Police Move Into Harlem

NEW YORK (UPI)—Additional police were moved into Harlem today to ease the danger of a race riot. Police Commissioner Stephen P. Kennedy argued that the danger had been increased by "inflammatory statements" by politicians.

"The people who are doing most of the talking are interested in the political situation," Kennedy told a news conference. His reference was to current primary campaigns for party leadership.

"If there were no tensions before, they now have been certainly started by inflammatory statements by such people."

Kennedy warned that "a race riot would cause more destruction of community relations than an atom bomb, and the lingering effects of such a riot would be worse for the community than the fallout of an A-bomb."

Kennedy named no politicians, but he apparently made reference to statements of seven Negro leaders who met at City Hall Tuesday after a tense crowd incident at a Harlem precinct station.

Manhattan Borough President Hulan E. Jack, one of those leaders, said tension was rising dangerously in the district, not because of police action, but because of housing and economic problems.

Others charged that police have been using "extra muscle" in the crowded Negro section.

"These tensions are built up and the police are made the scapegoats," Kennedy said. "These conditions happen in other parts of the city as well; they are not common to Harlem alone."

He agreed with Jack that the basic cause is housing, schools and economic conditions. But he said the West 133rd Street precinct, which Monday night's incident occurred, has a much higher rate of violent crimes than most in the city.

The incident involved the arrest of a 21-year-old Puerto Rican woman on charges of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. The woman denied through her lawyer Wednesday that she had been mistreated or ever claimed to be.

Jury In 8th Hour On Big Law Suit Here

A District Court jury entered its eighth hour of deliberation this morning in the Bettis-Terry \$25,000 damage suit.

District Court Clerk Helen Sprinkle reported that the case went to the 12-member jury at 6:30 Wednesday night following two days of hearings. The jury retired one hour for supper and then pondered the issue until midnight when they were dismissed until 9 a.m. today.

At stake are claims from three persons totaling \$25,000. The case was brought by C. M. Bettis, father of a 17-year-old Canadian youth killed in a highway accident last summer on Price Rd.; Clarence Hughes, father of a second boy injured in the wreck; and Glenn Hughes, driver of the car in which the Bettis youth died.

The defendant is Bill Terry, one of two young motorists allegedly racing on Price Rd., when a head-on collision occurred, killing one of the drivers, Donald Wayne Sands.

Terry, whose car was not involved in the collision proper, was charged by the plaintiffs with "improper conduct which served to incite and encourage the misconduct of Donald Wayne Sands."

For \$182 Million State Taxes

House Still Rejects Bill

AUSTIN (UPI)—Speedy Senate passage and continued House rejection of a new "compromise" tax bill was expected today as lawmakers wind-up a dismal second special session of the 56th Legislature.

A new conference committee reported the slightly revised \$182 million dollar tax measure Wednesday and all five House conferees pledged to oppose the bill.

The bill differed only slightly with one killed last Saturday by the House after it was passed by the Senate. The measure is constructed some 70 per cent on sales taxes.

Third Session
The continued tax deadlock was expected to throw lawmakers into

a third special session, starting no later than next Monday. The current session ends at midnight tonight.

Key issues were at stake Wednesday in the joint conference. The "big two" problem and dispute areas were considered to be a severance beneficiary tax on

natural gas versus a three-cent increase on cigarettes.

The chairman of the House conferees, Rep. Mauro Rosas of El Paso, said three conferees agreed to sign the bill as only a gesture to give House members another chance to vote on a tax bill. He said the bill was dictated by Sen.

ale conferees and is almost the same as a tax measure voted down by the House Saturday. He said the newly proposed edition is another sales-tax-related measure that still does not levy a heavy tax on natural gas.

Young Fugitive Slays Mother

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—A young fugitive who told of killing a 27-year-old mother of two children in a love pact shot, and killed himself Wednesday night at the climax of a two-hour assault on his hideout by more than 30 policemen.

Robert L. Kilmer, 27, a Fresno, Calif., mill worker, took his own life as police wearing bullet-proof vests and armed with shot-guns and tear gas bombs stormed his apartment while a crowd of about 1,000 persons watched.

He had been sought since last Thursday when the nearly nude, body of attractive Mrs. Mary Ann Prestridge, also of Fresno, was found stuffed in a car trunk in nearby Ingleswood.

Don Decker, 28, a byhook friend of Kilmer and occupant with his mother of the apartment where Kilmer was hiding, tipped police where to find the fugitive.

Decker said Kilmer came to his apartment near the Samuel Goldwyn Studios last Friday. He said he was unaware of Kilmer's involvement in the slaying, until several nights ago when the fugitive took a newspaper from under an "orderly condition," police said.

Long Flight Is Staggered By Weather

BIG SPRING, Tex. (UPI)—Threatening flying weather Wednesday night forced another interruption in Louisiana Gov. Earl K. Long's vacation trip to El Paso, Tex.

