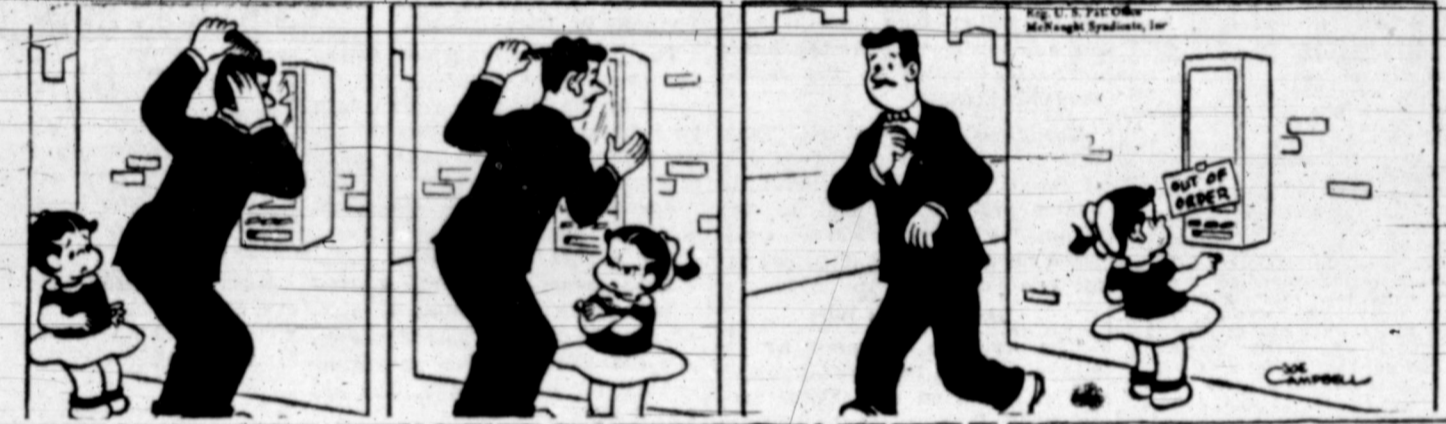

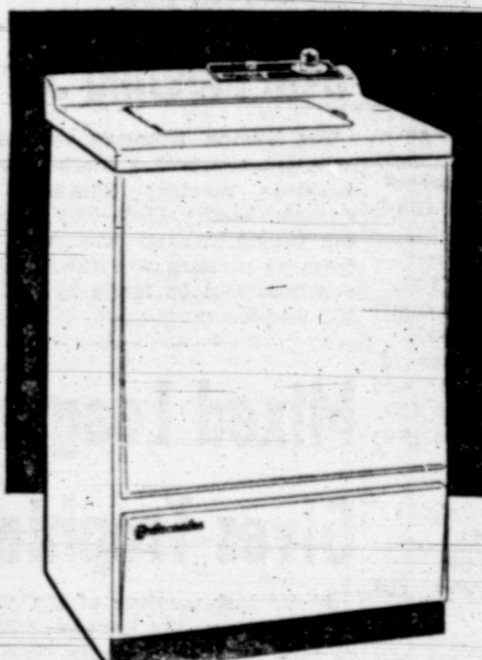

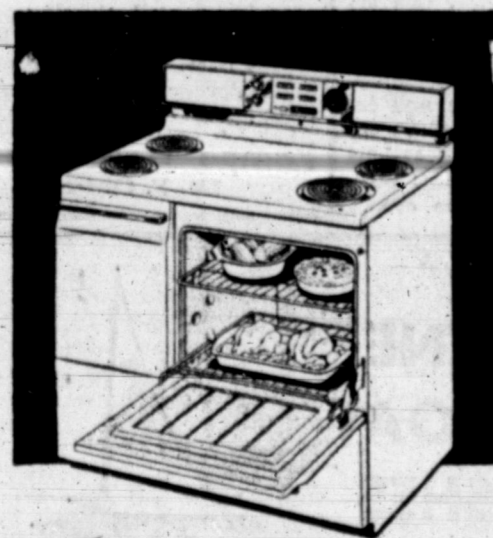

Cure For Inflation

A great deal is being said these days about inflation. However much is said, there seems to be a disparity of view respecting the causes of this dreadful tax. Unless or until the causes of inflation can be corrected, no cure is possible.

There is one school of thought which insists that labor unions create inflation. The proponents of this view hold that labor bosses, in their annual demands for more pay, force up wages, consequently force up prices.

There is a second school of thought which holds that business is responsible. Here it is believed that business men, by pricing products high enough to include a margin of profit are the responsible agents. Since it is demonstrated that it is the business man himself, who appends the price tag to the merchandise, it is concluded that business itself is responsible for high prices, and hence the creator of inflation.

Men in government frequently blame both business and labor for inflation. They offer the argument that it is both of these groups acting independently or together, who contrive to push prices up. Consequently, it is not unusual for men in government to argue in favor of wage and price controls, believing as they do, that labor controls wages and that business controls prices.

These are all opinions which are formed at the surface of the problem and are not necessarily valid. Inflation is deep-seated and relates to two factors which have not been mentioned, but which are the moving forces behind any inflation. These two factors can be called: 1) Pressure upon government provided by people singly or in groups which pressure calls for more government provided goods and services. 2) Willing reaction to pressure by men in government, who seek to increase the expenses and the size of government.

Clearly, the true cure in this dread malady is found only in self-reliance and self-control and on government's part, the more it spends, the less able to cope with it, financially, the people become. "Time" On Printing Unions' Costly Practice

Since a free and unhampered press is of the utmost importance, the public should be aware of the method used by the printers trade union to intimidate publishers on their wasteful practices.

