## Negro Students Sing And Fast

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI)—Some 800 hymn-singing Negro college students began a program of praying and fasting today to tell the world of the rape of a 19-year-old classmate.

The Negro students at Florida A&M University turned out at 6 a. m. today on the campus quadrangle, dressed nearly alike to demonstrate that "people who think alike dress alike."

Four young white men are charged with the rape of the Negro coed.

The prayer meeting, which opened with the singing of "Holy, Holy," was followed by Scripture readings. The students planned to pray and fast voluntarily until nationwide attention is focused on the case.

Band Plays Anthem  
"A soft answer turneth away wrath," read student leader Buford Gibson to the assembled crowd, which did not include faculty members.

The passive resistance program, sworn to Sunday night at a mass meeting, included missing classes today in addition to praying and fasting.

The 70-piece Florida A&M band played "The Star Spangled Banner" at 7 a. m. as the flag was raised above the throng, dedicating themselves to the crusade. The male students wore white shirts and blue pants and the coeds white or pink dresses to signify their unity.

School Head Speaks  
School student leaders emphasized again this morning that the demonstration would be peaceful. There was no indication how long it would last, but the students said the plan would continue until the world understands their cause.

Despite the plan to fast, the

crowd at the school cafeteria was slightly larger than usual for a breakfast of sausage and scrambled eggs. Mrs. C. B. Daniels, the school dietitian, said 1,013 students were fed in contrast to the normal weekday morning of about 900.

But classes were largely empty when the 8 a. m. bell sounded. By 9 a. m. the crowd had relaxed and dwindled to about 300. They alternated between group hymn singing and speeches.

Harvey Jefferson, president of the senior class, predicted that not more than one-fifth of the school's 2,700 students would eat today.

The meeting today apparently had the passive approval of the school administration.

Student President Clifford Taylor told the mass meeting Sunday night that "no loyal student will attend classes today."

Taylor called on the students to spend the day fasting and praying. "We want the world to know," he said.

## WINNIE CALLING ON IKE

LONDON (UPI)—Sir Winston Churchill respectfully raised his hat to an "honor guard" of three small boys in sailor suits and then took off today by Comet jet liner for a visit with President Eisenhower in Washington.

As the aged statesman walked slowly toward the plane he spotted Alexander S. Robert, 7, and John W. Winston, 6, drawn up in a line. Sir Winston smiled and with elaborate care raised his hat. The boys saluted smartly.

"We wanted to see Sir Winston because we know he's a famous man and that he is going to Washington for talks with President

Eisenhower," Alexander said. Sir Winston arrived at the airport in a limousine with Lady Churchill and his traveling companions, detective Sgt. Edmund Murray of Scotland Yard and Anthony Montagu Browne, Sir Winston's secretary.

They chatted in the lounge until the flight was called and then Sir Winston walked slowly out to his car again to be driven to the plane.

Among the small group which saw him off was U.S. Ambassador John Hay Whitney who said, "God be with you until you return."

The visit, at the invitation of the President, was pegged a "social call." But British political sources hoped the sharp-minded Eisenhower on British East-West policies.

Churchill is kept closely informed on the aims and policies of the Macmillan government and world affairs are bound to come into even the friendliest talks at the White House.

There have been some fears that Britain planned major changes in its cold war approach to the Russians but British diplomats insist there is no apprehension in mind although they believe

## Weather Alert Out In West Texas Area

A new storm center built up along the New Mexico-Texas line today and forecasters warned that it may bring heavy hail and high winds over the Texas Panhandle and South Plains.

Up to 18 inches of rain fell Sunday between Longview and Henderson and Lake Cherokee. Flash floods chased 11 families from their homes at Henderson, where newsman Pat Eadsley reported emptying a five-and-a-half-inch rain gauge twice Saturday night at Berger.

The severe weather warning went into effect at 7 a. m. and will last until 1 p. m. unless it is extended.

Up to 18 inches of rain fell Sunday between Longview and Henderson and Lake Cherokee. Flash floods chased 11 families from their homes at Henderson, where newsman Pat Eadsley reported emptying a five-and-a-half-inch rain gauge twice Saturday night at Berger.

At least three deaths were blamed on the weather. Damage was estimated in hundreds of thousands of dollars in East Texas.

A brief but heavy rain and hail storm hit Amarillo today after 8 a. m. The skies turned almost as dark as night. Hail and rain fell heavily in 20 minutes the rain measured 4 inch.

