

Malone Longs For Private Practice

The president of the American Bar Association likes his work, but he is anxious to get back to his own private practice in Roswell, N.M.

During his term as head of the ABA, Ross L. Malone, 48, has had time to handle only one case. It involved \$100 and was before a jury for four days.

"It concerned a group of ministers being sued for libel by another minister and I think a lot of principle was involved," he said.

Malone, a balding man with quick wit, has been sitting with the New Mexico delegation to the mid-winter meeting of the ABA in Chicago. He listens intently to every committee report and shakes hands with just about everyone passing by.

Malone said he has probably traveled more in the last six months than in his 26 years as

a lawyer. He has spoken in about 25 states and Mexico City and plans to appear in Alaska and Australia in the near future.

Appointed deputy U.S. attorney general in 1952, by ex-President Truman, Malone said his legal specialty, "if any," is in the field of oil and gas.

"I come from that part of the country," he explained simply.

Last year he toured Russia with a group of ABA representatives to get an understanding of the Soviet legal system. He attended several trials and came away with the impression that the rights of individuals were better protected than he had thought.

"However, this was true only when the government or the Communist Party was not involved in the case."

Malone received a law degree in 1932 from Washington and Lee University in Virginia and has practiced since then in Roswell, a town with about 35,000 population. During World War II, he was a naval intelligence officer and saw action in the battle of the Philippines. A highlight of his career is a case he argued before the U.S. Supreme Court in 1951. The case involved underground water rights and he represented the state of New Mexico.

His wife, Elizabeth, an airlines employe while he was in the Navy, makes all of his travel arrangements, and goes with him everywhere. They have no children.

"I've enjoyed my work with the ABA," he said, "but it's sure been tough on my law partners. I'll be glad to get back."

Ballet Had Real Chilly Atmosphere

MOSCOW (UPI)—The ballet "Romeo and Juliet" but the atmosphere was so chilly that N. S. Khrushchev and Harold Macmillan might have been watching "Swan Lake."

The British prime minister and the Soviet premier stared straight ahead through Wednesday night's performance, looking only at the famed Bolshoi dancers and exchanging no remarks.

They so completely ignored each other that Khrushchev was sent from their red velvet-covered box for an entire scene. Khrushchev also left the box because Macmillan did at each of the three intermissions, leaving his seat applauding by himself.

Macmillan and other Britons present were popular with the Russian audience which craned a neck to see the visitors. At the end of the performance in the air-conditioned theater the audience stood and applauded Macmillan.

Macmillan smiled, waved, and finally according to Russian tradition but with hesitant British reserve, applauded the audience.

The evening began pleasantly enough. The Russians rolled out red carpet in front of the theater in the heart of the city and facilitated Khrushchev and their foreign ministers, Selwyn Lloyd and Andrei Gromyko, were led to large box in the center.

The audience in the 150-year-old theater rose and applauded for several minutes while Macmillan and Khrushchev waved and smiled. The orchestra played the national anthems of both countries.

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Dulles Hopes To Resume His Work

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Administration officials said today that Dulles is taking a greater part in foreign policy each day and shows every intention of resuming his post full-time if at all possible.

The secretary, under massive radiation treatment for cancer, gave dramatic evidence of his increased participation when he summoned his top aides to Walter Reed Army Medical Center late Thursday for a strategy conference on Berlin.

Officials said Dulles, who was found to have a recurrence of cancer when he underwent a hernia operation Feb. 13, began last Sunday to show strong signs of wanting to get back on the job.

That was the day he conferred at length with Vice President Richard M. Nixon and with his brother, Allen W. Dulles, director of the Central Intelligence Agency. They discussed Russian threats to Berlin and German and Allied preparations.

Summoned by Dulles to meet with him in his hospital suite for an hour Thursday were Acting Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Deputy Undersecretary Robert Murphy, Assistant Secretary for European Affairs Livingston T. Merchant and Joseph N. Greene, Dulles' personal assistant.

They said the Dulles conference was not dictated by any imminent crisis but was a general strategy session.

