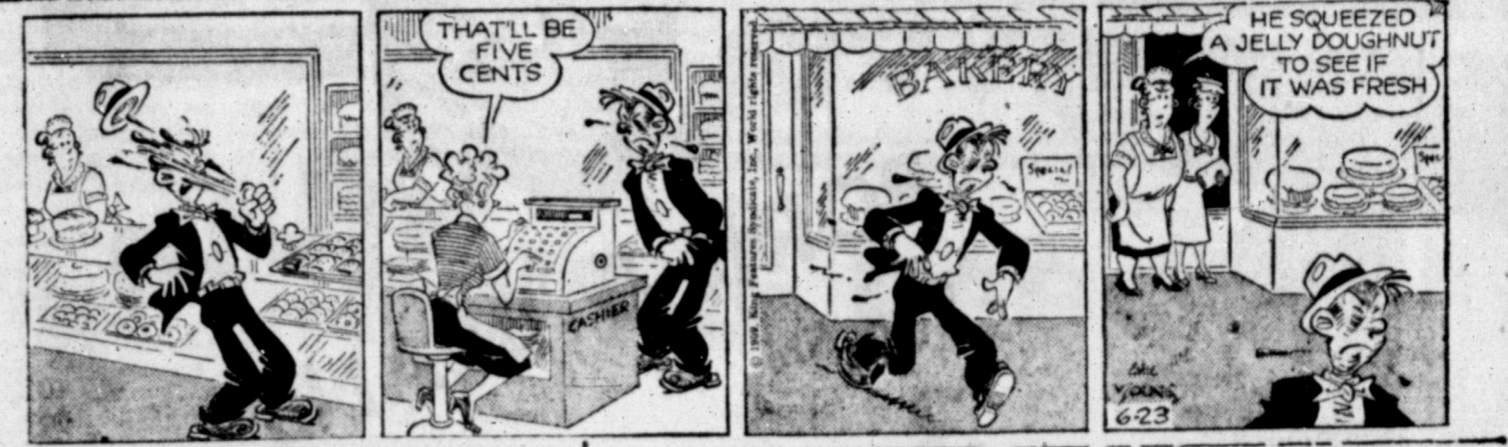

### Best Flower Arrangements Follow Natural Patterns

NEW YORK (UPI)—Poor old poses. They're "tortured" by the way we amateurs toss together bouquets, says a florist and lecturer on flower arrangements.

George Cothran, a slim, dark-haired man of 30 who came north from Georgia to show big city dwellers how to handle flowers, says that one look at most arrangements and he weeps for the blossoms.

"They're tortured," said Cothran. "Distorted by wire into shapes never intended. The best flower arrangements go along with nature. The flowers should not be bent into directions they do not grow."

To Cothran, the Japanese have the right idea in floral decoration. "All arrangements are built on three basic lines—heaven, man and earth," he said. "The heaven line points directly skyward; earth is the horizontal; man wavers in between, at about a 45-degree angle."

**Provides Balance**  
"This provides balance," said Cothran. "And the Orientals know what they're doing. Flower arrangement there has been one of the fine arts for centuries."

One other Cothran rule: Put the lighter colored flowers toward the top of an arrangement; the darker tones at the base. "Flower arranging is like a painting," he explained. "You want to lead the eye to the focal point."

Cothran is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Cothran, who operate a peaches and watermelon-producing farm at Lithonia, Ga. He said he had been interested in growing flowers "ever since I was a teenager. I started with African violets as a hobby."

He worked in flower shops to help pay for studies at Mercer University, Macon, Ga., and the University of Georgia, at Atlanta, where he specialized in business management. After school, he hit the lecture circuit—talking to garden clubs and other women's groups on flower arranging.

**Gets TV Business**  
Cothran has gone after the floral business of show business—either for television or stage sets, or for the homes of those in the entertainment world.

When I visited his shop, he was working on an arrangement for "Perry Presents," a summertime replacement for the Perry Como television show. The set designer wanted a summery theme, so Cothran was figuring how to arrange pink and red carnations in a watermelon half.

He has done rose trees, covered with 200 to 300 blossoms, for \$500. One client had an arrangement of orchids flown to London for a party.

"We have a card file on every customer," said Cothran. "It lists his or her floral preference, the color scheme and type of furnishings in the home. A floral arrangement has to fit the room. We wouldn't put harsh oranges

and reds in a room done in pastels. And some stark modern rooms can't take flowers at all. Here, modernistic arrangements of foliage are much better."