Hard driving rain that began at 9:15 a. m. fell at Berger, along with hail the size of marbles. The hail covered the ground, though no damage was reported from it. Clouds were so heavy that they

also made it look almost like night.

An 18-inch flood swept an automobile with five Negroes in it from Mud Creek bridge 14 miles north of Jacksonville late Sunday. Four of the Negroes were rescued but the fifth was presumed drowned.

State Highway 135 was still closed between Troup and Jacksonville today at Mud Creek, U.S. Highway 79 was closed between Henderson and Jacksonville at Stryker Creek.

State Highway 259, north of Kilgore, and Farm Road 319 between Kilgore and the Gregg county airport also were closed.

The Panhandle also reported heavy rain. Headley in the eastern Panhandle reported an inch of rain and hail up to two-and-a-half inches in diameter. Automobiles and roofs were extensively damaged.

## Texas Senators Survey Tax Bill

AUSTIN (UPI)—Texas senators get their first look at an 80 million dollar general tax bill today, as lawmakers move into the last full week of the 56th legislature and await an imminent special session.

The tax bill, passed by the House last Monday, will receive its first airing at an afternoon public hearing of the Senate State Affairs Committee, scheduled

to consider provisions on natural gas, oil, sulphur and special fuels. Hearings will continue week long.

Gov. Price Daniel was resigned to a special session — after the regular session ends May 12 — and held out hope that only the lawmakers will do something about the 65 million dollar deficit before winding up the regular session.

The governor was expected to call the special session no later than a week following the May 12 regular session adjournment — possibly May 18 or 19. But he has not indicated when he will issue the formal call.

## Severe Siberia Earthquake Brings Tidal Wave Alert

A severe earthquake, apparently centered in the eastern reaches of Siberia, set off a "precautionary" tidal wave alert in Hawaii today.

The alert was called off, however, when the threatened wave failed to materialize.

The quake was recorded as a strong one on seismographs around the world. It registered a magnitude of 7 on the Richter scale of 10 on the Fordham seismograph in New York. The University of California at Berkeley set it at 8.75.

The shock was strong enough to put the instruments of the San Domenico observatory in Prato, Italy, out of action.

First reports put the quake's epicenter near the Kamchatka peninsula of the Soviet Union, near the Aleutian islands, touching off the tidal wave alarm. Later reports put the quake on the Siberian mainland.

Officials of the Geodetic Survey in Honolulu said the tide rose only one foot at the island of Atafu in the Aleutians and no rise was reported at Adak, Midway or Wake.

It was not immediately determined whether the quake center was near a populated area but the likelihood was small. Normally on-the-scene reports of earthquakes in the Soviet Union are extremely slow to break through official Soviet news channels to the outside world.

A quake of 7 or 7.5 on the Richter scale would be quite severe. The scale, devised in the 1930s by Dr. Charles F. Richter of California, is based on the logarithm of the distance a seismograph needle is deflected by the shock, adjusted for the distance of the instrument from the quake center. A magnitude 2 earthquake is 10 times greater than a magnitude 1 quake.

A quake rated at 8, believed fatal, would be 100 million times stronger than a magnitude 1. The biggest quakes figured on the scale have been in the Philippines, James Evans, Mrs. J. W. Cole and J. D. Reeves.

## West's Package Plan Is Rapped

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Diplomatic authorities said today they expected Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko to take a tough position in the initial stages of the Geneva Conference beginning May 11.

They said they hoped, however, that the Russians subsequently would moderate their stand enough to make possible an agreement on fruitful areas for discussion at a summit conference.

The Soviet newspaper Izvestia's attack on the Western Allies' reported package plan for German unification came as a great surprise to authorities here.

They had not expected the Russians at this point to publicly announce abandonment of their long-standing opposition to handling German reunification on Western terms.

Rest On Their Willingness  
However, the feeling in official quarters here was that the Russians, faced with a united Western front at Geneva, would recognize that their hopes for a summit meeting rested on their willingness to discuss the proposals of the Western Allies.

American officials showed no desire to debate the subjects of Berlin, Germany and European security in public before the Geneva talks begin.

U.S. officials said they will judge Russia's sincerity to a considerable extent by its willingness to negotiate secretly at Geneva and not use the conference as another propaganda sounding board.

