Big Four To Begin Secret Talks After Dulles Rites

Gromyko In Agreement

GENEVA (UPI) - The Big Four foreign ministers agreed today to begin secret sessions on the Berlin and German questions Friday when they return from John Foster Dulles' funeral in Washington.

After more than two weeks of propaganda recriminations that got the conference exactly nowhere, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko agreed to join the Western ministers in private man-to-man talks.

Gromyko agreed to this during a private session today with British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd just before all the ministers took off for Washington to attend the
