

# Search Continues for 19 Dangerous Men

YANCEYVILLE, N. C. (UPI)—Planes and helicopters roared into a Southwide manhunt today for 19 psychopathic convicts who broke out of an "escape proof" prison and apparently fled the state.

"We're pretty sure they are out of the state," Highway Patrol Capt. A. W. Wells said in Greensboro, N. C. But he added that until the truck used in the escape is found "we're not going to call off our own search."

The main hunt centered early today near Roanoke, Va., where farmer W. R. Robinson of Buchanan, Va., said three men dressed in prison garb forced him

to give them civilian clothing Tuesday night and then made him drive them to Roanoke. Helicopters and planes hovered over the Roanoke area, while officers checked on Robinson's story.

One private plane and two National Guard craft crisscrossed woodlands between the Ivy Bluff maximum security prison near here and the Virginia border about 12 miles away.

Another report came from Memphis, Tenn., 600 miles west of the scene of the prison break, where Clarence H. Wortham, 52, said four "desperados" held a knife at his throat and assaulted his wife.

Police said the men were driving a car with North Carolina license tags. Prison officials pored over the criminal records of the 19 fugitives hunting for a clue which

might point to a hideout or a stopping-off place. The search spread over the eastern seaboard and into the Midwest. The FBI joined in the (See SEARCH, Page 3)

## Civilian Space Agency Will Speed Work

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department said today that creation of a new civilian space agency has been subject to congressional approval. The principal rockets under the Ostrander-Von Braun unit will be the Saturn and Nova, designed to send robot and manned vehicles to the moon and to nearby planets. These will be far larger than any of the present military rockets.

## Atlas ICBM Is Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—A huge Atlas ICBM made what appeared to be its 13th straight successful flight Tuesday night, boosting its stock as both a space rocket booster and a military weapon. There was no official word from the Air Force on results of the shot, but it was believed the Atlas achieved most of its test objectives on a 6,300-mile intercontinental range flight over the Atlantic.

## Sea Finally Beats Spunky Skipper

ST. COMBS, Scotland (UPI)—Capt. Jukka Vuorio today abandoned a single-handed attempt to save his storm-grounded freighter Anna and allowed Coast Guardsmen to take him off the ship by breeches buoy. Vuorio, tough 62-year-old veteran of many storms like the one that stranded the 1,045-ton Anna, stayed alone on her spray-soaked decks for more than 24 hours to try to get her refloated. His 17-man crew was carried across 100 yards of frothing waves to shore, but Vuorio ignored the Coast Guard's pleas, his owners' orders and the threat that the old ship might break up. The Anna had been his home for 25 years and he did not want to give it up.

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—A C-47 airliner with 46 persons aboard was overdue and feared lost in the Caribbean today. The plane was en route to Cartagena from the resort islands of San Andres.

# Eisenhower Gets Big Welcome In Indian Capitol City

## Conference Set With India's Leaders on Chinese Problem

By MERRIMAN SMITH UPI White House Reporter NEW DELHI (UPI)—President Eisenhower's triumphal tour of Asia brought him today to New Delhi where he promised Indians worried about war with Red China that he would work with their leaders in "our common quest for peace."

It was an uproarious, flower-garlanded welcome for the President on his fifth and so far most important stop on his 11-nation tour of Asia, Europe and Africa. It was obviously an emotional moment for him as he stood before a background of pink-tipped clouds in the setting sun and told an estimated 60,000 to 70,000 Indians massed at Palam Airport that there must be peace because the alternative is "too horrible to contemplate."

