

# It's Official, Dulles Stepping Down

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—President Eisenhower today sadly announced the resignation of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

The President, with traces of tears in his eyes and a choked-up voice, personally met with reporters to tell them that the cancer-stricken secretary was "absolutely incapacitated" to carry on his administrative duties as state secretary and still make

policy.

The President said however that Dulles will continue as the nation's top-level foreign consultant to the White House.

Dulles was placed under additional X-ray treatment today for what appeared to be a second outbreak of cancer.

The secretary of state returned from a recuperation trip in Florida only last Sunday and was hospitalized again.

The President, appearing at a highly unusual news conference in

the temporary White House news headquarters at the Richmond Hotel here, said he expected to name a successor to Dulles within a few days.

He said there were other government experts on foreign policy in addition to Acting Secretary Christian A. Herter who would be considered for the post.

Before he makes a final decision, the President said he would discuss the matter with Dulles.

Seldom have Washington reporters seen Eisenhower as som-

ber as he was today.

Grave-faced, he walked into the temporary White House press room and said simply that what he had to say would be brief and that it concerned Dulles.

He went on to report that, in view of the medical findings Tuesday when doctors announced evidence of new cancer in Dulles, the secretary had "definitely" made up his mind to submit his resignation.

Eisenhower, looking somewhat pale and drawn beneath his tan,

went on to say calmly that Dulles' formal letter, would reach him in a day or so and he would then reply to it.

Speaking of the medical report Tuesday, the President said sadly that the findings on Dulles were "not of the kind that make him hopeful."

Eisenhower said in an increasingly husky voice that no man of Cabinet rank to his knowledge had filled his position with greater distinction than Dulles.

Dulles, battling against his third

cancer attack, has been secretary of state since 1953. Although 65 at the time, he has become perhaps the world's most active traveler, covering hundreds of thousands of miles by land, sea and air in the interest of America's diplomatic policy during the cold war.

Eisenhower entertained a few questions from reporters bearing directly on the shift of command in the state department.

The President made these points:

The effectiveness of the American presentation at the April and May conferences of foreign ministers will not be damaged by the departure of Dulles.

Herter will go to both conferences because of his intimate knowledge of foreign affairs, regardless of Eisenhower's selection of a successor to Dulles.

As the President prepared to leave the news conference, he turned dejectedly to the reporters with what seemed to be a trace of tears in his eyes.

## Red Fighter Planes Watch, Don't Buzz U.S. Transport

Fly Within 600 Feet, Do No Harm

BERLIN (UPI)—Two Soviet fighter planes flew to within 600 feet of a U.S. Air Force transport flying the high altitude route to Berlin today but made no attempt to "buzz" it as on two previous flights.

The high-flying American turbo-prop plane, which the West would use in the event of a new Berlin blockade, was dispatched to West Berlin from West Germany despite previous warnings from the Communists that the West must fly the corridors under 10,000 feet.

A U.S. official said the United States formally notified the Russians in advance by filing a routine flight plan with the Soviet delegate at the Berlin air safety center stating the flight would be made today.

The official said the flight was "not provocative. We merely are asserting our right to fly to and from West Berlin at altitudes of our choosing."

"The C130 landed at West Berlin's Tempelhof Airfield safely."

The U.S. official said the two Soviet jets joined the transport shortly after it entered the space over East German territory.

"There was no harassment or buzzing," he said.

The official said it was a "high altitude" flight. It was assumed by this that the transport flew at about 25,000 feet, which was the altitude flown by the first C130 the Soviets buzzed on March 27.

The Soviets have insisted that Western planes remain below 10,000 feet in the air corridors between West Berlin and West Germany. They said the air above this was reserved for Soviet planes. The United States, Britain and France have insisted there is no ceiling on the corridors.

The C130 still faced the prospect of returning to West Germany from West Berlin.

The flight was made after the Soviets by word and deed warned the United States against sending to West Berlin high-flying aircraft of the type that would be used to fight a new blockade.

The East Germans today threatened the United States with threatened nuclear bombs if any attempt is made to break through to a blockaded West Berlin.

