



A major portion of the rest of the week was consumed in bitter debate over this highly controversial measure. We also had the wheat bill that had been approved by the Senate and House Conference Committee. This was hotly debated and incidentally, failed of adoption. As soon as the foreign aid bill had been concluded, the House considered probably the most expensive isue facing the country today. I refer to the proposal of the Eisenhower Administration to increase the nation public debt limit.

These activities meant that the day of the Congressman started earlier and lasted later than usual. I was on the move by 7 in the morning, and never able to get to bed before midnight all week. In addition to the activities outlined above, we had the usual responsibilities and obligations of the average day in the Congressional office. That is, the regular mail that must be answered promptly the matters that must be handled with all the Federal departments, the reference work which must be done to keep one acquainted with the pending bills, as well as a thousand and one things that are never anticipated. I am sure all newspaper, television, and radio people can appreciate the deadline situation. I just wanted you to know that it goes on here too.







Keeping 7th Army

'High' Huge Task STUTTGART - Football coaches say it is impossible to keep a team "high" for as many as four games in a row.

The same fear of staleness haunts a fight manager when he is readying a fighter for a big bout, and a baseball manager during the grind of the summer

Think, then, of the job that confronts Lt. Gen. Francis W. Farrell, the handsome, genial Irishman who commands the Seventh United States Army.

His is an Army that has to stay higher than high, day in and day. out, month in and month out, year in and year out. There can be no letting down for the men of the Seventh.

The two corps, the five divisions, the six armored combat commands, the three armored cavalry regiments, and all the rest, must be trigger-ready, andstay trigger-ready.

The stakes are too high for a letdown. A football team loses and all that is lost is a conference title or trophy.

But let the Seventh Army fall off, and a war can well be lost. For it is the guts of the NATO shield in Europe. Its zone of responsibility runs from the Austrain Alps in the south to Fulda Gap in the north, and embraces the centuries-old invasion routes, through which invading hordes have always poured.

Behind the Seventh's shield, counting on its forces for protection, are 20,000,000 Germans in the American zone of responsibility 300,000 Army and Air Force personnel, 150,000 U.S. dpendenats. 12,000 U.S. citizens living in Germany and some 25,000 NATO tour-

That's a lot of people, and when you add the folks back home for the Seventh protects Tucson, Bangor and Chicago, just as it does the towns of Western Europe

the responsibility is staggering. The Seventh stays combat-ready by constant work. There isn't a lazy bone in its body. The line soldier spends half his time miles away from his comfortable quarters, out in the field.


