



stipation is not easy to handle at this age: the writer will probabl need professional advice.

The important thing about chronic constipation is that it should be handled early in life, since true constipation is essen tially a habit. It should not be con fused with what might be called the false constipation resulting from taking too many laxatives. This generally leads to alternat ing constipation and diarrhea and the condition known as spastic

In real constipation the waste material of the digestive tract is held too long and there is delay in emptying the bowels. This results in waste material which is hard and dry.

Neglect and improper training during childhood are probably the most important causes of chronic constipation. During childhood, a regular time of day should be established and the responsibility placed on the youngster as soon as possible. An additional cause is that

many people suppress nature's call. This tends to interfere with the normal rhythm of bowel emp-

thartics is a great source of trouble today. All too many people have the notion that if they clean themselves out once a week with a good strong purge it will

be good for them. However, this upsets the normal regular rhythm of bowel evacuation and the intestinal waves may not return to normal for several days. Enemas may have a place in treatment but also should not be taken regularly.

Treatment of simple constipa tion is usually successful. When the trouble has started in childhood or has lasted for many years, good results are more difficult to obtain. The underlying cause, whether faulty diet, neglect, abuse of laxatives, or lack of exercise (or all of them)should be identified and corrected.