Western diplomats expressed fear that aggressive Russian harassment of high-altitude American flights in the Berlin air corridor would cause crashes and loss of life.

The Communists followed that up today by warning that if fighting breaks out over Berlin it will become a world war that will end in the defeat of the West at the hands of Soviet atomic and hydrogen bombs.

## Herter May Take Over

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Administration officials said today they expect Undersecretary Christian A. Herter to be named secretary of state within the next few days to succeed John Foster Dulles, who has resigned because of his illness.

It has been generally understood that the 41-year-old former Massachusetts governor, who has been acting secretary since mid-February, would step into the job if Dulles had to quit.

Some officials still conceded an outside chance to some other possible nominee—particularly C. Douglas Dillon, undersecretary of state for economic affairs.

**Has Powerful Backing**

"Dulles," whom the President has said he will consult on a successor, is known to rate Dillon extremely highly.

However, Herter has powerful backing on Capitol Hill, including the already expressed support of the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.).

Herter, according to his aides, was notified Tuesday of Dulles' intention to resign and the fact that the President would make the announcement this morning.

The acting secretary, who served eight years in Congress and four years as governor of Massachusetts, also was advised that there would be no announcement of Dulles' successor for a few days.

The President in announcing Dulles' resignation in Augusta this morning, noted that other government experts on foreign policy would be considered before a final decision is made on filling the post.

**Resignation Radiation Therapy**

Before Eisenhower made his announcement at an unusual news conference at Augusta, Dulles' associates considered his resignation was virtually inevitable, particularly after a possible new malignancy had been discovered in his neck.

**It May Be Too Late Now!**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—If you haven't mailed in your 1958 income tax returns by the time you read this, you probably are late. In addition to the tax you owe, you will be liable for a penalty for late filing.

The law says your return must be in the hands of your district director of internal revenue by midnight tonight. Unless you live in the same town and can drop it by the collector's office, the postman just won't be able to get it there on time.

But if your return is signed, is in good order and you've enclosed a check for the tax you owe, you may still get by without a penalty if you drop it in the mails, in a hurry. The tax collector usually is too busy handling the big flood of returns to bother computing penalties on returns that are a day or even two days late.

An estimated \$1 million taxpayers have filed or will file returns for the 1958 calendar year.

## Discoverer II Fate May Be Learned Today

VALENBERG AFB, Calif. (UPI)—The United States may learn today whether it has achieved the world's first return of a satellite capsule from outer space, even though it may be lost to the "polar bears and icebergs" in the Arctic.

The 1,600-pound Discoverer II satellite launched here Monday failed to eject the "space capsule" on command Tuesday because of a malfunction of a timing device. But an automatic device within the polar-orbiting vehicle was pre-set to dump the capsule at about 7 p.m. e.s.t. Tuesday on its 17th pass around the earth.

"If it did work," an Air Force spokesman said, "the capsule probably came down in or near the Arctic—a little package worth millions of dollars lost to the polar bears and icebergs."

Each time the time mechanism to operate in conjunction with a ground signal to trigger the ejection dashed elaborate plans by the Air Force to snag the 160-pound capsule in mid-air over the Pacific with giant cargo planes.

Spokesmen said it would take many hours of studying telemetry (radio) data from the satellite to determine whether the automatic triggering device worked. They said their only means of finding out was by noting a slight shift in the "signature" of the satellite's orbit which they believed would be caused by the sudden dropping of the capsule.

## Castro Arrives With Hopes Of Winning U.S. Favor, Cash

HAVANA (UPI)—Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro flies to Washington today for an 11-day visit to try to curry American favor and win financial support for his revolutionary regime. Maximum security precautions were set up in the American capital.

The bearded, 32-year-old rebel leader, whose forces overthrew Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista last January, was scheduled to arrive at Washington Airport in the early evening.

More than a dozen advance agents, including bodyguards, were flown ahead to the American capital to set up security precautions against possible attempts in his life by Cuban exiles, including relatives of the hundreds of "political prisoners" executed by revolutionary firing squads.

