swering Hoiles. 28. Hoiles: Just how do you arrive at how high wages ought to be? Should the prosperous employer have to pay more than the man who is just breaking even? If so, how is he going to select the fellows he's going to give the

gift wage to? Buck: Well, are you talking about under the ideal system or under our system now? Hoiles Ideal

Buck: Under the ideal system, going along with your thesis that if we had free competition throughout the economy in all aspects of it, then competition would be the answer.

Hoiles: But we want to approach a free unhampered comparative system. We don't want to advocate any ning that isn't the

Buck: Well, the worker has to defend himself against the en-croachment of non - free situa-

Hoiles: We've got a law that would put the employer in jail if he did what union labor does. And we want to enforce those laws. If the employers get together and agree, "We'll pay into the common fund a fine if any of us pay more than an agreed wage." Well, they'd put the employer in jail if he got into a proposition like that, while the union fellows say, "If you work for less than we agree, we'll fine There's no competition there between men. And that isnot a legal violation of civil law. Hoiles: You haven't yet told how you're going to arrive at a fair wage, because you deny the competitive wage over a long run. Buck: I don't deny that compe

tition should enter into it. Competition should be the rule, all economy as it exists today is so completely out of gear that there are millions out of work and the whole situation is out of gear through manipulation of our monetary system, free competi-

tion cannot obtain. Hoiles: Let's go the right way have less interference and more freedom. The whole proposition of labor unions is to interfere with the free and unhampered market. Buck: Freedom for the em-

ployer but not for the employe. Hoiles: It's not free for some employes to go into the union. The group gets together and limits them. And we have laws to stop the employers from getting together to set artificial prices, as we should have.

Buck: The laws don't stop them, Hoiles: We have laws against murder but we still have murder. Should we try to better enforce the law or should we advocate murder? To a large degree these laws stop conspiracies to set prices. Some employers even want tariffs taken down so that the employer, in selling his product, would have to compete with all the world. Of course, we never expect to have an ideal society. but we want an ideal to strive to approach. The minute you are doing something that is going the wrong way, interfering with the free market, interfering with the night of men to use all the facul ties they have to benefit themselves and benefit mankind, then, of course, you're starting the wrong way. And, of course, two wrongs do not make a right.
