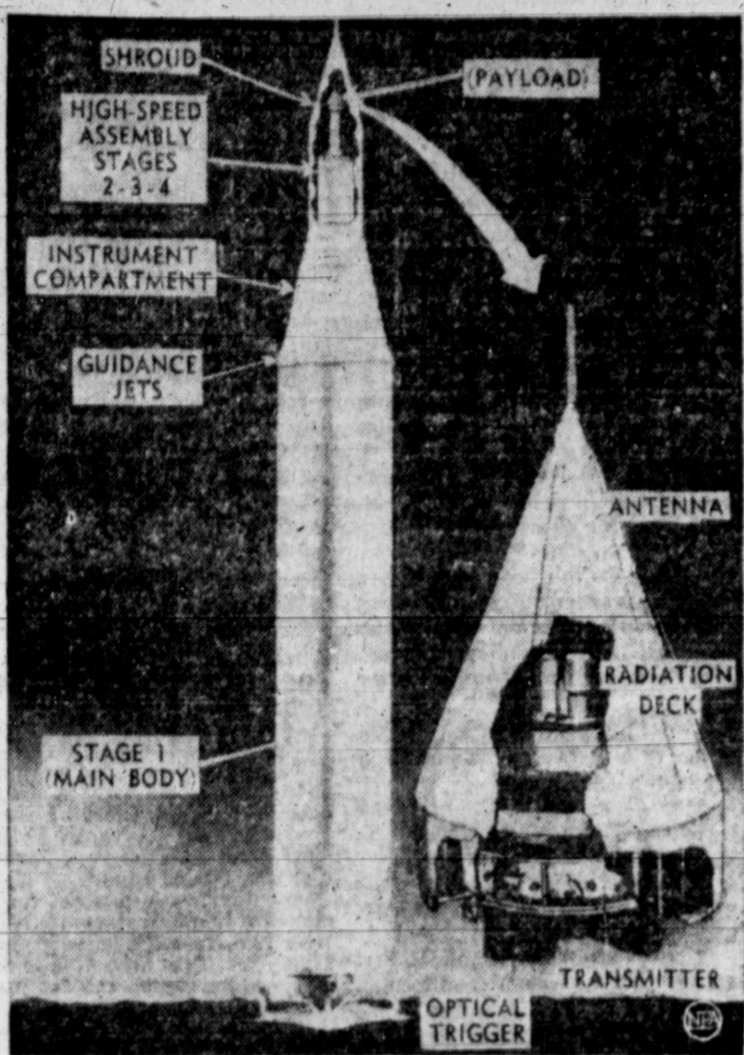

AIR FORCE SAYS:

Satellite Might Be In Polar Orbit

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (UPI)—The Air Force in a cautiously worded statement has announced that the "lost" 1,300-pound satellite Discoverer I is apparently circling the earth today every 96 minutes in a polar orbit.

Preliminary studies indicated the 19-foot-long satellite's life would be in excess of one month, the Air Force said.

The satellite was blasted into the heavens Saturday afternoon at Vandenberg Air Force Base to become the first satellite launched on the West Coast.

Its fate remained in doubt for nearly 32 hours because of an apparent radio failure before the Air Force's Ballistic Missile Division (BMD) here broke the suspense by releasing a guarded statement Sunday night reporting

the reception of "random" radio signals.

Not Definitely Confirmed

A BMD spokesman explained the difficulty the Air Force was having in determining whether the Discoverer I actually achieved orbit.

"We are not saying that it definitely is in orbit, neither can we say that it is not, at this point," the spokesman said. "We don't feel that we will definitely know an orbit has been achieved until we have tracked it by radar, obtained a visual sighting or received more definite radio signals."

"Until that time, we can say only that information 'tends' to confirm, not definitely confirm, an orbit."

The Discoverer shot was the initial launching in "Project Discoverer," a program designed to lead eventually the way into space for man. Another shot in the project already was being readied for 30 days hence.