### Public Opinion Favors 'Little Summit' Meeting

From the foreign editor's notebook:  
**PROTOCOL:**

There is mounting public opinion in France favoring a "little summit" meeting between President Eisenhower and Gen. Charles de Gaulle. Such a meeting might find a solution to France's demands for a greater share in NATO policy-making and atomic secrets. But the General is being stiff-necked about that, too. He feels that Eisenhower should go to Paris. American sources point out that Eisenhower was the one who issued the invitation first and that De Gaulle should go to Washington. Moreover, they say, De Gaulle is only chief of state and not head of the government as well, and is therefore well able to take time out for an official visit. The mounting public clamor may change his mind, but whether the meeting is in Paris or Washington, the General will not change his demand that France be given her "rightful place in the world."

**TO BE OR NOT TO BE:**  
In the next few months there

undoubtedly is going to be a wide-open fight in the ranks of the Labor Party on the issue of whether Britain should remain a nuclear power. Hugh Gaitskell and Aneurin Bevan, party leaders, think it should, and do not want their hands tied by any pre-election commitment which might come back to haunt them should they succeed in throwing the Conservatives out of office. But the pacifist rank and file of the Labor movement, supported by some big trade unions, are urging labor to say flatly that Britain will renounce the bomb if the Socialists come to power. The issue could split the British Labor Party.

**NEUTRAL PREPAREDNESS:**  
Traditionally neutral Switzerland will send military delegations to the United States and Britain later this year for a close look at their air defense systems and air defense missiles. Switzerland plans to bolster its defenses with anti-aircraft rockets.

**PLUMP FEELINGS HURT**  
SLOUGH, England (UPI)—Magician Alex McKeown told police Sunday that his wife, Gladys, 49, had vanished. McKeown, 57, married for 25 years and the father of two children, said she probably left because her feelings were hurt. He said he had told his wife she was too plump to continue as his stage partner. "Plump or not, I still love her," he said.

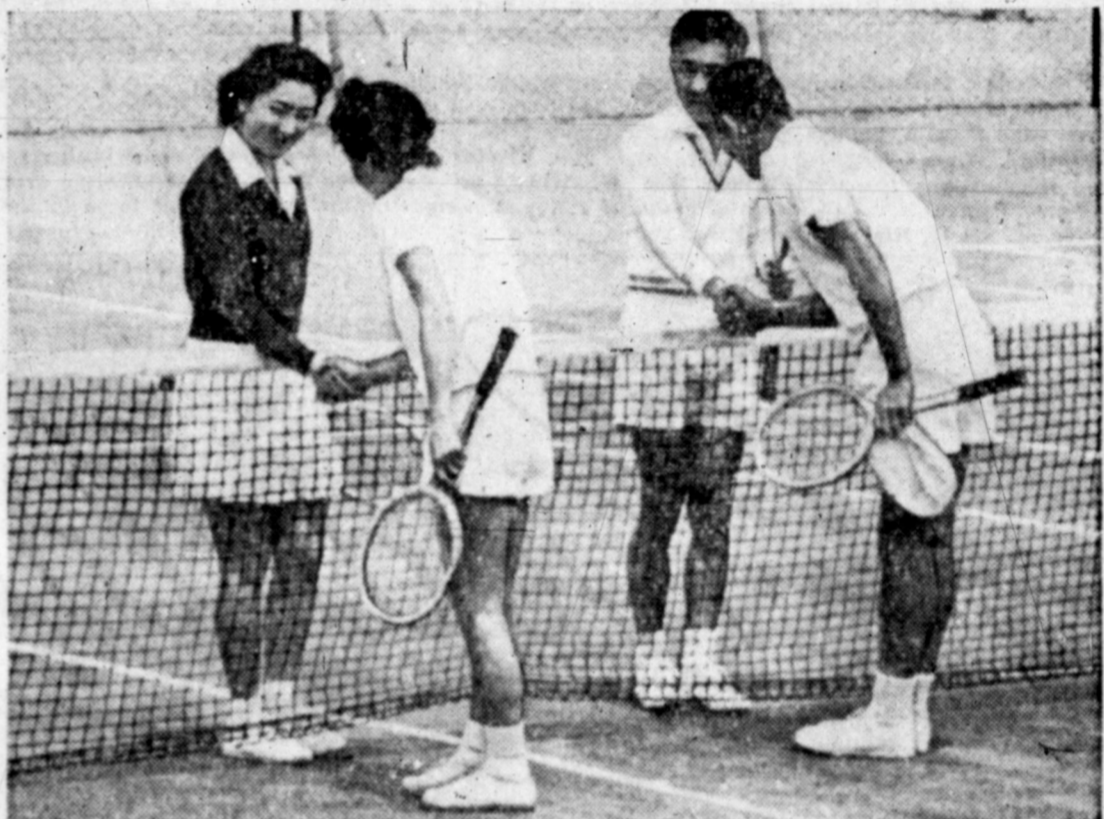

### Small Fry Can Be Of Help To Mother As Long Days Of Vacations Begin

The first Monday morning that the customary confusion of hustling children off to school is missing is a rather shocking reminder to mother that summer vacation has begun.