Russia Expected To Sign Treaty With Germany

BONN, Germany (UPI)—Western diplomats predicted today the Soviet union would sign a separate peace treaty next month with Communist East Germany.

The oft-threatened action would give the Communist regime additional authority — on paper, at least — to assert control over Western supply routes to West Berlin on May 27.

It also would be a major advantage in the Soviet campaign to win recognition internationally for the East German regime and to bring about formal negotiations between it and the West German government leading to a confederation of the two.

Walter Ulbricht, East German deputy premier and Communist Party chief, told UPI in an interview recently the Communists would demand one half the seats in the controlling congress of such a confederation although East Germany's population is only one-third that of West Germany.

The Soviets and their East German satellite always have warned they would conclude a separate peace treaty if the Western powers did not participate.

Signing of a separate Soviet-East German peace treaty would, in the eyes of the Communists, make East Germany's borders the official borders of Germany. This would strengthen the Communists' "legal" position in event the Western military ignores East German control officers on highways leading to West Berlin.

Jupiter Rocket Firing is Success

By RICHARD F. ROPER United Press International CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—The Army successfully fired another workhorse Jupiter on a routine test flight early today and then turned its attention to the new moon rocket it has assembled 150 yards away.

The Jupiter's flight of less than its full 4,700-mile range set the stage for blastoff of the Army's second space probe, expected some time this weekend. The Jupiter will again be used as the Army moon rocket booster.

Today's Jupiter test was the first in which Air Force troops have participated. About 19 Air Force rocketeers, trained by the Army at its Huntsville, Ala., missile center, helped launch the 50-ton weapon at 12:49 a.m. e.s.t.

The Defense Department said two hours later that the flight was successful. A spokesman said the firing was a test of the Chrysler-made Jupiter's nose cone, warhead, engine, and fusing system.

The new moon rocket, a four-stage vehicle with a 13-pound payload mounted atop it, will follow the trail through space blazed by Russia's Lunik if everything works properly. The 3,200-pound Lunik, according to the Russians, skimmed past the moon and went into orbit around the sun.

The Army's first moon rocket, fired last Dec. 6, failed to attain the 25,200 miles an hour speed needed to boost the Pioneer III payload past the moon because

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Daniel Designates 4-H Week In Texas

Wheat Surplus Gets Bigger

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department today estimated the wheat carryover on July 1 will rise to a record 1,285,000,000 bushels, and will shoot up another 200 million bushels next year.

The department's publication, "The Wheat Situation," accounted for the carryover increase by July 1, 1960, by assuming a 1959-60 crop of 1,210,000,000 bushels, imports of about 8,000,000 bushels, and domestic and foreign consumption of 1,025,000,000 bushels.

The department said wheat and wheat flour exports this year are running heavier than expected earlier. The total for 1958-59 is expected to reach 450 million bushels, about 48 million bushels above last year but far short of the 1956-57 record of 550 million bushels.

The use of wheat for food and feed is increasing this year, the department said. It estimated total domestic consumption at 619 million bushels compared with 587,500,000 bushels last year.

Per capita consumption of wheat in 1958, after declining every year since 1946, was unchanged from a year earlier at 167 pounds. This is only a little more than half the 315 pounds consumed a half century ago. In 1945, the wheat consumption per person was 230 pounds.

