## Family Rescued From Cold Gulf

CORPUS CHRISTI (UPI) — Physicians feared today that the three children of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Schmidt are contracting pneumonia from the three-and-a-half days they spent on a buoy in the cold Gulf of Mexico with only half a can of milk and a can of baby food to eat.

The children are Leslie Jr., three; Linda Lee, two and Cheryl, 10 months old. Schmidt, 23, is a fisherman. His wife, Sara, is 22. Their 26-foot boat "fell apart," as Schmidt put it, in the rough seas Wednesday while they were trying to get home from Port Mansfield, Tex.

Schmidt managed to get his wife and children into the battery box of a buoy seven miles off Corpus Christi. The box is just big enough to hold 12 batteries about the size of automobile batteries that keep a light going on the buoy.

**Heard Planes**  
Mrs. Schmidt burned her hip badly on liquid leaking from the batteries. A shrimp boat found them Saturday and brought them to nearby Aransas Pass, where they were put to bed in a hospital.

The conditions of Schmidt and his wife were fair to good. Schmidt said they could hear planes flying over them as they huddled, cold and hungry, in the battery box. But they couldn't see the planes for the fog and the planes couldn't see them.

A boat passed 100 yards away for two mornings, but they couldn't see it for the fog.

**Boat Breaks Up**  
Schmidt said that just before the boat broke apart, he got on the buoy with a rope. He tied the boat to the buoy and changed places.

# ANGRY MOBS RIOT IN BEIRUT

## Streetcars Are Burned; Fights Rage

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Inflamed pro-Nasser mobs rampaged through the streets of Beirut Sunday, burning streetcars and battling with rival groups in a riotous climax to the city's celebration of the first anniversary of the United Arab Republic.

Lebanese army troops and police dispersed the brawlers and sealed off the Muslim and Christian quarters to prevent the fighting from spreading.

It was the first incident to mark the U.A.R. anniversary celebrations in Lebanon as well as the first major outbreak in Beirut since the end of the civil strife last fall.

At least two persons were injured in the fighting. Both were members of the pro-Western Christian Falangist Party.

**Anti-Nasser Slogans**  
The fighting was touched off when Christian Falangist youths scrawled anti-Nasser slogans on street cars passing through the Muslim Basta quarters where the population was celebrating the merger of Syria and Egypt under President Gamal Abdel Nasser.

Crowds of Nasser supporters angered by the slogans ordered the passengers out of the streetcars, and then smashed the windows, ripped out the seats and set them afire. Two double cars were burned and battered and a single car was badly damaged before police could move in.

Angry pro-Nasser backers then surged down the quarter's main street to find the slogan scrawlers. The rival groups clashed along the city's main square in a quick flurry of fistfights.

**Troops Help Police**  
The Lebanese army rushed in seven truckloads of troops to assist police in dispersing the rival gangs apart and prevent the outbreak from exploding into wider violence.

Soldiers with rifles slung over their backs sealed off the entrances to the Basta and to the Christian sector of Ash Rafieh across town as a precautionary measure.

# Reds, British Seek Pact

## Cultural Affairs Treaty Is Sought By Macmillian

MOSCOW (UPI)—Russia and Britain agreed today to begin work on a new cultural affairs treaty linking the two nations.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev decided at their first formal conference to put the job of writing a cultural

agreement in the hands of a special committee, authoritative sources said.

Creation of the committee was the first concrete result of Macmillian's summit visit to Moscow. The two leaders conferred for two hours and 25 minutes.

The London Daily Mail said Macmillan told Khrushchev in informal talks over the weekend that Britain is ready to sign a non-aggression treaty with Russia if he finds it would help ease East-West tension.

# Iranian Officials Ignore Red Threats

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)—Iranian officials refused today to be intimidated by Soviet threats of retaliation if Iran signs a military agreement with the United States.

Soviet Ambassador Nikolai Pegov said Sunday Iran would "definitely become our enemy" if it went ahead and signed such a pact with Washington.

Iranian officials appeared unruffled by the Soviet threats.

Premier Manusher Eghbal told United Press International that "we are not afraid of any threats."

He took a bundle of papers which he said were the texts of Radio Moscow tirades against Iran from a tray labeled "incoming" and dropped them unopened into one marked "outgoing."

