Ike Confers With Kozlov

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower holds a cold war conference with Soviet First Deputy Premier Prok. Kozlov today in a test of the Russian's friendship overtures.

Kozlov Tuesday that he hoped his talks with the President and other U.S. officials would help restore the World War II friendship of the United States and Russia.

White House aides said the President was willing to listen to any ideas Kozlov has on the subject. But the President was reported not anticipating any dramatic shift in the Soviet policies which forced the Berlin crisis and are keeping up tension all along the Iron Curtain.

Eisenhower meets with the exuberant Kozlov immediately after the regular Wednesday presidential news conference.

Before meeting with the President, Kozlov was scheduled to confer with Secretary of State Christian A. Herter. Herter said he had no idea what the Russian wanted to talk about.

Administration officials said they expected Kozlov to talk in sweeping generalities about the need for settling East-West differences and increasing Russian-American trade. But they seriously doubted that he was authorized to start any hard bargaining on the thorny problems dividing Russia and the Western powers.

Officials also discounted speculation that Kozlov was bringing any new Russian suggestions to break the Big Four deadlock over the Berlin situation.

Pair Return From Camp In Kansas

Two Pampa High School students, Marianna Perkins and Jerry Porter, have returned from a leadership training camp in Kansas with the idea to do a better job next year in their Junior Red Cross chapter.

Miss Perkins is president of the PHS Junior Red Cross group and Porter is a member of the council.

The camp representatives spent last week at Camp Fellowship, Goodard, Kan., where they took workshops in home nursing, first aid and other Red Cross projects.

They are determined to set up a home nursing course for both boys and girls at Pampa High School and want to organize a student first aid course. The PHS Chapter is one of the few groups that does not have such courses.

The camp was attended by 122 students from the Midwestern area, with 25 faculty members from Red Cross headquarters in St. Louis, Mo. Twelve of the 16 midwestern states were represented.

The students lived in dormitories and had time for recreation after their day's work was done.

One boy, Dick Johnson from Okmaha, Okla., was selected to go on an international tour this summer. He will return in the fall to speak in enrollment assemblies.

The Pampa students advocate a blood program and speakers bureau and favor more active participation in the Senior Red Cross disaster program.

They want to organize councils for the junior high schools, a fund raising program, and a more inclusive Junior Red Cross program in Pampa.

Walk Off Great Lakes Ore Boats

NEW YORK (UPI)—Steel workers shut down major plants and walked off Great Lakes ore boats today in defiance of a two week contract extension suggested by President Eisenhower.

Negotiations for nationwide steel contracts were scheduled to resume here today under the truce agreement.

United Steelworkers of America picket lines kept day shift workers outside the huge Alquippa, Pa., plant of Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. and the United States Steel Corp.'s Fairless works at Morrisville, Pa.

The firms announced that they were backing furnace and preparing to shut down all operations.

More than 13,000 steel workers are employed on all shifts at the 1&L plant, about 4,000 workers were idled by the Fairless shutdown.

Furnaces Banked

A U.S. Steel spokesman at Morrisville said the company began banking furnaces when the 7 a.m. shift refused to cross a picket line to work. He said it would take "a little better than 4 hours" after the workers return to get the first starting again, and preparing to shut down all operations.

Other members of USW demonstrated at the Jones & Laughlin Alquippa mill when the union's original midnight strike deadline passed, but did not interfere with work schedules.

A southern division of United States Steel Corp. announced it would be shutting down Thursday, eventually idling 25,000 workers. The division of another union's refusal to go along with the USW's contract extension.

Four-man teams representing the union and 12 big steel producers were scheduled to resume bargaining here under the truce agreement in an effort to reach a new agreement by the end of the week. Both morning and afternoon sessions were scheduled for the 11th and 12th.

Walkout at Chicago

At Chicago, crewmen walked off the Inland Steel Co. ore boat P. D. Beck and the Republic Steel Corp.'s T. M. Gilder shortly after midnight.

An Inland spokesman said the action amounted to a strike by the steel union's Local 4,800.

Theodore B. Schrock, staff representative of the seaman's division of the local, had warned that crews of ore vessels would walk off their jobs at the expiration of contracts July 1.