Authorities at Webb Air Force Base here advised him to stay overnight to avoid thunderstorms.

The governor and his party were met by Acting Base Commander Col. James Johnson as they arrived at the base about 9 p.m. Long dined at the officers' club and retired to the VIP accommodations of the visiting officer's quarters after a short news conference devoted mostly to posing for pictures.

Long and his party had hoped to fly on to El Paso, situated just across the border from the bright lights and fancy night life of Juarez, Mexico.

Still Peaved
The ailing governor still peaved at an East Texas newspaper editor who wrote a "Long-to-home" front page editorial earlier this week, reaffirmed his decision to visit El Paso in his West Texas swing.

The governor alerted his National Guard platoon to have his twin engine airplane ready for the trip by 4 a.m. today. Still, no definite decision was made whether the Long party would finally make the flight or continue in the plush, air-conditioned Cadillac he paid more than \$10,000 for shortly before leaving Louisiana.

The drive Wednesday from Fort Worth was broken only by a short stop at Cisco, Tex., and another unexpected stop along the highway.

Lose Luggage
Luggage for the party crumpled on the roadway from a newly purchased luggage carrier on top of the huge black car. The governor's aides scurried back along the pavement to retrieve the scattered suitcases and stuffed inside around the governor's feet inside.

The party stopped in Cisco to chat with Mrs. J. C. Mobley and other old friends from Long's early years as a Texas banking powder-and-bucket peddler.

The group left Fort Worth shortly after the governor addressed more than 100 Junior Chamber of Commerce members, and told them of his experience in "three crazy houses" Paul Johnson, Jacee president, gave Long a pair of silver spurs to go with eight pairs of boots he bought Tuesday.

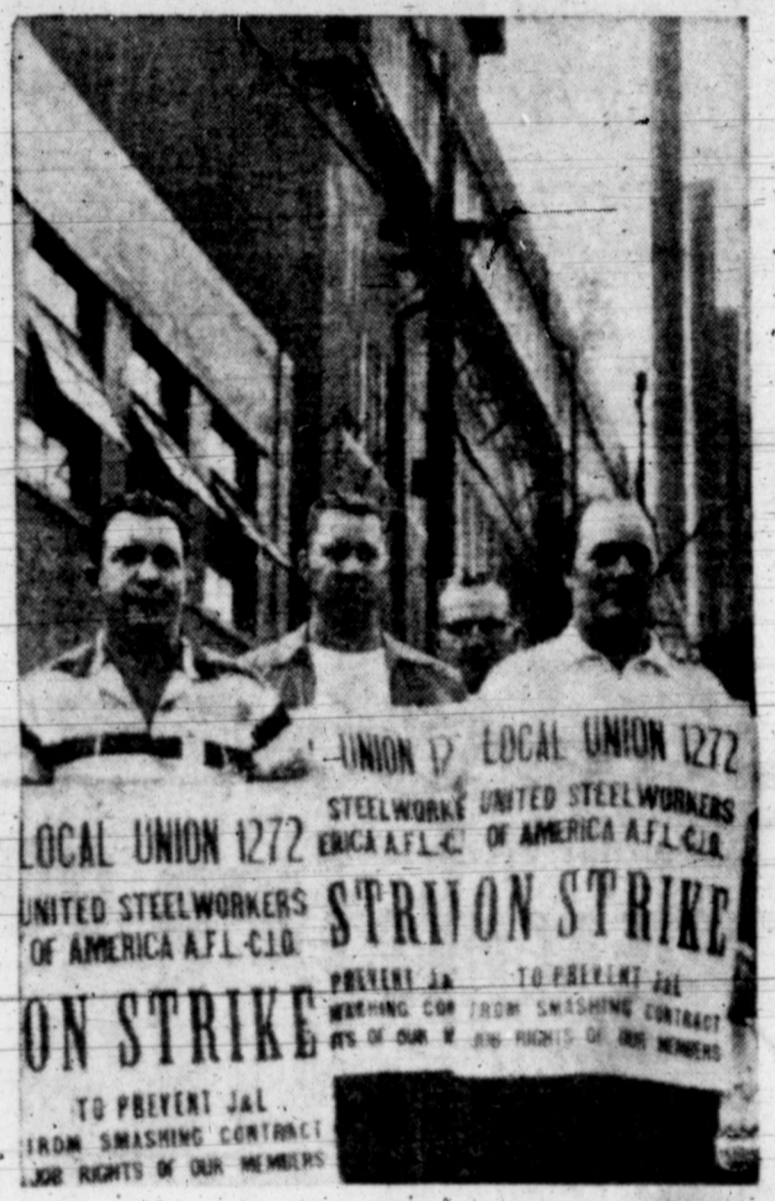
From El Paso, Long said he hoped to visit Monterrey, Mexico.