**Reds 'Sadly Mistaken'**  
"You see, I haven't got time to read a single word of this abuse against us," he said with a smile.

Pegov lashed out at Iran in an exclusive interview. His statement followed Moscow charges that Iran proposed a non-aggression treaty with Russia then backed out because of U. S. influence.

"Iran's rulers have openly insulted Premier Nikita Khrushchev and the Soviet people," Pegov said.

"The Shah's government invited a top Soviet delegation to Tehran to sign an agreement entirely prepared by Iran but when Deputy Foreign Minister Vladimir Simoni arrived here they refused to sign it."

There was no official confirmation available either in London or Moscow.

An official Soviet news agency Tass report on the opening session of the formal Anglo-Soviet talks said "A review was continued of questions of mutual interest."

Macmillian showed up for his meeting with Khrushchev wearing the foot-high white fur hat he wore on his arrival in Moscow and which delighted Muscovites. He also wore a borrowed fur coat.

**Informal Talks Sunday**  
The talks were held in the cabinet room of the great Kremlin palace. Portraits of Stalin and Lenin looked down from the walls.

Both sides apparently were fully aware of the others' thinking on international issues.

A British spokesman said Macmillian "gave a full explanation of Western thinking on the Soviet Union and its policy" to Khrushchev at their informal talks outside of Moscow Sunday.

Khrushchev spoke extensively on what the Soviet government thinks of the West and Western policy, he added.

The opening of the little summit talks in the Kremlin coincided with the 41st anniversary of the Soviet army and navy. The official Communist Party newspaper Pravda used the occasion to warn the West against "starting a war."

It also criticized the agreement reached on Cyprus last week by Britain, Turkey and Greece.

The British and Soviet premiers spent more than three hours in informal talks at the dacha in snow-covered Semonovskaya village. Details of the talks or the subjects covered were not disclosed.

**Guest At Dacha**

**Oklahoma Pair Are Jailed Here**

Miss Stephens was charged with passing a worthless \$30 check at the IGA market Jan. 24. Sheriff Rufe Jordan said she is suspected of passing at least 11 worthless checks totaling \$165.

# Demos Demanding Dulles Replacement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House said today that Democrats demanding the replacement of alling Secretary of State John Foster Dulles are just trying to get their names in the newspapers.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty dismissed the statements as so much publicly seeking. He said in answer to a question that "it is remarkable what people will say to get their names in the newspapers."

Hagerty said this was his own reaction to the Symington and Humphrey statements but that the President was aware of them.

"He is also aware of the many other members of the Senate from both parties who say we should avail ourselves of Dulles' services," Hagerty said.

Eisenhower, meanwhile, spent more than an hour with Acting Secretary of State Christian A. Herter. Hagerty said the meeting dealt with a broad range of State Department matters.

After meeting with Herter, the President discussed with Herter the President's third visit to the hospital since he went a hernia operation which disclosed the recurrence of cancer.

Sens. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) and Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) called for the President to name a successor to Dulles at once. But Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.), John J. Sparkman (D-Ala.) and Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), said Eisenhower

should wait.

Despite his illness, Dulles continued to keep his hand in foreign affairs. He conferred for 45 minutes Sunday with Vice President Richard M. Nixon on the Berlin problem.

The secretary's brother, Allen W. Dulles, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, also called at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center to give him a briefing on the world situation.

Physicians treating Dulles were encouraged by the fact that he has shown no adverse reaction to radiation therapy. The treatment, summed today after a one-day lapse.

Quentin Williams, a Pampa realtor, is in Austin today attending a meeting of the Texas Industrial Commission advisory board. The board is to have a special meeting tonight with the legislature to discuss proposed legislation intended to help carry out provisions of Amendment No. 7 which was approved in the general election last November.

# Safecrackers Confess To Pulling Jobs

Warren Ellis, 36, and Keith Duree, 28, charged last Wednesday with burglary following two safecrackings in Pampa, have confessed to both safecrackings and will likely go before the Gray county grand jury Friday. Sheriff Rufe Jordan reported this morning.

Duree, under questioning in recent days, has also confessed to burglarizing the Dr. Pepper bottling plant Feb. 7.