Double-Barreled Threat

The Air Force announcement said preliminary plotting of Discoverer I indicated it came within 146 miles at its closest to the earth and looped out as far as 558 miles into the sky.

No other satellite has ever been fired so that it would achieve an orbit across the poles. All other satellites circle roughly around the equator.

The announcement of Discoverer I's possible orbiting came only a short time after the Army called off "for technical reasons" the firing of its moon probe, Juno II rocket at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

The Discoverer shot from Vandenberg AFB, about 165 miles north of here, at last gave the nation a major, working West Coast space facility that together with Cape Canaveral would be a double-barreled threat to Russia's reported rocket supremacy.

FIRE INSURANCE RATE DECREASE DUE PAMPA

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's mission to Moscow became at least a partial success today.

The Soviet Union conditionally accepted Western proposals for a foreign ministers' conference, preliminary to a summit parley on the Berlin crisis.

This switch in Soviet tactics came in notes delivered in Moscow today to the ambassadors of the United States, Britain, France and East and West Germany.

The Soviet notes urged a summit conference for April, but agreed to foreign ministers' talks if the West "is not ready yet" for the Summit.

Firm Western Stand

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had rejected the idea of a foreign ministers' conference in a political speech last Tuesday.

The flat tone of that turnaround put a new chill into the cold war, coming as it did during Macmillan's trip to Russia.

But Macmillan refused to take Khrushchev's "no" as a final answer. In several speeches, he continued to insist that there must be negotiations on the future of

Germany in cold war relations.

President Eisenhower also threw cold water on the idea of a summit meeting on Berlin without adequate preparation at a foreign ministers' conference.

This firm Western stand, coupled with demands for partial U.S. mobilization, apparently impressed the Russians and cleared the way for negotiations on the growing Berlin crisis.

The White House withheld immediate comment on the New Soviet notes proposing conditional Big Four talks on Berlin.

But the Russian move brought hopes for at least a partial thaw

in cold war relations.

Would Begin in April

The only condition the Russians imposed in the latest notes—which were in reply to Western notes of Feb. 16 proposing foreign ministers' talks on Berlin and the entire German question—was to insist that Communist Czechoslovakia and Poland must be invited to give the Eastern camp numerical equality at the conference table.

The Soviet notes stipulated that the conferences must be limited to "a term of not more than two or three months," with April the best time to start and Vienna or Geneva the best sites.

The suggestion that the talks begin in April was considered crucial, since it meant an agreement in principle, at least, to start talking before the scheduled handover of Soviet rights in Berlin to the East Germans, now set for May 27.

The new Soviet notes were disclosed shortly after Macmillan emerged from his final negotiating session with Khrushchev in the Kremlin.

The developments came as demands echoed in Washington for mobilization of four or five additional divisions as a "diplomatic

Summit Parley In April, Maybe!

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union agreed conditionally today to negotiate with the West before handing over Berlin's lifelines to East German control on May 27.

New Soviet notes to the West supported an April summit conference but accepted proposals for foreign ministers' talks if the West "is not ready" for the summit.

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev withdrew his rejection of foreign ministers' talks on the Berlin crisis after

insistent pleas from British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Russia offered the compromise in new notes handed to the American, British, French and German ambassadors by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko today.

The only flat condition imposed by the Russians in the notes was that Czechoslovakia and Poland must be invited to give the East numerical equality with the West at the conference table.

The notes stipulated that the conferences must be limited to "a term of not more than two or three months."

Geneva or Vienna would be the best sites for the conferences, the Russian notes said, and April would be the best time to start.

The suggestion that talks begin in April was crucial. This meant agreement in principle, at least, to negotiate before the scheduled handover of sovereign rights in Berlin to East Germany, now due May 27.

The notes were published by Russia shortly after Macmillan emerged from his final negotiating session with Khrushchev in the Kremlin.