Pickets Tramping Steel Mills' Gates

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Pickets patrolling the nation's idle steel mills guided for a long strike today. The government's top labor trouble shooter predicted that a solution won't be "early or easy."

Federal Mediation Chief Joseph T. Finnegan said setting the crippling tie-up will take time and is not going to be accomplished by any magic formula.

Finnegan reported to Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell on his fruitless meetings with union and management leaders in New York.

"I don't think that a solution of this problem will be early or easy," he told United Press International.

Finnegan announced after the talks that the strike was "a very serious one" and is "not susceptible to an easy or early solution." He postponed further mediation efforts until next Monday.

Union President David J. McDonald agreed with Finnegan's statement that the strike situation was "very serious." He began a tour of eastern steel centers at Bethlehem, Pa., today and said other union leaders would go to Chicago and Pittsburgh to talk with strikers.

Idle in 24 States
Steel workers are idle in 24 states, halting production of an average of 300,000 tons of steel each day.

A half-million basic steel workers walked off their jobs at midday Tuesday, shutting down 20 per cent of the nation's steel-making capacity. After nine weeks of bargaining had failed to bring agreement on a new contract between the 12 biggest steel firms and the United Steelworkers of America (USWA), thousands of workers in supporting industries already have been laid-off as a result of the steel shutdown and the jobs of tens of thousands more were threatened. Coal and ore miners and Great Lakes seamen who handle shipment of raw materials to the mills were first affected. The Pennsylvania Railroad announced it would furlough 8,200 employees at the end of the week.

Merchants in steel towns across the nation reported business was down perceptibly. They invited their customers to "buy now-pay later."

USW Demand at Issue
At issue in the union's demand for a package increase estimated by it as 15 cents an hour and by the industry at near 25 cents.

The industry contended throughout negotiations that it is bound out contractually by existing agreements to resist any increase in its labor costs.

McDonald proposed Wednesday the establishment of a three-man fact-finding committee with an impartial chairman to be named by Chief Justice Earl Warren; to study the contract impasse and make non-binding recommendations.

Chief Justice Warren rejected it. An industry statement said, "We know the facts. You know the facts. We do not need third parties to find them for us."

President Soothes Cuban Resentment

HAVANA (UPI)—President Eisenhower's statement that the United States has not accused Fidel Castro of being a Communist soothed Cuban resentment toward Americans somewhat today, but relations between the two countries remained strained.

Premier Castro's government was determined to do all it could to discredit the testimony that former Cuban air force chief Pedro L. Diaz Lanz has been giving before the U.S. Senate Internal Security Subcommittee.

Diaz Lanz has testified he is convinced that Castro, his brother Raul Castro, chief of the armed forces, and several other high government officials are Communists.

Eisenhower, at his weekly press conference, said such charges are difficult to prove. "The United States has made no such charges," he added.

If it comes from a hardtack source we have it, Lewis Hove.

Fidel-Castro continued his silence on Diaz Lanz's charges but the official newspaper Revolution and other government spokesmen took up the attack.

Revolution Editor Carlos Franqui said in a signed editorial that Cuba was being "concretely threatened" by the United States.

The palace issued a statement said to have been authorized by Charles Shaw, news director of WCAU in Philadelphia, attacking Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), chairman of the committee questioning Diaz Lanz.

The statement said the majority of the American people long had been "abashed" of Eastland as an "enemy of democracy" and a "white racist."

David Salvador, head of the Cuban workers, denied there were any Communists in the labor movement.

Reinaldo Ramirez, director of a private investigation agency, came forward to charge that he investigated Diaz Lanz in March and determined that he had been a traitor who had tipped off U.S. customs officers as to where they could capture arms destined for the Cuban revolution.

Barbecued Biscuits Sure To Score Knockout Hit At Next Patio Party

A new trick with refrigerated biscuits suggested by the Pillsbury people puts this handy product right into the cookout scheme of things. Believe it or not, you can actually bake biscuits over the glowing coals on the barbecue grill. The garlic-flavored biscuits to serve with steak or chicken, quartered biscuits to serve with dips, biscuits rolled around hot dogs, sweetened biscuits for shortcake desserts.

Once you learn these three simple techniques of fresh-air-biscuit baking, you'll probably add variations and versions galore to your repertoire: first, when you bake whole biscuits, use a pocket of aluminum foil with all sides sealed closed. Like all charcoal cooking, these new ways to bake biscuits are fun to do and you'll enjoy the light tender results. As a start, you might try these "barbecued biscuits" at your next cookout.

