Like Requests Talks To Avert Steel Strike

NEW YORK (UPI)—The executive board of the United Steelworkers Union today ordered union negotiators to comply with President Eisenhower's request for immediate resumption of contract talks in an effort to avert a strike at midnight Tuesday.

Immediately after the executive board meeting, David J. McDonald, president of the USW, rushed from the room and telephoned R. Conrad Cooper, chief industry negotiator, to inform him of the executive board's action.

Steel mills across the country had already begun banking their furnaces in preparation for a strike, which would close mills which produce nine-tenths of the nation's steel.

McDonald, standing outside the ballroom of the Hotel Roosevelt where the board met, placed a number of phone calls in an effort to contact Cooper and inform him of the action.

There was a pause. Then McDonald said: "I'd like to meet as soon as possible, Coop."

McDonald then turned around and in a loud voice said to newsmen: "We're going to resume negotiations at 12 noon. This is as soon as they can get the boys up there."

Still at issue today, as on the day negotiations opened, is the industry's demand for a one-year wage and price freeze.

MILLS ARE CLOSING

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—The nation's major steel firms began the process of closing down furnaces and mills today on the eve of an impending "walkout" by 500,000 steel workers.

South Gary works, which employ a total of about 33,000 workers, Inland Steel planned to begin shutting down its East Chicago plant, which employ about 5,000 workers at its South Chicago plant, will start closing down electric furnaces and open hearths early Tuesday morning.

Republic Steel, with about 5,000 workers at its South Chicago plant, will start closing down electric furnaces and open hearths early Tuesday morning.

Youngstown Sheet & Tube began shutdown operations at three of its Chicago area works early today.

Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. at Pittsburgh said it would start banking blast furnaces today pending the strike threat.

Shutting down steel mill operations involves a gradual process of emptying or banking due to the danger of damaging refractory brick linings. The linings are kept warm to protect them from sharp temperature changes.

Shutting down operations were started the week end prior to June 30 when the original contract was to expire, but the extension resulted in a resumption of production.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower today called for new labor-management efforts to head off a steel strike set for midnight Tuesday.

Eisenhower held two separate conferences on the steel situation, the first with Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell and the other with Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Wildcat Well Comes In for Governor Long

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—Gov. Earl Long of Louisiana said today that a "long shot, wildcat well" has presented him with a \$300,000 fortune.

Long, 63 and in and out of three mental wards since May 30, said that a main reason for his coming to Texas was to get straight in his own mind who the "scalawags" are in his administration.

He hopes before Wednesday to be invited to address the Texas Legislature.

From El Paso, Long expects to go to Monterey and Acapulco in Mexico.

Reverse In House Is Sought On Tax Bill

\$182 Million Tax Veto May Mean Third Session

AUSTIN (UPI)—A move was reported underway today in the House to reverse its stand in turning down a sales tax loaded 182 million dollar tax bill.

With only four days remaining in the second special session, some lawmakers said an effort was to be made to reconsider the vote by which the House rejected the Senate approved bill Saturday.

Such a move would pave the way for a vote directly on House Senate Conference Committee's report which placed the burden some 70 per cent on selective sales taxes, with almost 50 per cent of the total on cigarette and tobacco users.

Spectators Create Hazard Around Jet

NEW YORK (UPI)—City and airport officials took steps today to prevent a recurrence of the "Roman holiday" in which thousands of sight-seers swarmed to watch the emergency landing of a jet airliner, hampering fire and rescue equipment and endangering their own lives.

The Pan American World Airways plane, with 102 passengers and a crew of 11 aboard, lost part of its landing gear when it took off for London at 8:37 p.m. Saturday. It circled the field for four hours, reducing its fuel load and awaiting ground preparations for a possible belly landing, before it made a safe touch-down on its remaining wheels at 12:29 a.m. Sunday.

The emergency landing was necessitated by a broken landing gear. Two of the plane's eight main landing gear wheels fell off as the giant plane took off.

During those four hours, an estimated 30,000 persons converged on Idlewild Airport, clogging traffic for 15 miles and delaying fire engines and ambulances attempting to reach the landing scene.