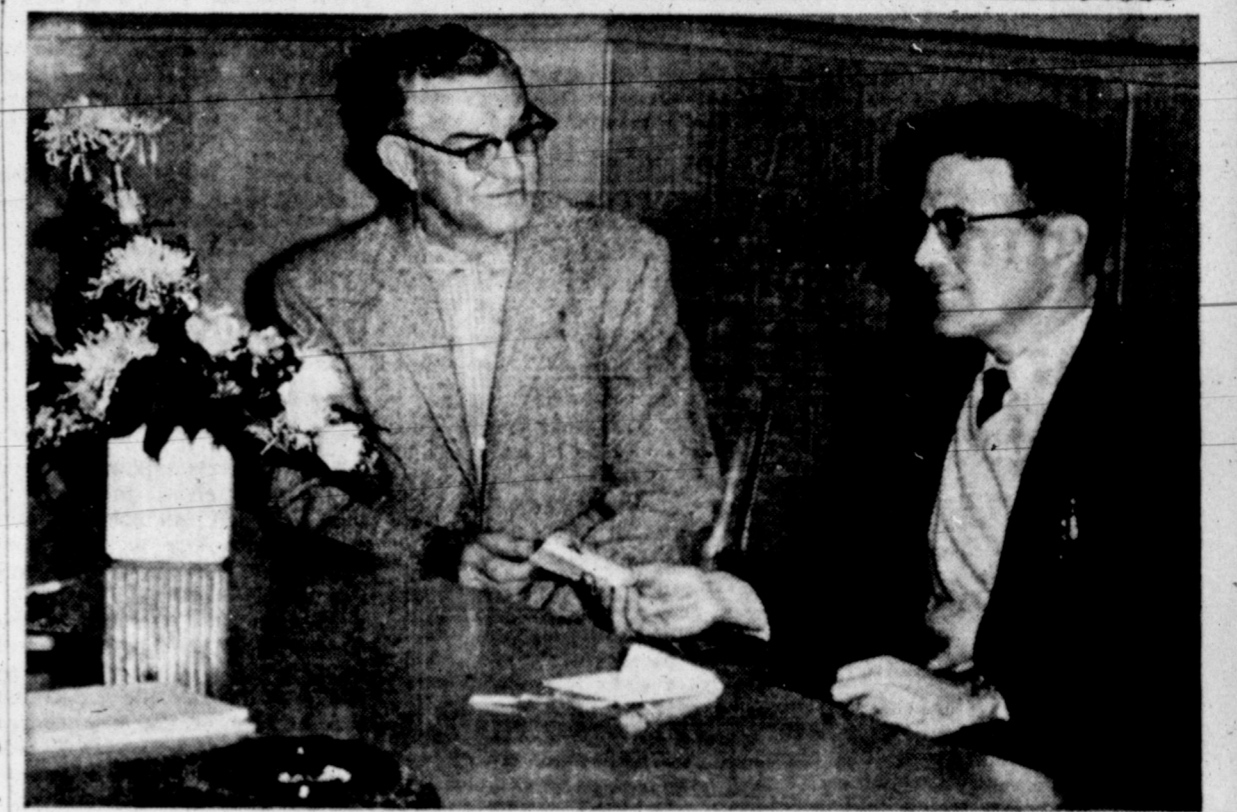

### Train Derailed, Three are Hurt

MT. UNION, Pa. (UPI)—A Pennsylvania Railroad express train, carrying about 140 passengers, derailed in a rugged mountain area of central Pennsylvania early today.  
Three persons were injured when the crack New York to Cleveland train, the Cleveland, left the rails about 12:30 a.m., after striking a piece of machinery apparently dropped by another westbound train.  
Dempsey L. Sutton, 21, 1886 E. 26th St., Cleveland, was admitted to Leavittown General Hospital with hand and leg injuries. Mrs. Jo Ann Mulligan, about 25, 4505 East-West Hwy., Bethesda, Md., and John Morgan, 48, 407 E. Luton St., New Castle, Pa., a railroad employe, were hospitalized at Huntingdon with shock and contusions.  
Several other passengers were taken up when two coaches left

the rails. A heavier toll of injuries was avoided because the coaches did not overturn. Four sleeping cars remained on the tracks.  
A three-unit diesel locomotive, 10-express, baggage and mail cars and a diner derailed.  
A railroad spokesman said 59 coach passengers were aboard the train when it reached Harrisburg, Pa., at 10:40 p.m. He said approximately the same number continued westward. There were 83 pullman passengers aboard the train.  
The Cleveland struck a large piece of equipment dropped from another train which preceded it on the westbound track, a train crewman said. The rails were split and the machinery which triggered the wreck was smashed beyond recognition when the passenger train slammed into it.  
Three of four tracks on the Pennsylvania's east-west mainline were blocked. Several crack passenger trains were delayed, one

NEW YORK (UPI)—Actor George Grizzard probably wishes Tuesday night's NBC-TV production of "My Three Angels" was on tape. But it was live and here's what happened:

In portraying a man who killed his stepfather, Grizzard was supposed to say, "Look, that night I dined with Jeannine at Maxim's... suppose the old buzzard were a different kind of buzzard."

Before reaching the first "buzzard," Grizzard hesitated for a fleeting moment and said something else, a seven-letter word that begins and ends with the same letters as buzzard.  
An NBC-TV spokesman said it was a "psychological slip" occasioned by Grizzard's being too familiar with the original Broadway production.  
"The play was taped earlier in the day," the spokesman added, "and nothing like this happened. But they decided to do it live because it needed that one more run-through."

The spokesman said 15 telephone calls were received and only four callers objected. They objected violently to the use of a swear word on a show that included a Christmas setting.

### Sherman Airmen Held Here For Extradition

Two Sherman AFB airmen, Steve Napp, 23, and Leonard Sherrick, 22, are in custody at county jail today awaiting extradition to Hobart, Okla., on burglary charges.

Sheriff Rufe Jordan said today that Napp and Sherrick were arrested late Monday night at McLean by Constable J. D. Fish.

Both men admitted today burglarizing a Mountain View Okla. jewelry store Nov. 30 and escaping with between \$500 and \$2,000 in watches and assorted valuables. They said most of the jewels were sold to fellow airmen at the Clinton, Okla., airbase.

Constable Fish arrested the two men after they were seen driving through McLean in apparent effort to burglarize a McLean parts store. They are expected to be returned to Hobart today in the company of Sheriff Pete Peters.

### Twenty Killed In Bus Accident

CACAHUAMILPA, Mexico, (UPI)—More than 20 persons were killed and at least 30 were injured when a jammed second-class bus plunged off a highway and caught fire here late Tuesday.

First reports said the vehicle rumbled and bounced some 90 feet down an embankment on a feeder road off the main highway to Acapulco in the state of Morelos, southwest of Mexico City.

Cause of the accident was not immediately determined.  
Most of the dead were feared to have died in the fire which flashed over the vehicle after it left the road.

In another accident near here, a pickup truck rammed a city bus, killing the driver of the pickup and injuring nine passengers of the bus.

Heretofore the maximum security prison had been considered escape-proof and was reserved for the state's most dangerous and incorrigible prisoners.

Bailey blamed laxity and failure to follow prescribed rules and regulations for the break-out. He fired three guards on the spot.  
One of the fugitives, Charles Edwards, 28, of Gastonia, N.C., a Negro serving life for burglary, was recaptured in a woods several miles from Ivy Bluff late Tuesday.