PICNIC HOT DOGS IN JACKETS

United States Headache Builds Up In Caribbean

Foreign News Commentary By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign Editor While the U. S. secretary of state is tied up with the Russians at Geneva, a king-size headache for the United States continues to build up in the Caribbean. Since the beginning of the year, a half-dozen of the 21 American republics have been the targets of uprising, usually fostered by political exiles whose model and, by all the evidence, sometimes mentor is Cuba's Fidel Castro. Latest to be hit, for the second time in a month, was Honduras. At the same time, newsmen in Port-Au-Prince, Haiti, and Ciudad Trujillo in the Dominican Republic were standing by for other threatened outbreaks. Others already had occurred or were threatened in Guatemala, Nicaragua, and Panama. **Uphill Battle** Outside the Caribbean, President Arturo Frondizi of Argentina fought his uphill way against opposition, at least some of whom were in the pay of exiled one-time Argentine dictator Juan D. Peron. Abortive attempts had been made against the government of Paraguay. An unhappy witness has been the United States with a primary interest in preserving Caribbean peace but fettered by both old and new dangers. Castro played up one of them with a blast against the U. S. for

Bellamy Or Heston Will Play Roosevelt In Movie

Right now it's a toss-up. Producer Lore Schary whose spectacular Broadway success has yielded 555 performances, says his decision is up to Bellamy. "Ralph hasn't told me whether he wants to play the role or not," Schary said. "He thinks it may be too old for the movie version, but I think Ralph would be just as effective as he is on a stage. If he wants the part it's his to lose, in the play Roosevelt is

depleted between the ages of 39 and 41, and Ralph is 54." **Plays Historical Figures** Heston, on the other hand is in his mid-30s, and accustomed to playing historical figures. "Charlton would make a fine Roosevelt," Schary said. "We won't go into production until next March, so there is ample time to think about casting the role. If neither Ralph nor Charlton are able to do it, I have a couple of other actors in mind. Use Hyde Park "We'll shoot the bulk of the picture in Hollywood with locations at Campobello and Hyde Park, the old Roosevelt home. It is now a national shrine, but I think the Department of Interior will give us permission to use the old house for actual interior scenes." Schary went on to say that Eleanor Roosevelt helped tremendously with details and background material while he was writing the play. "Sunrise At Campobello" was a great hit with everybody because of the wonderful emotional response it elicited from every audience. I even received congratulations from the toughest of Republicans. "The story is not essentially political. It relates an era in the life of a warm human being who overcomes a dreadful handicap of polio.

Wagoner Gets Scholarship In Transportation

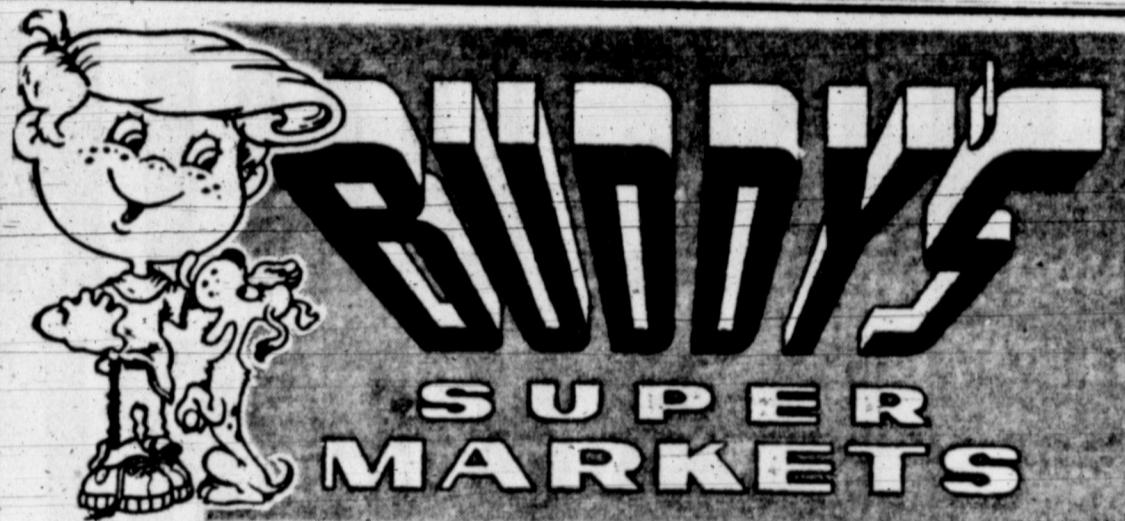

Washington's Tourists As Naive As Any Other Summer Flock

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Senate secretary with a number of years service behind her was stopped the other day by a Capitol guide with the suggestion she might profit by taking the official tour of the building.

"I can't do it today," she hedged, without denying his premise. "I don't have on my halter and shorts."

Officials say it isn't actually mandatory that tourists wear next to nothing when they visit our law factory here. On the other hand it has become obvious in the recent hot spell that they aren't required to wear anything much more than that either.

Several summers ago House members got so distracted by what the visiting ladies weren't wearing that a rule was imposed banning shorts in the galleries except where worn by girls under 10.