Older children may have a summer job lined up, but younger ones will look for things to do at home.

Most mothers recognize that unlimited playtime soon falls on a child, and they set up definite tasks to be performed each day.

Most children like to be a help around the house, at least part of the time, and summer vacation provides the opportunity to let them help. What jobs they can handle depend on age.

Little helpers can be encouraged to put away—toys, to pick up papers, and to store groceries; canned goods stacked on lower shelves of cabinets can be sorted by color of label or pictures on label.

By the time they're in first grade, you perhaps are encouraging them to make their own beds and keep rooms picked up.

They'll have time to do this carefully in the summer and, who knows, perhaps establish the habit.

Added jobs for the children seven or older could be: emptying wastebaskets, helping with dishes, helping in the garden, weeding and edging.

Running errands is often a well-liked job, especially if it involves a trip to a store or to the home of a favorite adult. Learning basic household routines is important for the young girl and she will gradually and pleasurably absorb homemaking skills, with sensible guidance.

A 9-year-old, for example, can do a creditable job of vacuum cleaning the carpet.

## Amendment Would Require Leaders To Prove Honesty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A slight amendment of the labor reform bill now pending in the House would put it up to the leaders of organized labor to prove they do not use union funds for forbidden political purposes.

The labor reform bill, which passed the Senate with only one dissenting vote, contains authorization for union members to sue for recovery of embezzled union funds. The language of that paragraph could not be stretched to cover the use of union dues money for political purposes. Two or three amending words, however, would extend it to political spending.

The federal corrupt practices act already makes it unlawful for "any labor organization to make a contribution or expenditure" in connection with election to federal office. The staff of the Republican Senate Policy Committee reported last year that in practice

the leaders of organized labor operate several more or less richly-endowed political machines which spend millions of dollars for direct political action.

"Voluntary Contributions" — "The labor bosses," the staff report said, "claim that these political auxiliaries do not fall within the Corrupt Practices Act definition of a labor organization." And, furthermore, that their activities are financed by "voluntary contributions."

The staff report stiffly challenged this position of the union leaders. It cited what it claimed were judicial and other findings in several state courts that specific labor unions had, in fact, used involuntary dues money, collected under the union shop, to influence voters and to contribute to candidates and to political committees.

Staff members believe they could show political misuses of union funds in North Carolina, Missouri and, perhaps, in Georgia and Michigan. Amendment of

the labor reform bill to invite union members to sue for recovery of funds so used most certainly would end the dispute.

There would be rank-and-file member suits and the courts would determine on evidence presented whether union leaders do or do not use dues money for political purposes in federal elections. The Justice Department, of course, could proceed now or any time on its own in that area.

Fair Question — How it is that a Republican Policy Committee staff could charge publicly that the corrupt practices act was being violated and the Justice Department would take no action, is a fair if baffling question.

The committee staff report was published last July. A Justice Department indictment of the United Auto Workers for allegedly illegal political spending in Michigan in 1954 was thrown out of court in 1956. The department has made no move since then.

President Eisenhower is understood to be planning a TV appeal to the nation for House approval of a labor reform bill substantially stronger than that which passed the Senate. If the law is mitted staff report contends, perhaps it would be the President's duty, as chief magistrate, to request specific remedial action

"After that I will return to Israel unless and until they have more film work for me," rifle-woman Harareet announced.