Long Words Flowing Hot

COVINGTON, La. (UPI)—Louisiana Gov. Earl K. Long alleged today his wife had conspired to kill him 10 months ago.

Mrs. Long charged in a counter suit for separation Tuesday that the governor threatened to kill her a month ago. Mrs. Long was unavailable for comment early today on Long's charge.

The governor told United Press International in an exclusive interview that Mrs. Long "kept calling this guy and telling him to bring both his shotgun and pistol. She wanted to hire him to kill me."

"She tried to hire somebody to kill me 10 months ago," he asserted.

Long said his wife "was going to give him five," holding up five fingers, "but she only gave him one."

The governor indicated the figure "one" finger pointed against the writer's chest.

Long said the man was the husband of a "woman she thought I was messing around with." Long did not say who the woman was.

It was believed the governor was referring to \$5,000 or \$1,000 in his reference to "going to give him five," but she only gave him one."

Hits at Senator

The governor, speaking rapidly, did not allow any interruptions in the interview.

He also charged U.S. Sen. Russell Long (D-La.), the governor's nephew, "is burning up to be governor."

"And so is Blanche," he added, referring to his wife.

Mrs. Long took over some of the parliamentary functions of the governor's office in 1950 when Long suffered a heart attack while chasing a hog up a hill. At that time Mrs. Long held press conferences and supervised some of the governor's staff.

Miami Motorist Jailed For DWI After Accident

A Miami motorist, Sammie Joe Smith, 32, was jailed for drunken driving Tuesday following a three car collision two miles east of Pampa at the Highway Department Barrs.

This morning in county court Smith entered a plea of guilty, was fined \$100 and costs, and sentenced to three days in jail.

Highway Patrolman Royce Logan reported that at about 1:30 p.m. Smith's 1956 Mercury strayed off the wrong side of the highway and struck two parked cars before plowing into a two-foot retaining wall.

One of the cars, a 1953 Buick owned by F. E. Young, 325 N. Eber, was described as a total wreck. The other parked car, a 1955 Chevrolet owned by J. E. Walkup, 121 S. Wynne, had \$225 damages. Smith's Mercury had \$600 in damages.

80 Known Dead In Flooding

IBAGUE, Colombia (UPI)—A sudden flood struck the mountain village of Junta early Tuesday while its inhabitants slept, and killed every person and animal there.

Only today was the completeness of the disaster becoming known. Authorities said 80 bodies had been recovered and that rescuers were trying to find other traces of the 150 persons.

The toll casually off may never be known. The flood caused by heavy rains struck at 2:30 a.m. with devastating swiftness and swept entire families and their livestock down the Cauca river.

Almost no trace of Junta remained.

Although the village is only eight miles from this city of 130,000, the bodies of men, women, children, dogs, cats and cattle lay in woe silence for nearly 48 hours before the first word of the catastrophe began to trickle in.

A rescue operation began immediately but after a few hours word came back that there was no life in the area.

The villagers had been caught asleep in their makeshift mud huts, easy prey for the roaring torrent.

When the waters began to recede late Tuesday they exposed a desolate valley strewn with corpses and debris.

Wheat Harvest Reported About Half Finished

Harvest of wheat in the Amarillo area is about 50 per cent complete, the Wheat Harvest Control Office at Amarillo reported today. Cutting is progressing rapidly and most of the wheat should be in elevators by next week if the weather remains favorable.

Only scattered acreage in the Panhandle and South Plains region is to be combined. An adequate supply of men and machines has been available in all areas of operation at the time and place needed.

For all practical purposes, harvest north of the Canadian River is complete. Combines are moving out of the area as soon as commitments are completed.

In the Herford-Dumas area the harvest is half completed and should end this week. There has been an adequate number of men and machines.