There is no evidence that attendance fell off among the House members. However, it was ascertained within a few days that dozens of the rejected visitors not only were over 10 but over 21, and were registered voters in some congressional district. So that rule was repealed.

Come As You Are

Now, the rule for visitors in both House and Senate galleries is "come as you are." And several lawmakers have been heard lately to comment on the number of women who appear to have received this message while out taking the sun.

Male and female, the taxpayers are visiting the Capitol again this summer in droves. And more than one jostled statesman has been moved to observe, as he beat his way through the corridors, that some of them acted as if they

owned the place.

"Where are all the members of Congress?" They usually want to know after finding only a dozen of the House's 436 members, or three of the Senate's 98, on the House and Senate floors. The answer is, they are in the offices answering letters from home, and attending to other such priority chores.

"Where is the President?" is another all-time favorite inquiry, a sad commentary on what they must be teaching in the civics classes back home. This one is so standard, in fact, that the guides now try to head it off by an early announcement that the President lives and works at another local tourist attraction, called the White House.

The Capitol tour takes 35 minutes and I don't know anywhere else you can pick up so much history for 25 cents. There is also the chance you will bump into somebody whose name you can mention on the postcards you write to your friends.

One presumed student of the current political scene, aged about 14, was spotted recently

hanging around the entrance to an elevator marked "senators only." After the passage of enough orators and presidential prospects to satisfy the most ardent celebrity hunter, somebody finally asked this visitor what he had on his mind.

"I'm waiting to see Harmon Killbrew," he is said to have answered.

Another elevator, I am embarrassed to say, is marked "press only." A lady observed this sign above the call button and asked, "What do they think we are going to do, pull it?"

When apprised that the sign meant the elevator was reserved for us newsmen, she asked, with some reason, how come? "Because nobody else wants to ride

with us," a harassed reporter replied.

Sullivan Will Take Program To Muscovites

UPI Hollywood Correspondent LAS VEGAS (UPI) — Ed Sullivan, who steps all over the English language on his TV show, is hard at work studying Russian for his junket to the U.S.S.R. later this month to introduce his "really big show" to Muscovites.

Sullivan will spend three weeks behind the Iron Curtain, determined to spread American goodwill among the Reds.

"My whole attitude stems from reading 'The Ugly American,'" the Irish smee explained.

"We were represented as a pretty sad people losing goodwill in the cold war because we haven't the brains to visit foreign countries and speak to the natives in their own language.

Illiterate or Discourteous

"That puts us in the position of being either illiterate or extremely discourteous. Neither of which will gain us friends.

"Europeans and Asiatics resent it, and I don't blame them. When foreigners come to this country on official business they usually know how to speak English. We expect it of them. So why shouldn't they also expect us to put ourselves out a little!"

Sullivan is knocking himself out five hours a day in this resort town working with Professor Alexander Malbin of the Army Language School at Monterey, Calif. He's taking the accelerated course with tape machines, special records and alphabet books.

Trouble is Old Stone Face doesn't sound any better in Russian than he does in English. But he's in there pitching.

Has Knowledge

"I've already learned to say things like thank you, good morning, please, applause and goodbye," he said proudly. Then he gave it a whirl in Russian, and it just might bring on World War III.

Ed is starring in his own revue at the plush Desert Inn Hotel which is very much like his own weekly CBS video show.

He's more relaxed on stage than on the air and manages to score very well in a comedy sketch.

"The troupe I'm taking to Russia includes Marge and Gower Champion and Dick Contino," he went on. "We'll give eight shows a week in Moscow for two weeks, and then move to Leningrad for the third week.

To Use Russian Acts

"I have an agreement with their ministry of culture to choose six top Russian acts to integrate into our show and to tape them in action for my own program when we get back.

Russians are particularly pleased when Americans speak their language.

"The whole flavor of our meetings with the ministry of culture changed when Bob Precht (a member of my staff) was able to speak to them in Russian. They grinned and talked their heads off to him. Bob's talent helped clinch permission to go over there."

