## Ike Offers Plan For Disarmament

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—President Eisenhower has offered Russia a new plan for traveling the road to disarmament—a step at a time.

The first step—an installment plan for limiting nuclear weapons tests which increase the world's radioactive fallout—was made public as the Chief Executive prepared to end his two-week spring holiday in Georgia and fly back to Washington this afternoon.

Eisenhower's plan to approach the control of nuclear weapons gradually was outlined in an April 13 letter to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. Khrushchev had not replied to the news of its existence Monday in Geneva where four powers talk of test suspension area in progress.

The White House was something less than pleased by this development and gave Eisenhower's full text to reporters Monday night without waiting for the Khrushchev reply.

The United States proposal for a limited ban on nuclear weapons had been outlined broadly in Geneva by Ambassador James J. Wadsworth, chief of the American delegation.

The Geneva conference on banning tests began last Oct. 31. The

Russians insisted on their right to veto inspection aspects of any control system applying to underground explosions.

"These negotiations must not be permitted completely to fail," Eisenhower wrote Khrushchev, saying that without a new approach "no basis for agreement is now in sight."

Eisenhower's new approach was this:

Step around the current arguments, political and technical, over control of underground and outer space tests and try to seek an initial agreement on prohibiting tests in the earth's atmosphere.

"If you are prepared to change your present position on the veto on procedures for on-site inspection and on early discussion of concrete measures for high altitude detection," the President told the Soviet boss, "we can of course

proceed promptly in the hope of concluding the negotiation of a comprehensive agreement for suspension of nuclear weapons tests.

"If you are not ready to go this far, then I propose that we take the first and readily attainable step of an agreed suspension of nuclear weapons tests in the atmosphere up to fifty kilometers (30 miles) while the political and technical problems associated with control of underground and outer space tests are being resolved."

While such an admittedly one-step plan was operating, the President felt that "fears of unrestricted resumption of nuclear weapons testing with attendant additions to levels of radioactivity (See PLAN, Page 3)

## Nepal Accuses Red China Of Invasion

### HERTER TO GET SENATE'S OKAY

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Christian A. Herter goes before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today apparently assured of quick approval of his appointment as secretary of state.

The committee called a hurried public hearing to consider the nomination of Herter to succeed John Foster Dulles. No opposition was evident and final Senate confirmation was expected this week.

Herter implied, in a conversation with reporters at the airport, that he would do less traveling than his predecessor, who logged almost 600,000 miles during his six years in the Cabinet.

Herter will rely less on personal diplomacy and delegate more authority to his subordinates than Dulles did.

Herter's appointment was announced by President Eisenhower today. He will be sworn in on Monday.

Herter, who has been undersecretary of state, was named to the Cabinet post by President Eisenhower last Saturday. The formal nomination, roundly applauded by congressmen of both parties, was sent to the Senate Monday.

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### Many Thousands Tortured, Killed

KATHMANDU, Nepal (UPI)—A group of high Nepalese citizens accused Communist China today of invading this Himalayan mountain kingdom and "raiding, looting and torturing" Nepalese citizens.

They threatened to take action themselves to stop Chinese Communist "atrocities" if the government did not act. Sherpa tribesmen who brought the accusation to Kathmandu said the Communists had shot and killed "thousands" of Nepalese.

Nepal is a tiny kingdom high in the Himalayan Mountains between Tibet and India, famed for Mt. Everest and other peaks which tower miles into the air.

The charges were made by G. N. Vidya, general secretary of the Himalayan Society, a powerful organization of Nepalese Sherpas in a memorandum to King Mahendra. The note was signed by 511 Sherpas.

Vidya made public the charges shortly after a Kathmandu newspaper said the Red army raided a village 20 miles inside Nepal's border in a search for anti-Communist Tibetans. The government did not deny the report.

The Himalayan Society's memorandum demanded protection against Chinese Communist "atrocities" which the society said were committed against Nepalese in Nepalese territory.