Conferred With Dulles  
Secretary of State Christian A. Herter reported to his old chief, John Foster Dulles, Sunday on the package proposal to be handed Russia at the Geneva talks.

Herter and two aides conferred with Dulles in the former secretary's room at Walter Reed Medical Center, Dulles, now a consultant to President Eisenhower, was briefed on last week's Paris meeting of the Western foreign ministers.

Herter is scheduled to make a radio television report to the nation Thursday night on the results of the Paris talks and Allied strategy for the Geneva meeting. He planned to leave Friday for Geneva.

This morning his body was taken to California where his mother, Mrs. Lennie Gowans, and his brother, survive. Burial will be at Hanford, Calif.

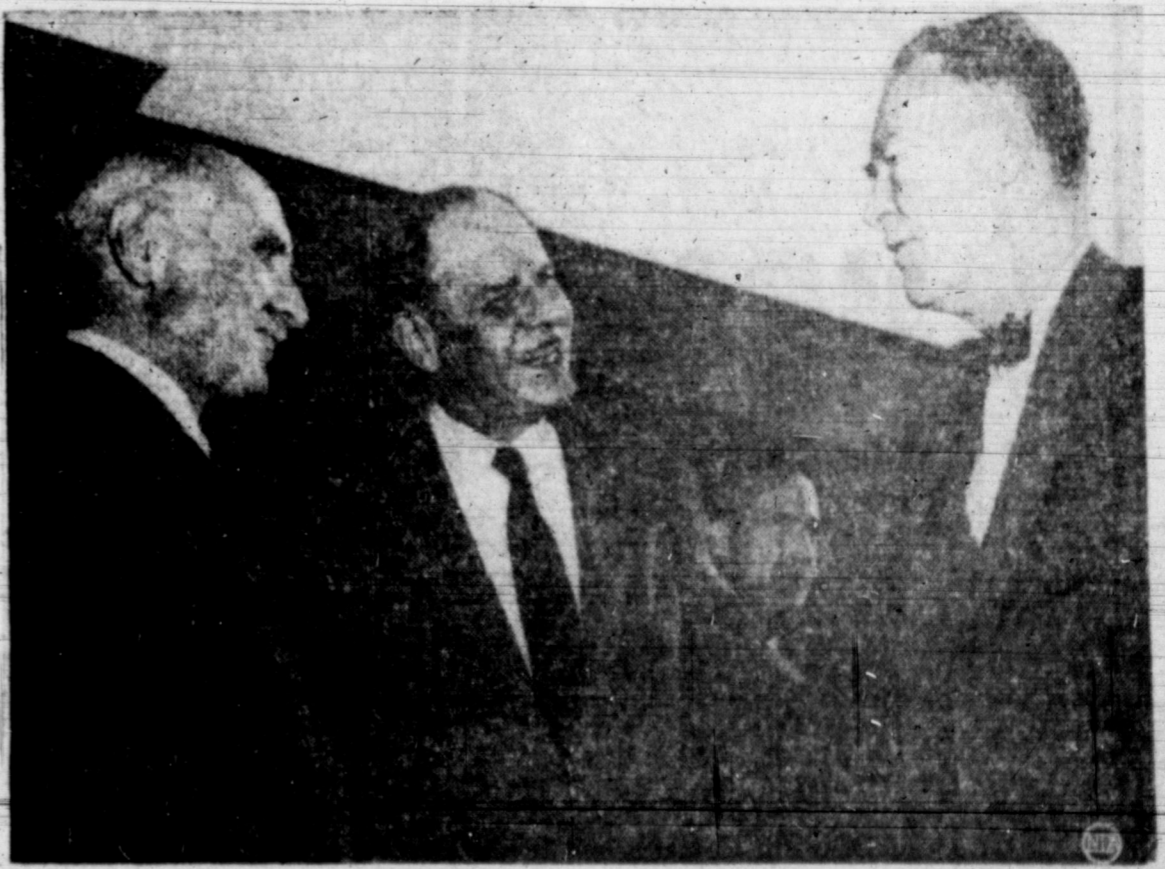

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman today called for repeal of the ban on a "bad" constitutional amendment. He said it was devised to "get Roosevelt" and is now hamstringing President Eisenhower.

Truman said the ban was "a bit of goods" sold to the country by "Roosevelt haters."

Truman told a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee that he has "no personal axe to grind" in the hearings on repeal of the 22nd Amendment, adopted after the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt, who was elected four times.