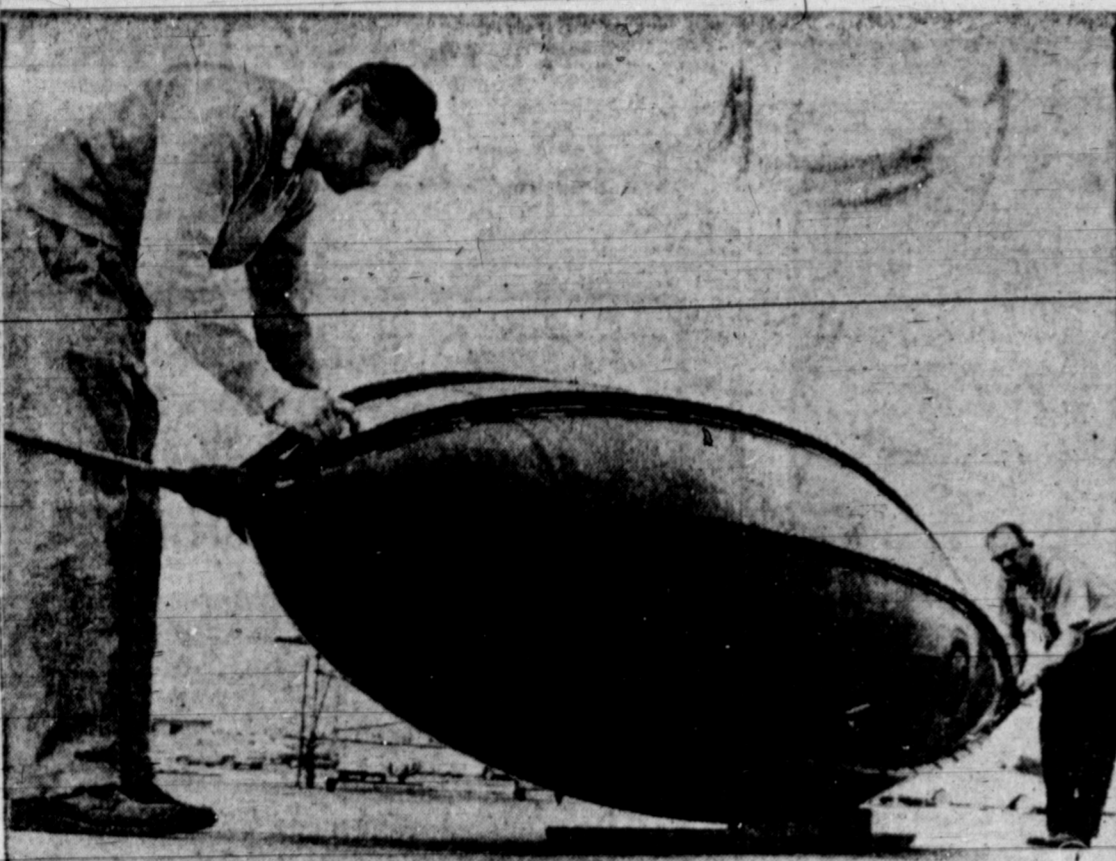

Quintana Will Wrestle Bulls To Open Men's Clothing Store

By CHESTER SELTZER United Press International

JUAREZ, Mexico (UPI)—Manuel Quintana, a burly Spanish wrestler who wants to open a men's clothing store, plans to go into business with the money he earns wrestling 850-pound fighting bulls.

Manuel, the 30-year-old European middleweight champion, said he stopped grappling with men and began wrestling bulls because of the higher pay scale.

"In Mexico City I earned about 2,000 pesos—about \$165—for a main event and much less than that in the Mexican provinces," he said. "But when I wrestle bulls I get 50 per cent of the gate receipts which so far has amounted to more than \$1,000."

He hopes eight or 10 more wrestling matches with bulls will net him working capital for the store he plans to open in Mexico City or Madrid, Spain.

Manuel said bullfighting officials fined the subaltern for rushing into the ring while the wrestling match was going on.

Manuel's second match with a bull. He killed a bull with his bare hands at Bogota, Colombia two years ago. He admitted the bull carried the fight to him most of the way. The fast-charging animal forced him to jump the wooden fence encircling the ring.

But he said he turned the tide of battle his way after he swung the bull around by the tail and set him up for a headlock.

Manuel said he signed contracts to wrestle bulls at Nogales and Torreon when his hand heals.

Manuel, son of a Santander, Spain bull breeder, began grappling with bulls when he was only 15. He said he had to wrestle the bulls to the ground so he could give them medicine.

"I wanted to be a matador but I was too bulky," he said. "So since I lacked a matador's grace I finally decided to make my living wrestling bulls instead of capturing them."

Has Hard Tussle

"Wrestling bulls seems like a hard way to raise capital, but a man can't let himself drown in a little water," he said. "A man who wants a settled and secure life has got to take risks to achieve it."

Manuel, wearing Roman sandals, a tunic and headband, wrestled a bull called "Blue Beard" in a throwback to Roman circus days at the Alberto Balderas bullring last week.

The spectacle was the first of its kind in the bullring since a bull and a lion fought in 1947. Manuel grappled the bull to its knees but couldn't throw him.