The memorandum accused the Chinese of raiding and looting the Nepalese village of Gyabra at the foot of Mt. Everest. Gyabra is 20 miles inside the border.

The Sherpas asked the Nepal government to make suitable arrangements for 70 families of prominent Tibetan noblemen who space capsule back to earth, may arrive recently at the town of plunge to a fiery death today.

### Charles Starkweather Will Appear Today Before Nebraska Pardon Board

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI)—Charles Starkweather appears before the Nebraska Pardon Board today in a last ditch effort to avoid execution for his mass murder spree.

An attorney representing Starkweather, whose execution date has been postponed twice by appeals, has asked the board to commute his death sentence and schedule him to appear before the board to fight the appeal imposed for one of the 11 killings he admitted.

Starkweather was convicted of two members of the three-man board were to hear Starkweather's appeals. They are C. S. Beck, an attorney and Secretary of State Frank Marsh. The third board member, Gov. Ralph G. Brock, was unable to attend because he was ill with influenza.

However, state law enables a majority of the board to act on majority appeals.

The board's ruling was expected to be announced immediately after the hearing. If the board denies clemency, it will set a date for Starkweather's execution. AUSTIN (UPI) — A bill to make nudist camps illegal passed the Senate Monday by a vote of 26-2. The anti-nudist measure, sponsored by Sen. Ray Roberts, McKinney, has been branded by the opposition as a move to strip away sun-lovers' rights. Roberts told senators: "I've got one of these places in my backyard. I want to get rid of it. If you want to annex it, you may." He referred to the nudist colony discovered recently near Ivanhoe in Fannin county. Rep. James A. Turman, Gober, who sponsors a similar House measure, said he has already received protesting mail charging the legislation "would strip the nudists of their rights."

**Panamanians Seize Yacht**

PANAMA CITY (UPI) — Panamanian authorities took British ballerina Dame Margot Fonteyn into custody Monday night and planned to question her today about reports she and her Panamanian husband have plotted to overthrow the government. Police sources said Dist. Atty. Francisco Alvarado probably will interrogate the 39-year-old star of Britain's Royal Ballet, who was picked up Monday by Secret Police Chief Hector Valdes and held overnight in his home. The dancer's husband, former Ambassador to London Roberto Arias, has been charged with plotting against the government on the basis of reports that he fished up a cache of arms from the Pacific Ocean near the entrance to the Panama Canal and smuggled the weapons into Panama. In Havana, Panamanian Ambassador Alberto de Obarrío said that Arias had been a frequent traveler between the Cuban capital and the western province of Pinar del Rio, where Panamanian refugees have been reported planning an attempt to invade their homeland. Alvarado said that charges also have been filed against Dame Margot, but he refused to reveal their nature. The arms cargo is believed to have been raised by the Arias fishing launch Nola and turned over to the shrimp boat Elamo, which landed Sunday night near the Rio Hato airstrip. Dame Margot had sailed with her husband in the Nola last Tuesday. It cocked early Monday in Balboa, C.Z., with the ballerina alone in the launch except for Aquilado Darksin, a Panamanian crewman. Col. Bolivar Vallarino, commander of the Panamanian national guard, said Arias returned to Panama in the Elamo and probably is still in this country.

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**Terror Keeps Voters Away**

ALGIERS (UPI) — A wave of rebel terrorism appeared today to have succeeded in its purpose — keeping voters away from the polls in the third day of Algeria's municipal elections. The rebel terror joined forces with political apathy and confusion to place doubt on outcome of the elections. Voters stayed away in droves and there was no clear-cut indication of whether President Charles de Gaulle or his extreme right-wing opponents were winning. The political confusion arose from the unprecedented number of competing rightwing tickets. Most candidates campaigned bitterly against each other on nearly identical platforms calling for Algeria's "integration" with France. Officials believed the deadly production costs there.