### James T. Aubrey, Jr. Promoted To Columbia System President

NEW YORK (UPI)—James T. Aubrey Jr. today moved into the presidency of the Columbia Broadcasting System television network at a turning point described as possibly the most critical in the network's history.

He was catapulted into the job by the bitter resignation Tuesday of Louis G. Cowan, originator of television's first high-stakes quiz show, "The \$64,000 Question."

In a strongly worded letter to CBS President Frank Stanton, Cowan said "you have made it impossible for me to continue." He offered to stay on as president for 30 days in accordance with his contract, or to leave ever Stanton asked him to.

Stanton replied "I accept your resignation. It is effective immediately."

Stanton said he was "very, very sorry" Cowan had written such a letter, but Cowan indicated that the subject of his resignation had been a sore point for some time.

Aubrey, who was appointed executive vice president of CBS-TV last June, had been acting as president since Cowan became ill with a thrombosis of the left leg in October. Cowan was hospitalized during the congressional hearings into quiz show rigging.

"This decision was importantly affected by the realization that the next six months may well be the most critical in the history of the CBS television network as we engage in basic reappraisal and planning," Stanton said.

Cowan's sudden resignation was the second major development affecting television networks Tuesday.

Only a few hours earlier, the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) admitted that a Negro choral group, the Clara Ward Singers, had kicked back to NBC half the money they were paid for appearances on the "today"

### Winter Gales Hit Shipping

LONDON (UPI)—Winter gales today piled up powerful storm waves in the busy shipping lanes around the European coastline for the fourth day and new sinkings raised the death toll—past the 100 mark.

For the first time since the storm began, Russian rescue crews were called out.

The storm's force swung to the north after battering Portugal, Spain, and France on their Atlantic coastlines. It hit the northern seas—the North, the Baltic, and the North Atlantic.

The death toll rose to 104 and others were missing, including five or six Americans somewhere in the Atlantic aboard a new Norwegian-designed yacht, the 60-ton Edward Grieg.

They were identified as Eugene Scott, of Newport Beach, Calif., his wife and two daughters, E. Lamerding, of San Rafael, Calif., and possibly Lamerding's wife.

West of Norway, the 1,719-ton Norwegian freighter Elfrida turned over and sank early today after a night of fatal pounding by waves too big to weather. Its 21-man crew was presumed dead, because its position was only 500 miles south of the Arctic Circle.

Frank Meyers, 42, of Farmingdale, L.I., said a strong cross wind struck the plane as it rolled down a runway he described as "very slippery." He said the nose wheel of the plane collapsed when it hit the dirt off the runway.

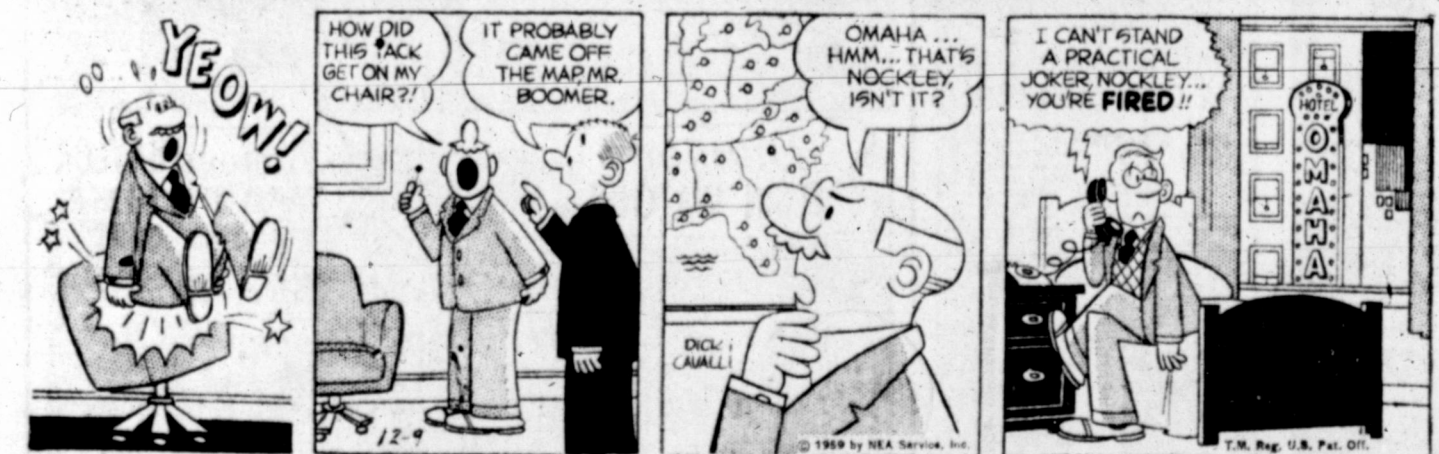

### Suit Filed Tuesday Against Lubbock Insurance Companies

AUSTIN (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson filed suit against two Lubbock insurance companies Tuesday charging officers of the firms siphoned off more than \$152,017 for their personal use.

Shortly after the suits were filed, Dist. Judge Jack Roberts issued temporary restraining orders placing the companies in receivership.

The companies are Investors Security Life Insurance Co., and Mutual Old Line Life Insurance Co.

Five men were named as defendants in the suits. They are R. C. Hewitt, president, and E. B. Fullingim, secretary, of Investors Security Life; George Wimberly, president, of Mutual Old Line Life.

Wilson charged Investors Security is insolvent with a reserve impairment of more than a quarter of a million dollars. He said the firm filed a false annual statement for 1958, and tried to hide the condition of the company from a state insurance examiner by withholding vital company records.

