The report followed indications that President Eisenhower is personally interceding with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to break the log jam in East-West negotiations.

The log jam had reached such proportions here that the conference appeared on the brink of failure and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan was reported ready to fly to Washington and Moscow in an effort to head off dis-

Western ministers did not expect outright acceptance now. But a word from Gromyko that he is willing to accept the plan as a "basis for discussion" could be enough to prevent breakdown of the so-far deadlocked talks.

Jets In Attack

YOKOSUKA, Japan (UPI) The crew of a U.S. Navy patrol bomber attacked by Communist MIG jets over the Sea of Japan said today they were unable to fire back because some guns were out of order and the Reds knocked out the tail gun.

Lt. Cmdr. Donald Mayer of Nyack, N.Y., and Litchfield, Conn., heroic pilot of the plane, gave the order to return the fire but a broken intercom system kept the order from reaching tail gunner Eugene Corder of Jacksonville, Ill., an aviation electrician's mate.

Answering Gues. On Coveting

A reader asked several questions on coveting and challenges my oft-repeated statement that if it is coveting for one man to do a thing, then it is coveting or immoral no matter how many people do the same thing.

Since many people believe the agents of the majority or the State have a right to do things that are coveting for the individual to do, the answers to the questions this man has asked are important. I want to repeat his questions and answer them.

First is the oft-repeated question about the roads that are owned by the government. Many, many people are confused on this subject. and because they are confused on this, they are confused on many other subjects. He asks:

Question: "Do you believe that It is morally wrong for a traffic officer to force a reckless driver to the curb? Would it be right for an individual to do that?" Answer: to the first question is

ves: to the second, "No", Since the roads are owned by the state, the agents of it have a right to specify on what conditions a man can use the roads, just as a man who owns a toll road has a right can use the road. And the owner of a toll road is not violating the coveting commandment to force a man to the curb and compel him

Question: "Is it wrong for a majority to make laws by which an officer can take a man by force and get him locked up as dangerously insane?"

Answer: It is wrong for the majority to make laws under which an officer can take a man by force and get him locked up as dangerous and insane so long as that man is on private property with the consent of the owner. If he is on private or public property without the consent of the owner or the owners, the owners of private property, if the man will not get off the property, have a right to use force either to lock him up and feed him if they want to or to put him in a private sanitarium and pay for his keep or throw him off and keep him off.

Question: "Could it be right for individual to decide that his neighbor is insane, and, acting individually, lock him up?"

Answer: Not if he was not on his property. If he was on his property he would have a right if he couldn't get him off to lock him up and join with others on a voluntary basis provided they would pay the costs.

My authority or the statement that the Coveting Commandment also means that we have no right to do collectively what would be coveting if done as an individual is that the servant is not greater than his master; that the agents have no right to do things that the principal does not have a right to do. To claim that the agent or the servant has a right to do things that the master or the principal does not have a right to do is to contend that there are no moral absolutes, no eternal principles that apply to every individual in every occasion. The authority comes from the Creator as expressed in The Declaration of Independence.

Question: "Do you class all taxation as a violation of the coming commandment?"

Answer: Yes. Question: "Is it coveting to tax a minority to help pay for a sewer, or does the coveting commandment require the majority to let the minority expose the majority to typhoid fever?"

Answer: There are two ques tions there. It is coveting to tax the minority to help pay for a sewer if the owner does not want to use the sewers and does not expose anyone to typhoid fever, The Coveting Commandment does not require the majority to let the minority expose the majority to typhoid fever. The Coveting Commandment does not interfere with the individual having the right to use defensive force or have an agent use voluntarily supported defensive force. But it does not

use defensive force. Question: "What are your etern-

al laws of rightness?" Answer; My eternal laws of rightness are the Coveting Commandment and that you cannot serve two masters. You cannot believe in voluntaryism and involuntarvism at the same time.

The authority is that this position does not require a man to evade an answer. He is not embarrassed by questions. And any man who is embarrassed by guestions and will not define his terms has no national authority for his

The Decalogue also says "Thou shait not murder," which is the rea! meaning of the Commandment "Thou shalt not kill."



As a result of this activity, individuals who have lost limbs or parts of limbs, and those born with malformed or missing limbs, can now look forward to being fitted with effective substitues.

These now provide opportunity for living again the normal life if independence. In the otherwise healthy individual, amputation is today no longer a bar to leading an almost normal life.

The amputee today is fitted and trained by a group of individuals known as an "amputee clinic team." Together they apply to the patient the skills of the physician, the limbmaker (or prosthetist), and the physical and occupational therapist.

Now York - Let us take up the somewhat confused and bewiidering story that a long-time friend and superb woman named Joan Crawford is or is not, by own admissions, broke. One Los Angeles reporter quotes Miss C. as having said flat out that she was not only broke but didn't have "a sou to my name. Uncle Sam has it all." Other reporters, notiled by having missed this startling confession, hastened to Miss Crawford's side and now quote her as saying "there was a possibility of misinterpretation." In other words, she does have a sou. Maybe not much more, but that much at least. It seems to me, who was not

particularly aware of Miss Crawford's fortunes either way, that what is needed here is a calm recital of facts as I know them. Joan Crawford was (and still is) a motion picture star and has been that for about 25 years. Maybe 30 years. A long time, She is 51 years old now and was in her early 20's when she first was summoned to California and a showerbath of gold by the week. She did not earn enormous sums right at first, but neither were income taxes anything but token items. She was at the beginning and still is an economically wise and sagarious woman who does not fritter away what her talents have earned her. As her fame grew, her income grew and it grew to healthy size during the low tax period in our history. She cannily enough and admirably enough invested in several things, among them Los Angeles real estate. I have never discussed as much as 50 cents with Miss Crawford, but my information is that she long has owned several exceedingly valuable parcels of Los Angeles real estate with apartment houses on them.

When the second World War came and taxes began to spiral upward, she still was a hefty earner of money, but it has to be said that taxes, both federal and California state, took great chunks out of each annual increment. By then, however, she owned a beautiful and costly house in West Los Angeles as well as the other real estate parcels. Then she was married to Alfred Steele, president of a cola company, whose income was about \$60,000 a year, not counting any bonuses or other gains. Indeed, it has been said that it was possible for him, under his arrangements, to earn as much as \$150,000 a year. One of the first things they did was to

acquire a cooperative New York apartment and redesign of this haven was extensive and expensive. Some printed estimates ran as high as \$300,000, which I would the kind of sound business woman who, if she had, to spend \$300. 000, would spend it on acquiring the whole property. In other words, as a down-payment on the apartment house itself. 