Meanwhile Sheriff Jordan has begun a search for a pair of black engineers' boots and a four-pound hammer, used by Ellis and Duree in safecrackings at the Pampa Lumber Co. and the Coeg-Cola plant.

Duree said they "dipped" the boots and hammer just outside Pampa. They pointed out the spot but neither the boots nor hammer were found.

The boots are described as having rigid cord laces. They were specially-made for LeVines store and are about one-month old. Jordan believes they were probably found by someone passing through Pampa.

World-famous since its founding in 1498, six years after Columbus discovered America, the Choir has become known to a wider audience than ever during the past three seasons with their appearances in "Operama," on the Ford Foundation's "Omnibus" or NBC-TV's Christmas Eve program, and on the Perry Como Show. Two years ago on New Year's Eve the boys made a surprise appearance in the Metropolitan Opera's Gala Performance of "Eldermaid."

Performing only for the Austrian Imperial Court until the end of the Empire in 1918, the historic Seminary School, which trains the youngsters, found it necessary to fall back on itself for support at the end of World War I, and public concerts were inaugurated in 1926. Under Hurok's aegis, their finely-trained groups have been visiting the U.S. off-and-on since 1932.

The Choir was disbanded during World War II, when the late Father Josef Schmitt, director of the group, refused to allow the Choir to be used for Nazi propaganda. With the end of hostilities, the Choir was reorganized and returned to the U.S. in 1945.