If the store doesn't have the pink sweater Gloria asked for, it's to go home without any, saying, "The shop didn't have a pink sweater. What other color could you use?" If Joan is doing a clumsy job of pressing her skirt, it's easier to say, "Give me that iron," instead of showing her how to dampen a pressing cloth and remove the old hemline marks herself.

We don't always have time to respect children's right to achievement. So we mustn't reproach ourselves if occasionally we do John's examples for him or buy the sweater Gloria hasn't asked for. But we can register the fact that we've substituted our achievement for theirs, and refrain from demanding gratitude for our high-handedness.

It's when we demand, like the mother in the dream, to be admired for stealing others' achievements that trouble begins. It's then that protest goes underground. It can emerge, not in words, but in refusal to study at all, in overweight that makes the blue sweater unwearable, in hands that tremble with the need to shove us away.

## Government Workers Will Miss Two Special Holidays

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Tom Murray (D-Tenn.) looked at his calendar and discovered that Memorial Day, May 30, falls this year on a Saturday. So does the Fourth of July.

Ha figured this was a dirty trick on government workers who are off Saturdays, anyway, and who therefore will miss out on two of the eight special holidays which we provide them—a-a-a-h year.

So Murray, chairman of the House Post Office Committee,

put in a bill to relieve 'em. He said give them an extra day off on the preceding Friday, whenever this happens. And that is why on Friday, May 29, and Friday, July 3, we could find our post offices closed.

All Is Normal  
More likely, they'll be open as usual. Eugene J. Lyons, the assistant postmaster general, said on past experience he didn't think we would stand for shutting them down. But he told the committee that if Murray's extra holiday bill becomes law—keeping them open will cost \$3,900,000 on each of those days.

"With the budget already unbalanced, Lyons said he didn't rightly know where he could scratch up that kind of money. Rep. August E. Johansen (R-Mich.) said wouldn't it have to be borrowed? And wasn't this bad?

Lyons said it would, and it was. Rep. John R. Foley (D. Md.) agreed we might have to go to the bank for the dough, but said this wasn't necessarily damning. He said we're already so far in the red that the regular pay of our post office workers comes out of money that's borrowed.

"So this is normal," he argued. Murray noted that it's already government policy that when a holiday falls on a Sunday, everybody gets off on the following Monday. Lyons said there's a difference. He said the Monday-off policy was adopted because Sunday, being a religious day, is not suited to the kind of celebrations we like to put on, say, on the Fourth of July.

Murray said he was just trying to do for the government's workers what many private employers do for theirs. Phillip Hughes, the assistant budget director, replied that he couldn't see that our help was suffering much. Anyway he said we can't afford to do what Murray proposed.

Hughes said his calendar shows that over the next 40 years there will be 23 holidays falling on Saturday. He said that brings the total bill for Murray's proposal to \$10 million dollars.

