Conference Near Deadlock; West Plan Like 'Noah's Ark'

Agreement Appears **Impossible**

GENEVA (UPI) - The East-West foreign ministers conference approached total deadlock today. Both sides admitted privately the only hope appeared to be in some interim agreement on Berlin that would lead to a summit

Even a Berlin agreement appeared impossible without a major backdown by one side or the other. The West wrote off as entirely unacceptable a three point Soviet plan. The Soviets said Western hopes to freeze the situation there might lead to war.

The brightest hope came in a Premier Nikita Khrushchev would visit Albania from May 25 to June 6. That apparently meant he expected his six-month deadline on Berlin to pass on May 27 without

Last Thanksgiving Day Khrushchev told the world the Allies must get out of Belin within six months and make West Berlin a "free city." The alternative, he said, would be for the Russians to turn over access to the city to Communist East Germany,

U.S. Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy warned Tuesday the Geneva conference would collapse if ne Russians stir up new trouble unlikely they would do so,


