our arrests," Sheriff Jordan related this morning. "It was a wonderful piece of work and there was some fine research work behind the scenes before we could corner them," Jordan added.

Mayor Lynn Boyd, also up for reelection, likewise has not yet filed for a new term. Final date for filing is March 7. The election will be held April 7.

of the floodwaters fed by row boat, Army duck, truck, car and foot, leaving whatever equipment and possessions they could. All 30 residents of the nearby village of Westport fled, with store owners and tavern keepers taking as much of their stock with them as they could.

The flooding came unexpectedly as the river had begun receding and levees were expected to hold. However, the relentless pounding of the high water weakened and finally punched through the earthen mounds along the storied Wabash.

Evodus Orderly U.S. 50 between Russellville and Vincennes, Ind., was the main escape route, and it was jammed Tuesday by farmers with grain wagons, tractors and trucks hauling goods to safety. Cattle cars from the Vincennes stockyards joined the rush, moving livestock to safety.

State policeman Claude Rollins said the traffic was orderly as most of the refugees knew what to do and where to go. "We get a flood around here every seven years," Rollins said. "These people all have some place to go."

In its six-day sweep through northern Indiana, the flooded river has killed three persons, forced 2,000 families to evacuate and caused damages estimated at 45 million dollars.

PLAINVIEW — There's been suspender poppin' in Pampa all season long over the steady strength of Pampa High's well-rounded scoring machine. That "beautiful balance" was never more in evidence than it was here Tuesday night as the Big Green Warriors butchered Plainview's Bulldogs, 79-49.

The outside sniping of Craig Winborn, only junior in the Pampa starting lineup, earned the 6-3 blonde sharpshooter high scoring honors for the first time this year. The younger side of Pampa's potent brother-punch and the kid around whom the 1959-60 club will be built, sprayed the nets with 19 points on eight field goals and three of four charity tosses.

The lop-sided win pushed the Harvesters five full games ahead of Amarillo and Plainview in the run-away District 3-AAAA race with only Thursday night's curtain-closers remaining on the regular season schedule.

Amarillo, a 50-59 victim to neighboring Palo Duro Tuesday night, invades Harvesters Field House Thursday night. The Sandies and Plainview are tied for second at the moment with identical 8-5 records. Borger is fourth at 7-6 while Palo Duro is fifth at 6-7 and Monterey and Lubbock, 31-7 loser to Tascosa Tuesday night are tied for sixth with 4-9 marks and the Rebels bring up the rear with a 2-11 count.

For the 1958-59 season, Pampa is now 20-0. In conference they're 13-0 and the Plainview pasting advanced their winning string over the past two seasons to 39 straight. A win over the Sandies Thursday night would send the Harvesters into bi-district competition against Wichita Falls Tuesday night in Pampa, with a 27-0 record and a string of 40 straight wins behind them.

The Bulldogs never once led here Tuesday night, and only at the outset were they able to stay even with the classier invaders, tying the score twice, at 2-2 and 5-5, before Pampa pulled away to a 20-11 first quarter lead. By halftime it was 42-25 and after that only a matter of just how high the score would go.

A dozen Harvesters logged playing time in the "rough and tumble" contest, with nine cracking the scoring column. Thirty-seven fouls were whistled out in the game, one a technical on Plainview's Lee Richards in the first period for slapping the ball to the floor in boyish disgust. Pampa had 21 fouls and Plainview 16, but neither team fouled a man out.

Pampa's Charlie Minor had four personals and ten points while hook-shooting Dale Webb who paced Plainview scoring with 15 points, had four fouls for the losers. The Big Green had one of their best nights of the season at the free-throw stripe, sinking 25 of 28 attempts.

Besides Craig Winborn and Minor, two other Harvesters hit double figures: Coyde Winborn sinking 15 and Bob Gindorf netting 13. Center Mack Layne added nine while sub Hershell Terrell and Joe Timms both zeroed in five of six free-pitches in the fourth stanza while Phillip Gist added three points and Pat Carter chipped in with a long one-handed set shot to round out Pampa scoring.

Three More Satellites Are Planned

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The space agency charged ahead today with preparations for orbiting three more Vanguard satellites to unlock vital secrets about the sun's activities and the world's weather.

The first experimental satellite, a step toward future continuous weather mapping, was put in orbit by NASA in the space agency's first try. NASA took over the Vanguard project and its scientific team from the Navy last October. The satellite had many called a depressing record during the frenzied post-Sputnik period.

After a cooling off period of several months, during which it minutely studied the rocket vehicle and made several "minor" changes with no deadlines in mind, NASA Tuesday successfully launched the 21 1/2 pound sphere from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

It was hailed officially as start of a new era in weather search and a vindication of faith of Dr. John P. Hagen a the rest of the Navy's team which moved to NASA.

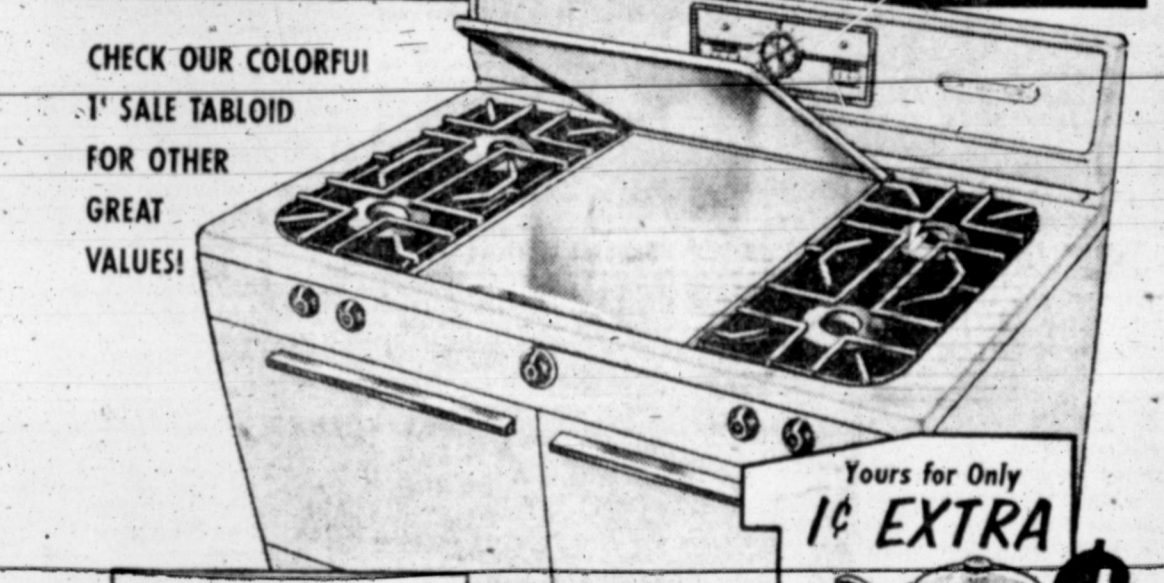
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