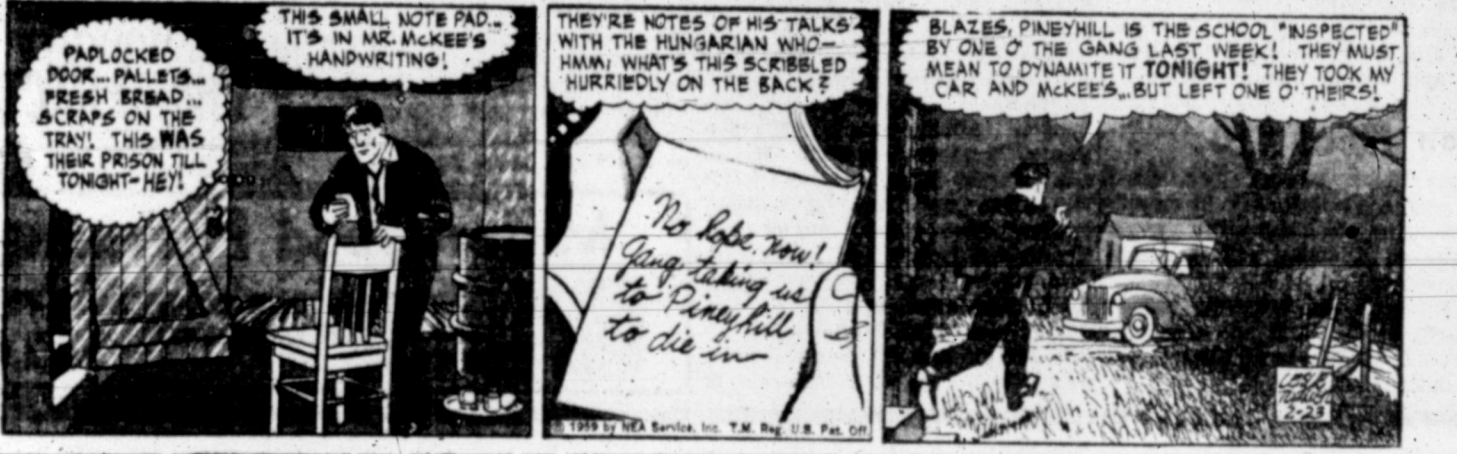

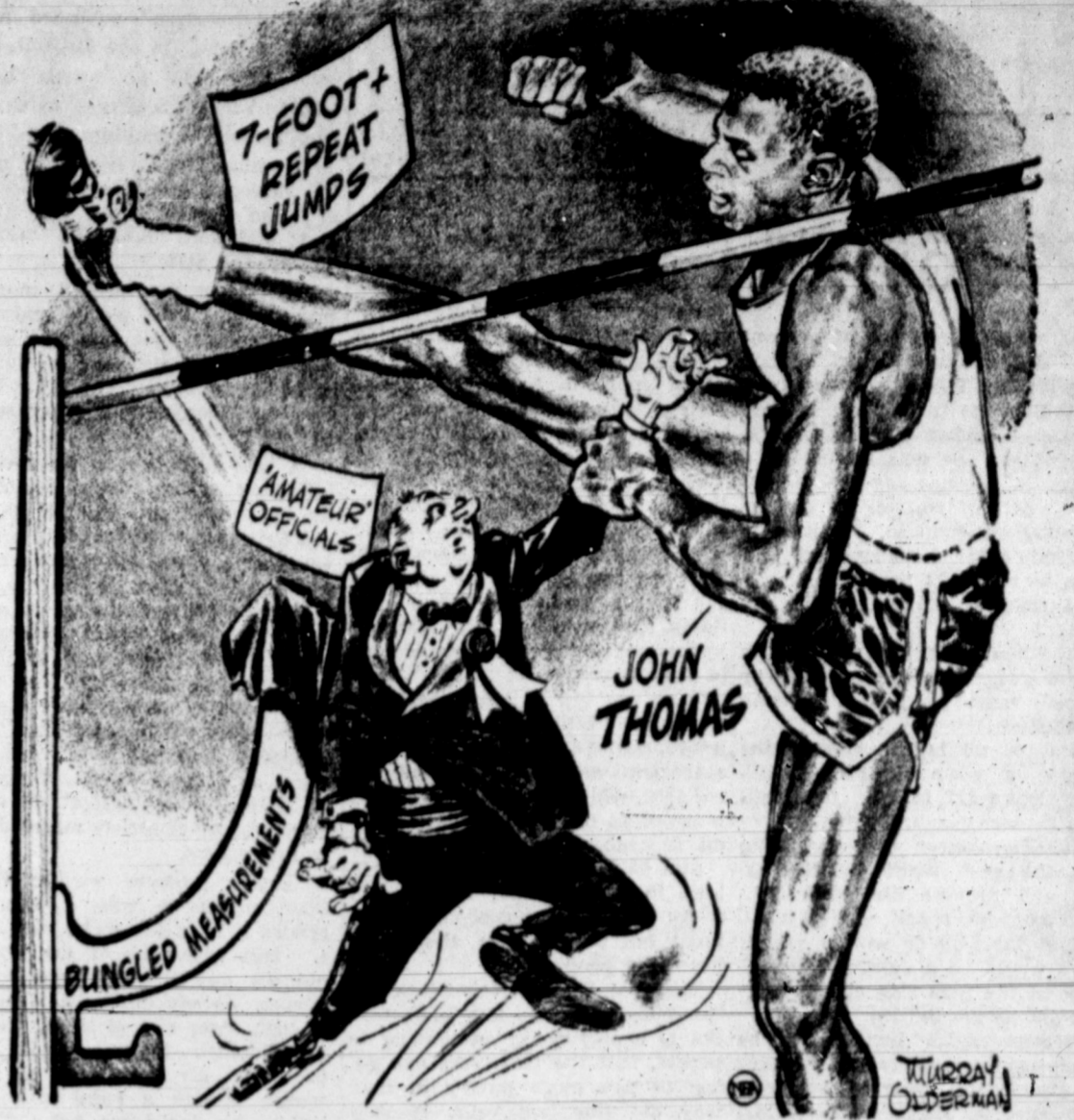

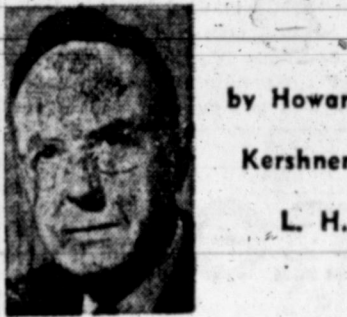

## Living Costs Up, Says Government

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Living costs crept upward slightly in January but remained below the all-time high, the government has reported.

Higher prices for beef, veal and poultry outweighed decreases for fresh fruits, pork, coffee, eggs and milk, resulting in a slight overall increase for the month.

