WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said today White House Press Secretary James Hagerly "ought to be ashamed of himself" for accusing come Democrats of headline-hunting in the illness of John Foster Dulles.

Hagerly reacted to statements by Humphrey and other Democrats urging President Eisenhower to appoint a successor to Dulles immediately by telling newsmen: "It is remarkable what people will say to get their names in the newspapers."

Humphrey said Hagerly "knows better than that."

"The decision as to the secretary of state is distinctly in the hands of the President," Humphrey declared. "No one could wish Dulles a more speedy recovery."

Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) was the other top Democrat calling for the naming of a successor to Dulles. Humphrey said he was asked a question about what Symington had stated and "I replied

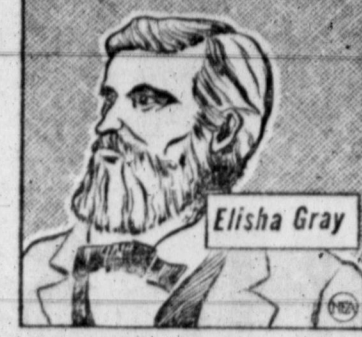
Statements made by the two men Monday night oozed good will.

It would be a disaster to all mankind if we did not do all we possibly could to prevent a third world war," Khrushchev replied.

Both the official party newspaper Pravda and the government newspaper Izvestia, printed the text of speeches made by Khrushchev and Macmillan at the dinner.

# Ivy Fights For Use Of Krebiozen

CHICAGO (UPI)—Dr. Andrew C. Ivy launched a fund raising campaign Monday night on behalf of the controversial cancer drug krebiozen at a dinner attended by movie actress Gloria Swanson and Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.).

The University of Illinois physiologist also warned that if the National Cancer Institute does not act to give the drug a "fair test," supporters of krebiozen will seek legislation to force a test.

Ivy told guests at the testimonial dinner in his honor that a "tax-exempt form of organization" will be organized to raise at least \$250,000 to finance production of more krebiozen.

"At the present rate of usage, all the krebiozen now available will be used up next summer," Ivy said, "and those patients now dependent on it will be left without it."

# Britain Retains Military Bases On Free Cyprus

LONDON (UPI)—Publication of the Cyprus agreement reveals that Britain will retain extensive military facilities on the island after it becomes independent, in addition to its two existing bases.

Two more areas will be held open for possible future use as British bases, and Britain also will have the right to install a number of radar stations on the strategic east Mediterranean island.

Two other nations will have the right to station troops on Cyprus—Greece with 950 men and Turkey with 650—and the island state itself will have a 2,000-man army, 60 per cent Greek in origin and 40 per cent Turkish.

Although all three of the nations which are to maintain troops on Cyprus are members of the Atlantic pact, Greek Orthodox Archbishop Makarios—a probable first president of the island state—says it will not join the Western alliance.

In an interview, Makarios, who studied at Boston University in 1946-47, credited U.S. pressure behind the scenes for the Cyprus agreement hammered out this month by Britain, Greece and Turkey.

# Bi-District Game Set For Tonight

## Pampa, Coyotes Clash at 8 p. m.

Pampa has won 27 straight games this year, but they won't mean a thing unless the Harvesters make it 28 tonight. The Pampa cagers meet the Wichita Falls Coyotes tonight at 8 p. m., in a one-game bi-district playoff. The contest will be played in Harvester Field House.

The winner of tonight's game will go into the regional playoff later this week, probably against the Odessa Bronchos. For the loser, the season will be over.

The Harvesters, winners of 40 straight contests over a two-year span, and defending state champions, are heavily favored to whip the Coyotes and take a big step toward another state title.

The Harvesters move into this game with amazing shooting percentages of .508 from the floor and .713 from the free throw line. Four of the regulars are averaging 10 or more points per game and three of them have hit more than 80 percent of their field goal attempts.

Coyles Winborn has led the Harvesters attack throughout the regular season with 451 points and a .530 shooting percentage. Winborn, Mack Layne, Bob Gindorf, and Charles Minor are all averaging 10 or more points per game, and all except Minor are shooting over the .500 mark.

The Harvesters hit equally well from the outside or from under the basket throughout the year, and their fast-breaking offense has worked for well over 60 points per game.

The Pampa defense has also been excellent. Using mostly a shifting zone, the Harvesters have forced most of their opponents to shoot almost entirely from the outside, and have used their height to spoil many of those shots.

The Harvesters, averaging 6.3 in height, have also controlled the boards in all but two or three games they have played. The Pampa regulars, with their height, are Coyle Winborn, 6-4; Layne, 6-5; Gindorf, 6-4; Craig Winborn, 6-3; and Minor, 5-11.