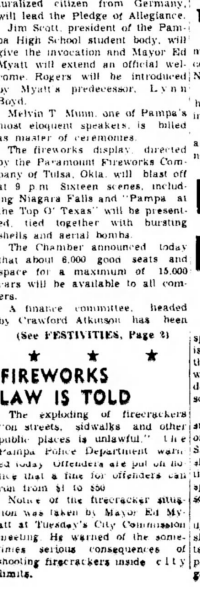
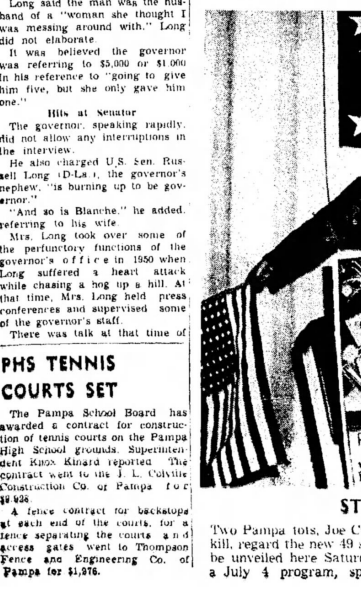

16 Dead In Crash of US Jet Fighter

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI)—Local authorities announced today an official casualty list of 16 dead and 118 injured in the crash of a disabled U.S. jet fighter into a crowded housing area.

Okinawa Police Commissioner Eizo Omine said that the injured included 105 school children, five infants and eight adults. Nineteen of the injured were in critical condition.

The U.S. military command here also announced an official death toll of 16, including 10 children, but said that 112 had been injured.

The plane, an F-100 Super Sabre, caught fire while taxiing over the town of Ishikawa Tuesday. Its pilot, Capt. John O. Schmitt of Chalmers, Ind., headed towards a non-populated area before bailing out. But his pilotless plane veered to the right, careened off the Miyazaki primary school and then plowed into a group of houses nearby.

Eyewitnesses said the burning jet speeded flame over a 10-block area. An estimated 300 houses were destroyed and 200 persons left homeless.

Capt. Schmitt was unavailable for comment today. But an Air Force spokesman described him as "stunned and dazed" after learning of the destruction his crippled plane had caused.

A policeman said the number of children killed might have been even greater but for the armistry of one student in the primary school.

Seeing the flaming plane streaking toward the school, he shouted "air raid!" The other had participated in drills for such an event.

Rep. Joe Chapman of Sulphur Springs supported Kennard.

"This is the crux of the tax bill for this session," Chapman said. "If we don't vote for some kind of gas tax we won't pass a tax bill. You're either voting for Texas as we're voting for the interstate pipeline."

Compromise Doubtful
Rep. Eligio De la Garza of Mission was in opposition of the amendment striking the proposed gas tax out of the bill arguing that the idea of the tax falling mainly on interstate pipelines and out-of-state users is a "political expedient" to fixate in some people's minds.

The vote knocking out the sales tax Tuesday was 86-55, a greater show of disapproval than the Saturday vote of 76-51, despite a compromise by Seeligson of exempting farm machinery.

Seeligson told the House if he knocked out the sales tax "all hope of compromise is broken as far as his particular bill is concerned."

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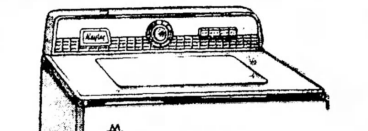

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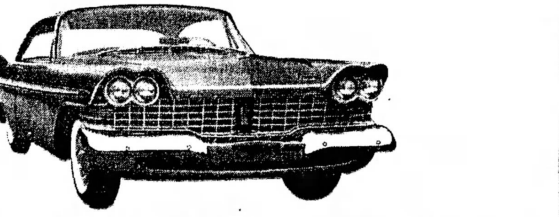

DeGaulle Straining To Make French Voice Heard In Europe

President Charles de Gaulle is proceeding methodically toward his avowed goal of obtaining for France new recognition as a world power and as a decisive voice in the affairs of Europe.

A step in that direction was his recent visit to Italy which resulted in a joint French-Italian call for a meeting of Western foreign ministers in Geneva.

On the one hand would be France and Italy, solidly aligned in their fields of special interest, including Mediterranean defenses and a greater voice in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). Italy probably also could be courted to join the Gaullist bloc in opposition to a summit conference with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Relations Turn Cool
Also aligned against Britain would be West Germany, whose mounting annoyance with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's spirit maneuvering has led to a cool and relations about as cool as they can get among friends.

Desire For Voice
Of special common interest is the desire of both for a greater voice in NATO affairs. Italy long has been resentful at what she believes to be one-sided decisions taken by the United States and Britain in NATO affairs in which Italy also is deeply involved. Italy's army, one of the largest in Europe, is totally committed to NATO. She has last 48-star flags to be flown over agreed to U.S. missile bases on her soil, and besides the Mediterranean, she has two guards in the vanguard from the north.