The amendment was initiated by the Republican-controlled 80th Congress. Truman noted in a terse prepared statement that he himself is still eligible to run for a third term.

"Out of the 175 million people in this country," he said, "I am the only one to whom the amendment does not apply—the only one who could be elected as many times as he could get enough votes."

Truman was a witness before the subcommittee headed by Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.). Kefauver similarly condemned the two-term limitation on grounds it blunts the "quality of flexibility" in the Constitution.

The blunt spoken ex-president opened up in traditional style: "My position on this question is

Truman said that what the amendment really did "was to make a lame duck" out of every second term president for all time in the future.

"It is ironic that the first lame duck president to be hamstringed by this amendment is one of the Republicans' own," Truman remarked.

Truman was exempted from the ban because he was in the White House at the time it was enacted in 1951. Nevertheless, he declined to run for reelection in 1952.

Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) of the House Judiciary Committee, author of one of several measures to repeal the 22nd Amendment, said recently he considered the matter dead because he could not whip up any interest.

Former President Herbert Hoover was invited to give his ideas on the amendment at the House hearings. He sent regrets but no statement. President Eisenhower has said he doesn't think much of the third-term ban.

## OAS Sure Threat In Panama Over

PANAMA CITY (UPI)—An Organization of American States (OAS) investigating team returns to Washington today convinced it has wiped out the threat of an invasion of Panama from Cuba.

With 80 Cuban invaders, plus one Puerto Rican, a Panamanian, and two Panamanian women locked behind bars and destined for trial, the inter-American group considered its job accomplished.

The Panamanian National Guard was scouring the interior for seven Cubans and a Panamanian who fled to the jungles when the main invasion force capitulated Friday. There were unofficial reports that as many as five more Panamanians had joined them.

National Guard authorities said they hoped to round them up by tonight.

Jorge Hazera, Costa Rican member of the OAS investigating team, said OAS military advisers would stay at least until midnight tonight and if there were no further reason for them to stay they too would return to Washington.

## Nehru Pressured To Revise Policy

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru was under heavy political pressure Saturday to revise Indian foreign policy in light of angry Chinese Communist blasts against Indian "intervention" in Tibet.

Reliable sources said some members of his cabinet had advised him to be more wary of the Chinese situation and to reform his policy accordingly, but that Nehru still was convinced his policy of neutrality between East and West was best.

Close associates said Nehru's policy is to be just and honest and to criticize his friends as well as his enemies if he found their actions displeasing. But he believes even in backing his enemies if he thinks they are right.

The Tibetan situation has strained relations between Delhi and Peiping badly and Nehru's foreign experts have been reviewing the whole affair, especially to find out why Peiping's anger against India reached such heights.

Political experts said there must be something more behind Peiping's harsh criticism than the mere fact that India granted political asylum to the Dalai Lama, the God-King of Tibet. They expressed belief these factors may be involved.

Peiping has resented the fact India has had a greater voice in international affairs than Red China and was annoyed when Moscow suggested that India be included in a Great Power Summit meeting.

The Chinese consider themselves superior to Indians. The Chinese do not like the idea of India's forging any closer link with Tibet.

The Chinese Communists were angered because India gave preferential treatment to the Dalai Lama over the Communist-sponsored Panchen Lama during a 1957 visit although Peiping hinted they should receive equal treatment.

A working committee of Nehru's ruling Congress Party meets here next Friday to review the Tibetan situation and the strained Indian-Chinese relations. Nehru will attend the session and is not expected to make up his mind on policy revision until the issues are thrashed out, political sources said.

## Hogan, Hawkins Meet in Playoff

PORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—Golf club manufacturer Ben Hogan and a close pro friend playing Hogan clubs for the first time, Fred Hawkins, staged an 18-hole playoff today for the Colonial National Invitation golf tournament title and the major share of \$8,000 prize money.

The 47-year-old Hogan, semi-retired and playing only infrequent tournament golf, and the 35-year-old Hawkins, who has been well up in the money despite only one tour crown in a dozen years of campaigning, tied for first place Sunday with 72-hole totals of 285.

That set up this afternoon's head-on battle to see who claims the \$8,000 top money.

For Hawkins, who has won some \$76,000 over the past three and a half seasons although his only first place money came in the 1956 Oklahoma City Open, it will be the first playoff of his career.