A group calling itself the Anti-Communist Movement of the Americas announced in Washington it would protest his visit by parading 75 pickets with anti-Castro signs in front of the White House two hours before Castro's arrival.

Castro was invited to the United States by the American Society of Newspaper Editors to address his convention in Washington Friday. His visit is unofficial, but he will meet with high U.S. officials.

Acting Secretary of State Christian A. Herter will receive the Cuban premier at lunch Thursday and Vice President Richard M. Nixon will entertain him at his home Sunday.

Washington officials hoped his visit would pave the way for a better understanding between his government and the United States.

# Texas City Disaster Occurred Twelve Years Ago This Spring

TEXAS CITY, Tex. (UPI)—Longshoreman Paul Rogers was one of hundreds who gathered on the docks at Texas City 12 years ago today to watch copper-colored smoke billowing from the hold of the French Lines freighter SS Grandcamp.

It was a warm, spring day and Rogers, like the others crowded around him, had no hint of impending disaster.

Firefighters scurried across the deck pouring water into the holds of the ship where 1,400 tons of ammonium nitrate was stored.

At 9:12 a.m., without warning, two tremendous explosions disintegrated the big freighter. This set off a three-day, chain-reaction series of blasts and fires that turned into the greatest industrial disaster in the nation's history.

Torn bits of bodies were scattered over wide areas. The nearby Monsanto Chemical Co. plant caught the full brunt of the explosion. At 1:11 a.m. on April 17, another freighter loaded with ammonium nitrate, the High Flyer, went up. A third vessel, the Wilson B. King, burned until only its hull was left.

Rogers, now 37, and a disc jockey at Radio Station KTLW, was working on the Grandcamp the day before it exploded, but was "bumped" by a union longshoreman and moved over to the Wilson B. King.

Workmen on the King were told to cover up the hatch and leave the area until the fire on the Grandcamp was out.

Rogers was standing beside his father-in-law, J. D. Meek Sr., watching from a distance of about 150 yards when the first blast oc-

urred. Meek, like some 750 others, was killed. An estimated 3,500 others were injured—many of them horribly maimed and burned.

The concussion picked up Rogers and hurled him several yards. When he regained consciousness, he was pinned under a pile of debris and had a fractured leg, burst ear drums and numerous cuts and bruises.

"Most of those around me, including my father-in-law, were killed," Rogers recalled. "I still don't know how I got out alive."

The entire town of Texas City looked like a war-devastated town in Europe during the 1940s.

**Damage Everywhere**  
Nearly every business and home suffered varying degrees of damage. Typical of these was a ship supplies firm operated by J. C. Seiffert.

On the day of the initial explosion Seiffert was holding "open houses" at his new produce plant some two and one-half miles from the docks. The concussion caved in the roof of the building and virtually ruined \$6,500 worth of produce. What remained later was given away by Seiffert to victims who were left homeless.

The last scar of the disaster—the skeleton of a grand elevator on the docks—was torn down only last year. Now, only memories and scarred bodies of those who lived through it remain.

In 1955 Congress passed the Texas City relief statute under which the U. S. government paid death, injury and property damage claims up to \$25,000 each if claimants would assign to the government all claims against a third party. Nearly \$70 million has been paid out of this fund.

Later the U. S. government filed 70 million dollars in claims announced today.

against the French Lines and the French government. It was only last March 9 that Federal Judge Ben C. Connally of Houston ruled that neither the French Lines nor the French government is entitled to exoneration in the disaster.

A buckskin banner will go to the troop that attains the most points in the performance of Scout skills. Blue, red and yellow ribbons will be presented to each patrol.

Troops will pitch their tents at the ranch Friday evening, April 24, and early Saturday morning. The buckskin trails will be held all day Saturday. Adult judges will be assisted by Explorer Scouts.

Skills to be judged are purification of water, knot tying, map reading, first aid, axe and knife work, compass and trail sign reading and use of Morse code.

Scouts will also cook their own meals and stand unit inspection.

As everybody knows, Rin Tin Tin is a handsome, king-size German shepherd, allegedly the fourth in a line stretching back to 1918 and one of the Kaiser's trenches. So naturally I had some good questions ready about West-

Berlin, etc.

