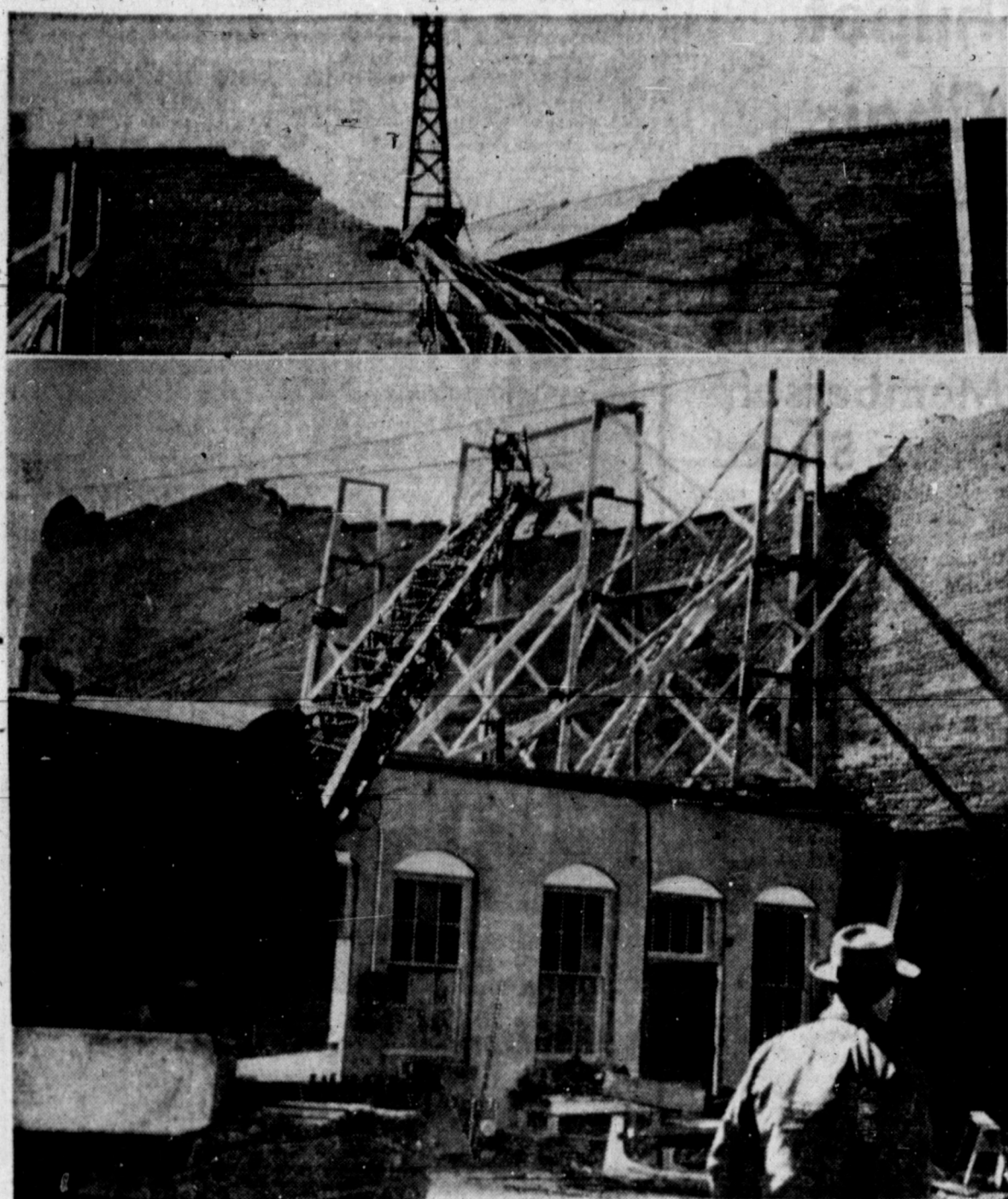

## Diplomats Say Commies Will Okay Foreign Minister Meet

MOSCOW (UPI)—Western diplomatic circles predicted today the Soviet Union would quickly snap up the Western offer to hold a pre-summit foreign ministers conference in Geneva May 11.

The Russians apparently are far more eager than anyone to get out of the way what they regard as a rubber stamp conference and proceed to global problems at a meeting of heads of state.

Premier Nikita Khrushchev, for all practical purposes, agreed at his March 19 press conference on the time and place. He also made it clear he was not interested in an agenda covering more than the German problem.