He said the company's records reflect unauthorized withdrawals by officers and employees of more than \$76,355, and that the money was converted for personal use.

The attorney general charged Mutual Old Line is also insolvent and it had a surplus impairment of \$39,840 as of last Aug. 31.

He charged further the companies "engaged in the wholesale selling of surplus certificates in complete disregard and violation" of the Texas Insurance Code, and

### Boys To Skip Lunch - For Good Cause

ALBION, Mich. (UPI)—Some 180 youths at the Starr Commonwealth for Boys, in need of help themselves, will go without lunch Tuesday to help give needy Detroit children a better Christmas.

It has been a tradition since 1914 at the Commonwealth for the boys to have a "fast day" just before Christmas so they can raise money to contribute to some charity.

Although they are also trying to raise \$100,000 to match \$10,000 donated by the Knights Templar for a new recreation building at the school, the boys voted to donate this year to the Detroit Goodfellows Old Newsboys Fund, which buys gifts for needy children.

The boys go without lunch so the money that would normally have been spent on the meal can be contributed to a charity.

"Uncle Floyd" Starr, who founded the Commonwealth for wayward boys, usually matches the amount saved by the fasting out of his own pocket.

But he explained that he would make an exception this year because the money is needed so badly for construction of the new recreation building.

He said the money raised by the boys would go to the old newsboys fund but his matching contribution would go to the recreation building fund this year. He estimated the contribution to the Old Newsboys' Fund would be about \$150.

The "fast-day" was begun about a year after Starr founded his home for homeless and wayward boys on a farm west of here.

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West Meets East Fashionably As U. S. Swaps Japan Cotton For Silk

NEW YORK (UPI)—The wide, loose sleeves of the oriental kimono show throughout Western styles for spring. Now, 13 Japanese designers hope to inspire even more of a West-meets-East trend.

Ten of Japan's leading textile mills commissioned the designers' works—all of which are in cotton. (Japan sends us most of their silks; we send the Japanese most of their cottons.)

The works of the 13 range from beachwear to formal clothes and were shown in New York this week under the sponsorship of the Japan-U. S. Textile Information Service. Once the American stylists and fabrics people get a good look at the Japanese designs, all the clothes will be auctioned for benefit of a charity.

Most of us are familiar with the wide sleeve, but narrow body of the kimono; the wide waist circlet called the obi; and the easy, unbelted fit of the coolie jacket.

But the designers turned to other traditions of Japanese dress also for inspiration.

One named Mrs. Tsumako No-ruchi copied, for evening wear, the lines of the momoyama, an evening dress of court circles four centuries ago. The ensemble, made of jacquard, consists of a two-piece kimono, plus obi, plus

a short cape. The coolie dress, provided the design for a resort ensemble from Mrs. Junko Oda; it consisted of a black coolie jacket worn over slim-cut white coveralls.

From the tradespeople's happi coat, worn on festival days, came Miss Yoko Kuwasawa's "New Happi"—a sleek-looking at-home costume of printed cotton. It consists of long tapered slacks, and a loosely fitted top belted with a sateen obi.

The higher, samurai class provided Mrs. Shigemi Nomura's inspiration for an evening ensemble of a red crepe sheath, accented with embroidery and a full-length kimono. This type of apparel, the service said, now is worn by Japanese brides.

The designers copied farmer's field wear, robes worn by Japanese priests on ceremonial occasions, and a samurai footman's garb which in modern form became a resort ensemble in three parts—holero jacket, halter and pedal pushers.

Boy's-Eye-View Of Jesus Given By Reviewer At Episcopal Women's Meet

Women of St. Matthews Episcopal Church met recently in the parish hall with Mrs. Jack Curtis and Mrs. Bruce Scott as hostesses. Mrs. James Dailey, president, presided during the business meeting.

Mrs. Frank Kelley, for the program, gave a review of "I Remember Jesus" by Randolph Crump Miller, professor of Christian Education at Yale University Divinity School.

In opening remarks, Mrs. Kelley quoted author Miller as saying: "Jesus always confronts us with some degree of mystery. Through the Gospels we must see him from the perspective of the community of faith, but this makes it harder to conceive what he may have been like in daily life. This book attempts to get behind the Gospel narrative to the period when Jesus was living in Palestine, so that we can share some of the experiences of that time."

"The author says," Mr. Kelley continued, "that he has often thought that children were among the followers of Jesus. In the throngs of men and women, there must have been boys and girls, who were thrilled by the golden words, the kindly deeds and the spiritual power which radiated from one whom they loved, but did not understand."

"In this boy, he has pictured a young boy of about twelve, who is associated closely with Jesus and

his followers. He is sufficiently intimate with them to follow along on their journeys and keeps his eyes and ears open. And yet he is hardly noticed. This is possible because his parents are among the faithful and often appear in the company of Jesus' followers."

"When this boy becomes a man of about 50, he recalls the events of those early years and writes them down. He is looking back on his boyhood and is trying to remember the incidents as he saw them and not as he interprets them now. Occasionally, as he tells the story, his later views creep into his interpretation. But the boy, at the time, these events unfold, does not know what is going to happen to Jesus or even just who Jesus is. He gives us a boy's eye-view. Before the book is finished, the reader will know who this boy is for he appears quite naturally upon the scene at the proper time.

### Henry Pu Yi Was Pathetic Figure In Chinese History

Henry Pu Yi has atoned for his crimes.

