Buckler Is Lauded For School Work

Dr. Joe Donaldson and C. P. Buckler were the principal figures at the weekly meeting of the Pampa Noon Lions Club Thursday. Dr. Donaldson spoke on free enterprise, after which Buckler re. ceived a plaque commemorating his service to public school education in Pampa.

Tearing into socialism, Dr. Doraldson asked, "What is the source of this collectivistic danger?? He said that the American people get what they want when they allow Congress to pass socialist legisla-

"We have pinned our hopes and belief on free enterprise and it's naid off " the speaker declared. "The government's function is law and order and settling disputes. This government favoritism that started during the Depression has no end. We're asking the government to do things for us that we ought to be doing for ourselves.

Donaldson blasted the "cradle to the grave philosophy" that expects the government to take care of us. The American way, he pointed out, is to pay a man for what he does rather than force

The American People's ignorance of industrial facts is partly at fault for creeping socialism, he government regulation (but not







Daily News Sports Editor Pampa's Harvesters and Odessa's Bronchos lock horns Saturday at 8 p.m. in a battle of unbeaten teams. The game, to be played in Harvester Field House, will decide the regional championship, and the winner will go to the state tournament in Austin, March 5-

Onessa mas a winning streak of 29 games, all this year. Pampa has won 41 in a row - 28 this season and 13 last year. The Harvesters, defending state champions, will be shooting for their sixth trip to the state fournament in

The Harvesters have won three state championships under Coach Chitton McNeely, in 1953, '54, and '58. McNeely's teams have won an even 300 games.

The short but potent Bronchos appear to be the major obstacle between the Harvesters and a fourth state title. The two teams,

should give Pampa an advantage. The Harvesters have not lost at home since the spring of 1957.

Shooting Percentages Both teams have a great offense, a fine defense, balance among the starters, outstanding rebounding ability, and a tremendous shooting

percentage. Both Odessa and Pampa won handily over their bi-district opponents. The Harvesters walloped Wichita Falls Tuesday night, 57-37: and the Bronchos thumped El Paso Bowie, 68-55.

Over the full season, Odessa has outscored its opponents 2032 to 1531, an average of 70 to 53. The Harvesters have outscored their opponents 1877 to 1351, an average of 66 to 49.

From the floor, the Harvesters have outshot the Bronchos, percentage-wise, 50.8 to 46.5, but most of Odessa's shots were from the outside. From the free throw line Pampa has the edge, 71.3 to

Pampa, Odessa Clash Saturday

Every starter on both teams is above the 200 mark in scoring. Odessa's too scorers, Jack White and Don Brownleee, are ahead of Pampa's number one and two men, Coyle Winborn and Mack Lavne.

Through the regular season, White scored 559 points and Brownlee 413. Winborn tallied 481 and Layne 378. White, Brownlee, and Winborn are all - state candidates.

Winborn and Brownlee are considered the most valuable men on their respective teams. Both are great all-around ball players, as well as good scorers. Brownlee is the field general of his team. Winborn is considered one of the best players ever produced by Pampa. Pampa Is Taller

The Harvesters have a three inch height advantage over the Bronchos, averaging 6-3 to Odessa's 6-0, but the Bronchos have given away height many times this season and still controlled the

other departments. Three men on each team have snagged more then 200 off the boards.

The offense and defense of both teams are similar, with slight variations. Both are deadly on the fast break, but both can also work the ball in for a shot if necessary. Both use primarily a zone defense. Their main difference is that Odessa shoots mostly jump and set shots from outside, while Pampa fires from both outside and under the basket, with equal effectiveness.

Both teams use their reserves very sparingly, but both have a couple of very capable substitutes. For the Bronchos, they are Audie Cox, 5-9, who has scored 80 points; and Larry Glast, 5-8, who. has scored 44. For the Harvesters, it is Joe Timms, 5-11, who has tallied 78 points; and Phillip Gist. 5-11, who has netted 64.

Against common foes, it's the same story as in just about everything else - both have done terey 75-59; Lubbock, 74-61; Amarillo, 68-47; Tascosa, 59-31; and San Angelo, 72-64 and 73-55.