Notes Were Brief  
The Soviet note of March 2 did propose that the summit meeting take up the general problem of European security, disarmament and the "de-nuclearization" of Central Europe in addition to Germany.

Observers said the Western notes were so remarkably brief and free of polemic and diplomatic gobbledegook that they made Soviet acceptance almost inescapable.

The Soviet government also was not expected to quibble over either the agenda or the Western formula for inviting Polish and Czechoslovakian representatives at "certain stages" of the negotiations.

Remain Poles Apart  
Western observers here said the truth of the matter is that a foreign ministers conference has been downgraded to what one neutral diplomat called "a procedural subcommittee for a summit meeting." The same idea has been reflected in dispatches from Western capitals.

# Chinese Offer Deal To Tibetan Rebels

## Reds Propose 'Friendship' Pact; Dalai Lama Fleeing

NEW DELHI (UPI)—The Chinese Communists have offered the Tibetan rebels a new "friendship agreement" in hope of putting down the widespread Tibetan revolt, reports from Kalimpong on the Indo-Tibetan frontier said today.

Tibetan noblemen fleeing to Kalimpong from the Tibetan capital of Lhasa, said the Chinese Communists themselves ceased firing in Lhasa after offering to make a new deal with the Tibetans. The revolt was reported still going on outside Lhasa, however.

Reports reaching Gangtok, capital of the Indian protectorate of Sikkim which borders Tibet, said the Dalai Lama, spiritual and temporal leader of Tibet, was fleeing southwards to the Indian border but did not plan to enter India.

The reports said the Dalai Lama left Lhasa two days after the revolt broke out and that he planned to join Tibetan resistance forces massed in south Tibet. The group would be expected to flee into India in event of an emergency.

The Communists were reported in control of Lhasa, and the fate of the lama (monks) in the Dalai Lama's cabinet was not known. It was generally believed they were moving southward over Tibet's tortuous roads with their leader.

In Taipei, Formosa, Dr. Tsiang Tingfu, Nationalist Chinese representative to the United Nations, said the United Nations may be asked to investigate the uprising because Tibet is not regarded as a sovereign state and is not a U. N. member.

Summation Key Officials  
The Nationalist parliament summoned key government officials in Taipei to express their views on sending military assistance to the rebels. It adopted a resolution asking the government to send army generals, Tibetan born officials and Nationalist troops if necessary to the rebels.

It asked the Defense Ministry to send arms, food, medicines and signal equipment to the rebels but did not say how this would be done.

## Myatt, Saunders In Mayor Chase

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifth and last of a series dealing with candidates for the April 7 city election. One more installment in the political background series is forthcoming Sunday: on the school board candidates, whose election is April 4.)

Ed Myatt became prominent on the city's political scene two years ago with his election as City Commissioner of Ward 1. It was his first run for political office.

Myatt is 39, married, and the father of two daughters, ages 8 and 18. The Myatts live at 2121 Charles.

Commissioner Myatt has his hand in a number of out-of-state interests, is currently a partner and vice-president in the Milliron Engineering Co. and a vice president of Malcolm-Hinkle Inc. He is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce and is an avid sportsman.

Myatt, one of two candidates for mayor, takes issue with critics of the city's indebtedness. "A growing city has financial problems," he said. "A city that isn't growing probably isn't in debt."

He is concerned about the apparent lack of interest in city government and wishes more interest could be drummed up over civic problems.

In his role (since 1957) as City Commissioner, Myatt probably carries more influence than any other commission member. His opponent for the mayor's job is John Saunders.

Candidate for mayor John Saunders, a long-time Pampa resident, is making his second bid for the city's top elective office. He ran in 1957 against present Mayor Lynn Boyd and was defeated about four votes to one.

Saunders lives at 230 N. West where he heads the All-State Realty Co. He is a widower (Mrs. Saunders died nine years ago) and has one son, an insurance man at Tyler.

Saunders, who first came to Pampa in 1901, has in his long and eventful lifetime, been a Texas Ranger; a cowboy at the turn of the century on the giant JA ranch south of Palo Duro Canyon; a justice of peace in Pampa's earliest days; and once ran for mayor of Dallas.

Of his campaign for mayor of Dallas 13 years ago, Saunders said he ran second among five candidates. He lived at Dallas during the 40's where he ran an insurance business, and later moved back to Pampa in 1950.

Saunders said he feels he is well qualified to serve as mayor of Pampa if elected. He feels he has had "every kind of experience," and is as well qualified for the office as his election "foe," Ed Myatt.