History never will record great deeds of derring-do by Henry Pu Yi. But he must rate at least a paragraph as the last of a dynasty, a pathetic figure swept along throughout his 54 years—by events in which he was forced to play a part but over which he had no control.

In his lifetime, he sat upon two thrones and was ousted from both.

He was the last of the Manchurians who ruled China for nearly 300 years.

And he was the puppet whom the Japanese sat upon the throne of the Manchurian state which they renamed Manchukuo.

In the meantime, he lived in the north China city of Tientsin simply as Henry Pu Yi.

His name cropped up last week in a list of nearly 60 others granted amnesty by the Red Chinese for various offenses ranging from political unreliaables to war criminals. Henry Pu Yi was in the latter category.

Henry Pu Yi ascended the crumbling throne of China in 1908 when he was 10 years old.

He succeeded the dowager Empress Tsu Hsi who made Peiping a forbidden city to foreigners and whose hatred of all outsiders finally exploded in the Boxer Rebellion. Her extravagances and prejudices already had brought the country to ruin.

For four years Pu Yi ruled through a regency, finally being forced to abdicate in 1912 with establishment of the republic under Sun Yat-sen.

He returned briefly five years later but again was forced to abdicate, this time within a month. For nearly 20 years thereafter he lived the obscure life of plain Henry Pu Yi.

But in 1934 a militant Japan had overrun Manchuria, which had the coal, minerals and expansion room the Japanese needed. They also needed some form of legality to mask their outright steal of a huge chunk of Chinese territory.

Henry Pu Yi was their answer and they placed him on the puppet throne while they proceeded to build their railroads and dams and a great industrial complex in preparation for World War II.

At the end of the war, the Russians found him and took him to Tokyo to testify in the war crimes trials and then turned him over

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Three ingredients measure the makings of any success, says one of the nation's youngest and undoubtedly prettiest woman executives.

"The basic talent to begin with; then the basic training; and finally, caring enough about the job to work hard—I honestly believe these are the qualities," said Geraldine Stutz.

Miss Stutz, 35, is president of Henri Bendel, a landmark on New York's fashionable 37th St. For two years she has occupied the specialty store's executive suite—in celadon green with works of art from her personal collection decorating its walls.

We checked in to see how Miss Stutz is doing in a business highly competitive in any city, and in a position "which most career women of any age would give their eye teeth to have.

The answer is quite well. And bossing 200 employees—many of whom have been with the store 25 to 50 years—apparently hasn't

given her a swollen head.

"So what's to be impressed about?" said Gerry Stutz.

The woman president is disarmingly unlike many executive types this reporter has interviewed. No chain of secretaries to break through; just one assistant, a pretty blonde. No constant telephone interruptions. And no hard-hitting, brusque manner.

Instead, you meet a relaxed, friendly woman who looks about 25; who has dark brown hair worn in a short bob, dark eyes, and the figure of a model—five feet, six-inches and around 110 pounds; a woman president who sits at her desk eating a doughnut and drinking tea from a paper cup.

"I'm usually here by nine each morning," she said. "I don't work late many evenings . . . I like to crowd in a lot of theater. But it seems like I haven't had a Saturday off since I took this job."

"But one thing, I am not a career woman in the traditional sense . . . not like one of those Roz Russell heroines in the movies. I love men, women, children and dogs and want to get married when I meet the right man."

"This is a pleasant way of making a living. It is not a way of life."

### Toys Not All Safe

**CHICAGO (SpI)**—Toys, toys, peeking from beneath Christmas trees across the nation Dec. 25 will be all sorts of playthings—round toys, hard toys, soft cuddly toys, noisy toys. But little if any thought will be given to how safe they are.

This, the National Safety Council points out, just isn't smart.

"Fortunately," it said, "most toy manufacturers have done their best to make their products safe for youngsters. But a toy perfectly safe for an 8-year-old may be quite unsuitable for a toddler."

The Council made these recommendations about buying toys this Christmas:

1. Teach children how to use the toys.
2. Keep an eye out for possible wear of damage—broken edges or splinters, for example.
3. Perhaps most important, buy toys that suit the child's age.

The council gave these suggestions on what toys to buy:

For children up to 2 years. Buy sturdy rattles, washable squeak blocks, stuffed animals and dolls. Toys with round corners, push or pull toys, and large colored balls.

Beware of small toys that can be swallowed. Flammable toys, and toys with poisonous paint, sharp edges, button eyes that can pull loose, removable parts.

Age 2 to 3. Tops for tots in this, the exploring age—sandbox toys,

**NATO's Shield May Wear Thin, As Cold War Thaws**

PARIS (UPI)—NATO, the West's principal defense alliance in Europe today, is facing an agonizing re-appraisal.

Gen. Lauris Norstad, the supreme commander of the alliance, has asked for 30 divisions as the minimum to make the defense shield effective in Europe. He wants them well equipped and gradually nuclearized.

At present NATO musters only about half this force, and prospects of a thaw in the cold war are threatening to weaken still further member contributions. Expert voices have raised the alarm that the defense shield, devised 10 years ago as an outright reaction to the Kremlin's aggressive policies, is wearing thin.

The foreign ministers of the 15-member alliance meet in Paris next week at a full-dress ministerial council for a close look at the alliance's needs. First, the smaller nations of the alliance, Benelux and the Scandinavians, are dissatisfied with the alleged big power policy "monopoly" and have been urging closer consultation with them.

on all major international policy issues. This poses a serious problem for the United States, Britain and France who feel that while they are prepared to consult their smaller allies they must, nevertheless, retain a free hand in major issues which require at some stages confidential or speedy handling.