The larger cities are usually more demanding in wasteful practices than the smaller cities. In many smaller cities the printer union does not demand that the publisher reset matter that comes in plate or mat form. That is, unless the publisher either privately or publicly criticizes the union.

"Against such practices," most U. S. publishers can only shrug helplessly. The pressmen's union is one of the five members of the International Allied Printing Trades Assn., which also includes the International Typographical Union, the International Stereotypers' and Electrotypers' Union, the International Photo-Engravers' Union and the International Brotherhood of Bookbinders.

Admiral Hyman Rickover, famed "father" of the history-making nuclear submarines, strongly urged construction of an atomic-powered carrier. The subcommittee was favorably impressed.

But the \$200 million cost of such a carrier blocked it. "I am not against this," declared the subcommittee member, "I am heartily in favor of nuclear carriers, and particularly nuclear day in and day out for economy. Any additional funds we approve should be for the most immediate urgent purposes."

"Modernizing the weapons and equipment of the Army is top on such a list. We know the Soviet is way ahead of us in modernizing its huge army. With the President insisting on cutting the strength of the Army, from 900,000 to 870,000, the least we can do is to improve its fighting potential."

The Navy already has Forrestal-class carriers and is building others. It can wait a year to get more of them. But the Army is already dangerously behind in modernized equipment. Such a program should have been started several years ago.

Ike's Giant Jet! Spiked By House

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower is going to have to continue using his big propeller-powered Columbine — if the House Appropriations Subcommittee in charge of the defense budget has its way.

The giant Boeing 707 jet the Air Force proposes getting for him has been spiked.

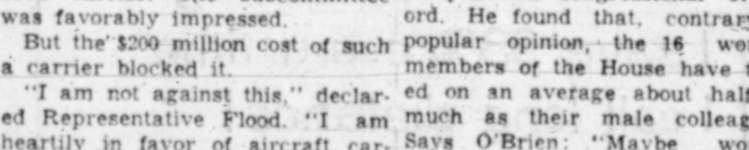
At a closed-door meeting of the subcommittee, following sharply critical comments by Representative Daniel Flood (D., Pa.), voted against appropriating \$53 million for the purchase of 10 of these new planes for the President, the cabinet and other top officials.

It is not the end of this matter. It still has to be approved by the full House Appropriations Committee, which is very powerful; then by the House as a whole; after which the issue goes over to the Senate, where the process is repeated.

The season has opened on the American tourist.

He is the two-legged bird, hab, hab, hab, who wears a money-belt carrier, travelers' checks, has a passport and migrates to Europe in the summer.

Starting around May 15, and continuing until September when he has to return to put his fledglings in school, the American tourist is the favorite target of critics.

Travel editors bombard him with advice on how to behave when abroad.

Foreign newspaper columnists and cartoonists shoot at him with unkind words.

Even his own State Department, when it issues him a passport, sends along a printed slip asking him to behave himself.

Magazine articles and letters to the editor paint him as a boor, a self-will ambassador, and something much better kept in a coop at home.

His wearing of a camera slung across his shoulders is decried. So is his occasional flash of a roll of bills or travelers' checks. He is told, in short, to change his personality the moment he walks up a gangplank, or takes a seat in a plane. It would be much better, it is advised, to arrive in Europe as meek as a mouse, as drab as a boxcar, as dull as second-hand dishwater, as scornful of his country as if it were a second-rate land.

Also, the American tourist is told to mind his manners, to do his best to be a gentleman, and not to upset the Europeans with his restlessness.

To put it plainly, all of this makes me mad, angry, sore and sick to my stomach. As an American tourist of long standing, I resent all this downgrading of me, and the likes of me. By and large, Americans are the most gracious, understanding, helpful kind people in the world. And that goes for whether they are at home in Iowa or abroad in Rome. They'll put up with more, ask less, and laugh more at being put upon than any other travelers in the world.

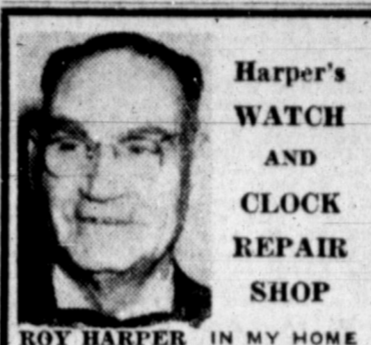
A lengthy steel strike could result in a permanent loss of markets to domestic producers and a permanent loss of jobs to American steel workers, Steel Magazine warned. The metalworking weekly forecast that steel imports might reach 400,000 tons in the second month of a walkout. During the first 30 days imports could be about 240,000 tons.

Demand for lead and zinc were strong at current prices. Some trade circles looked for another mark-up in the price of lead, now 12 cents a pound. On top of the 1/2-cent advance early this month, copper remained firm at 31 1/2 cents for producer metal and 32 cents a pound for custom smelter copper with the domestic supply picture still tight.

A 1/2-percentage point increase in the prime rate charged by commercial banks to their best credit risks—went into effect and heightened speculation that the federal reserve system would hike the discount rate. The increase in the prime rate from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent came in the wake of mounting demand for bank loans.

Public hearings start in November to study ways of broadening the income tax to include many types of income now exempt. The study by the House Ways & Means Committee will be aimed at determining whether new sources of revenue can be found that would permit "significant" cuts in corporate and personal income tax rates.

The Supreme Court ruled that once truckers collect their charges shippers are barred from seeking court orders declaring the rates too high. The Interstate Commerce Commission, which can order refunds of railroad rates, lacks the same power over trucking rates.