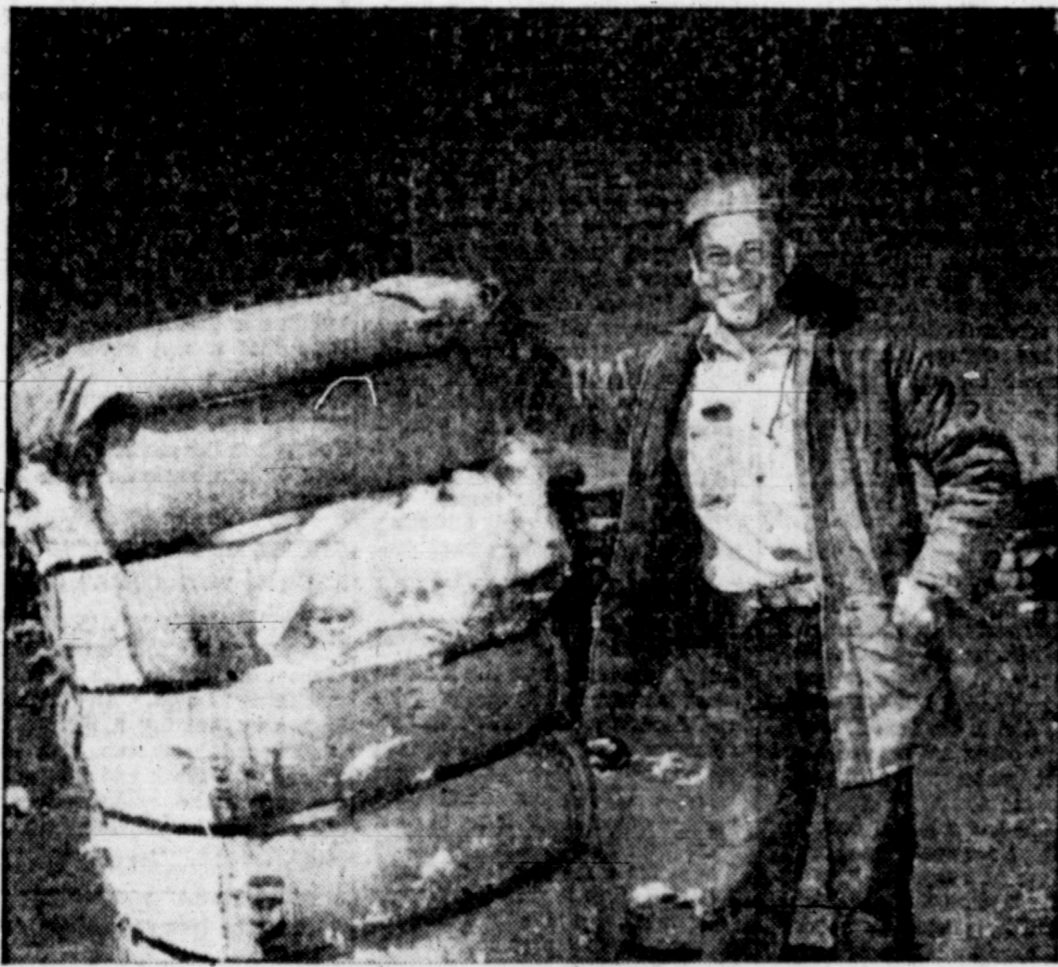
"I would not like to establish a permanent home away from my native country. To me it is the most beautiful place on earth—and the most exciting."

"Can we talk?" she said, her voice low and more than a little hesitant. "Of course." "I'm British, London. I flew in last night. About thirty-odd of us. We're the 'Lido de Paris' girls on our way to Stardust Hotel at Las Vegas. Ghastly flight. We were 24 hours all told. It was knowing in Newfoundland. And now look, this appalling heat. My name is Marcella. Marcella Laine."

"So I told her my name and turned and looked directly at her. She was simply lovely. And she was, she said, six feet tall. This was her first show job. She'd been a secretary in a London office. "That's something of a transition," I said. "How did that happen?"

"I saw an advertisement," she said. "Tall girls, for a revue in Paris which would, after a few weeks there, go to Las Vegas. I wanted to make some money. The pay was enormous — or so it seemed. What with taxes and living costs in Las Vegas, I don't know."

Keeping 7th Army

'High' Huge Task

STUTTGART — Football coaches say it is impossible to keep a team "high" for as many as four games in a row.

The same fear of staleness haunts a fight manager when he is readying a fighter for a big bout, and a baseball manager during the grind of the summer months.

Think, then, of the job that confronts Lt. Gen. Francis W. Farrell, the handsome, genial Irishman who commands the Seventh United States Army.

His is an Army that has to stay higher than high, day in and day out, month in and month out, year in and year out. There can be no letting down for the men of the Seventh.

The two corps, the five divisions, the six armored combat commands, the three armored cavalry regiments, and all the rest, must be trigger-ready, and stay trigger-ready.

The stakes are too high for a let-down. A football team loses and all that is lost is a conference title or trophy.

But let the Seventh Army fall off, and a war can well be lost. For it is the guts of the NATO shield in Europe. Its zone of responsibility runs from the Alps in the south to the Fulda Gap in the north, and embraces the centuries-old invasion routes, through which invading hordes have always poured.

Behind the Seventh's shield, counting on its forces for protection, are 20,000,000 Germans in the American zone of responsibility, 300,000 Army and Air Force personnel, 150,000 U.S. dependents, 12,000 U.S. citizens living in Germany and some 25,000 NATO tourists.