Second, there is the paralyzing uncertainty of France's role in NATO, with President Charles De Gaulle seemingly unwilling to proceed with integration of French forces into the NATO force. To all appearance, France cannot be fobbed with something short of nuclear independence, or outright allied nuclear weapons sharing.

Moreover, at the present rate Germany, with 12 divisions by the end of next year, will outnumber all other NATO powers on the ground, including the United States and Britain.

With her target of some 1,000 planes, Germany will become the second strongest NATO partner in the air, after the United States. The projected nuclearization of German forces assumes a formidable aspect in the light of this power shift.

Either of the two courses men-

tioned previously is held unrealistic at present. Moreover, there is the growing danger that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's smiles could prove a strong temptation to some NATO members to cut the burdensome defense expenditures. Belgium already plans a cut of her share to NATO.

Such a trend spells increased danger at a moment when the United States is tightening her purse strings and is appealing to her European allies to carry a bigger share of the defense costs in the light of Europe's vastly improved economic situation.

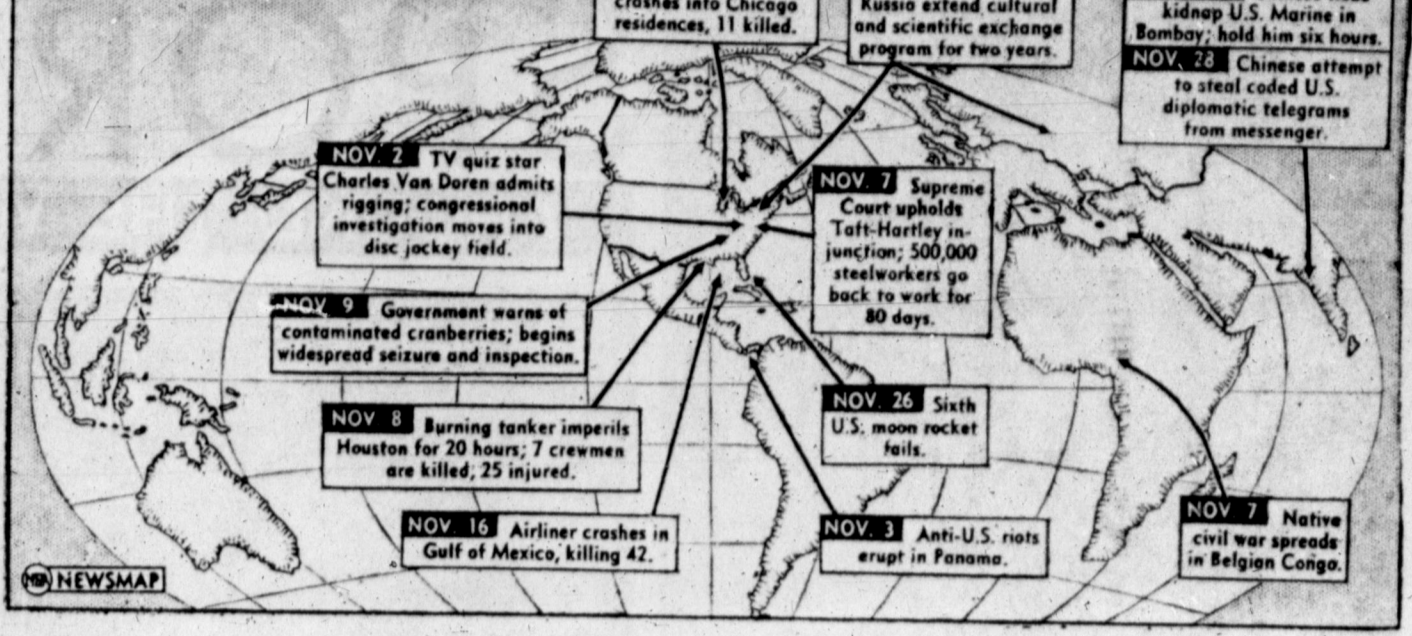
Next week's Paris council will thus face one of its most formidable tasks in recent years of mending fences in the NATO alignment.