As the plane took off, the pilot, Capt. Edward Sontmeier, was seen under the wing and another rescue equipment was at the truck of wheels under the nose. Other aid of the runway and As the craft ascended, a hollow could not have reached us if it forged metal tube snapped and were needed.

Reds Asked To Scrap Its Berlin 'Bomb'

GENEVA (UPI)—The Western powers called on Russia today to scrap its Berlin time bomb once and for all if it wants a summit meeting.

U.S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter told Russia's Andrei Gromyko in unequivocal terms that the West will not negotiate under an ultimatum, duress or the continued threat of a new Berlin crisis.

Herter delivered the warning on behalf of all the Western powers as the Big Four foreign ministers' conference resumed after a three-week "cooling off" period.

Herter, Gromyko and British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville met at the Palais des Nations for the second and probably decisive phase of the East-West talks.

Western officials said Gromyko had indicated that he did not wish to speak until after hearing what the West had to say.

It appeared certain the West would demand as a minimum for agreement on summit talks between heads of government Russian acceptance of a Berlin truce at least until 1961.

The general feeling in Geneva's hot and sticky air was that a bare minimum of agreement would be reached this time, possibly enabling the four heads of state to meet early in September without loss of face.

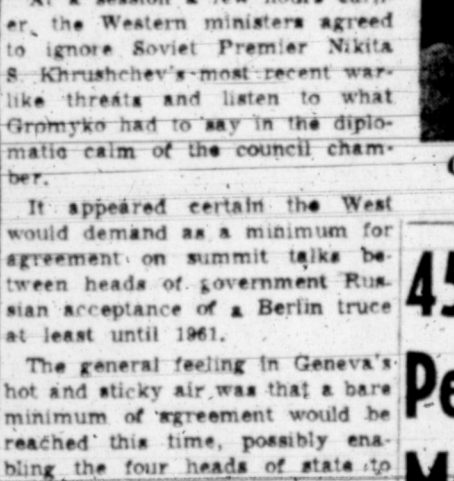
The East German official Communist newspaper Neues Deutschland called today for a "series of summit meetings" after the Geneva talks and predicted the Western ministers would have to accept a meeting of government heads.

But the optimistic newspaper showed no sign of Communist readiness to seek a compromise on Berlin.

Lloyd Expresses Hope
The most optimistic statement came from British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd who said on arrival Sunday, "We are going back hoping to reach agreement."

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter was guardedly optimistic. "Although I do not come here with high hopes," he said, "I believe it is possible with good will on both sides to reach an agreement."

French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville spoke only of a "limited concrete arrangement" and said that "progress can only be moderate."