But, for the little hometown, Hogan, it will be his 12th. He must sincerely hope that the playoff pattern will change for him because he's only won 4 of the previous 11.

Hawkins was playing in the same final threesome with Hogan and their head-to-head duel drew most of the gallery of 12,000 in broiling 90-degree heat.

Billy Maxwell of Odessa, Tex., who closed with a 69, and Tommy Jacobs of Whittier, Calif., who finished with a 73, tied for third and won \$1,900 each. They were a stroke ahead of Lionel Hebert of Lafayette, La., and Kroil, who won \$1,500 each. Hebert, who led the first two rounds with a pair of 67s, finished with a 75.

# Maxwell Hits 4 Home Runs

They battled with fists and beanballs in the Indians-Senators and Pirates-Cards game Sunday, but the most damaging blows of the day were struck by the bat of Charlie Maxwell in the Tigers' double-header sweep over the floundering Yankees.

Maxwell, who owned an anemic .136 batting average going into the twin bill, tied a major league record by hitting home runs in four consecutive times at bat to help the beleaguered Tigers sink the proud world champions, 4-2 and 5-2.

That made it nine setbacks in their last 10 games for the Yankees, who now are in seventh place with a 7-12 record.

Frank Lary, long a Yankee nemesis, and Don Mossi each pitched an eight-hitter to make it a happy managerial debut for Jimmie Dykes, who replaced Bill Norman after Saturday's game.

Gordon and Piersall banished Maxwell drove in two runs with a single and a homer in the opening game. He hit home runs in his first three times at bat in the nightcap, knocking in six more runs.

Manager Joe Gordon and Jim Piersall of the Cleveland-Indians were banished from the opening game of a twin bill after a near-pitch touch off by a bruch-back pitch thrown by Pedro Ramos of the Washington-Senators.

Ramos also was ejected for throwing a baseball at Gordon. The Indians won the opener, 5-0, but lost the second game, 3-1.

The Kansas City Athletics beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-3, and the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, in 10 innings in American League single games.

In the National League, players streamed on to the diamond twice to "settle" beanball disputes involving manager Solly Hemus of the St. Louis Cardinals and pitcher Bennie Daniels of the Pittsburgh Pirates. Pittsburgh won the

first game, 4-3, in 10 innings; the second game was suspended because of the Pennsylvania curfew law with the Cards ahead, 2-1, after 6 1/2 innings.

BETTER JOBS

Relative Rightness In the last issue I was quoting from Salvatore Saladino, professor of history, Queens College, on the subject of education in a free society. It showed that many of our instructors have contended that right was relative, that there were no absolutes as far as rightness was concerned...

The Problem of Morality The portion of American education which clings to this relativistic, manipulating view of moral values and practices is markedly reluctant to teach morality, or even to face the problem. This is at least both logical and consistent. For if it is believed that there are no absolute values and that transitory utility is the sole basis for making valid judgments, then the only sensible approach in education is one of continuous adjustment in both the material and moral realms...

Historian's Creed If the views which I have briefly criticized are wrong in part or in whole, and if their consequences have often been calamitous for mankind, then it is imperative to identify with some precision the views which I believe to be more correct, and more desirable in their consequences. With which principles in mind, and with the prospects of what results, should American education be guided?

First: Man possesses certain eternal qualities, revealed and exemplified in the historical process, and these qualities are his fallibility and his yearning to transcend his fallibility. Second: The yearning for self-perfection, when faced by the imperfect nature of man, leads to a spiritual crisis which, when expressed concretely among educators, is commonly called "a problem."

Third: Logical reasoning and a sense of history both lead to the conclusion that perfection is beyond the range of mortal man, but the striving for perfection is the source of all that is noble in man and the society in which he lives. Fourth: The goal striven for and never reached is also the source of humility and a sense of utility, qualities that are the best safeguards against the fanatical enterprises toward Utopia which have brought mankind more misery than relief.

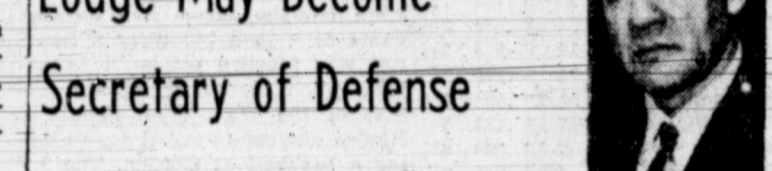
My Own, My Native Land How can these principles or premises be put into practice in education today, and what results may be reasonably expected? At this point, I must reveal my prejudices as a student of history. I do so by insisting that one of the most important tasks before the educator must be to instill in those pupils entrusted to him an understanding of the past and due regard for it. In as much as there are practical limits on how much time and effort can be devoted to this enterprise, it seems to me that it is necessary to emphasize that part of the student's past with which he is likely to have to deal most often, that is, the history of his own country.