# Lion Escapes Cage, Terrorizes Crowd

NEW YORK (UPI)—A huge circus lion broke out of an arena cage Thursday night at Madison Square Garden and terrorized an audience of 3,000 until he was trapped in a dead-end corridor 15 minutes later.

Ponto, 800-pound star of Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey's big cat act, smashed through an insecurely hinged section of the ring-side cage after getting into a fight with two of the act's eight Bengal tigers during the full dress rehearsal performance.

The powerful, heavily-manned beast bounded around the end arena, then paused as the screaming audience of invited guests, including reporters, and their children, jumped to their feet and started for the nearest exit. Ponto did the same, leaping gracefully over the arena rail and disappearing through an exit into the main lobby.

Watched For Re-appearance  
Realizing that the lion now had the run of the building, most of the spectators decided to stay in the seating area where they could watch for his possible re-appearance. Many persons suddenly realized that the interior of the

garden resembled the Roman Colosseum.

"Now I know how those Christians felt waiting for the First Lion," one woman remarked.

In the lobby, Ponto scattered the ticket-takers and refreshment stand employees and eyed the various stairways and escalators leading to the upper balconies. But he chose to plunge headlong down a short corridor leading to a stairway to the basement, where the smell of other circus animals probably attracted him.

A locked grill across the end of the corridor frustrated Ponto and he turned momentarily to claw at a telephone booth only a few feet away from one in which UPI correspondent Murray Brown was reporting the news to his office. Then Ponto attacked the grill again, this time getting his paw caught in an interstice.

"Here comes the trainer, hurrying in followed by several circus hands rolling his cage," Brown reported. "But I'm not sticking my head out to see how the trainer is going to get him loose."

The German trainer, Hans Naumann a veteran of five Garden seasons, ordered a net thrown across the entrance to the corridor. He placed Ponto's cage near the roaring beast, talked to him a sliver, and prodded the paw with the giant cat's back in the cage and roustabouts were rolling him off to the basement.

"He's the biggest lion in America but he never caused me any trouble before," said Naumann of the 8-year-old beast. "Ponto is probably more afraid than anybody else. He certainly is not dangerous to me, but to you, 'yes, maybe.'"

As part of the convention, which closed Wednesday, several persons were named regional winners of safety awards. Among the winners were Ellen Marie Latta and Glynda Harrell, both of Groom, who won farm-ranch individual awards.

The Junorette 4H club, also of Groom, was named winner of the farm-ranch group award.

# 4-Way Vaccine To Be Available

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Supplies of a new four-way vaccine which will protect pre-school children from polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough are expected to be available by August, Public Health Service officials predicted today.

The four-in-one inoculation announced Thursday by Surgeon General Leroy P. Burney will provide "safe and effective" protection against the diseases. He said this was proved by tests on thousands of individuals.

Two laboratories, Parke, Davis & Co. and Merck, Sharpe and Dohme—have been licensed to produce the vaccine.

Burney stressed that the new four-way vaccine, which includes Salk shots, was designed only for children 3 years old or less.

He said it was "inadvisable" for older children and adults because of the "well-known hypersensitive reaction to diphtheria toxoid in full dosage in this age group."

Burney said the four-way vaccine will not be available in large quantities for some time. He said he could not yet tell when it will be in the hands of doctors. However, Parke, Davis predicts its vaccine will be on the market in August.

The new vaccine is a combination of the Salk polio vaccine and a 3-in-1 shot, already in common use by physicians, providing against diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough.

It calls for four injections—the first three to be given one month apart and the fourth shot to be given four or five months after the third shot.

## Khrushchev Wants Mao Kept From Summit Meet

PARIS (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev steered the Western powers to a summit conference to keep Communist Chinese leader Mao Tse-tung from joining the talks, informed sources said today.

They said Khrushchev hoped to strengthen his position in the Communist world as regards Red China by scoring a propaganda victory by meeting with the Western chiefs of state.

Western diplomats believe the move may increase chances for success at the summit conference, now tentatively scheduled for sometime this summer, the sources said.

At any rate, they said, the West feels Khrushchev should be allowed to state his case for peace in Europe and, in a wider context, for the rest of the world.

Khrushchev, who had been planning for a summit conference on the Middle East last fall, suddenly reversed his field after meeting with Mao in Peking last July 31.

The sources here said Khrushchev called off the talks with the West because Mao had insisted that he be included in any summit meeting which dealt with world-wide tensions.

## Heart Surgery Too Dangerous

HOUSTON (UPI)—Little Donna Lee Evans went home to Joplin, Mo. today because doctors at the Texas Children's Hospital said an operation to close a hole in her heart is too risky at this time.