The fight ended unexpectedly, Manuel said, while he still had one of the bull's horns and muzzle secured in a headlock and was straining to topple him. He said a bullfighting subaltern, fearing the wildly thrashing bull would gore him, stormed into the ring with a dagger. The subaltern slashed at the bull. But he missed and skirts may go down to below the knee, bringing them to American length. At least one fashion house—Ava Gardner's favorite, Fantasia Sisters of Rome—plans a "natural silhouette" with the emphasis on tiny waists.

in Frankfurt. The planes will be spread around bases through southern Germany, although their exact disposition is a closely guarded secret. The warplanes are being transferred as result of the French dispute with NATO over atomic stockpiles on French territory. While American spokesmen have emphasized that U.S. feelings toward France remain as friendly as always, British newspapers are saying that this final step means that France almost is out of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

MOUNT OLYMPUS:

If there is a summit meeting following the Foreign Ministers Conference in Geneva, it is almost certain to take place in Europe. The British, the Americans and the Russians have no objections to a place like San Francisco. In fact, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev might prefer it. But the Germans and the French do not like the idea and that makes Geneva or Vienna the most likely sites.

ROYAL TOUR:

It's now almost certain that Crown Prince Akihito and his commoner princess will make a tour abroad, probably within a year. Their romantic marriage created headlines around the world and a tour would help popularize Japan and Japanese products.

TRADE WAR:

In the midst of the uproar over Italian fashion shows open July 16, and there are predictions

British officialdom is very worried about a problem that is providing few headlines: the economic war in Europe. High-level British thinking is that a potential economic war between the six common market nations and the free-trade "outer seven" led by Britain can do more damage to Europe and NATO than Khrushchev's threats. The common market nations include the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, West Germany, France and Italy. Britain fears that if the six common market nations should erect a common tariff wall, then Western Europe would be split just as effectively as if by a war.

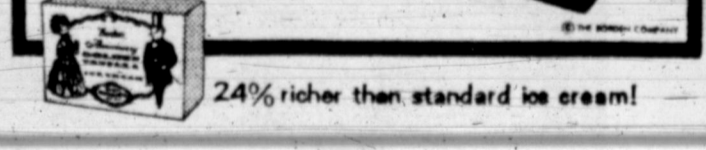

Because this type of family vacation home is enjoying a boom, I talked with one of the largest dealers in the country, Robert Crist, Chicago, who rents and sells travel trailers and mobile homes.

The housekeeping to be done depends on the site and equipment of the trailer that's rented. Travel trailers, incidentally, are the junior-sized mobile homes and are light in weight, readily pulled by an ordinary car.

More families are renting trailers for vacation travels. Crist thinks, to help beat the high cost of room and board. Also, to have more freedom of choice in where they go and how long they stay.

The superhighways which make for easy motoring also encourage the travel-trailer vacation.

You supply the linens, including kitchen towels, blankets and such dishes, pots and pans. If you want to travel independent of trailer parks and their electric and sanitary facilities, the self-contained trailer is advised.

For about seven to 10 dollars a day, this rented unit will sleep four to six people (how they do it is through ingenious design; dinette become beds, canvas bunks roll out of the wall).

Bottled gas is used for cooking, water heater, the trailer will usually have a shower, toilet, and septic tank.

Space is limited, so multipurpose or folding equipment is useful. Folding table and chairs for outdoor eating and lounging are valuable to have along. Nested aluminum or steel utensils such as campers use are space conserving and unbreakable.

In any vacation housekeeping plan, it pays to think ahead to what you'll do about laundry. Will there be self-service laundries available? Will you have to do most of it by hand?

If so, you might want to tuck in a washboard and a can of concentrated liquid detergent as insurance against not being able to buy it later and having then, to

Meeting with favor among vacationers is a small, nine-pound washing machine with histintox tub or pail and washes a four-pound load in about 10 minutes. This does require electricity, however.

The absence of hot water, or enough of it, is a familiar beef among vacationers. A new, electric, faucet-water heater claims to help end the complaint. The heater, which fits on a faucet and is plugged into an AC outlet, goes into action, makers say, on five pounds of pressure. Regulating the flow with the faucet handle determines the temperature of water—slow flow very hot; fast flow, warm water.



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Haralson's Homer Nips Borger, 7-6

Rebs Cop It In 9th Frame

BORGER—Horatio Alger Jr. couldn't have stretched prone in his garret, nibbled at a wine bottle and come up with a better plot.

- Victory for the underdog away from home.
- Winning runs scored in the 9th inning after two out and a 3-2 pitch on the batter.
- Nice guy Terry Haralson in the hero's role.

Only thing it needed was for Debbie Reynolds to climb atop the dugout and sing, "You Wouldn't Dare Insult Me, Sir, If Jack Were Only Here."

It was an American Legion District I survival of the fittest here Wednesday night with underdog Pampa springing a minor miracle by trimming Borger's Stars, 7-6, in a chiller-diller that saw the lead change hands five times.

Pampa's Rebels drew first blood with a two-run third frame, fell behind 4-2 in the sixth inning, regrouped their forces for a 5-4 lead in the seventh and then again lost their precious lead in the eighth as Borger spiked home plate twice for a 6-5 advantage.