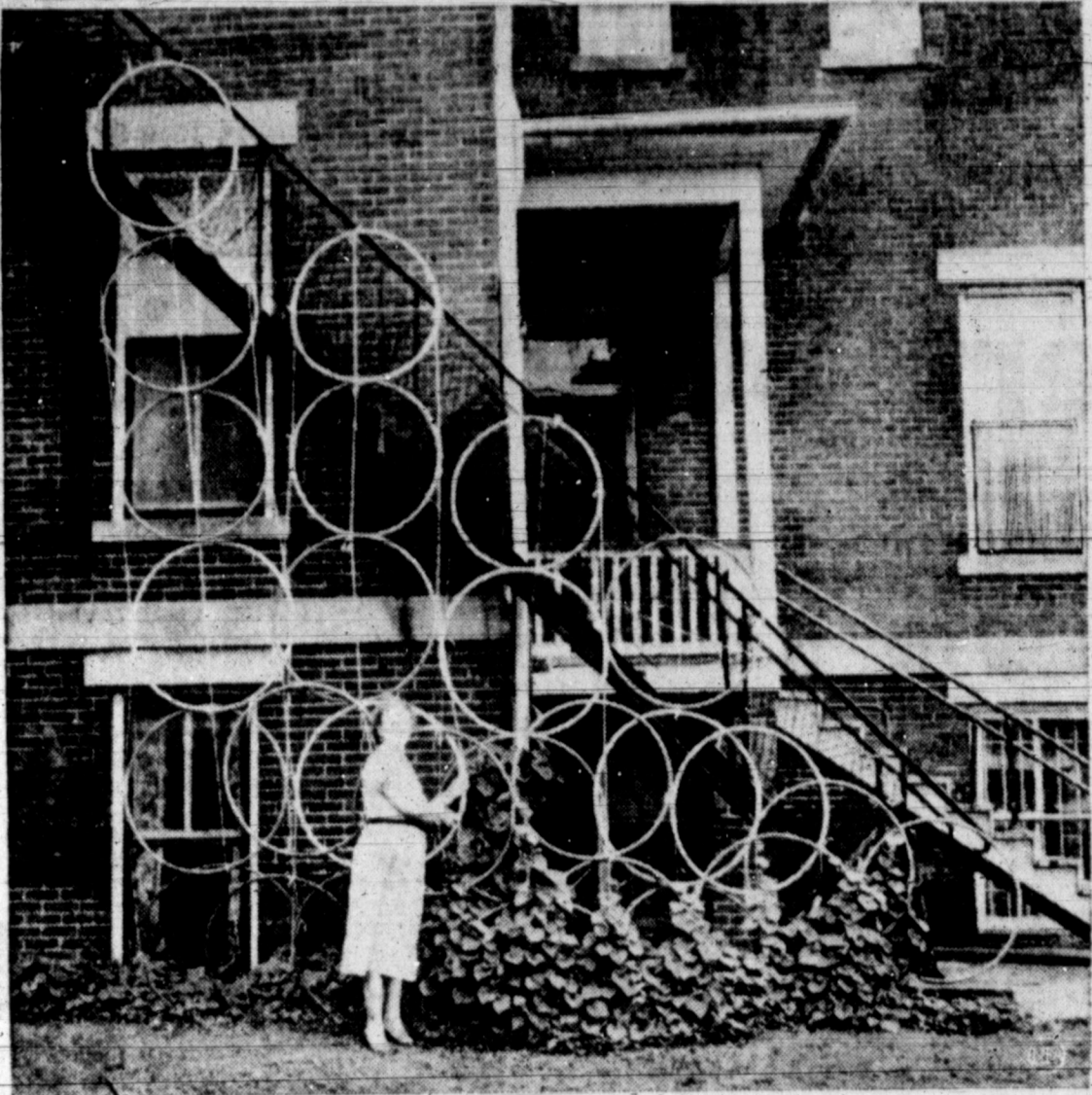
Damages of \$200 Result from Crash

'DRUNKARD' REVIVAL STAGGERS TO FINISH

By VERNON SCOTT UPI Hollywood Correspondent HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The nation's longest running stage show announced it will fold in October after 25 smash years and some 10,000 performances. The Drunkard, a revival of P. T. Barnum's 1850 morality play, finally has staggered to the end of the line. Mrs. Mildred Iles, founder-producer of the venerable temperance drama, thought her show would last no more than a dozen performances when she launched the epic at the Theater Mart back in July of 1933. Instead, it was an instantaneous hit. The theater was decorated with original posters of the play warning against the evils of drink. Costumes and stage design were patterned after Barnum's original.

Included in the price of admission. In later years the beer drinkers almost took over, so the suits were rationed. More than three million patrons trooped into the 340-seat theater during the 26 years to hear a play written 100 years ago. Some actors made a career of the show, and one, Neely Edwards (who plays the bartender) has been a member of the cast since 1934. There were 28 marriages among the players and seven actresses left the show to become mothers. Celebrities Favorite "The Drunkard" has run more than twice as long as "Life With Father," which managed 3,283 performances in New York, and it was a great favorite with celebrities. Among the repeaters were: Boris Karloff, W. C. Fields, Mae West, Lily Pons, Mary Pickford and Edward Everett Horton. Many show business personalities climbed up on the stage to join the act. Comedians Olsee and Johnson often sat at opposite sides of the theater ribbing one another aloud. In 1953 business dropped off. Reds Orbit 2 More Dogs

LONDON (UPI) — The Soviet news agency Tass said today that another dog-carrying rocket was successfully launched and recovered on July 10. Tass said the ballistic rocket weighed 4,840 pounds and carried two dogs. It said the dogs and the equipment were recovered. It was the second such space flight reported by the Russians this month. On July 2, Soviet scientists launched and recovered a space rocket carrying two dogs and a rabbit. The United States on May 28 shot two small female monkeys to a height of 300 miles and recovered them alive after a 1,300-mile journey over the Atlantic. Able, a 7-pound rhesus monkey, died a few days later while undergoing an operation for the removal of an electrode from under its skin. Baker, a one-pound spider monkey, is still alive.

