SILVER LAKE, Minn. (UPI)-Authorities today admitted they have hit a dead end in their search for a contractor who vanished Dec. 30 with his wife and five small children, leaving behind a pile of debts. -

The combination - type lock was knocked off with a hammer and chisel. Although \$300 was lost, about \$265 in cash in a pile of brown envelopes was

Sheriff Jordan said \$60 of the money taken was "coffee money" placed in a pot inside the safe. Most of the loss, \$240,. was in \$20 bills.

The safe-cracking was not discovered until about 9:45 this morning when plant manager Robert Mack reported for work. Mack said the safe was cracked open sometime between Saturday evening and

## Western Unit Resolves To Stay Put In Berlin

BY DAYTON MOORE United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today the Western Allies have resolved to stay in Berlin and have reached general agreement on a plan of action against any new Soviet blockade.

Dulles made the statement on his return from Europe where he conferred with British, French and West German leaders on the German problem and the Russian threat to turn over control of Berlin to the East German Reds on

May 27. Shortly before Dulles' return, the British governmentannounced complete support for his earlier statement that the West will make no concessions to the Russians without counter-concessions. A foreign Office spokesman declared

51st cause I do not believe there is as ianism. Libertarianism has become distorted to mean liberalism o. other people's money. My contention was that I believed in unlimited voluntary ex-

changes. Some of the points I tried to emphasize were that voluntaryism really meant that one should get what he gets by benefiting those from whom he gets it, that in voluntaryism not only both parties were benefited but everyone else in the world was benefited: that voluntaryism was, in reality, nothing but a free and unhampered market; that to the extent voluntaryism was practiced, duced, and the only fair way of measuring what each and every person produced was to have jobs interchangeable so that any person who thought he was getting too little and someone was getting too much would have not only the right, out it, was his duty, to render a better service for the same money or the same service for less money, and thus benefit both parties to an exchange. Not only would both parties be benefited, but everybody else in the world Socalism is socialism. The Doctor Says:

Until 1628, when Willam Har-

vey published his famous paper written in Latin, the way in which the blood circulated in the body was wrongly interpreted by physicians everywhere. William Harvey made careful

studies of anatomy in animals and human beings and came to the conclusion that the previous ideas regarding circulation were incorrect. He carried out studies on animals which conclusively proved the relations between the heart and the lungs and the differences between arteries and veins.

For the first time the functions of the different chambers of the heart and of the heart valves were understood. Harvey described just what happened when the heart contracted and relaxed

To this great investigator we really owe our knowledge of how blood is pumped heart to the lungs (where it is given oxygen), and how the blood flows back to the heart and out again to the arteries reaching to all parts of the body. After pass-

ing through the bed of fine blood vessels, called capillaries, the blood is then returned to the heart through the veins.

Harvey, of course, did not know everything that we know now about circulation, such as the chemical exchange of oxygen and carbon dioxide. His studies, however, revolutionized medical ideas. They had far-reaching effects, not only for the treatment of all heart conditions and diseases of circulation, but also in all other fields of medical research. The views advanced by Harvey

did not receive acceptance at once. Many of the leading scholars of the day opposed them violently, always citing tradition as the principal reason for their opposition. The weight of opinion gradually came over to his side and his studies and experiments are now considered to be one of the great classics of medical progress.

Without such knowledge we should not have come as far as we have-and certainly would be in no position to make further advances in the study of diseases of the heart and eirculation.



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