Lodge May Become Secretary of Defense

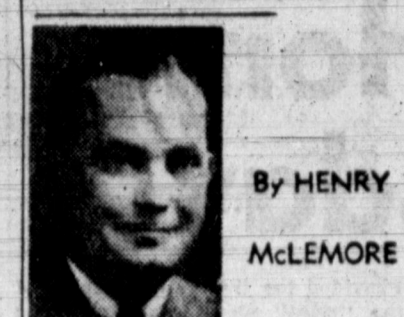


WASHINGTON — The White House is sounding out congressional leaders on the possible appointment of Henry Cabot Lodge, Ambassador to the United Nations, as Secretary of Defense.

Both Republicans and Democrats are cordially approving that. At the same time, certain of the influential lawmakers are giving President Eisenhower some unolicited advice on the naming of a successor to Defense Secretary McElroy when he departs in a few months. They are warning against the selection of Deputy Secretary Donald Quarles.

He is a strong contender for the top Pentagon job. But the President is being bluntly told that Quarles will encounter vigorous opposition, particularly in the powerful Armed Services and Appropriations Committees, where he is under sharp fire. Quarles' elevation to Defense Secretary would be certain to precipitate a bitter confirmation fight.

Congressmen Don't Always Hire Relatives!

It is not true that Congressmen and Senators always hire their relatives. I can brand that widely-held belief as a canard, and from personal experience. I have with me here in Washington, documentary proof that I am related, somewhere along the line, to my Congressman. We aren't first cousins, or anything like that, but if the two of us climbed far enough up the family tree, we'd find ourselves out on the same limb.

I used this documentary proof of relationship in an effort to get a job with my Congressman while I was in Washington. I didn't want much. I didn't hope for a front porch of my own, or even a parlor with myself and the other relatives. I wanted a nominal three or four bucks a day for putting stamps on envelopes, opening the door to the office, or changing ribbons on the typewriters of closer relatives.

It would have helped defray my expenses, and at the same time given me an inside peek into the working habits of our lawmakers. But I didn't get to first base. The fact that my Congressman had similar corpuses racing through his veins, was of no help.

The Doctor Says:

Healthy people ought to use their muscles if they want to treat their bodies in the way intended by nature. The circulation is better, the digestion and bowel elimination work better, and probably all of the other various functions of the human tissues and organs behave better if appropriate physical exercise is taken.

Far too many people take little or no exercise during the winter. Thus their muscles and circulation lack the stimulation provided by exercise during a good part of the year. A second mistake by starting out on the first pleasant day of spring by trying to make up for lost time is also common. Several strenuous sets of tennis after seven or eight months of desk work can be truly dangerous.

How much exercise a person should take to maintain the best possible health is not easy to say. However, the strenuous athletics all right for a young man of 18 or 20 can harm the rapidly growing boy of 13 or the man of 40.

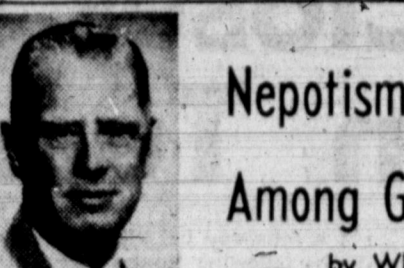
Age is one of the factors to take into consideration when considering exercise. The greatest amount of physical exertion can undoubtedly be taken by young men in full maturity, usually from about 18 to 25. Even at these ages, however, it is possible to overdo, especially for the man who is not "in training." As one correspondent wrote me, scholastic sports should be for amusement and not so strenuously conducted as to injure the heart.

The sex also influences the amount and kind of physical exercise desirable. There are certain types of exercise which women can stand better than men. For example, most women can stay in cold water longer than men because they have a larger amount of fat under the skin which serves as insulating material. The muscles of women, however, are not as a rule so well developed as those of men and their organs are so arranged that certain types of physical exertion are frequently undesirable.