The seven-week-old baby was rushed to the hospital Sunday by car escorted along the 700 mile journey by dozens of state police cars. The trip was made in 11 hours.

The break-neck trip started after Donna turned blue and a Missouri doctor told her mother, Mrs. Grace Ann Evans, she had a 50-50 chance to live if taken to Texas for special treatment.

Mrs. Evans and her mother, Mrs. Ralph Christman, raced over three states with Donna in a makeshift oxygen tent in the back of the car. They feared a plane trip might hurt her worse.

Extensive tests by specialists at the children's hospital showed Donna has a hole in the partition between her right and left heart chambers. They told Mrs. Evans to take her home and bring her back in two months. They hope she will be strong enough then to withstand an operation.

## Coast Guard Will Probe Ship Wreck

NEW YORK (UPI)—The collision of the sleek new liner Santa Rosa with a tanker off the coast near Atlantic City which killed four will be investigated by the Coast Guard and a Senate committee, it was reported today.

The 20,000-ton liner knifed into the stern side of the 10,000-ton tanker about 3 a.m. Thursday a few hours before the Santa Rosa was due in New York ending a Caribbean cruise for 247 passengers.

The victims of the crash were all from the tanker Valchem. One crewman died en route to a hospital and three were missing and presumed dead. Sixteen other tanker crewmen were injured. Three seriously enough to be hospitalized.

Capt. Frank Wivik, 50, master of the Santa Rosa, said he had plotted the tanker's course from sightings which indicated the Valchem would pass safely to starboard (right). He said the tanker suddenly swerved into his path.

The operators of the tanker declined to make any immediate reply to Wivik's charges.

Coast Guard officials appointed a marine board of investigation which will hold hearings on the collision Monday in Washington. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said the Senate Commerce Committee would investigate the causes of such offshore collisions of ships equipped with radar and other modern navigational aids.

## Domestic Strife May Be Related To Women's Tension, Doctor Reports

Let good old Casey or Bill Norman (manager of the Tigers) have that spot. Our aim is first place and I honestly feel we're going to make it."

His first base situation is such that he even is considering moving Lollar to that position if Earl Battey continues to improve in his catching and if veterans Ray Boone and Earl Torgeson and big Ron Jackson can't fill the bill on a full-time basis.

Boone has slowed down. Torgeson is 35 and Jackson still has to prove he can hit major league pitching. He hasn't been able to do this for this spring.

Short and second are set, of course, with Aparicio and Fox and at third it will be Bubba Phillips with the veteran Billy Goodman behind him. Sam Esposito will be the utility infielder and rookie John Romano, who hit .291 at Indianapolis last season, the third string catcher. That leaves catcher Les Moss in the expendable class.

## Kansas Captures ACC Track Meet

**ABILENE (UPI)**—The powerful Kansas Jayhawks, favored to win the NCAA track championship this year, showed tremendous depth Thursday in winning their first outdoor meet of the season Thursday at Abilene Christian College's invitational classic.

But Davis was all alone in his specialty. He won the 440 in 47.7, beating John Emmitt of SMU by nine yards.

Carroll Makes Conditions

Then a week before she was due to report for work, Carroll discovered the names of Palmer and Cobb also were to go above the title — but beneath her name. Carroll notified producers Bill Perberg and George Seaton she would not appear before the cameras unless there were some changes made.

"We told her she had agreed to the contract," Perberg said, "and that we wouldn't make any changes. I couldn't cancel the picture. It would have cost me more than \$50,000 to pay everyone off."

"Carroll turned out to be a real thank me and said she would like to make another picture for us. She even kissed me goodbye."

And Bill kissed away \$50,000 for the privilege.

## Still Some Quirks In Facilities Of Senate Office Building

**The Lighter Side**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Beneficial occupancy is the legal term for what our senators currently are enjoying in their \$24,446,000 new office building. But not all the senators view the relationship precisely that way.

What the term means is that the senators are getting moved into the marble and walnut-paneled edifice across the plaza from the Capitol but that they haven't yet conceded it's finished.

From some of their comments it can be surmised their final settlement date with the builders may yet be some months away.

Take Milton R. Young (R-N.D.), a senator usually easy to take. One day last week Young was due, with the other 97, to the Capitol to hear President Eisenhower speak at the House side Sean T. O'Kelly of Ireland. He stepped out of his third-floor five-room office suite, walked to the elevator, and pressed the button.

Now, a senator's wish has long been an elevator operator's command. In the old office building and in the Capitol itself, a senator has only to press the button three times, and the elevator appears as by magic and hastens to the floor he desires.

