He was a major in World War II with Gen, George Patton's Third Army, In 1945, he was given the mission of returning to Budapest the hand of St. Stephen, first king of Hungary, whose body was removed from its grave about 30 years after his death.

His hand was found intact, however, and honored by Hungarians who believed no harm could come to their homeland as long as the hand was there.

## Victims Killed By Hammering

FORT WORTH (UPI) - Police hoped today that fingerprints on a glass would lead them to a killer who beat an aged couple to death with such ferocity that their brains spattered the walls of their bedroom.

Homicide Capt. O. R. Brown said it was the most vicious killing he had seen in Fort Worth, which is noted for the violence of its gangland killings.

The victims of the killing Brown and every man on his homicide detail were investigating were Vernon Stanley, 67, and his wife. Hattie, 65. Stanley was a well to do retired automobile dealer.

They were beaten to death with a club or piece of iron. The weapon inflicted cuts an inch and a half to three and a half inches along in their heads and was used with such violence that their brains and blood spattered the wall.

"It's a terrible mess, the most brutal killing I can re-






WASHINGTON (UPI) - The most natural thing in politics is for all hands to gang up on the fleet fellow who is running ahead of the pack for a presidential nomination.







The Difficulties Of Government-Managed Surpluses

When I was reading the Baxter International Economic Research Bureau bulletin on "Newest Trend in World Commodities," I was impressed with the futility of the government attempting to control surpluses.

William J. Baxter has been in the Far East for several weeks and on his way back stopped off at Honolulu, Hawaii. He ob-

"The opportunities for young people in Hawaii certainly appear to be quite limited and the migration from the islands will, in the years ahead, be quite substantial. More than 60 per cent of the food needed for subsistence here has to be imported and control over the movement of these goods is tied up to a very great extent with the Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union, which employs 20,000 to 25,000 persons, or one-tenth of the actual labor force of the state. Big business and big labor have tremendous influence in . Hawaii."

Agricultural Exports Everyone knows that United States has been buying up surplus wheat, cotton, tabacco and various other commodities. Here is what Baxter has to say about the over-all agricultural export picture of the United States' decline in 1958:

. . . The American exports of agricultural products in 1958 dropped to \$3.85 billion, sharply below the \$4.5 billion of 1957. This decline of 14 per cent tied in very closely with a similar decline in the non-agricultural export market. It is important to note that more than half of the decline occurred in shipments to highly industrialized countries, including Great Britain, Canada, Japan, West Germany and the Netherlands. Quite frankly, I, for one, believe that, if it had not been for the various government export programs, which account for almost a third of our agricultural shipments, the over-all agricultural export picture would

have been absolutely disastrous." Then Mr. Baxter gives a table showing the exports for various

In 1957 United States exported in 1958, 4.6 million bales of cotton, a decline of 33 per cent. But it must be remembered that we were selling cotton abroad at much less than we were selling Under wheat and flour, in 1957

we exported 495 million bushels and in 1958, 413 million bushels, or a decline in export of 17 per

Rice declined 25 per cent. Feed grains and canned fruits were the only increases. grains exports increased 42 per cent and canned truits increased 16 per cent.

Fresh orange exports declined 51 per cent. Meat products declined 32 per

cent. Canned vegetables declined 21

per cent.

#### Looking Sideways

NEW YORK-Boys, you might as well face it, you are being taken over. Women are taking you over. The process is subtle, slow but certain.

For exactly nine years the invasion has been underway, and as things stand now, here is the evidence of how much ground you have lost.

It is internationally accepted by psychiatrists, domestic relations workers, students of sociology and others studying the human animal that the American male has lost his position. What is more distressing is that he likes it that way. He isn't at all downcast. Women dominate the financial picture, dominate the home. Women own more money and securities in the United States than do men. Every passing year adds to the percentage. Medical men announced seven years ago that exhaustive tests showed that women were by far the better and more reliable drivers of automobiles. They had fewer accidents, handled the cars

with more skill and were more

careful observants of traffic laws.

Jokes and cartoons to the con-

trary, female drivers excelled all down the test line. Medical men announced five years ago that women had more stamina, resistance to disease and tolerance of pain than men. They had fewer colds, less cancer, less tuberculosis, less heart disease. They were able to wear less clothing in severe weather and survive it than men. They had less high blood pressure, less arthritis, less of almost anything you could mention, including polio, but fell down in one depart-

Just now medical men have announced that tests covering four years have established beyond question that women have more acute hearing than men and suffer less from deafness. They begin life with more sensitive ears and keep them in working order

The other day a New Jersey executive who has to do with a "package house repair" service growing up in and around Newark, telephoned to suggest it would make a good story.

"It was an idea put together by men," he said blithely, "but actually it has met with success because women now run the home night and day and they want immediate plumbing, repair, electrical, painting and allied 'services without waiting for their husbands to attend to it." I hesitated and said; well, I didn't know, but I didn't think women went that far, quite.

"They certainly do," he said, and I think it's for the better. Anybody knows the woman boss these days."

Here was a man of attainments, of success, experiencing not the slightest embarrassment in admitting openly that women bossed the ranch these days.

With a few exceptions, women know more about what is truly wrong with a household device's developing ailments than do the men. They can detect advance murmurs in oil burners, know exactly what is wrong with a washing machine or electric iron and can use a bent coat hanger to repair a dishwasher. The repair