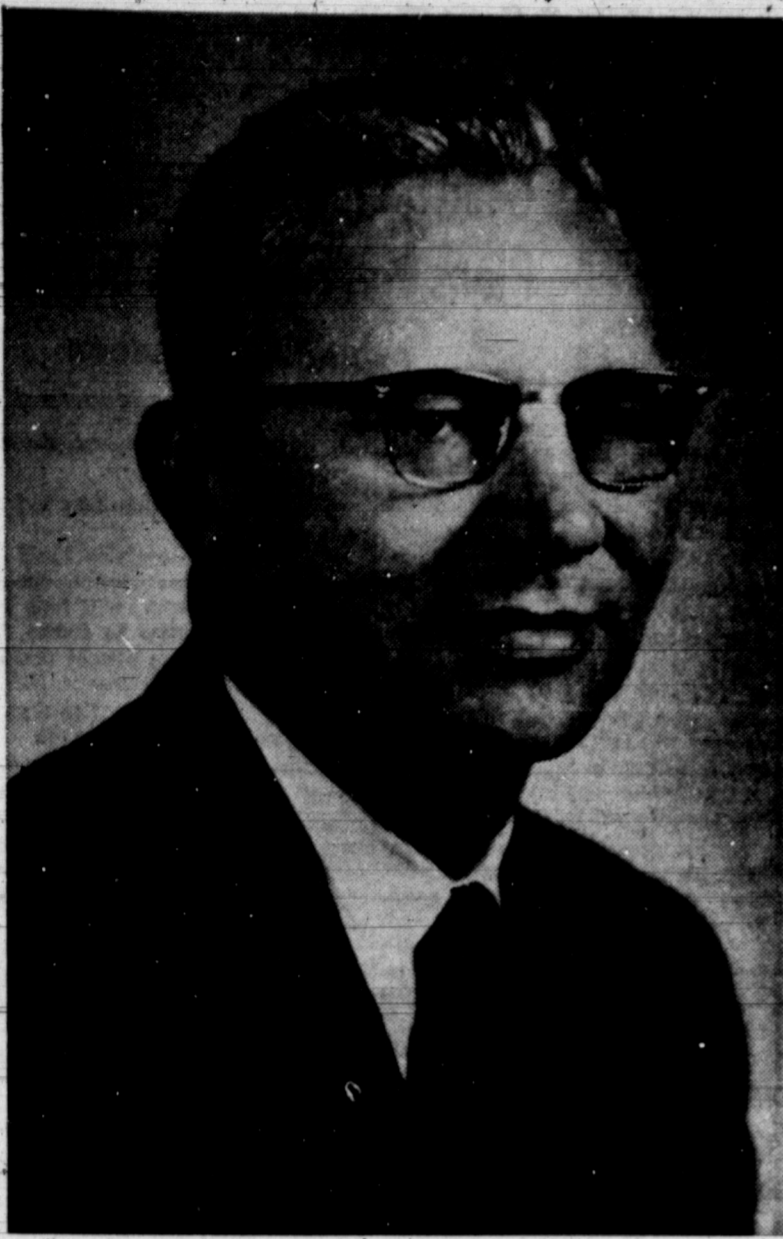

### Stein To Present Paper at Meeting

Walter F. G. Stein, chief petroleum engineer for the oil, gas, and gasoline division of Cabot Carbon Company in Pampa, is the author of a paper which he will present at the spring meeting of the Mid-Continent District, API Division of Production, at Amarillo Wednesday through Friday.

Stein will present his paper, "Operational Problems in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle and Adjoining Areas," to the Committee on Production Practice.

Stein was born in the Republic of Mexico in 1908, and attended primary and high schools in Mexico and Germany. He studied chemistry and physics in Oldenburg, Germany, where he completed the state examination in 1929. Afterward, he returned to the United States.

He first worked in the oil and gas industry for the Magnolia Gas Company and in the natural gas and gasoline departments of the United Gas Company in Latex.

After serving some time as district engineer for the latter company, he was employed by Magnolia Petroleum Company in 1931, where he had various positions, culminating in the position of assistant superintendent of the carbon black department.

From 1937 to 1939 he was employed by the Texas Railroad Commission as district engineer in the Panhandle, chief gas engineer at Austin, and division oil and gas engineer at Corpus Christi.

In 1940 he became a partner in the Stein-Henderson Engineering Company, an oil and gas servicing company in Corpus Christi. After a short service with the North Basin Pools Engineering Company of Midland, he entered the U.S. Army in September, 1942, and served in the Ordnance and Military Intelligence Service.

He returned from overseas service in March, 1948, and since that time has held his present position.

### Man Lives In Bottle House

JUAREZ, Mexico (UPI)— Luis de la Mora, a slender man called "Seven Struggles," lives with his family of four in a three-room glass-house he built out of tequila bottles.

Luis, 52, finished building his house out of about 7,000 tequila bottles in the middle of March. The Mora family has been living in it ever since.

The glass house, surrounded by about 500,000 "commercial" bottles—each classified according to type, size and worth, is the show-place of the Reforma colony on the edge of the Chihuahua desert.

It has been a magnet for visitors ever since Juarez reporter Amado Flores wrote about it in the newspaper "El Fronterizo" on March 1. Amado called Luis' home "a hymn to hard work and inventiveness."