The notes said both East and West Germany should be represented at the conference.

The notes warned against any use of force by the West to keep Western military supply lines open into Berlin. They referred to a Western Big Three statement that said "all appropriate means" would be used to preserve the Western position in West Berlin.

"It is hardly necessary to prove to... the United States that the party whom they threaten... have at their disposal everything necessary to stand up for themselves in a worthy manner and to give a rebuttal to any aggression," the Soviet note warned.

Along with his note on the proposed foreign ministers' and summit conferences, Gromyko also delivered to East German Ambassador Johannes Koening a message dealing with Russia's stepped up plans for a peace treaty with East Germany, a treaty the West fears will clinch Germany's permanent division.

Funeral Services for Marion Francis Blasingim are pending at Duenkel-Carmichael Funeral Home until notification to all relatives has been made of his death. Blasingim died Saturday night in a fire that destroyed his home on the Combs-Worley Ranch, southeast of the city.

Mr. Blasingim, born June 22, 1882, in Piuski, Giles County, Tenn., had been employed for the past 40 years by the Combs-Worley Ranch, where he was a foreman.

He is survived by two brothers, Harvey of Tampa, Fla., Arch of Monahans, one sister, Mrs. Will Peavey of Live Oak, Fla.

US Bond Goal Set

George B. Cree Jr., chairman of the Gray County Savings Bond Committee, has announced the 1959 Savings Bonds Goal for Gray County will be \$795,000.

"During the month of January, the people of this county purchased \$65,885 in Series E and H bonds which was 8.3 percent of our 1959 goal," Cree reported.

The 1959 goal for Texas is \$182,500,000. Sales during January totaled \$16,147,649, which represents 8.8 percent of the 1959 sales goal.

"A part of every American's savings should be invested in Savings Bonds, to provide for his future and to add strength to the National economy," stated Cree, County Chairman.

Lack of Moisture Hurts Winter Wheat

AMARILLO (UPI)—Lack of moisture and wind erosion is hurting winter wheat in parts of West Texas, southwest Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico, says Santa Fe crop report.

The area generally lies south of the Canadian River and has been suffering from a serious deficiency in moisture since last September.

A windstorm on Feb. 9 also damaged growing wheat and whipped off topsoil, the monthly report said.

However, because of generally good rain last summer and anti-erosion practices by farmers, wind damage is not expected to be as great this year as in previous years, the report said.