Layne has snagged the most rebounds this year, 284, but Gindorf and Coyle Winborn have also grabbed more than 200, and Craig Winborn has nabbed 182.

### Coyote Summary

The Coyotes, depending heavily on defense, have won 17 games this year while losing only four. They were undefeated in eight district games.

The Coyotes lost twice each to Quanah and Denton, teams the Harvesters have beaten twice each. Wichita Falls beat Quanah once, 47-42 in Wichita Falls, but even then Quanah outshot the Coyotes from the floor.

The big man on offense for the Coyotes has been Garland (Bubba) Bailey, 6-1. Bailey has averaged about 20 points per game through out the season, as he hit consistently on both long set and jump shots, and driving layups.

Gerald Phillips, 5-8, has been Wichita Falls' floor leader and second-leading scorer. He has averaged nine points per game, is a great clutch player, and hits well on a running jump shot.

Other Wichita Falls starters are Leland Allred, 6-3; Aaron McDonald, 6-2; or Steve Dean, 6-0.

The Coyotes use a deliberate, ball-control offense, and shoot mostly from the outside. They use mostly a shifting zone defense, but occasionally switch to a man-to-man.

## Claunch Wins Gloves Title

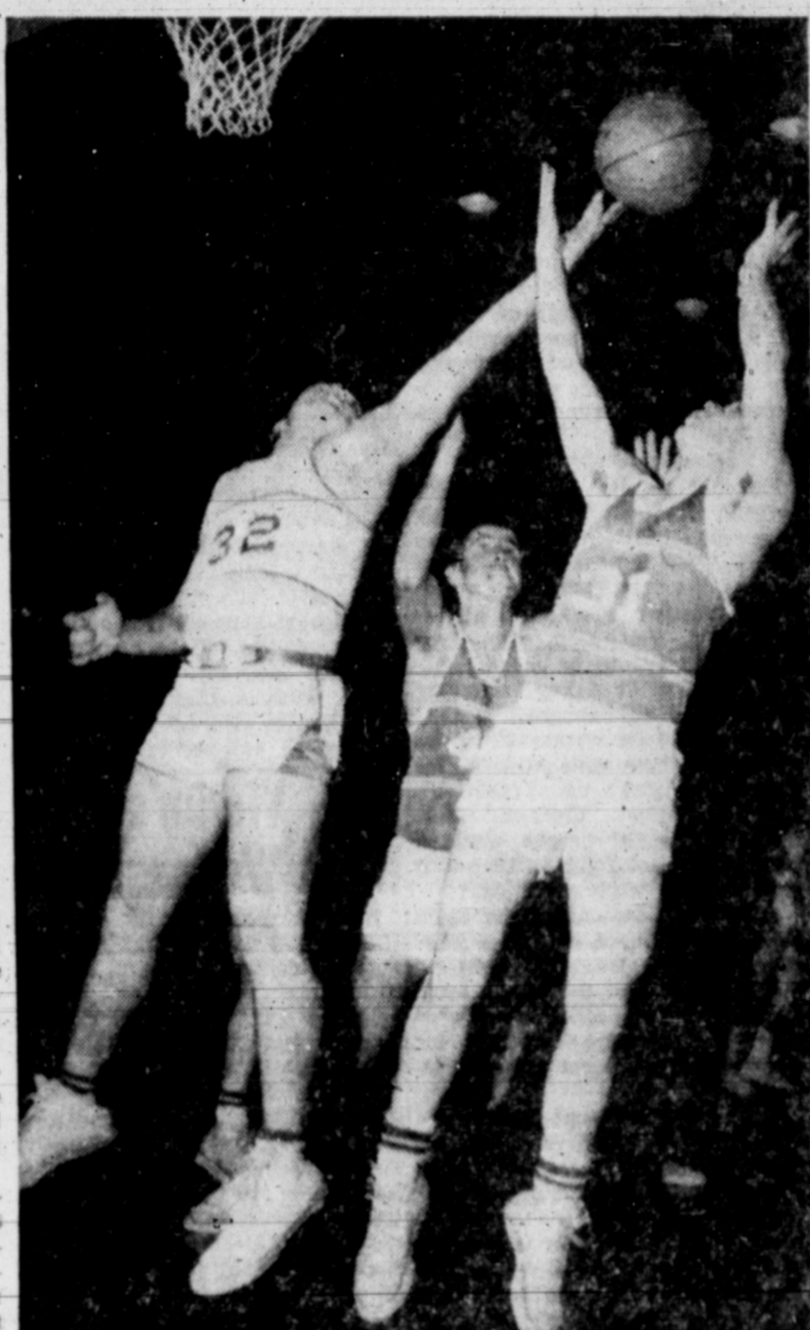
FORT WORTH (SpI) — Johnny Claunch, a Pampaan fighting for Abilene, won the Texas light weight championship Monday night in the Golden Gloves finals.

