Afte great director and Belafonte said was more; he was a great gentleman. Having no argument to make on that score, we started talking about a song.

"Last Christmas," I said, "you sang a simple, beautiful carol-like thing called 'Mary's Boy Child, Jesus Christ.' Is it an old Elizas bethan air?

'No, "it isn't," said Belafonte. "It only sounds like one: Actually, it was a fast beat + struck West Indes Calypso song written by a friend of mine down there. The tune fascinated me. I took it and added a yerse, which does have Elizabethan tones, changed the body of the chorus a little, shifted some words, then sang it in slow, reverent tempo. It was part of an album at first, then I did a single on it. It has a curious fate. It has not been a sensational success here. I feel it will be and will become a Christmas standard, building year by year. But it did an almost unknown thing in England: it sold one million discs. When that happened, it was taken up in Parliament and, after debate, was by law made a permanent part of the British Carol Archives. It is on file now with the wonderful and historical old English carols and, of course, will be played with them each Christmas as the years go by. I count it a great honor. The original West Indies version was no less reverent in meaning but its calypso beat gave it a more festive spirit than the theme commanded. The present version, I