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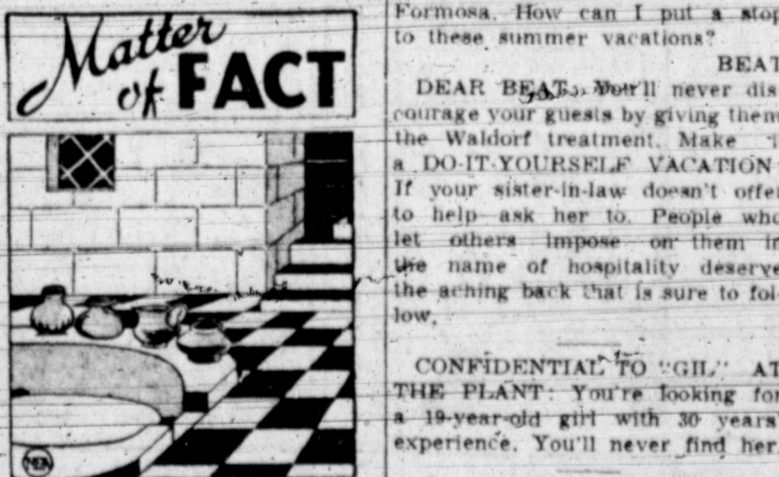

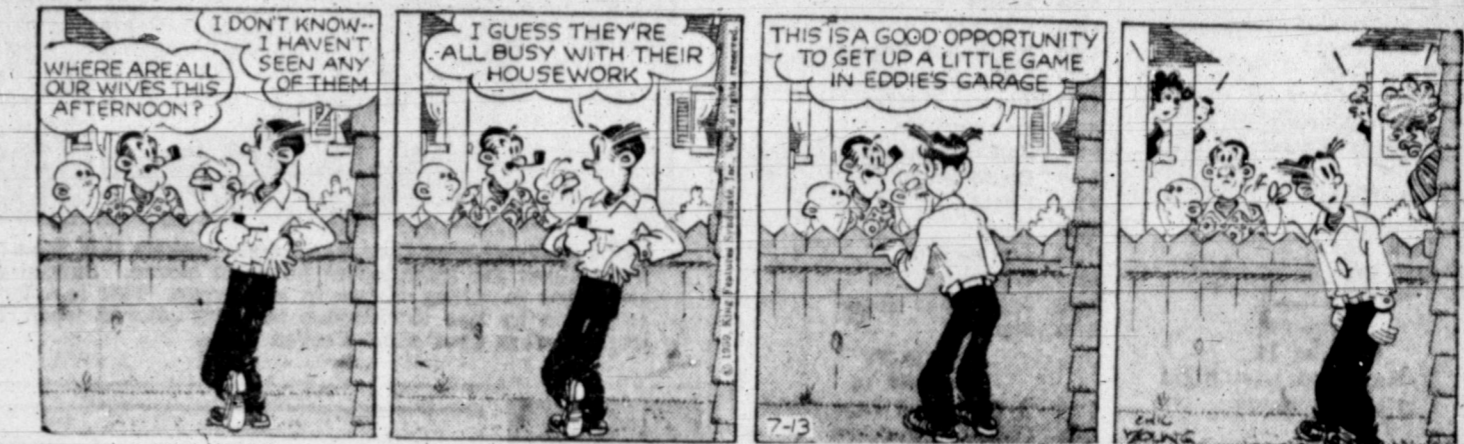

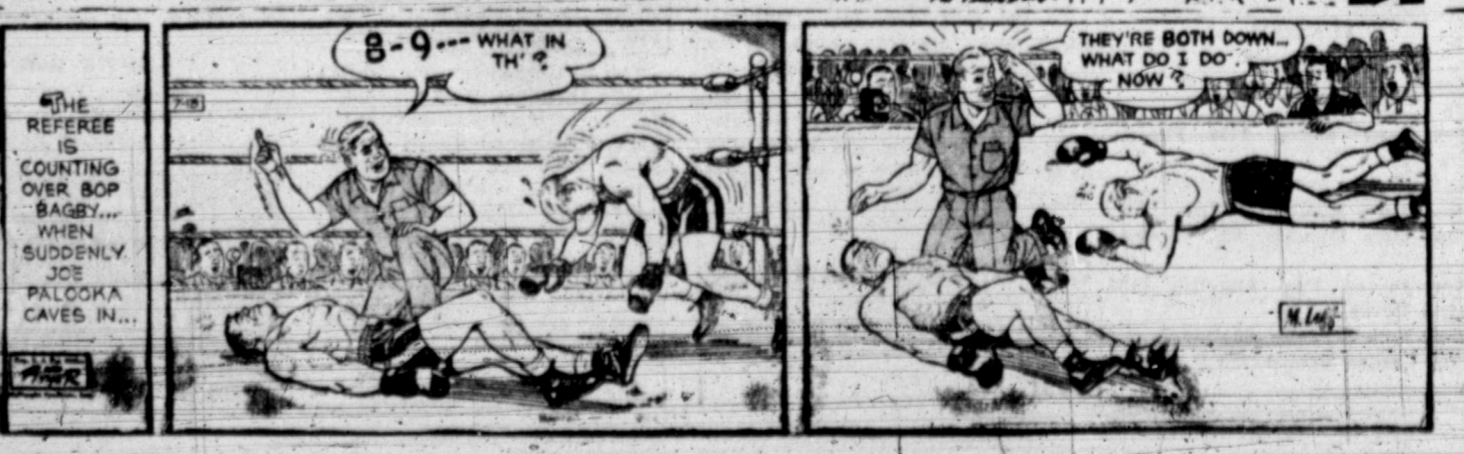

Bullpen Baron Does It Again

They call him the "Baron of the Bullpen" or the "Man With the Golden Arm," and come this winter they even may be calling little Elroy Face—the most valuable player in the National League.

The pint-sized Pittsburgh relief ace turned his 14th straight victory of the season without a loss Sunday when the Pirates beat the Cardinals, 6-5, in a 10-inning opener and was out there on the mound again protecting a 5-4 lead in the nightcap when the game was suspended in the ninth inning due to Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew.

Face's 14 consecutive victories constitute the longest major league winning streak in 12 years and he now is only five shy of the all-time record of 19 in a row during a single season set by Rube Marquard of the Giants in 1912. Dating back to May 30, 1938, Face is unbeaten in 19 straight games.

Roberto Clemente's single with the bases full in the 10th inning produced the Pittsburgh victory in the opener. Face was rushed into the breach again in the ninth inning of the nightcap after Glen Cimoli homered to, but the Pirates' lead to 5-4. He struck out pinch-hitter George Crowe just before the game was suspended. It will be completed Aug. 19.

San Francisco Loses

Milwaukee defeated San Francisco, 4-2, but the Giants still stayed a game in front when Cincinnati beat second-place Los Angeles, 4-3. Chicago won the opener of a double-header from Philadelphia, 7-5, then lost the nightcap, 4-1.

In the American League, the second-place White Sox moved to within a game of first place by taking a pair from the Athletics, 5-3 and 9-7; Detroit defeated Cleveland in the opener, 6-2, but the Indians won the nightcap, 8-4; the Red Sox handed the Yankees their fourth straight loss, 7-3; and Baltimore licked Washington, 5-1.

Low Burdette pitched a seven-hitter against the Giants in notching his 12th victory and making the three-place Braves within 1 1/2 games of the top. Eddie Mathews lined his 26th homer with two on off Jack Sanford in the third inning for Milwaukee's margin of victory. Jackie Brandt hit a two-run homer for San Francisco.