The Labor Department said its consumer price index, based on 1947-49 price average as 100, edged up .1 per cent from December.

The January index reading of 122.8 was below the record 123.9 posted last July and again in November.

Government officials have said living costs now are relatively stable and will continue to show stability in the coming months.

In the past nine months, living costs have fluctuated within a range of 2 per cent.

Ewan Clague, the government's No. 1 price expert, said this was "the longest period of narrow stability" of the 19 years in which the government has been making its monthly price report.

A factory worker with three dependents took home \$74.70 last month compared with \$74.37 a year earlier. But January takes home pay was less than in December because of a seasonal cutback in hours and because of the Jan. 1 increase in social security taxes.

The price report meant a penny an-hour increase for 82,000 aircraft workers. There was no change in the wages of 1,250,000 auto workers, however.

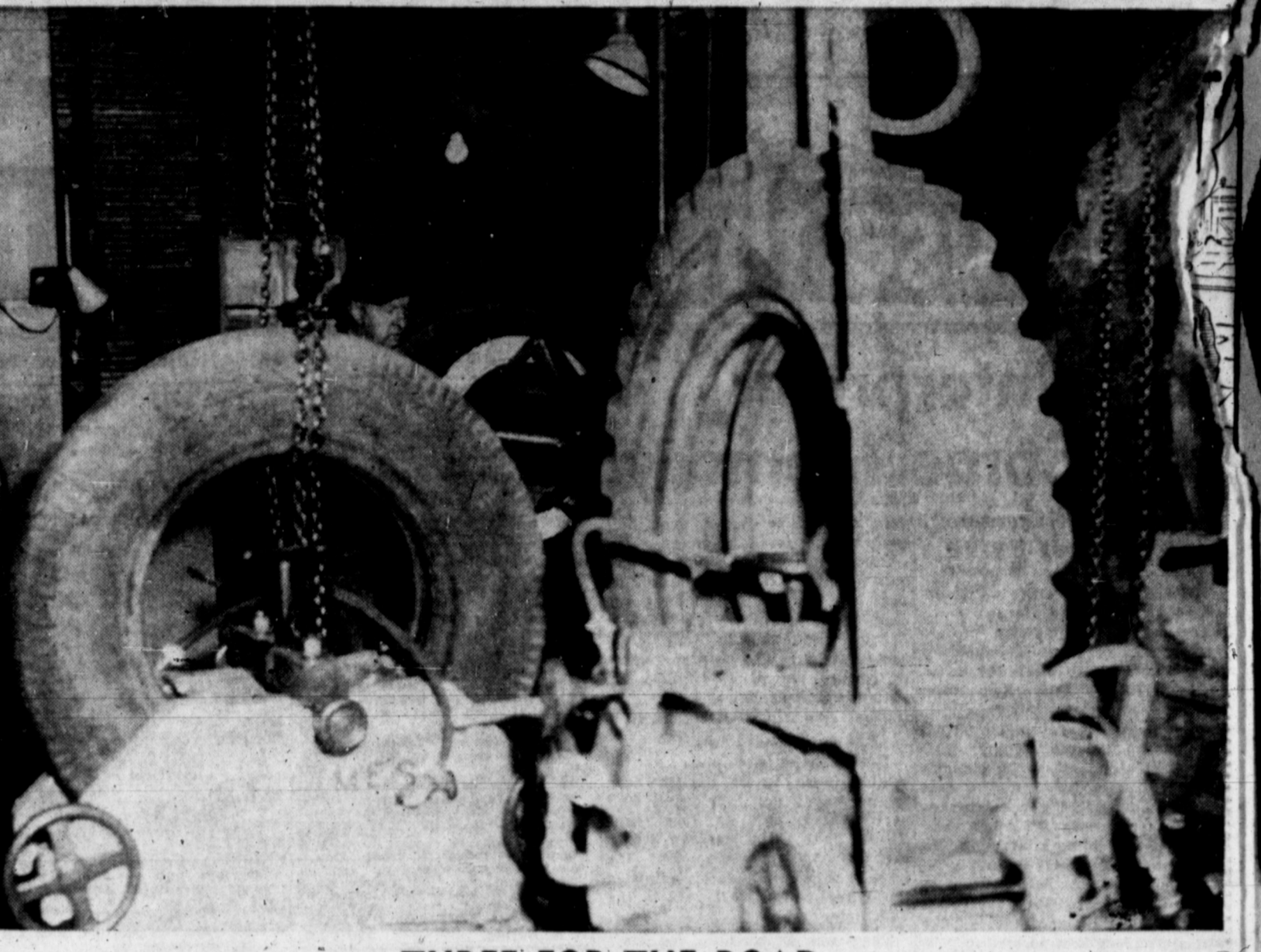

## Cyprus Face To Face With Last Of Its Conquerors

(Foreign News Commentary)

The man of the week, Greek Orthodox Archbishop Makarios of Cyprus.

The place: London.

The quote: "I am entering the conference with an open mind and with the utmost goodwill and friendliness."

This is an era of an accelerating rush to independence by formerly dependent peoples. And in the case of the Mediterranean island of Cyprus, it is a desire for self-rule that goes back almost 4,000 years.

In recent years, that desire has been epitomized in the person of Makarios III, archbishop and ethnarch or elected national leader of Cyprus.

His feelings on the subject have been summed up time and again in the view that "Cyprus belongs to no one but its own people. And that people is demanding the right to decide its own future."

It was with that attitude that he arrived in London last week to take part in the critical conference on the future of his country.

**No Mood For Compromise**

The Greek and Turkish governments had worked out an agreement in Zurich, Switzerland, the week before. Britain endorsed this plan.

To put the final seal of approval on the arrangement, Archbishop Makarios, spiritual and political leader of the Greek Cypriot community, and Dr. F. J. Kutchuk, head of the Turkish Cypriots, were invited to the British capital. Of these, the views of Makarios were the most critical.

He was not in a mood for compromise and was reported to odds with some aspects of the Zurich arrangement which some Greek Cypriot circles regarded as a "constitutional monstrosity."

But he was satisfied with modifications in the plan.

For Makarios, there could be only one future — an independent and sovereign Cyprus state, without any infringements on that sovereignty.