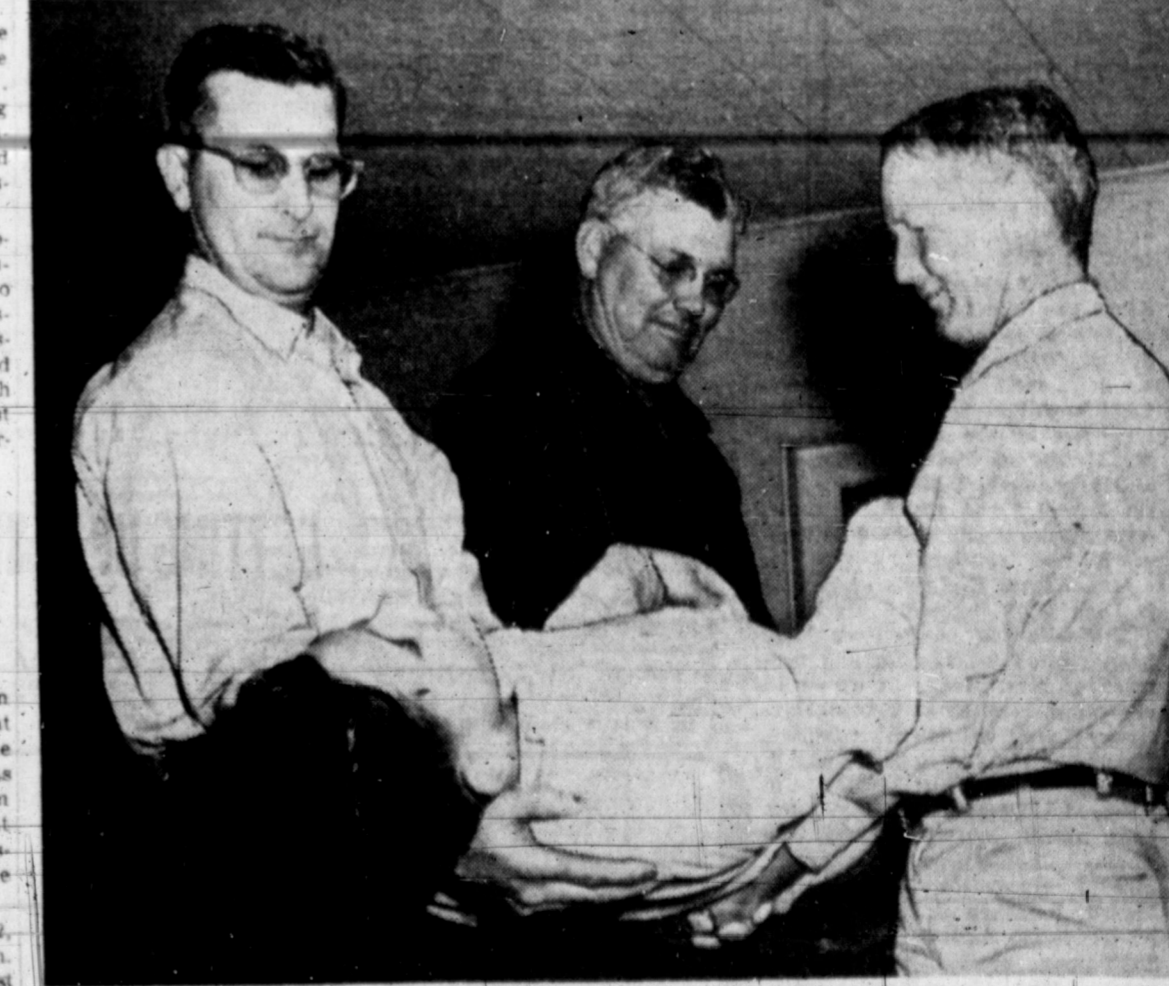
Red Cross Make-Up Set Tonight

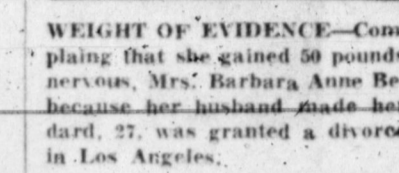

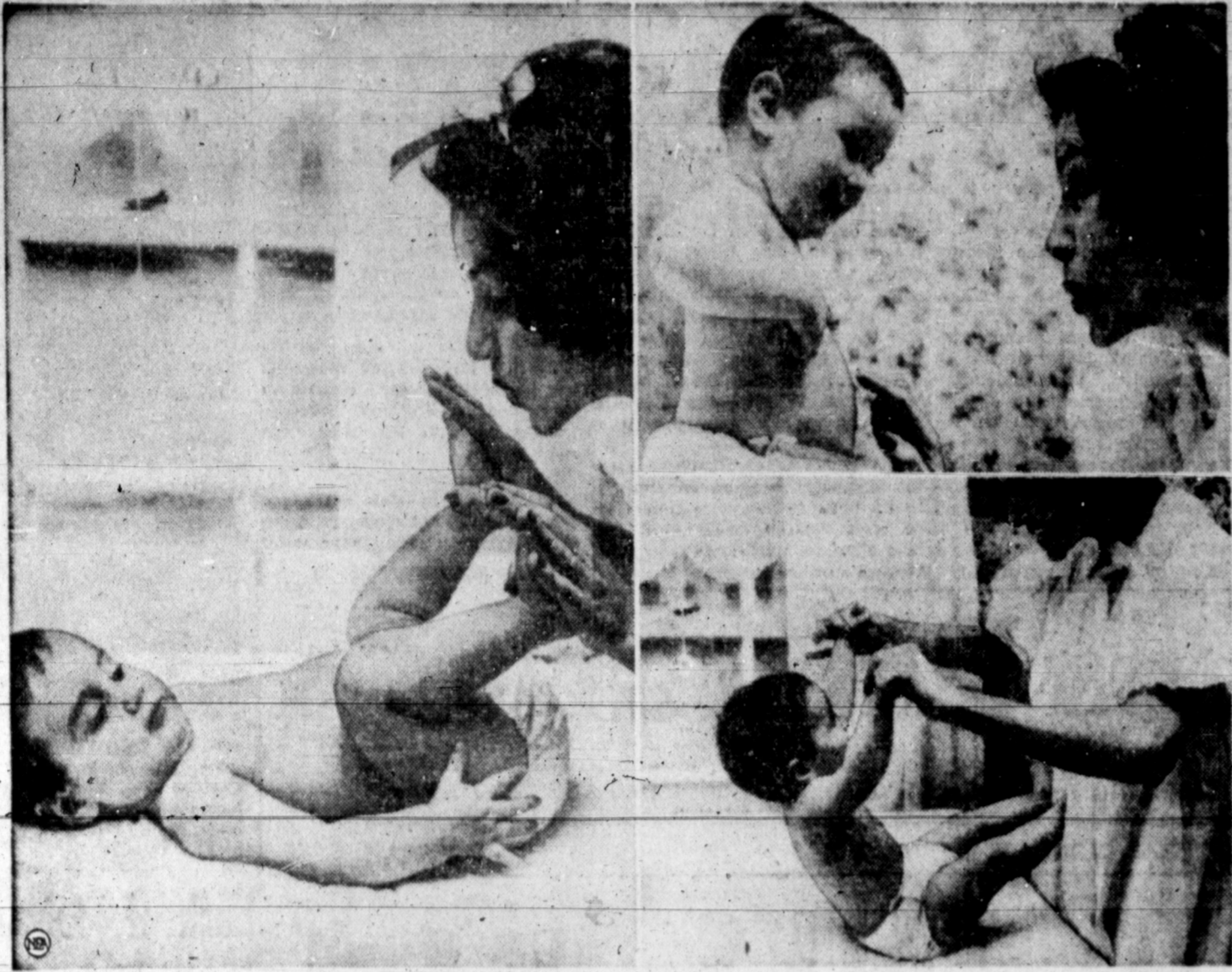

When baby is strong enough to hold her head erect easily, mother pulls her up gently by her hands (lower right) and then lowers her carefully. Gradually, she will raise baby higher until she sees-saws to sit up and back.

Early Start With Exercising Essential To Help Make Baby Beautiful, Healthy

Beautiful babies are not a matter of choice. A clear-eyed, strong-limbed, happy baby is one who has been given loving care. And her beauty is built on the firm foundation of good health and cleanliness.

If mom is faithful about her baby's periodic visits to the doctor, meticulous about her laundry, sensible about her diet, and careful not to overdress her when she is outdoors, the new member of the family should be a bright, healthy bundle from heaven.

Mothers often make the mistake of believing baby to be a good deal more fragile than she is, and even on a mild day bundle her up to the hilt for her airing on the porch. The result is that she perspires profusely and may become chilled. Dress her suitably, but don't overdo it, for babies often need less clothing, comparatively speaking, than adults.

There is another way to help your baby to be happy and strong. And it's fun for mom and dad, too.

Few parents are aware of the fact that even a three-month-old infant can enjoy and benefit from "setting up" exercises - provided they're not overdone. These exercises have been suggested by experts at the Chix Diaper Institute, who warn of a few points to bear in mind before you start. A trembly chin or a whimper means stop. A smile means go ahead. And when dad is baby's partner, ask him to be gentle.