Another Top of Texas fighter, Carl McClure of Dumas, copped the heavyweight title. Claunch had trouble with his 6-5 opponent, Al Gonzales, in the finals. Gonzales kept Claunch from landing very many solid blows, but once in the second round Claunch moved inside and landed a staggering right to the head. That may have been the difference in the fight, which Claunch took by decision.

McClure, who was state runner-up last year, moved up a step this time. He went to the national meet last year as an alternate, but will be eligible as a champ now.

McClure won a hard-fought decision over Pete Peterson, a 245-pounder, in the heavyweight finals. McClure landed enough punches to win the first two rounds, but none of them seemed to hurt Peterson, a Gainesville High School football player.

McClure, 185, staggered Peterson in the first round with a solid overhead right, but ran into some trouble in the third round.

Hedley High's hustling Owls couldn't hit worth a hoot from the field but they didn't exactly give a hoot that Miami couldn't either, and parleyed sharp free-throw firing with a steady defense to pluck the Warriors head-feathers, 54-45 here Monday night.

Hedley's heads-up display of defense wasn't anything new, however. The Owls, sparkled with the same fine ball-hawking they've exhibited all season for Coach Don Haskins, a product of Henry Iba at Oklahoma State, often referred to as Mr. Defense in the round-ball sport today.

It was a class B bi-district fracas performed before some 950 excited Harvester Field House spectators who rocked-and-rolled during a torrid first half tempo that saw the score change hands ten times and tied on three occasions before the Owls spurred ahead by six points at intermission, 26-20.

The Warriors of Coach Bill Hinson were down by nine points early in the third quarter, 32-23, but roared back with little Jimmy Bowers, Miami drop-kicking specialist in football last autumn, paving the way to only a five-point deficit by the stanza's end, 38-33. The Warriors let a golden opportunity to overtake the Owls slip away in the early moments of the fourth period when they pulled it within only two field goals, 39-35, and gained possession of the ball. But one of many bad passes fell astray into the arms of a Hedley defender and from that point on the Owls began to pull away.

Bobby Lesley, who played for Berger High's B-team as a sophomore two years ago, hit three field goals and a couple of charity tosses as the Owls broke the game wide open, increasing their lead to 46-35 in a matter of two minutes.

Lesley paced scoring for the night with 26 points on seven jump-shots from the field and 12 of 13 free-throws. Hedley made only one more field goal, 17-16, then did the Purple Warriors, but Miami hit only 13 of 23 free-shots while the Owls were death from the house, line, swishing through 20 of 24. Both outfits committed 16 fouls, Miami losing its high point producer, Larry Anderson, who tallied 17 points for the night, with 3-4 left in the game and then losing Gerald Anderson moments later with five personals. Hedley lost Rodney Hargrave via the same route.

Bowers had 13 behind Anderson's 17 for Miami while Bill Maddox and Bill Wiggins both chipped in with ten for the Owls. The win moves Hedley into Friday and Saturday's Regional tournament at Canyon with a state tournament bid lying in the balance.

Illinois Governor Hit For Allowing Serving Of Liquor

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI) — The Temperance League of Illinois has taken a slap at Gov. William G. Stratton for permitting the serving of champagne in the state armory here during the Abraham Lincoln birthday dinner last week.

The league released copies of a letter sent to Stratton by its executive director, Luther J. Tigner, in which he criticized Stratton for placing himself "above the law" which bans alcoholic liquors in state buildings.

Along with the letter was a press release which said that such alleged winking at the law "is the sort of thing that finally bore fruit in the Orville Hodge case."

Tigner explained that the letter was sent to Stratton Feb. 16, but not released until today to give Stratton time to reply.

The only reply, he said, was "an evasive letter from his assistant," Miss Marion Keever.

About 1,400 persons attended the dinner in the armory which was addressed by West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt.

Tigner's letter to Stratton said "I was deeply disappointed" in the Lincoln dinner.

"Perhaps as the executive director of the Temperance League I should protest the serving of alcoholic beverages on the basis that Mr. Lincoln was a total abstainer and refused to serve liquor in his home even on the greatest occasion of his life, when news was brought of his nomination for the presidency," Tigner wrote.