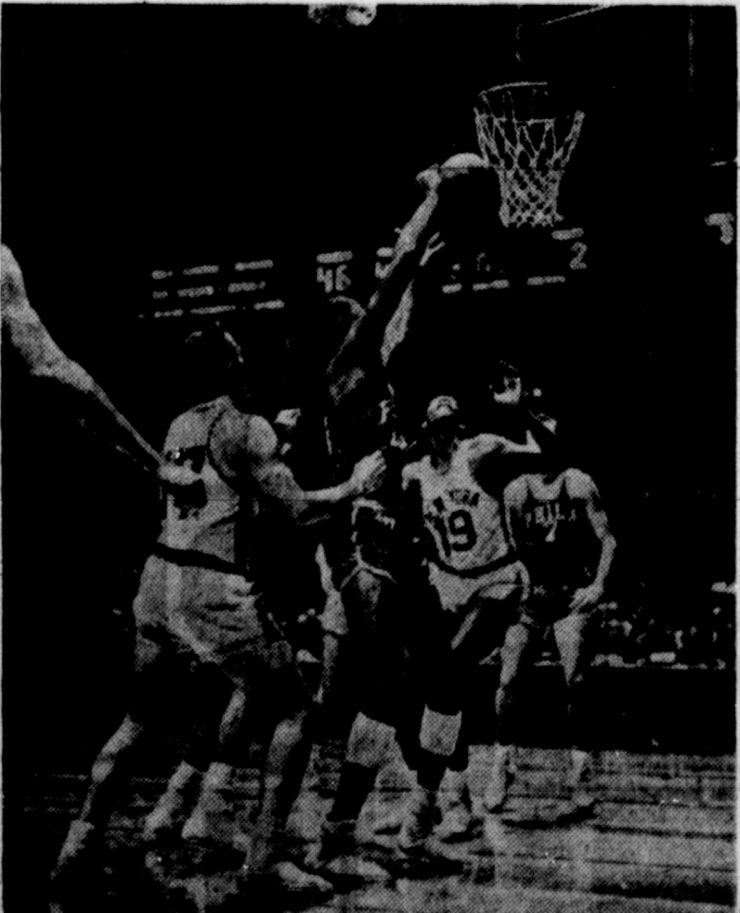

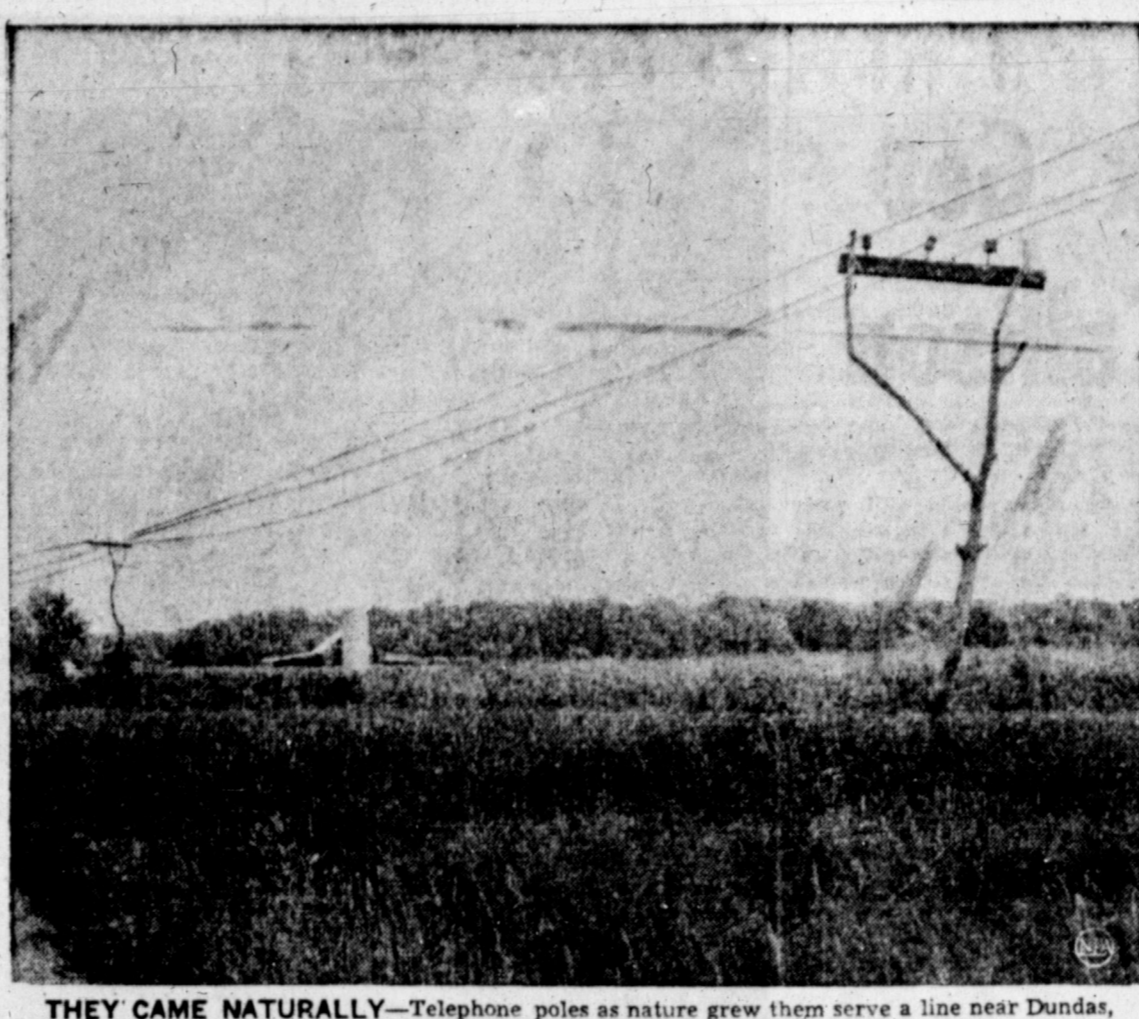

## Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI) — This year's front-runner for next year's presidential nomination is a man who merits your compassionate sympathy.  
 Almost anything can happen to a front-runner, and often does. He is the patsy, the fall guy, the common enemy of all other runners. All of the other runners know that they can score only if the front-runner in their party can be brought down, never mind how, just so he is brought down.  
 Among the Democrats, Sen. John F. Kennedy probably best understands the foregoing facts. And, among the Democrats, the Young senator has constant and urgent cause to wish these facts were not so.  
 Among the Republicans, of course, Vice President Richard M. Nixon is the man out in front and, therefore, the man who must be brought down before any other Republican can take seriously his own chances.  
 Ground rules such as these make the great game of politics a mean and bruising contest. All's fair in politics, and the time is approaching when sweetness and light may be expected to diminish and the back-stabbing to begin.  
 The coy and cautious politicians who right now are campaigning from here to yonder for their party nominations still avoid open declaration of their candidacies. There is a reason for that. Such a statement simply would doubly alert all other aspirants speedily to get a hold on the business of knocking off the declared.  
 So it is that the full weight of political misfortune implicit in the current public discussion of artificial birth control fell heavily on the head of front-runner Kennedy. There are other Roman Catholics among the numerous Democrats who are playing with the idea of being president.  
 But it was to Kennedy that the newsmen hurried for a statement when the bishops of his church spoke up again against birth control.  
 The advantage of being front-runner, of course, is that the prize can be won if the pace can be maintained. Nixon, equally with Kennedy, is aware of that. What troubles some of the vice president's most ardent supporters right now is that the polls will boomrang. That would be deadly to Nixon's political future.  
 The pills in recent weeks have squashed the Nixon can't win argument. But will the argument stay squashed? That is the question.

other 15. But it is unfair to viewers to remove the main character from more than half of the series. Therefore, I'm going to show up in all of them."  
 Stack, son of extraordinarily wealthy parents, was afraid televiewers would blame him for misrepresenting his role in the hour-long adventure series.  
 "The minute an audience is cheated they put the blame on the performer," he explained.  
 "I realized it would be a mistake to devote less than all my attention and energy to the series."

In the past few years Bob was snagging the flashy, neurotic roles which most actors these days consider prime parts. Stack found them limited and unsatisfactory.  
 "It feels good to let the other guy play the flash role," he grinned. "In the series I play a 'good guy,' and it seems to be making an impression on the public."

If Stack appears to be overzealous it's only natural. He owns 25 per cent of the series through his Langford Productions. His canny entry into TV has upped his price for movies from \$30,000 per picture to the \$100,000 bracket.  