Then in the top of the ninth, Frank Merriwell could have collaborated with Alfred Hitchcock in a technicolor production and with Cinema Scope yet, and they couldn't have outdone the suspenseful and stunning climax young Haralson, the husky Pampa catcher, was to write.

Wendell Ridgway opened the ninth by rolling out to third, Rebel centerfielder Bob Stephens, who had singled in each of his last two appearances, drew one of the nine walks issued by Wild Man Bob Connelly, the aspirin tablet-throwing Borger hurler.

Clean-up batter Larry Stroud contributed his third strikeout to Connelly's game total of 18 for the second out. Then, along came Haralson who had himself whiffed on three previous at-bats and whose stick of lumber hasn't exactly been burning up the league of late either.

As if the playwriter would have it no other way, the count soared to 3-2 on Haralson before he cracked a long fly ball down the right-field line that would have been a two-run homer had it not curved foul at the last minute. The 364 paid attendance cleared the field and almost fainted into a swoon. The count remained 3-2, there was still two out and Stephens was still dancing gingerly off first base, representing the tying run.

The lanky red-topped Connelly went into his stretch, a fastball shot-out-of-his-right-handed cannon high and hard. There was that pleasant sound of ash smacking horsehide. A white sphere rose in a graceful arch toward rightfield. It seemed to pick up steam as it shot toward the dark overhang, like something out of Cape Canaveral. The ball continued its climb and the roar of spectators steepened with every foot it ascended until bedlam really broke loose the magic moment it cleared the right field wall at the 335-foot mark.

The dramatic and clutch poke by Haralson—biggest in his life—meant victory for Pampa and elimination from the district race for Borger. The Rebel triumph clinched at least a tie for the conference title for the kids of coaches Lloyd Summers and Bill Ridgway.

While Haralson's homer in the ninth made him the big hero, there were other Rebels deserving of heaps of praise.

Veteran lefthander Kippy Williams never faltered in hurling the distance and scattering seven Borger hits while fanning eight and walking five. Keith Gregory at third and Ridgway at shortstop turned in eight assists between them to help Williams out of plenty of tight spots.

Connelly started strong fanning seven of the first nine Rebel batters he faced. Roy Don Stephens and Gregory worked him for a walk in the third, however, and a single to right by Ridgway gave Pampa a 1-0 lead. Bob Stephens took a curve ball on the left arm to load the sacks and Connelly walked Haralson to force home a second tally.

Borger slapped Williams for three singles and a walk and an error pushed the Stars ahead 4-2 in the sixth. But in the seventh Pampa forged back ahead as Williams singled down the leftfield line to open the frame. Gregory walked, Ridgway flew to deep left and both runners advanced a base on a wild pitch. A single to right by Stephens scored Williams and a clutch single to left by Ruben Strickland sent both Gregory and Stephens scurrying home for a 4-4 Pampa lead.

Borger again streaked ahead, 6-5, in the eighth on an error, double by Duke McLean and single by Ray Atkins.

But Haralson's two-ply blast in the ninth won it for the visiting Pampa crew and Williams got the side out in the last of the ninth with only a walk throwing a minor scare into a large delegation of Pampa rooters who made the trip over for the crucial engagement.

Stephens with two safeties gathered one-third of Pampa's six hits. Borger played flawlessly afield while the Rebs committed four miscues.

Drysdale Fast Ball Sounds Like Music

Some say it hums, some say it whistles, but no matter what it does, Don Drysdale's fast ball sure sounds like pennant music to the Dodgers' ears.

Standing up at the plate against the side-arming Drysdale is like facing a firing squad without a blindfold, according to National League hitters.

The six-foot, five-inch Los Angeles right-hander is sheer murder on right-handed batters when he fires those sizzling fast balls at them by way of "third base." Some of those hitters don't seem to know whether to wince or wind their watch.

Drysdale turned in that type of performance Wednesday night when he pitched a three-1-batter and struck out seven Pittsburgh batters in a 2-0 victory that lifted the Dodgers within one game of the National League lead.

The victory was Drysdale's 11th against six losses, and those seven strikeouts increased his total to 147 in 2-3 innings—tops in the majors.

To complete his night's work, the 25-year-old Drysdale doubled off loser Bob Friend to drive in two runs in the seventh. The loss was Friend's 11th in 15 decisions.

The Chicago Cubs tightened their hold on fifth place with a 5-2 victory over the Milwaukee Braves and the Cincinnati Reds defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 11-5. Rain caused postponement of the San Francisco-Philadelphia game.

In the American League, Washington took over fifth place and dropped Detroit to sixth by beating the Tigers, 3-0, in a game limited to five innings by rain. The rain also washed out a doubleheader between the Indians and Yankees and single games between the White Sox and Red Sox and the Athletics and Orioles.