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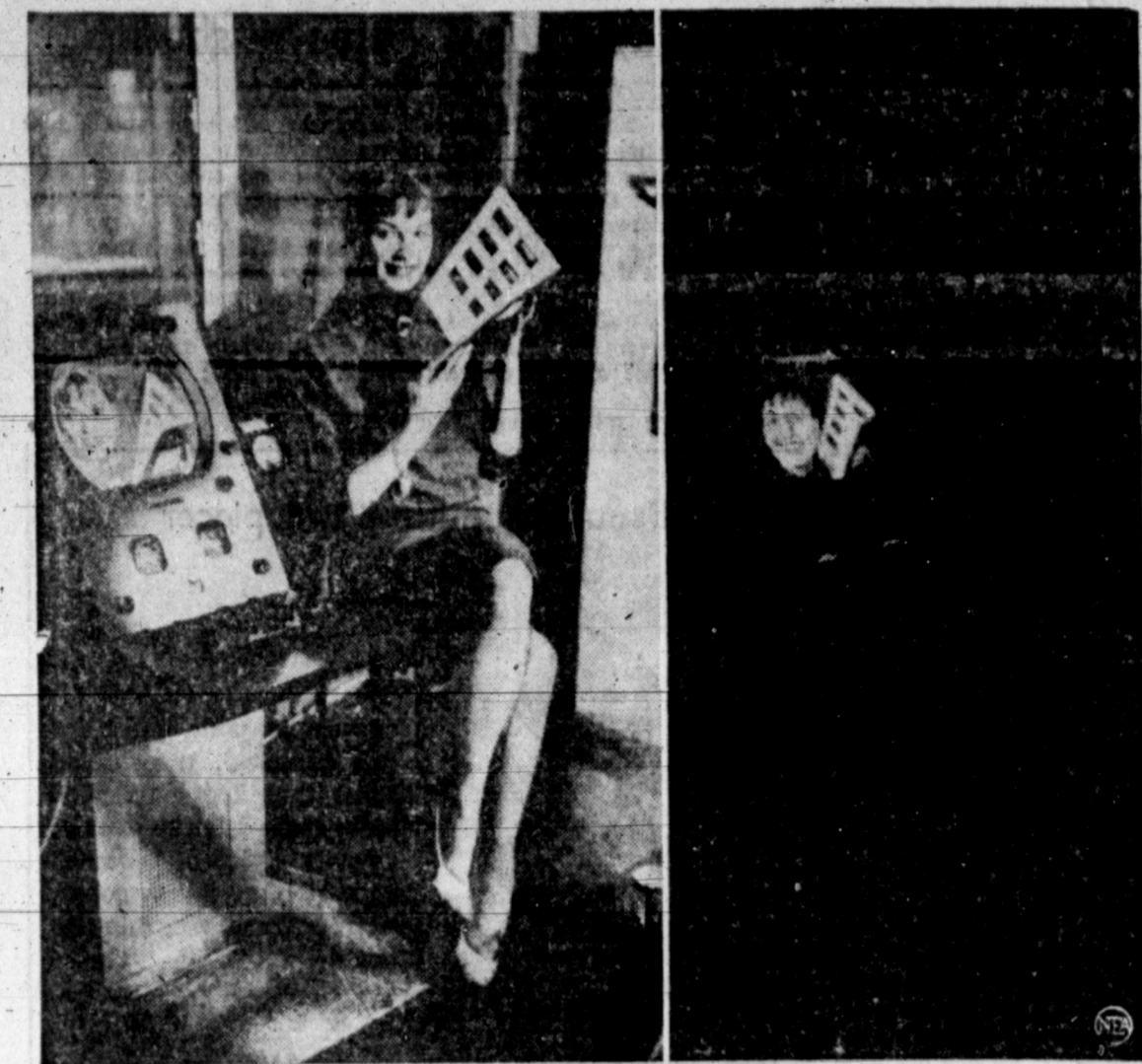

The tube is far more sensitive than the human eye, or even the human eye aided by night binoculars. This is a new electronic approach differing from infrared rays. Potential uses are varied. Militarily, it could enable submarines to see much better ahead and below the bow when submerged, or permit trucks and tanks to travel without revealing themselves with headlights. Its use will be confined to closed-circuit television.