1. Place your hands firmly against baby's feet and push up gently. She usually pushes back with surprising strength.
2. Pull her legs out straight and hold them for a moment. Then relax your grip and let them go back to normal position. She will soon learn to flex her legs by herself.
3. Hold her hands. Move her arms slowly in and out. Try it to a slow song - she'll get double enjoyment.
4. When she can easily hold her head erect, try pulling her up gently by her hands - at first, just an inch or two - and then lowering her carefully. Gradually raise her higher until she sees-saws to sit up and back.
5. With a firm hold on baby's thighs, rotate her hips from left to right, right to left. In a few days, her shoulder muscles will begin to help. One morning she'll manage to flip-flop right over on her stomach.

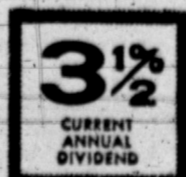

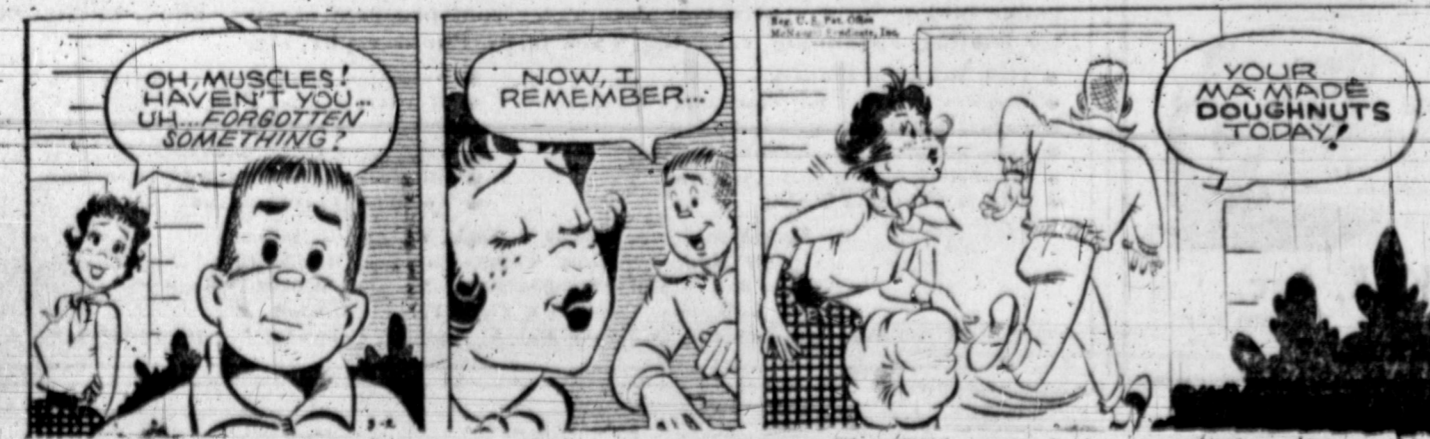

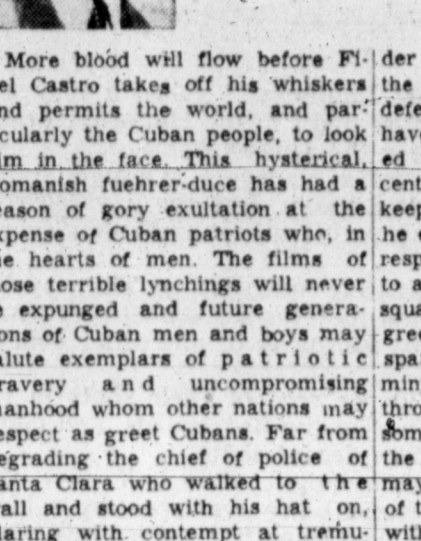
