Russians Grow Irrigated Cotton

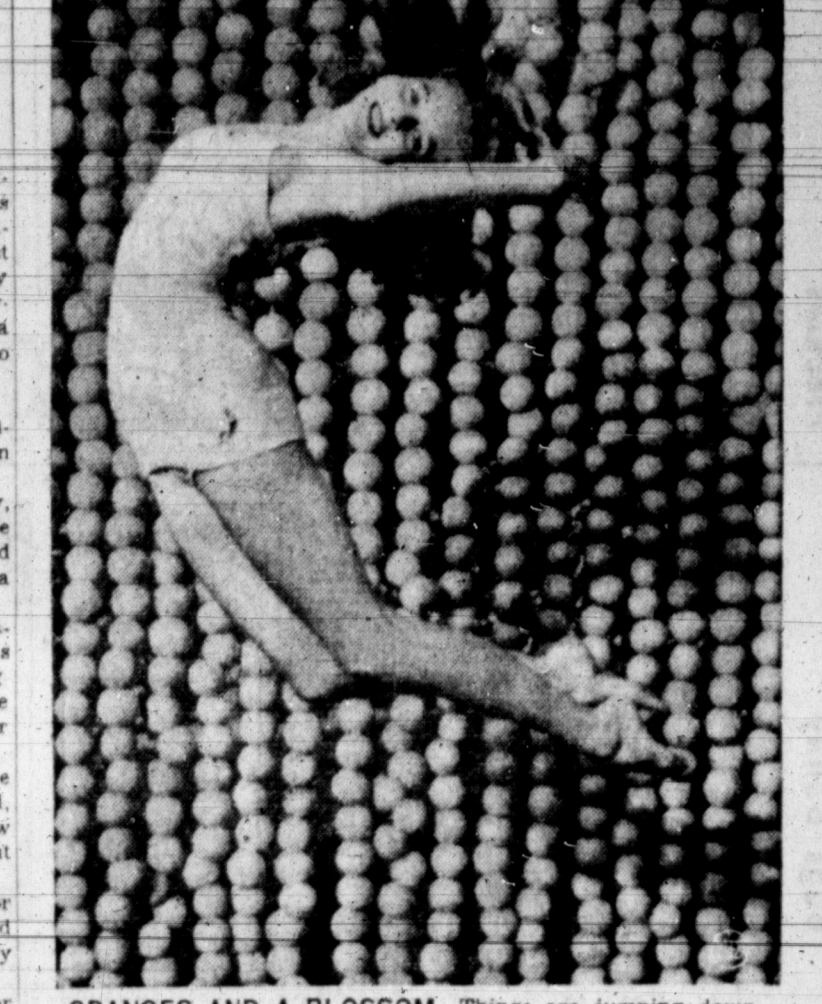
By GAYLORD P. GODWIN United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) — A six-man team of American cotton specialists which toured Russia last fall had three specific purposes in mind. The team, headed by Charles H. Barber of the Foreign Agricultural Service, wanted to find out (1) whether Russian cotton actually could be produced on a large scale in northern areas, (2) whether the Soviet government's goal of a 10-million bale crop could be reached by 1965, and (3) if the goal is reached, will the additional cotton be absorbed in the domestic market or exported? All of Russia's cotton is grown in a latitude of 38-42 degrees. The U.S. cotton belt is south of the 38th parallel. That means Russia's cotton is grown in an area located similarly to such cold climates as Connecticut, New Jersey, lower New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, northern Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho, southern Oregon, northern California, and northern Nevada.

The United States said that it did not propose to discuss in detail now the Russian proposal for a German peace conference. This was partly because U.S. views had been made plain before and partly because in its view neither politics nor insistence on the prior acceptance of any limitations on the means of reaching satisfactory solutions can be helpful. The United States noted that it had "repeatedly expressed its conviction that the continued division of Germany constitutes a danger to European security and world peace."