The general health of the individual is an obvious but frequently overlooked factor in deciding about exercise. In practically all forms of heart disease, the amount of exercise has to be decreased. Exercise after an illness or operation must be approached gradually, as the muscles have become flabby and need to be reconditioned.

The general physical condition should, therefore, always be one of the items weighed in choosing the kind and amount of exercise. Most people believe that there is greater benefit obtained from exercise which a person enjoys than from one he does not. If it is a question of choice, it would seem ordinary good sense to pick a type of exercise or athletics which is fun, preferably one which can be kept up for many years and will not be too greatly influenced by age. This is often hard to do, particularly in big cities.

Nepotism, Established Among Garment Workers

NEW YORK — Nepotism is an established institution in the hierarchy of the Garment Workers' Union, which is also a vest-pocket political party and patronage machine with international ramifications. Therefore, the disclosure of nepotism, or country, in Congress, finds the high bureaucracy of the Garment Workers strangely reluctant. Some officials of the Garment Workers are more or less reformed Bolshevik Communists. Jay Povestone, David Dubinsky's Secretary of State for Political Action Overseas, quit his post as first chief of the American Communist Party to lead his own Communist Party, which he called the Communist Party Opposition.

Dubinsky's son in law, Shelley Appleton, recently was promoted from the post of manager of Shipping Clerks' Local 99 to the same job in Skirtmakers' 23. His wife, Jean, Dubinsky's daughter, is a very successful girl. Strictly on her own merits, she landed a job with the Pennsylvania Exchange Bank in New York, as an "account executive," which means a job that she is clever at bringing in accounts and deposits. Hundreds of Garment firms in New York, all subject to Dubinsky's favor or disfavor, have bank accounts, so many unions. Jean's salary was \$15,000 in 1957. She may get more now because she is so very competent.

The reason why Shelley Appleton's transfer from the Shipping Clerks to the Skirtmakers is advantageous is that the Shipping Clerks are not Garment Workers but in the colloquial sense, cars and dogs. Whoever heads the Skirtmakers is on a springboard and job.

She asked me what I wanted. "I am here for two things," I said. "To get a job and to extend greetings from the East of the Appalachians branch of the family, of which I am a member." "You do not stand a chance," the receptionist said. "I turned down a kissing cousin yesterday, even though he was proficient in typing, double entry bookkeeping, and could handle a filing cabinet as if it were a baby."

I couldn't believe my ears. "Do you mean to tell me," I asked, "that I have no chance of getting even a temporary job, even though I bring a jar of arctichoke pickles along with my greetings from Aunt Het, and a length of blue ribbon worn by the Congressman's great-great-grandmother when she was married?" "You are so right," she said. "Let me tell you something — if you seem the right sort — I am holding onto this job by the skin of my teeth. And me a third cousin, no times removed."

"In-laws are the great threat. Every Congressman has millions of in-law relatives help. Oh, do not be too critical of the Congressman. Once the ballots show that they are in, in-laws swarm like locusts. Pray, sir, be tolerant of them. They have great and mighty problems, most of which start after they leave their offices at night."

I left my jar of pickles and went away. My heart went out to congressmen. So many laws to make, so many heads to pat, so many mouths to feed. I tore up my proof of relationship. It made me feel better.

Lawmakers Set For Special Session Of Texas Legislature

AUSTIN (UPI) - Texas lawmakers, unable to agree on a tax program to finance the state's money needs, prepared today to run out the clock on the 56th regular session - ending May 12 and stand by for a special session. Gov. Price Daniel shed the optimism of his earlier statements and held out hope only that the legislature will enact measures to increase the state's general revenue fund deficit of 65 million dollars. With only one full week of action left - plus two wind-up days in the following week - passage of deficit retirement bills would require a burst of speed on the part of the Senate, where the proposals are now pending. Daniel Blast Lobbyists. Daniel was expected to call a special session no later than one week after the May 12 final adjournment of the regular session. Daniel fixed the blame for legislative failure squarely on an "arrogant group of lobbyists" and called for "courage" on the part of legislators and active support from the people at the grass-roots to meet the problem. The governor, speaking to a service clubs luncheon at Marshall Friday, laid out a blueprint of action with the statement that "even yet there is time to pass measures which will retire the deficit ahead of expenditures and taxes for the next biennium." He congratulated the Senate State Affairs Committee, headed by Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, for setting tax and revenue-raising measure for full-scale five-day hearings next week.