But I soon gave up trying to ask them. Rinty was being pushed, patted, mauled and admired by a large uncritical group of average age about 7, and the fact nobody drew back a nub testified to his superhuman restraint.

Lama Will Appear Publicly Saturday

By EARNEST HOBERECH United Press International

NEW DELHI (UPI)—The Dalai Lama will make his first public appearance in India Saturday and thereby deny Chinese Communist and Soviet charges he was "kidnaped" and is being held under duress, it was announced today.

The charges were repeated Tuesday night in Peking by Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai and the Communist-sponsored Panchen Lama.

Two Taipei newspapers, the United Daily News and the China News, meanwhile reported major fighting in the Chinese province of Tsinghai adjoining Tibet and said tribesmen there had revolted against Peking.

The China News, quoting Nationalist intelligence reports, said: "The vast desert frontier is burning with freedom fire."

It reported anti-Communist elements had cut the main highway leading from the Peking capital of Hsiangshu of Liaas, with the Red army almost cut off in Tibet and largely dependent on airborne supplies.

The public appearance of the Dalai Lama was considered significant because of new Peking charges almost certain to anger anti-Peking elements in India.

One charge said certain Indian political leaders were trying to sabotage Indian-Communist China relations.

Official sources said the Dalai Lama would bless the tea planter town of Tsepur when he arrives Saturday en route to his exile in Mussoorie-130 miles north of New Delhi. Hundreds of Buddhists were expected to attend the ceremony.

Peking Radio announced that Communist leader Mao Tse-tung made a major speech today on international affairs and Tibet and it was believed certain the Chinese Communist Peoples Congress starting Friday would devote much of its time to the Tibetan rebellion.

No details of Mao's speech were released.

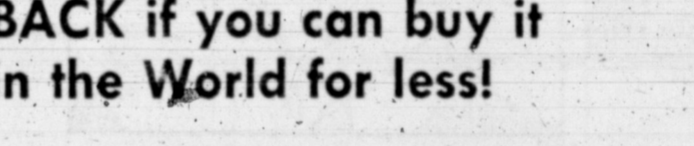

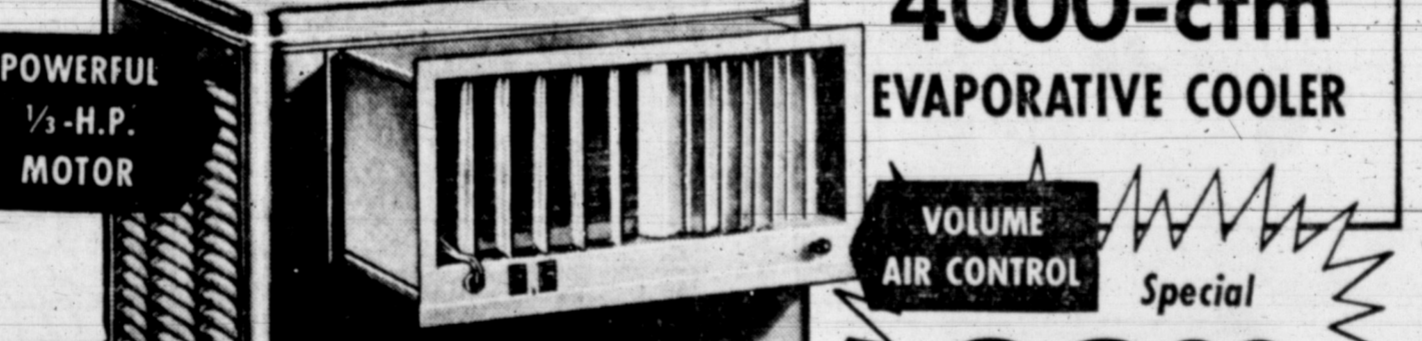

Budget Battles

In the battles of the budgets some abroad. Recently 2 million raring in Washington, in Austin and other state capitals all over the land, there is a curious similarity. Whether to increase taxes or hold the line is what the fighting is all about. It has become almost heresy to suggest that government costs, at any level, could be cut.