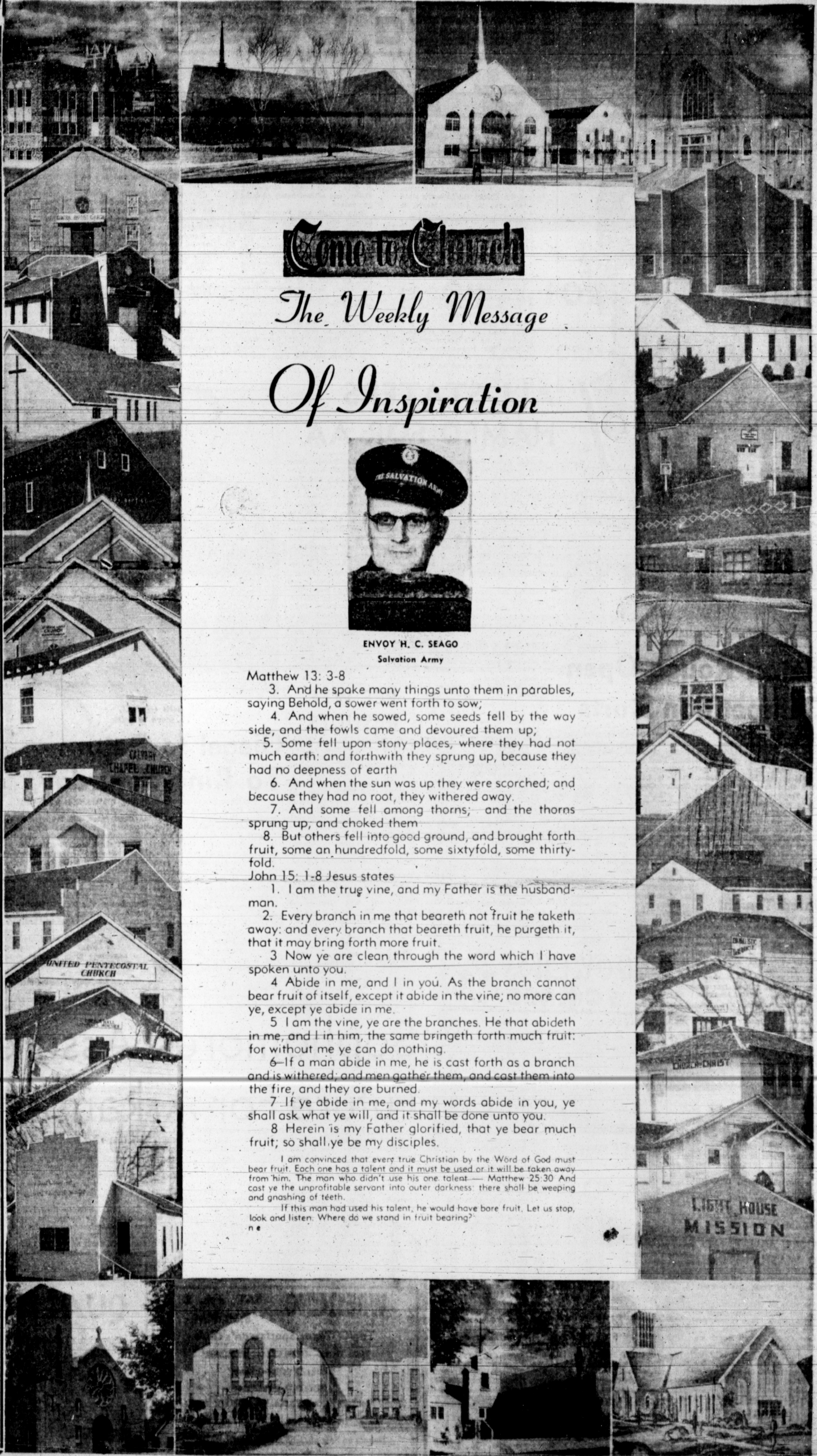

The man who didn't use his one talent — Matthew 25:30 And cast ye the unprofitable servant into outer darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