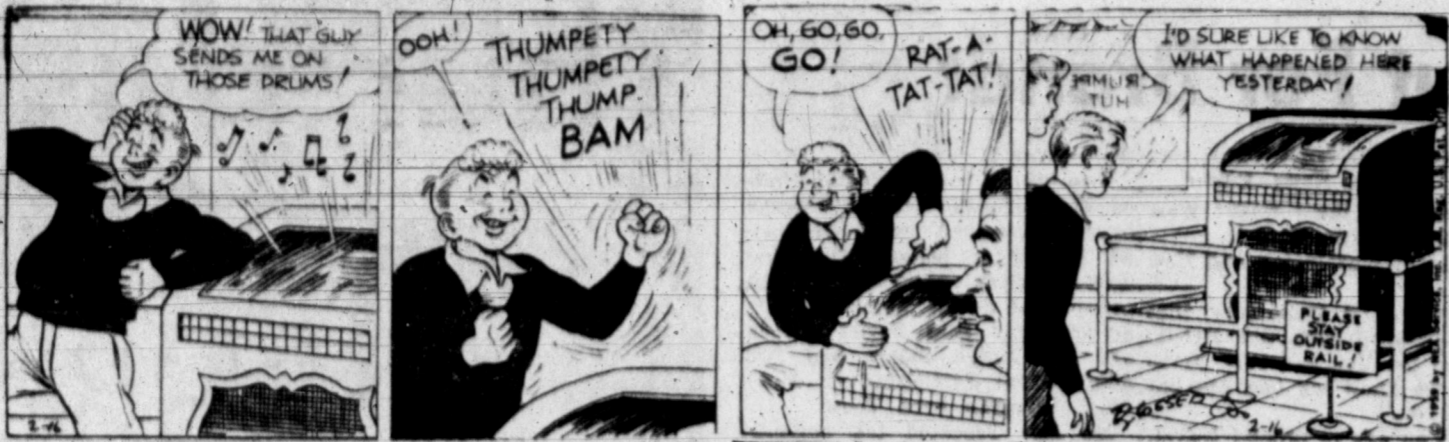

Sort of wearily, it seemed, McElroy nodded his head. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and our military man, didn't have to nod his head. He had his orders. He sits each day at McElroy's left hand, sometimes as a witness himself and sometimes as consultant to the boss. They have sweated out the questions so far of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee (one day); the Senate Armed Services Committee (two days); the Senate Combined Preparedness and Space Committee (one day); the House Appropriations Committee (four days); House Foreign Affairs Committee (one day); and the House Armed Services Committee (four days as of today, with the end not clearly in sight). An aide in McElroy's Pentagon office, who never sees the chief anymore, inquired plaintively the other day whether he could be reached at his "branch office" in the Capitol. Of course he can't. His office is his brief case, crammed with documents and (when he has time between appearances to prepare them) summary statements. Indians Mad At Slaphappy Sioux Brave

La Fontaine said he would ask Russia for bids on nine million acres of land in North Dakota, which he said the Indians owned. The U. S. government did not help his people. "They resent any action," she said, "which could conceivably cast reflection on their basic faith in the government of the United States."

Now 68 Years Old Gentleman-farmer Segni, who marked his 68th birthday Monday, is the father of Italy's agrarian reform, one of the great achievements of the postwar center regime. In the process of that reform, Segni gave up part of his own land on the island of Sardinia for distribution to poor peasants. A father of four and grandfather of a 4-year-old boy, Segni is a family man. During his term as premier in 1955-57 he became the target of trenchy jokes for his habit of flying back to his native Sardinia every week end. In his spare time, Segni still looks after the family farm in Isilo, Sardinia, and has managed to convince his Sardinian peasants to grow citrus fruits — no small achievement in the novelty-disturbing island. Some persons who do not know Segni closely consider him weak. But he commands widespread respect. Is Law Graduate His thin face, with silver hair, aristocratic features and sensitive eyes, is that of a scholar and of a man who believes in things. His career bears this out. Segni was born Feb. 2, 1891 in Sassari, Sardinia, of a land owning family, originating from the Italian Riviera. He graduated in law at Sassari University in 1918 and served as a university professor at Perugia in Central Italy from 1920 to 1925. Under the Fascist regime, Segni retired from politics and concentrated on teaching and farming. As early as 1942, when the Axis powers appeared at the peak of their fortune, Segni started working to rebuild an anti-Fascist Catholic Party under the name of "Christian Democracy." The in-