BETTER JOBS

"Managed Money At The Crossroads" I have just finished reading a new book on "Managed Money at The Crossroads" written by Melchior Palyi. It is not really an easy book to read but it is a most important book about managed money and deficits, which we are facing in the United States and almost throughout the world.

At one time he wrote a column for one of Freedom Newspapers, but few newspaper men thought readers were enough interested in money and banking, and not enough newspapers bought his column in order to make it profitable for him to continue.

This study was suggested by the Rev. Edward A. Keller, C.S.C., Professor of Economics at the University of Notre Dame, with whom the author undertook in 1955 a three-month survey trip through a number of European financial centers.

I doubt if very many people know that the real function of commercial banks is to take deposits payable on demand or on short-time notice in order to make short-time loans; loans that are payable when the borrower has something that he is producing that will be on the market and he will get the cash to pay off the loan.

When I was reading this book I couldn't help but remember an old banker in Mansfield, Ohio, with whom I had a deposit, who said when the run was on the banks and other banks were having a lot of trouble, that his bank could have made a lot more money if they had taken long - time loans rather than limit their lending to shorter terms; that he believed that those banks that believed that the trust of their depositors and stockholders by accepting short-time loans and making long-time loans should suffer the consequence for their betrayal of trust.

Palyi points out that for 100 years the Bank of London was based on liquidity; that they did not regard themselves in a position to make capital loans - only short-time commercial loans.

When I read a book I always underline or mark alongside important parts of the book. There are so many important parts of this book I hardly know how to choose the most important.

Under "The Code of Rules" Palyi writes: "The most significant 'rules of thumb' and institutional conditions - in addition to the free reasemblance, at a fixed gold price, of all kinds of currency in use - for maintaining confidence may be summarized briefly (and broadly):

"1. Liquidity of the assets of the central bank and of the commercial banks. This means qualitative as well as quantitative restraints. The latter is two-fold: to canalize the flow of short-term funds into short-term outlets only, in order to maintain the banks in a flexible position and their outstanding credit in proper relation to the actual volume of goods sold; and to moderate the seasonal and cyclical fluctuations in business activity by curtailing them in the upturn. If an aphorism is permissible, liquidity may be defined as a financial policy and policy of restraint of which is to avoid wholesale liquidation, which is the financial essence of the depression."

Sound Banking Then he continues to list several other essentials to sound banking. His fourth one is: "4. Absolute freedom of the central (note-issuing) bank from interference either by the government or by private interests. Especially, it must be free from any obligation to support the credit of the government."

Just how far are the banks of America under the Federal Reserve System, which is really controlled by the politicians, free from obligations to buy government securities? Under sound banking the government, if it has to borrow money, would borrow money on a long-time basis from those people who had earned the money and had it to lend.

Then in Palyi's seventh one he mentions restraint from monopolies, and certainly the United States is not following this principle. He puts it this way: "7. An economic climate which is free from overbearing monopolistic restraints and similar rigidities, so that monetary policy can become effective through relative mobility of labor and capital, flexibility of prices, and adaptability to international competitive conditions."

Debt Monetization Under his chapter on "The Common Denominator: Inflationary Drift" he writes: "Inflation is not to be considered merely as a state of affairs at a given time, but rather as a dynamic process or trend over a period of time; as characterizing a general and deep-seated economic disequilibrium in domestic and external relationships rather than simply registering a given condition of prices, money volumes and price levels. Robert Allen Reports:

Oil Depletion Tax Under New Fire

WASHINGTON - The long-controversial oil depletion tax allowance is under new congressional fire.

Aim of this latest attack, which significantly includes both the House and Senate, is to force a vote in each of them this session to cut the oil tax deduction from 27 1/2 to 15 percent.

Leaders of this double-barreled opposition are Senator William Proxmire (D., Wis.) and Representative Torbert Macdonald (D., Mass.).

Under backstage plans, they will use different strategy in their attacks.

In the House - Macdonald and a bipartisan group of supporters will first try to put his bill to slash the oil depletion allowance, through the Ways and Means Committee, which has jurisdiction over this issue.