**Young Misses Ride**  
The senators consider it unfortunate, but entirely bearable, if this procedure imposes some ups and downs on the travel plans of lesser passengers.

In Young's case, there was no apparent response to his call. But then that is the way the elevators work in the new office building. They are quiet. Automatic. Non-discriminatory. But sooner or later the door will fly open.

This time it was later. So missed the senatorial station wagon on its departure for the Capitol. This is a tour, each way, of at least a block. It is hoped President O'Kelly will understand why Young had to abandon the trip.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) also is disaffected with the new office building. Magnuson is chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee, which oversees radio, television and such other methods of communication as public address systems. It is little wonder he expects his committee's own public address system to work.

It put out, all right, but what it put out was mostly hums and squawks.

**Irked By System**  
"We spend billions of dollars to fly away to the moon," growled Magnuson, finally snatching the P.A. system out by its roots. "Yet we can't build a public address system that works!"

Magnuson's new arrangement, where senators speak directly to witnesses and vice versa, without benefit of mikes and amplifiers, has afforded an unforeseen and additional boon. With its sound system silenced, the committee no longer is subjected to quorum calls.

These annoying summonses to the Senate floor are sounded by two rings of a buzzer. In the old building, the buzzers are audible. In the new building, they come through committee P.A. systems like blasts on a fog horn.

At a session of his racket committee the other day Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.), sorely tried by a succession of witnesses who rejected his entreaties to talk, turned to the moaning loudspeaker box with a snarl.

"Oh, shut up!" he commanded, in what another committee member said later was the most unheard-of remark in this committee, he ever heard of.

## Foreign Aid People Get Plush Training On Taxpayers' Tab

CAIRO, United Arab Republic (UPI) — The Egyptians suspect they are getting diplomatic doubletalk from the Russians.

No matter what other preoccupation may occupy the Arab world, there is one that is constant — their enmity for Israel.

Add to it in the matter of Israel that they think they are getting double talk from the Soviet Union.

The Israeli issue was at the top of the agenda of this spring's meeting of the Arab League.

The league headquarters sits in the middle of downtown Cairo. It is a solid-looking building of yellow stone set in the midst of a sandy courtyard. Spring flowers line the driveway approach to the entrance. There is a reception hall and high-ceilinged rooms on either side.

**Discuss Refugees**  
In one of these rooms is the office of Abdul Malek Hassouina, secretary general of the league which ranks Israel as its bitterest enemy.

The main topic was the flow of Jewish refugees from Romania. Russia, he said, has given the league blanket assurances that no Russian Jews would be permitted to emigrate to Israel. Romania has said its emigration is limited and is for humanitarian purposes.

"But," he said, "when we hear Mr. David Ben-Gurion (premier of Israel) asking for more refugees and planning to get into Israel 100,000 in 1959 and know of the existence of receiving centers in Vienna and the activities of agents in Italy looking after them and facilities for their trip to Israel, we cannot help but feel there is a planned program for this purpose."

**Echoes Hassouina**  
An Egyptian government official echoed Hassouina but in stronger language.

"The Russians may say they are not permitting emigration," he said, "but we don't believe them."

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## Carroll Baker Gets Extra

NEW YORK (UPI) — Amateur "psychiatrists" have a warning man that the business of digging deep into people's minds can be dangerous — for the digger.

Dr. Phillip F.D. Seltz was advising general medical practitioners on whether they could properly engage in psychotherapy despite their lack of specific psychiatric training, but his remarks applied as well to the amateurs who, martini in hand, try to find out what makes another party guest tick.

**Amateur Ranks Growing**  
Professional psychiatrists are remarking, with amusement but also worry as to the consequences, on the growing number of amateurs who have read a book or have had personal experience with psychoanalysis and try to work out on anyone who'll stand still. "It's a psychiatric age," they say sarcastically.

But "psychotherapy has become a science with an established body of knowledge sufficiently comprehensive that it now requires years of study to master its principles and techniques," said Mr. Seltz to the doctors who have mastered only medicine in general.

As an example, Seltz told of a young non-psychiatric doctor who had heard of an experimental psychiatric technique for getting deep into the mind of a person suffering from skin disorders of emotional origins. The young man got in deep all right, and put in a hurry-up call for Seltz.

**Should Have Training**  
"He sounded upset and frightened," Seltz said. "I went to the doctor's office, where the patient was found in a violent abstraction of rage with the very frightened doctor trying to calm him. I had to take over the case because the doctor was clearly too terrified."