 "The best part of a TV series is the constant work," Bob concluded. "In movies you make one picture, then sit around for a year. In TV you keep busy all year long."

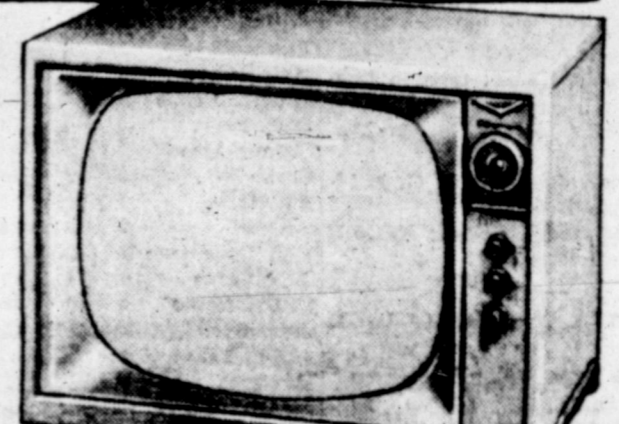

# Chicago White Sox Get Freese For John Callison

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Baseball men tipped their hats to the White Sox today for making the best deals of the meetings despite Frank Lane's angry accusations that they had "pulled a fast one" in their latest trade with the Phillies.

Lane was steaming and he didn't care who knew it over the deal in which the White Sox obtained hard-hitting third baseman Gene Freese from the Phils for rookie outfielder Johnny Callison.

The burned-up Cleveland general manager said he believed the White Sox were promised Freese before they traded third baseman-outfielder Bubba Phillips to his club in a seven-man deal last Sunday.

Stengel Expresses Shock

"I never thought the White Sox could get Freese," Lane snapped. "In fact, John Quinn (General manager of the Phils) told me he wouldn't trade him. I sort of figured they'd get a third baseman, but never dreamed it would be someone like Freese. Now they've got one helluva ball club."

Even Casey Stengel, whose Yankees didn't complete a single deal during the minor and major league meetings, expressed shock over the Freese deal.

"I never heard Philadelphia advertise he was on the market," Stengel remarked.

"The White Sox came down here needing a left-fielder and a third baseman," he went on. "and they left here with both of 'em. First they got (Minnie) Minoso in that seven-man swap with Cleveland and now they come up with Freese, who they tell me is another Babe Ruth."

The Ruthian reference to Freese stems from his showing this year with the Phils. Freese opened the season as a pinch hitter and delivered five pinch homers. He hit a total of 23 homers, including four with the bases full, while driving in 70 runs and batting .268.

Up until the moment he left here Tuesday night, Lane still was trying to swing another deal for Cleveland. He offered Cal McLish, Billy Martin and minor league pitcher Dick Stigman to Gabe Paul of Cincinnati for Johnny Temple. Paul rode all the way

# Ft. Sill To Fight Here Thursday

Pampa's Optimist Boys Club boxers take on the Fort Sill, Okla., boxing squad Thursday night in their second major inter-city match of the year. The bouts begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Boys Club.

Pampa's district champion heavyweight Wesley Crites, will also make his first ring appearance of this season. He's expected to meet James Jackson, who was Alabama heavyweight champion before entering the service. Crites' best hope of victory may lie in his baffling southpaw style of fighting.

Fort Sill's Lewis Bell, who is listed as a light middleweight, is expected to meet Pampa middleweight Norman Rexroat. This will be the second appearance for the year for Rexroat, who proved by winning a unanimous decision last week that he can box as well as slug. Rexroat was one of Pampa's top crowd-pleasing sluggers last season.

Among the other Pampa fighters who will probably see action Thursday will be lightweights Ronnie Morgan and James Morse. However, both are recovering from injuries and may not be ready by fight time.