Gouda Cheese Is Used In This Simple Macaroni Salad

The combination of vegetables, cheese and macaroni can produce summer salads that stick to the ribs. Served in large bowls, they are perfect for the patio or backyard cookout and within the skill of even the beginner cooks.

GOUDA MACARONI SALAD
(Makes 6 servings)

One tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 2 cups elbow macaroni (8 ounces), 1 10-ounce Gouda cheese, 1 cup sliced cucumber, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/3 cup chopped scallions, 1/2 cup sliced radishes, 1 1/2-ounce package Italian salad dressing mix.

Add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add macaroni so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander. Rinse with cold water.

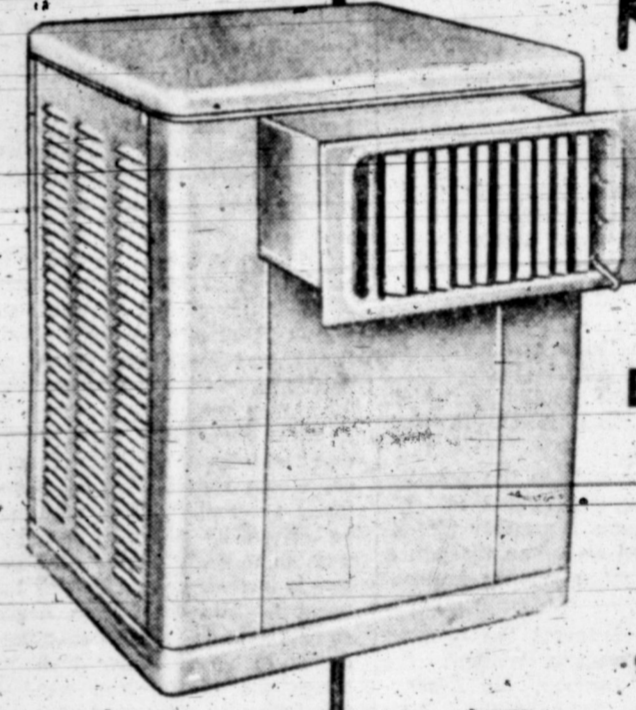

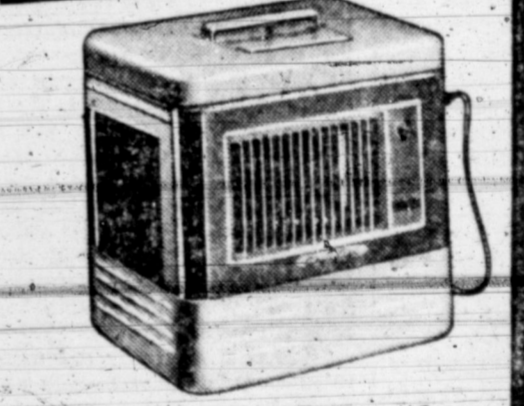

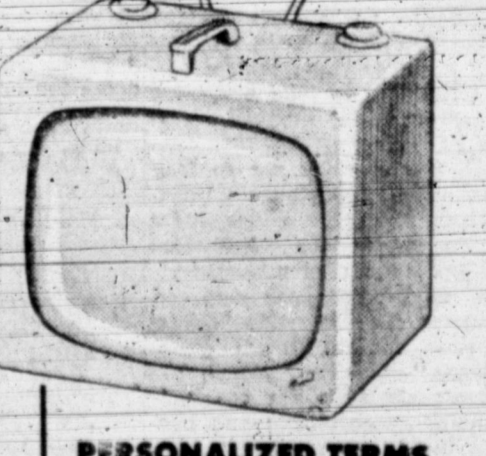

ASK PITCHERS AARON ONLY LOOKS SLEEPY!

NEW YORK (UPI) — This was between games of a double head-er and the two ball players sat munched motionless over a check-er board.

Finally, with great deliberation, one of them made a studied move and then said sharply: "Wake up, Henry, it's your move."

"Oh," said the one who seemed to be sleeping as he reached out, took a checker and made a triple move.