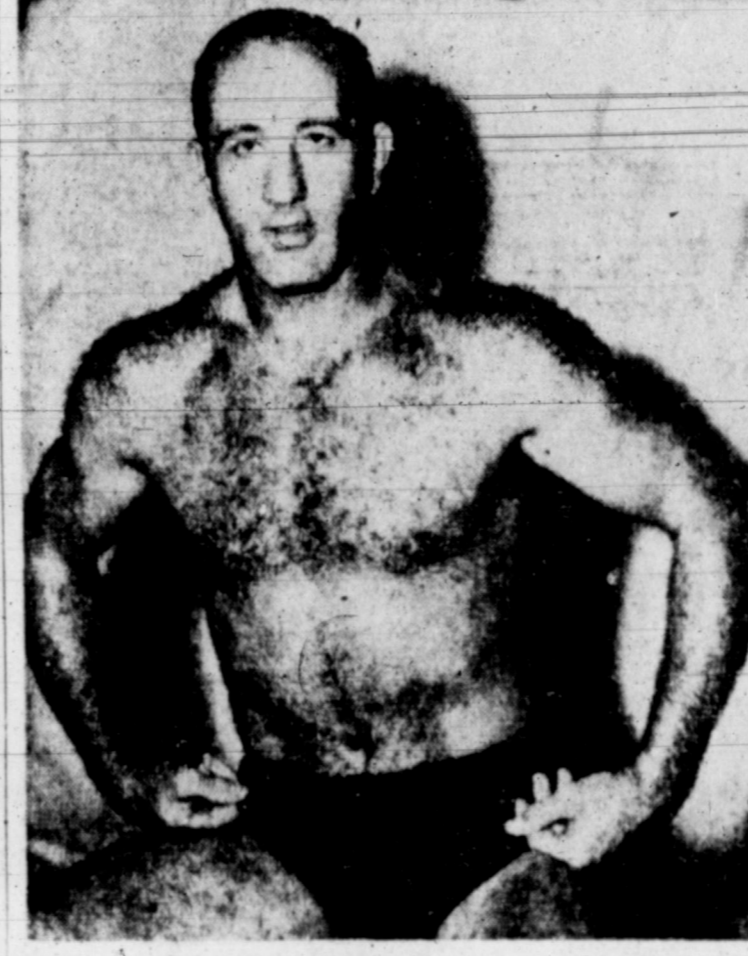

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MANY NEW FACES SEEN IN ACADEMY AWARD ENTRIES

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — They're off and running in the Oscar derby with the preponderance of entries charging out of the starting gate for the first time.
Never before, have so many new faces appeared in the nominations.
Eleven of the acting nominees find this their maiden race. There are eight veterans going again, and one old war horse, Spencer Tracy, a two-time winner, is the only major Oscar holder in the field.
Running against him for the golden statuette are three young comers — Tony Curtis, Paul Newman and Sidney Poitier — and veteran David Niven.

French Discuss Russian Rejection

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle called his cabinet into session Tuesday to discuss Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's abrupt rejection of the Western offer to hold East-West foreign ministers talks on Berlin.
The session originally planned to discuss French political and economic problems but turned instead to the blistering "nyet" Khrushchev delivered Tuesday to a political rally in Moscow.
Khrushchev's speech was the dominant topic of conversation at a huge diplomatic reception given Tuesday night by de Gaulle at his Elysee Palace residence. It was attended by more than 250 high-ranking diplomats and French leaders, including Premier Michel Debre.
Many guests at the reception voiced deep concern over the uncompromising stand taken by Khrushchev. Earlier, French officials sources gave the Khrushchev outburst a cool reception and this too was discussed at the reception.
A Foreign Ministry spokesman said, "We are surprised that this speech was delivered while (British Prime Minister Harold) Macmillan was in Moscow, but we are not surprised at its content."
One Paris diplomat described the Soviet bluff as "unprecedented in the annals of East-West diplomacy."
Most French newspapers greeted the Khrushchev speech grimly and called anew for strengthening of the Western alliance in the face of the Soviet stands.

Niven and Hayward favored Morning line favorites in the top handicap races for best actor and best actress awards are David Niven and Susan Hayward.
So how do the rail birds pick these two?
Inasmuch as Tracy has collected two Oscars and because he generally is agreed he has turned in better performances than in "The Old Man And The Sea," he is unlikely to garner much sentimental hailing.

Liz Hurt By Romance