The glass house flames with fiery colors at sunrise and sunset. It reflects sun rays with such blinding brilliance is said many visitors mistake it for a bonfire.

In the daytime, Luis said, sunlight filters through the tequila bottle walls of the kitchen, filling the house with a dim greenish glow.

Cost Under \$70

Panfilo Garcia and Catarino Ruiz, his partners in the business of buying and selling bottles, helped Luis build the home. The men mixed a plaster of lime and sand to hold the 7,000 bottles in place. They built two bedrooms and a kitchen, each measuring 15 by 12 feet. Beer and pulque bottles, Luis said, were too costly to use in construction. Building costs were under \$70. It took them six months to complete it.

Luis said necessity prompted him to build his house out of bottles instead of adobe. "I wanted a home for my family but lacked money for cement and adobe," he said. "So my friends Panfilo and Catarino helped me build the first home my family ever owned out of bottles good for construction but sometimes hard to sell to bottling plants."

No strikes, Luis said, have been pitched at him by Reforma colony rock-throwers. "The children are all great friends of Panfilo," he said. "They like him so well they don't throw rocks at the house he helped build."

Bottles Flew

March winds blew part of the roof off the house a week after he moved into it. The winds sent tequila bottles flying. But damage was slight. Luis shored the roof with sotol bottles.

Luis, nicknamed "Seven Struggles," because he worked at that many trades, said he and his two friends plan to add a new room to the house.