That episode also sums up the hitting technique of Henry Hank Aaron, of the Milwaukee Braves, who currently is smashing the ball at a stratospheric clip in the 380's despite his languorous, sleepy-eyed look. In the process he also is making a bid for the home run and runs-batted-in championships.

Hank Loose, relaxed the heavy-lidded man from Mobilio doesn't look like one of the most feared hitters to come along in years. He stands loose and re-laxed in the box and his 180 pounds appear remarkably slender on a six-foot frame. But when the wrists which were developed delivering ice uncold, their power the camouflage is stripped away.

Aaron at the moment must be regarded as the best hitter in baseball. His relaxed manner, added to the fact that he is a natural hitter, give him this ac-cede. Ted Williams, the Ben Ho-gan of baseball, is precisely sci-entific when it comes to the art of blasting out hits. Willie Mays also is a natural hitter but the "say hey" man is shackled by un-predictable moods. Aaron remains loose and unchanged.

Hank is aided, too, by the fact that his reflexes and wrist pow-er enable him to be a successful ball hitter. His former manager, Jolly Cholly Grimm, called it ex-actly when he said that Aaron's strike zone "is from the top of his cap to his shoes."

"I make 'em tip my mind to swing at a pitch," he draws, "so I swing. I don't look for no walks."

Aaron, usually a slow starter, got off to a sprinter's opening this season to inaugurate conversation that he might be the first 400 hitter in the majors since Williams did it 18 years ago. There was a solid basis for these discussions when Hank was batting .427 at the end of May.

He compiled this amazing start by jitting safely in 34 of the Braves' first 39 games and getting base hits in 22 in a row. But he would make no predictions.

"I'm swinging faster and getting around on the ball better," said Aaron. "And I've quit trying to outguess the pitcher. After all, I have the advantage over the guy on the mound. He only has a ball. I've got a bat and, in addition to base hits, I can get on through a boot, a fielder's choice, a walk or by getting hit with the pitch."

He was the only man picked unanimously by the players, man-agers and coaches for the July 7 All-Star game at Pittsburgh. Hank may look heavy-lidded, but they all know he isn't asleep.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Deacon Rueliff Stich risks his status as Louisville's rapidly-de-veloping contender for the welter-weight title tonight against un-ranked but dangerous Rudy Saw-yer.

Cause Sought For Freight Train Calamity

MELDRIM, Ga. (UPI) — Federal and state investigators were seeking to determine today the cause of a freight train derailment and gas explosion that killed at least 19 persons, nine of them children.

The Interstate Commerce Commission ordered two agents to the scene here.

The Georgia Public Service Commission also sent an agent here. Seaboard Air Line Railroad officials said a preliminary investigation did not reveal what caused two butane gas tank cars to explode.

A dozen persons were injured, officials said no other persons were missing.

Skidners and searchers were unable to find more bodies after searching the Ogeechee River where about 100 persons were picnicking and swimming Sunday afternoon.

Two of the 15 cars derailed as the train crossed a wooden railroad trestle Sunday broke open. Escaping butane gas caught fire and exploded, showering flames over the water and banks of the river where the picnickers were sitting.

Fourteen bodies were found in and around the river. Other victims died en route to Savannah hospitals or in the hospitals.

Rep. Prince Preston (D-Ga.) asked the ICC to investigate the accident.

At least eight of the victims were related. They were at the favorite river recreation spot for a family reunion.

Seaboard General Manager J. N. Broetzman of Richmond, Va., said here that "we haven't been able to track condition or car condition to cause" the wreck.

High Frequencies Stimulate Defense Against Infections

NEW YORK (UPI) — High frequency waves of the sort used by TV and FM radio stimulate the "whole" human body into defending itself against infections and other ailments, a medical research symposium was told Friday.

Air Force To Select Penalty For Hoaxers

AMARILLO (UPI) — Air Force officials were expected to decide the punishment today for three airmen who staged a hoax kidnapping to "create some excitement."

It touched off a search by military police, highway patrolmen and sheriff's deputies Saturday night. A few hours later, air police found the "get-away-car" in front of the men's barracks, and the kidnapers and "victim" snoozing in their bunks.

Col. Charles C. Haltom, base executive officer, said the men had been restricted until Col. Cleytor returns and decides what is to be done.