To become effective, this parliamentary procedure to override a committee requires the signatures of 218 members (a majority of the House).

Macdonald and his backers are claiming they already have around 100 signers.

In the Senate - Proxmire proposes to offer a similar bill as an amendment to every tax bill that comes up there.

The most important slated to be considered in the Senate is the measure strongly recommended by President Eisenhower - to continue the 52 percent corporation tax and the existing excise levies on liquor, tobacco and motor vehicles.

Unless extended by June 30, the corporation tax will drop to 47 percent, and the excise taxes be cut in half.

This would cost the Treasury more than \$4 billion in revenue. Proxmire is saying he already is sure of around 40 votes for his amendment.

Purpose of this legislation is to offset a recent Supreme Court decision holding that a 5 percent depletion allowance on clay is also applicable to products made from clay.

Secretary Anderson contends this ruling would cost the government more than \$300,000,000 in revenue if applied to other minerals - as is very possible.

Swope, Biggest Phony Of Our Time! by WESTBROOK PEGLER

NEW YORK - Leo Katcher, a newspaper reporter, has written an excellent biography of Arnold Rothstein, who has written a biography of Swope, the greatest non-criminal phony of our time, the late Herbert Bayard Swope. I salute Herbert's memory in awe, for he was actually a dog-eared deuce who walked with kings, and to know him was to admire him, as I frankly did, for a career so poor in achievement that his grandeur is all the more so.

Mr. Katcher reports, apparently on authority, for he says he spent hours talking with Swope, that Herbert was Arnold Rothstein's best man when he married Carolyn Greene, a young actress, at Saratoga in 1909. Rothstein may require introduction to some latter-day readers. He was the most ruthless, ferocious, cunning and untill his death by gunshot on Nov. 4, 1928, successful crook of the era which began with the "reform" of Woodrow Wilson, Barney Baruch and others equally important.

Baruch was to say, with a sigh when Herbert had died, that he missed him sorely. Barney even said he thought he had said all he had to say in this life. He has now disappeared from print almost entirely. Yet once when I asked Herbert flatly whether he was Baruch's press agent, he coughed noisily and said, "I am not in his fee, but I am his consultant on a policy level."

He got mail order commissions as both lieutenant - commander of the Navy and major of the Army, but fate diverted his steps from the path of glory. In his Naval phase he was drafted into service as press agent for the war industries board and, as major, he was shanghaied from battle into the war department as personal consultant to the Secretary.

Among a whole drawer of citations, badges and scrolls he had the order of Knight Commander of Liberia and one of about 75,000 medals of merit conferred on press agents and buyers of buttons, cloth, and paper clips.

Actually, Swope's exclusive story was Rosenthal's death warrant and this was only one of numerous feats, for he was one of the best reporters in the country. He always wrote with a flourish, however, and when he became a "director" of Freedom House, the memorial to another arch - faker, Wendell Wilkie, I began to inquire, Herbert committed himself when, figuring that Joe McCarthy was outnumbered and defenseless, he took part with Lewis W. Douglas, one of our ambassadors in London, at ceremonies "honoring" Egbert Murrain for attacking Joe.

Actually, as "director" of this thing, Swope did little more than confer by word and signature with other "directors," but on this occasion the temptation to pose with his foot on the head of a fallen lion was irresistible. So he appeared in person with Douglas, although Murrain seems to have been too busy. In another case, when Freedom House thought of hanging a botchleap on Harry Ashmore of the Arkansas Gazette for the coup which landed the Airborne in Little Rock, Herbert pointed out that Ashmore already had the Pulitzer Award, so Freedom House gave it to the Gazette rather than the editor.

Douglas too was brave enough for the McCarthy occasion, but later, when he circulated a writer's scurrilous insinuation by an amateur "authority" who had never seen Joe McCarthy and I personally demanded that Douglas say this to McCarthy's face, Douglas curled up and quit. Joe never had a chance to face either Murrain or the curbstone psychologist whose report was relayed to me by Frank Brophy, an old friend and neighbor of Douglas, in the presence of two other witnesses.