But he said he would pass over this on grounds he might not be able to speak for all the churches represented in the league.

However, Tigner said, "I know that I speak for every member of our board and every church in our federation when I say that our democratic system depends for its life on obedience to law by both the high and the low."

Heavy Winter Cattle Feeding May Be Over

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UPI)—Cattlemen in East Texas see an end to heavy winter feeding but in the dry western two-thirds of the state, ranchers dig deeper into their feed bins, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

A few days of mild weather, aided by ample moisture, was the boost small grains and winter clovers needed to make growth. However, some areas near the coast are too boggy for cattle grazing, said director John E. Hutchison.

High wind and blowing dust in the plains and West Texas caused much small grain, already in poor condition, even more damage.

Much progress was made during the week in land preparation, except within generally 100 miles of the Gulf Coast. Chiseling and plowing has begun in the Panhandle, cotton farmers in the El Paso area are about finished with their plowing and some plowing was done in northeast and South Central Texas where fields were dry enough.

Livestock still is reported by district agricultural agents in generally good condition and feeding is general across the state. However, in the boggy coastal pastures some herds are in poor shape.

There's much ranch activity in addition to feeding herds as calving and lambing is moving north across the state, sheep are being tagged and goats are being sheared for mohair.

In deep East Texas where plant growth is reported best, cattlemen hope to be able to cut down on feeding in a few days.

Fruit trees began popping with blooms after unusually high temperatures early in the week, but orchard owners are skeptical as a late freeze would injure their trees and lower fruit possibilities.

Tomato seed are going into hotbeds as far north as counties along the Red River, and watermelon land as far north as Waller is prepared.

A few pine seedlings are still being planted as planting season nears its end.

Future Of Power Widow Uncertain

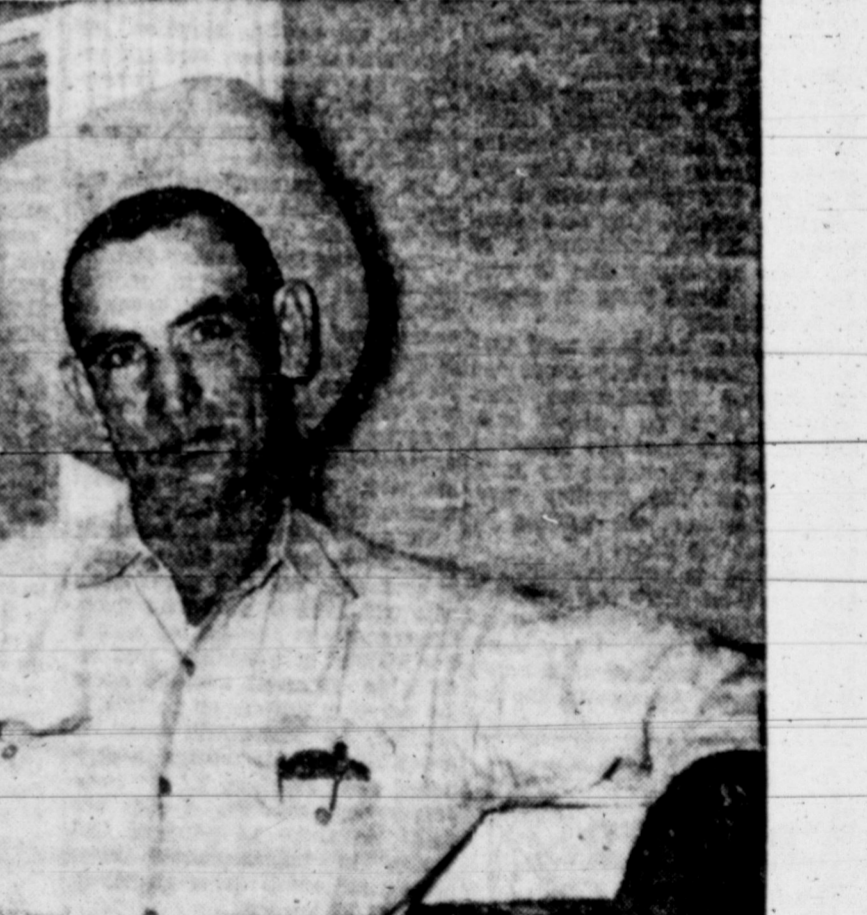
"I have to pick up the threads of my life. One must, I have always managed to roll with the punches and keep my feet on the ground. Sort of like a cat."