That was the logical culmination of his long fight in a campaign that saw him defy the might of Britain and wind up in exile, only to be freed slightly more than a year later and then carry his fight to the United Nations and world public opinion.

"Makarios is a crusader, but he is not a zealot. He considers his dual role of ecclesiastic and national leader a temporary one. With independence for Cyprus, he has said he will devote all his efforts to his church duties alone."

**Ran Away From Home**

He was born of peasant parents in the mountain village of Anopolis in the mountain village of Anopolis in the mountain village of Anopolis in the mountain village of Anopolis.

At 35 he became bishop of Kyrenia, and two years later he was elected archbishop of Cyprus and took the title of Makarios III.

By that time, he had already started leading the Greek Cypriots of whom there are four for every one Turkish Cypriot on the island — in their latest fight for independence and apparent desire for enosis, or union with Greece.

He took his plea to the British, to Athens and to the U. N. — all without success. Then EOKA, the underground Greek Cypriot — Direct action organization, added the element of terror to the picture. When Makarios refused to repudiate its methods, the British denounced his condoning of violence. He was accused of "terrorist plotting" and of being an accessory to conspiracy to murder.

## Living Costs Up, Says Government

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Higher prices for beef, veal and poultry outweighed decreases for fresh fruits, pork, coffee, eggs and milk, resulting in a slight overall increase for the month.

The Labor Department said its consumer price index, based on 1947-49 price average as 100, edged up .1 per cent from December.

The January index reading of 122.8 was below the record 123.9 posted last July and again in November.

Government officials have said living costs now are relatively stable and will continue to show stability in the coming months.

In the past nine months, living costs have fluctuated within a range of 2 per cent.

Ewan Clague, the government's No. 1 price expert, said this was "the longest period of narrow stability" of the 19 years in which the government has been making its monthly price report.

A factory worker with three dependents took home \$74.70 last month compared with \$74.37 a year earlier. But January takes home pay was less than in December because of a seasonal cutback in hours and because of the Jan. 1 increase in social security taxes.

The price report meant a penny an-hour increase for 82,000 aircraft workers. There was no change in the wages of 1,250,000 auto workers, however.

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