Gus Bell's ninth-inning single scored Johnny Temple with the Red Sox winning run against the Dodgers. Home runs by Vada Pinson, Ed Bailey and Frank Robinson gave Cincinnati its first three runs. Herter Wants 24 Hour Alert By One-Third of SAC

WASHINGTON - Secretary Herter wants one-third of the Strategic Air Command to be immediately put on an around-the-clock alert in the increasingly disquieting Berlin crisis.

The Joint Chiefs of Staff also favor taking this forceful measure to "emphasize" U.S. determination to remain in the Kremlin-threatened Berlin crisis.

President Eisenhower has taken this drastic proposal "under advisement."

For that purpose, it will be deliberated at this week's meeting of the National Security Council, over which he presides personally.

Secretary Herter and Defense and Intelligence authorities are members of this top policy-making agency.

This momentous Security Council meeting will precede Herter's return to Geneva for the second round of the stalled East-West foreign ministers conference.

It is the State Department head's desire to go there armed with full authority to notify both our allies and Russia that this country is now determined to resort to "preparedness moves" to back up our talk about "no retreat" from Berlin.

Such a blunt warning would be a marked change in position.

In the previous Geneva negotiations, Herter has talked sternly and firmly about remaining in Berlin. But no concrete measures were taken, particularly military, to reinforce that stand.

This is now deemed essential by Herter, and he is strongly urging that vigorous policy on the President.

To leaders of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, to whom Secretary Herter disclosed these far-reaching backstage developments, he explained that "time has come to make it unmistakably clear to Russia that we mean what we say."

"We must act tough as well as talk tough," he added grimly.

These senators also were informed that President Eisenhower, on Herter's recommendation, pulled no punches in the discussion, with First Deputy Premier Kozlov.

While stressing the West's fervent desire for a solution of the German problem, at the same time the President asserted the U.S. is ready to employ force to keep West Berlin from Red domination.

"We want peace," the President was quoted as telling the Kremlin leader, "and are eager to go more than halfway to solve the problems confronting us. But we have no intention of abandoning the 2,000,000 free West Germans living in Berlin. Any agreement on Berlin must fully protect their rights and liberties."

"Further, we are not going to be either bluffed out of Berlin or pushed out. If necessary, we will use force to stay there and retain the privileges we are legally entitled to. I want no misunderstanding on that. I mean every word of it."

Kozlov replied cordially he was confident an "agreeable solution" is possible.

"If you and Premier Khrushchev will sit down and take up these matters personally and directly," said Kozlov, "there can be no question but that you will come to an understanding. I say that you are sincere men of peace."

A number of senators strongly approved of Herter's proposal that one-third of the Strategic Air Command be placed on around-the-clock alert - that is, in a long-range bombers to be airborne and armed with nuclear weapons.

These senators include Alexander Wiley, Wis., senior Republican member of the Foreign Relations Committee; Hubert Humphrey (D., Minn.); Styles Bridges, N.H., chairman of the GOP Policy Committee; John Kennedy, Mass.; John Marshall Butler, Jr., Miss.; and Stuart Symington (D., Mo.).

NURNBERG - Budget your feet. If I were a travel editor, that would be the first piece of advice I'd offer my readers in my first article.

It's all well and good to warn tourists to budget their money, their clothes, and their time, but in Europe tourists' feet are their most important possession.

This is especially true of tourists who have reached the age of forty and beyond. It is an accepted medical fact that at forty the feet start going into decline, and Europe has many attractions celebrated for the way they aid and abet feet in falling apart.

There are the Louvre and the Eiffel Tower in Paris. The Tower and National Gallery in London. Any Alp in Switzerland. St. Peter's and the Vatican Museum in Rome. And any of a thousand ruins in Greece.

A great many tourists start treating their feet in an inhumane manner the moment they step on foreign soil. People who walk fewer than five miles a month when at home, do ten and fifteen miles a day in Europe. They do that much, that is, until their feet lose patience and rebel.

There can be no pleasure in Europe, Asia, Africa or anywhere else with rebellious feet. While they may not look it, the feet rule the rest of the body, and when they announce that they are tired, everything else gets tired, and at once.

Not long ago, in Cologne, I saw a typical sight in Europe in tourist season. A couple - I'd say they were in their mid-fifties - sat sobbing on the Cathedral steps.