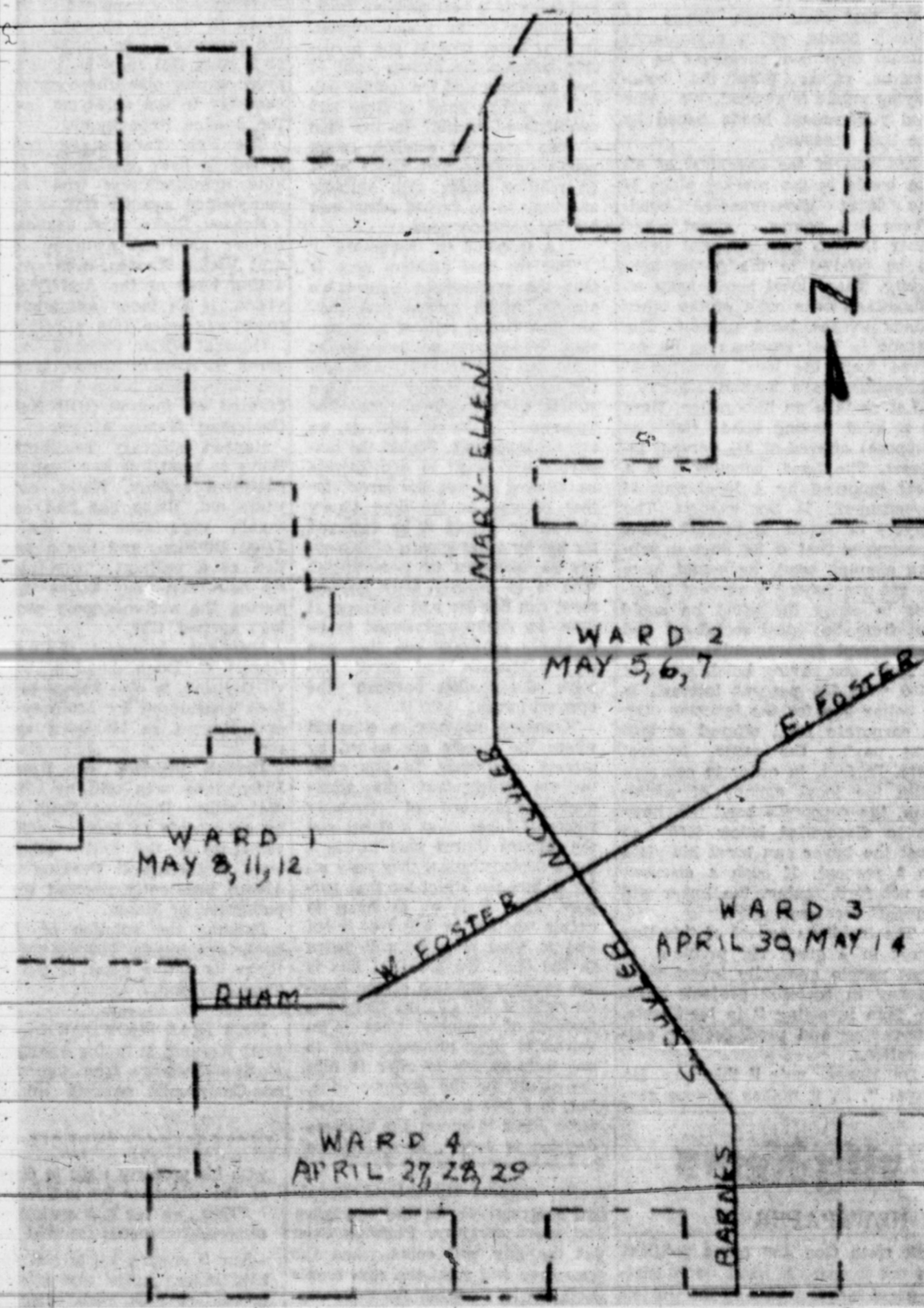

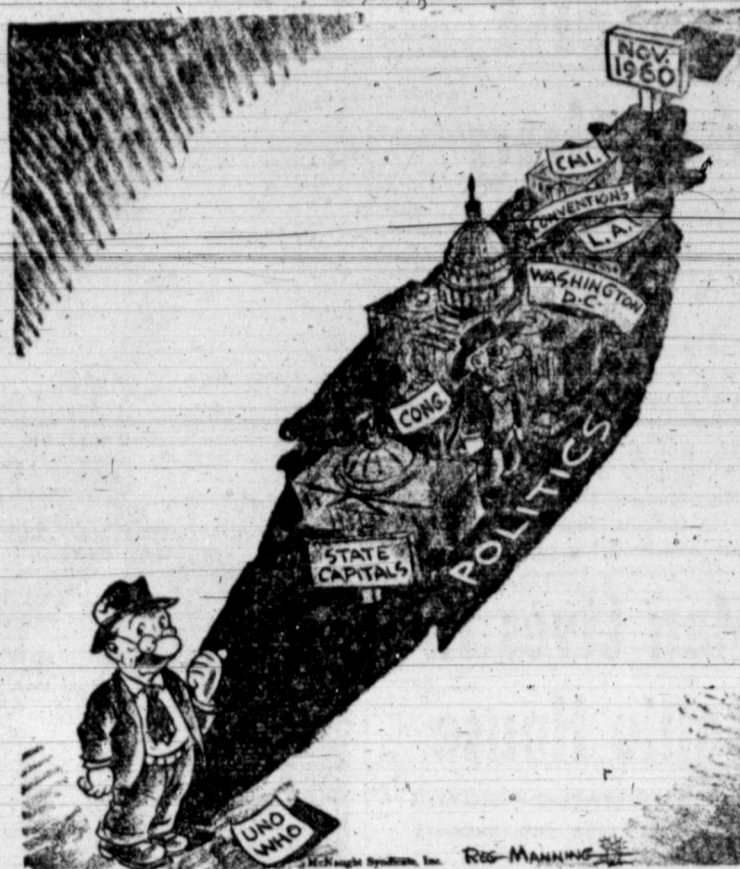

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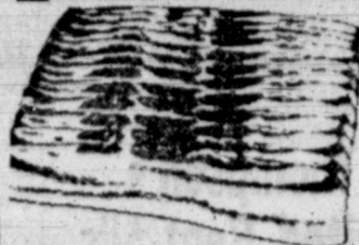
